The St. Tammany Parish Public School is involved in a broad-based community effort to establish strategic plans for educational improvement at the District and School Levels. Funding for a planning grant has been made available from the Goals 200 Educate America Act. The planning process includes community members, teachers and parents who will play a major role in designing educational programs to meet the individual needs of all students.

The planning process facilitated by Carol Fleischman and Dr. John Cornwell set out to explore past history that impacted education in St. Tammany Parish. Next, a vision was set to show how St. Tammany Parish Public Schools would look if all eight national goals were in place. Contradicting factors standing in the way of progress were identified. Once obstacles standing in the way of the vision were identified, new directions for the future were set that strategically eliminate those blocks. Action planning that positively impacts student performance will be conducted by trained facilitators. Eight community volunteers have agreed to be community contact people for each of the national goals. They will serve as an advisory committee to ensure that the Local Improvement Plan reflects the Vision and New Directions set forth by the broad-based community group and the schools.

Each separate school will develop a strategic plan for educational improvement. School-based facilitators have been trained to guide the faculty and staff through the planning process.

The outcome of this planning effort is the production of a systemwide plan and a plan for each school to use as a guide to the future. The eight goals from the Educate America Act will be addressed at all levels.

With the finalization of a plan, the system will apply for an implementation grant from the State. We will then be moving forward with deliberate speed to make decisions for the future based on our motto: "Is It Best For Kids?"

I appreciate all who have had a part in the planning process and look forward to implementation in the coming years.

### INTRODUCTION TO PROCESS

#### THE STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS

This first phase of our collaborative planning process has brought together teachers, parents and community partners for two goals:

- to incorporate a Strategic Planning Process that generates continuous improvement and implementation for the school
- to collaborate with Educators, Businesses, and Parents in defining and working toward a shared vision for local education

The combination of ideas and new communication is at the heart of this consensus planning. Consensus means "con" (with) and "sensire" (to sense), that is, to listen and hear each other's perspectives until we have a common "sense" of what we all feel is needed. Thus, consensus uses both rational and intuitive thinking. Consensus allows us to make decisions together—and it is through understanding "our best wisdom" that we are able to take practical action together.

In each of our four workshops, a consensus-building methodology has been utilized. The school representatives were guided through a highly participatory process that honored the individual input of each person in small groups as well as the corporate wisdom (consensus) of the group in large plenary sessions.

In each of the workshops we used:

- Brainstorming...as individuals and as teams
- Organizing...the workshop data
- Naming...clusters of related information
- Deciding...the consensus

In four meetings, we have developed a dynamic, living, implementable plan. This Journal holds our consensus—our best wisdom, at this time, for a new direction for our school and a comprehensive plan of action. Quarterly Refocus Events will continue to update our plan and engage people in this participatory process.


