IT'S A REVOLUTIONARY SWINGING SUCCESS!

More than 2,000 persons tripped the light fantastic on 1980's Valentine's Day at Uptown's sixth Annunal Valentine Ball. Fourteen buses and six vans were kept busy transporting eager dancers from all across Chicago's Uptown neighborhood to the once famous Aragon Ballroom. (Built in 1926 at a cost of \$1,750,000 and designed to represent a Moorish palace, the Aragon was known for many years as "one of America's most beautiful ballrooms.")

Representing all ages, walks of life and ethnic groups, those who attended had one important thing in common—the desire to celebrate their love of community by giving their all to staging a truly gala affair.

They did just that and loved every minute of it. A key event of the afternoon's festivities was the historic debut of the new musical composition, *The Valentine Swing*. The number was written especially for the occasion and dedicated to Uptown by Don Sadofsky, who is director of the Revolutionary Swing Orchestra.

Broad community's support allowed the event to come off as planned. A number of area businesses helped sponsor the ball through donations of money, goods and services. Community agencies and residents contributed time and talent. This year alone, 27 organizations served on the Valentine's Ball Steering Committee worked long and hard for two months to ensure the ball's success. There were 34 policemen in attendance at the ball itself.

One person who served on the steering committee volunteered this opinion of the 1980 Valentine Ball: "This year was a time of more revolutionary changes than a new song. The attendance increased quite alot. The ball was spearheaded by the community itself. Of the six work forces involved in planning the event, four were chaired by people in our community, and the convenor of the steering committee was a neighborhood resident. The ball was organized by the community belonged to the community and was made a swinging success by the community."

Or, as another participant put it, "It was fun; let's do it again!"

Silent Servant

Celia Nemerow brings the news to Uptown.

Not every now and then. Not once a month, or even weekly. She brings news to Uptown daily-and that's seven times a week.

Celia Nemerow is the owner of the newsstand at the Lawrence El stop. Fifteen years ago Celia and her husband were looking for a good place to sell the news, and when they found the Lawrence El stop available, they grabbed it.

Now her days begin at 4:30 a.m., when the papers arrive for here to count and purchase. Then the challenge starts. If she doesn't sell enough, she'll lose money, or barely meet the cost of purchase. If the weather's good and the news is exciting, the papers will pay for themselves and help the Nemerow income. The challenge has to be met seven days a week, day in and day out.

Occasionally, however, a change of pattern occurs that makes a helpful difference. Sunday afternoons, for example. Newspapers aren't for sale on Sunday afternoons. Ms. Nemerow watches TV, visits her children, or snatches a few minutes to talk to friends. Or, as last winter, the news sales were temporarily moved inside the building. Despite the threat of a salesdrop, sales continued as usual, and being out of the freezing cold to sell her papers was a warm and welcome respite.

COMMUNITY RESOURCES

Need help with your 1979 Income Taxes? Specially trained law students at Chicago Kent College of Law have volunteered time to help the poor and elderly prepare their taxes. (A limited amount of help is available for the Spanish-speaking.) You must take your W-2 forms and tax forms, along with any other necessary documents, to the school at 77 S. Wacker—one block south and two block west of the El station at Madison and Wells. The students are working under the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program sponsored by the American Bar Association, the Internal Revenue Service and the Illinois Department of Public Aid. Those who wish help should call for an appointment between noon and 5 pm Monday through Thursday or between 9 am and 5 pm on Friday. Tel: 567-5975.

Snowed under by your winter heating bills? Help may be available at your local Community Service Center, 4554 N. Broadway. In order to qualify, you must pay a heating bill. You must also pass an income test. The maximum income allowed to qualify depends upon the number of people in your family, from one on up. As an example, if there are four in your family, your maximum income for 1979 would be \$8,375; if six, the maximum would be \$11,125. Age does not matter. The heating allowance for those who qualify is paid directly to the heating company, up to a maximum of \$300. (If you are on Aid and received \$200, your maximum would be \$100.) Take your proof of income for 1979 with you, or your medical card if you are on Aid. For further information, call 334-8200.

Need help with your welfare application or appeal or on any other problem with welfare? Help is available at no cost at the Heart of Uptown Coalition, 1222 W. Wilson. The volunteers there will assist you in filing an appeal, getting emergency aid, applying for welfare, etc. (Note that if you want to file an appeal, you must do so within 10 days of the notice of your aid being cut off in order to keep your check coming.) Someone is available to take your call between 9 am and 1 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays. (An appointment can be arranged if you cannot come at this time.) Ask for Walter Tunis at 769-2085.



Throughout Chicago volunteer citizens work with the Beat Rep Program to help to improve police-community relations and work for crime prevention. If you or your group wants to organize a workshop encrime prevention, they can help with speakers and audio-visual aids. If you see a problem in your area but don't want to talk directly to the police, then tell them. If they can't help, they may be able to tell you who can. STAND UP AND BE COUNTED! CENSUS IN UPTOWN

The Census! The Census! Everybody's talking about the Census. On March 28th,1980 over 200 million Census questionnaires were mailed out all over America. And since mid-April, Census enumerators have been knocking on the doors of those who have not yet answered the Census questions.

What do they want with you?
Why answer?

Well how else can the nation allocate money to meet the needs of the people?

The Census happens once every ten years. In the last census many people mistakenly wouldn't answer, fearing their privacy would be destroyed, or public aide might be cut.

And so Uptown, particularly our minorities, were undercounted and so underserviced.

Here are the facts: 1) The only thing your name and address is used for is to tell who has already answered the census. After that, information is stored on computer tapes, without any identification and your answer becomes one of thousands of faceless answers just like yours. 2) It is a felony for anyone to give out the information you send in like name and address, for 72

years after it comes in. It is punishable by 5 years in jail and a \$5,000 fine. 3) The people who come to your house are usually from your neighborhood. 4) Finally, the questions asked on the Census are no more 'personal' than the Public Aide forms or job applications. That's it. Your privacy is insured, even protected. And in return look what we have to gain-better jobs, services, education. So, answer the Censusthe life you help will be your own!

PHIL ARENDT—A Friend in Deed—

When 5443 Winthrop burned on Feb. 7th, 1980, Phil, a neighborhood fire prevention leader, arrived at the burning home in time to save five lives. He spent the next day helping families locate missing members.



There is a man who lives in Uptown, just like me and you, who cares about people in Uptown. He finds it "exciting, real, with a great deal of comraderie, acceptance and warmth."

His name is Phil Arendt. He has the job of fire prevention program co-chairman; as well as president of Department of Human Services (DHS) Advisory Council, and he is a member of the board of directors of the Uptown Chicago Commission.

He gave an outstanding example of his care on Feb. 7, 1980, when he saved five lives from a disastrous fire at 5443 N. Winthrop. Then later followed up by helping to re-unite families seperated in the confusion.

Besides saving lives Phil works at saving buildings. Some of his hobbies are restoring doorplates, stripping wood, and sanding floors.

Phil Arendt is one man who cares about his community and the people he shares it with.





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

STAND UP AND BE COUNTED! CENSUS IN UPTOWN

The Census! The Census! Everybody's talking about the Census. On March 28th,1980 over 200 million Census questionnaires were mailed out all over America. And since mid-April, Census enumerators have been knocking on the doors of those who have not yet answered the Census questions.

What do they want with you? Why answer?

Well how else can the nation allocate money to meet the needs of the people?

The Census happens once every ten years. In the last census many people mistakenly wouldn't answer, fearing their privacy would be destroyed, or public aide might be cut.

And so Uptown, particularly our minorities, were undercounted and so underserviced.

Here are the facts: 1) The only thing your name and address is used for is to tell who has already answered the census. After that, information is stored on computer tapes, without any identification and your answer becomes one of thousands of faceless answers just like yours. 2) It is a felony for anyone to give out the information you send in like name and address, for 72

years after it comes in. It is punishable by 5 years in jail and a \$5,000 fine. 3) The people who come to your house are usually from your neighborhood. 4) Finally, the questions asked on the Census are no more 'personal' than the Public Aide forms or job applications. That's it. Your privacy is insured, even protected. And in return look what we have to gain-better jobs, services, education. So, answer the Censusthe life you help will be your own!

PHIL ARENDT—A Friend in Deed—

When 5443 Winthrop burned on Feb. 7th, 1980, Phil, a neighborhood fire prevention leader, arrived at the burning home in time to save five lives. He spent the next day helping families locate missing members.



There is a man who lives in Uptown, just like me and you, who cares about people in Uptown. He finds it "exciting, real, with a great deal of comraderie, acceptance and warmth."

His name is Phil Arendt. He has the job of fire prevention program co-chairman; as well as president of Department of Human Services (DHS) Advisory Council, and he is a member of the board of directors of the Uptown Chicago Commission.

He gave an outstanding example of his care on Feb. 7, 1980, when he saved five lives from a disastrous fire at 5443 N. Winthrop. Then later followed up by helping to re-unite families seperated in the confusion.

Besides saving lives Phil works at saving buildings. Some of his hobbies are restoring doorplates, stripping wood, and sanding floors.

Phil Arendt is one man who cares about his community and the people he shares it with.


THE AMERICAN DIABETES ASSN., Northern Illinois Affiliate, will sponsor its summer camp for insulin-dependent children.

AT YOUR SERVICE!

• Want to cut your food bill? Here are two ways that may help:

1) The Heart of Uptown Coalition has a food cooperative that offers fresh produce, eggs, butter, cheese, canned foods and paper products at a savings. Member place orders for what they want on Tuesday and pick them up on Friday or Saturday. Membership costs 50¢ per month per family. For further information, call the coalition (1222 W. Wilson) at 769-2085 and ask for Mark Kaplan.

2) There is a plot at Leland and Winthrop, about which you can get information from Debbie Kahn at Hull House (561-3500). Those who are going to garden the plot get together adn co-operate in the management of some activities such as watering. Each person has his or her own space and grows what he or she wants, and some former members can give advice on what has grown well. Additionally, the Urban Garden Program (University of Illinois Agricultural Extension) plows the ground and can give advice.

- Do you have a noisey neighbor, trouble with a shopkeeper or customer over faulty goods or non-payment, or a dispute with your landlord or tenant? Instead of allowing the problem to worsen through inaction, or hiring a lawyer and taking the matter to court, bring it to the Uptown-Edgewater Neighborhoods Justice Center, 4753 N. Broadway. Suite 1122.

Residents of Uptown-Edgewater and nearby communities, who have been trained in the skills of mediation by the American Arbitration Association, serve as impartial third parties to help disputants develop mutually satisfactory settlements to their problems.

Since this service is underwritten by foundation grants, it is free. Mediation sessions can be scheduled in the evening or on Saturdays. as well as during regular business hours. They may be conducted in Spanish and Japanese as well as English. Call us at 561-4721. We will contact the other party and schedule a mediation session if he or she agrees.

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
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
