# ELEMENTARY DESIGN

CONTEXT: It is important to start on time whether food is up or not. Children come directly to table and sit down. The Guru starts at 6:30 no matter if one or all 24 children are present. Starting on time will encourage all to get to dinner on time.

Note: This cycle the Guru role is done by an adult not an emerging generation.

# PRESCHOOL DESIGN

CONTEXT: It is important to start on time whether food is up or not. If food is late and many times it is possible to maintain order by SINGING OR READING A STORY (a book may be borrowed from the preschool room next door). DO NOT LET THE CHILDREN RUN AROUND. When departing for floors DO NOT WAIT FOR E.G.

Children are cared for by demanding they care for the corporate - pass to the right, use the appropriate eating utencil, stay in your seat.
