Visions of Uptown

One of the booths at the Bicentennial Valentine Ball was a Heritage Booth at which there was a questionaire titled 'Visions of Uptown.' The following is a summary and interpretation of the questionaires that were completed at that booth

The first two questions dealing with the national background and date of arrival of ancestors to America reflect the wide diversity of Uptown. Date of arrival of families go back to pre historic times with one native American Indian; three dated ancestors arrival before the American Revolution; two in the 1800's; six in the 1900's. National origin included five from Germanic states, four from the British Isles, two from Italy and one from Russia.

The third question, 'What important challenges has America faced in your lifetime?' had a high percentage of similar answers. From the eleven answering that question, five said something about war; two each mentioned education or the depression. Other answers included welfare and resources for international development.

The answers to the last two questions dealing with the challenges our grand-children will have to face and the practical proposals that will help them meet these challenges, are typical of the nation's confused picture of the future and how we should approach it. There were no two answers alike for either the challenges or the proposals.

Challenges ranged from very practical issues like 'making a go of marriage' to very broad concerns like 'ignorance' or 'life'. Only eight people offered proposals, and they also ranged from very practical things like 'more scholarships' to the very broad like 'common sense and patience.'


Once again Uptown has demonstrated that it is an example of the diversity makes America great.

Uptown Changes Indian Village

'Maliwada is a village 16 km. away from Aurangabad on the Bombay-Aurangabad Road. Since it is situated at the foot of the historic Deogiri fortress, one's attention is immediately attracted to the tall pillars of this piece of history while the little town at its foot remains neglected. Even today it is bypassed and unnoticed and this element of neglect is almost the symbol of Maliwada. But today, a transformation has happened; Maliwada looks like it will attract the world's attention. It seems like Aladdin himself rubbed his magic lamp and ordered the genii to create a palace. That has happened!'

This was the enthusiastic reaction of one Indian newspaper to the Maliwada Human Dévelopment Project. Eugene Boivin of the Uptown 5 Guild was one of the consultants who launched this project last December at the invitation of the government of India. His report to the Guild, given at their special meeting on February 24, 1976, emphasized that the key to this 'magic' is contained in the methods used in this project which is but one of eight Social Demonstrations being performed across the globe.

'These projects,' according to Boivin, 'work because local man across the globe has needs and hopes that draw attention in every nation. These dreams only need practical ways to be reached.' This has been shown at Maliwada where two con-

crete goals -- regular bus service to the market place of Aurangabad, and street lights for the village -- have already been met.

The Guild saw photographs of ancient temples carved from solid rock by the ancestors of people who now live in mud huts. 'How do these proud and hard working people become a great community in a new way?' This question, Boivin says, is answered by the project which is receiving money and people from leading businesses in India. He told the Guild about the 62 year old man in Maliwada (where the average lifetime is only 47 years) who used his wisdom as an Elder to guide the consult and who is determined to spend the rest of his life working to achieve the dreams set loose at the consult.

With fellow workers like this, we in Uptown are able to do our part. While Maliwada, whose name means 'gardener's village' inspires us, we will continue to create a community whose strength reaches around the globe.

The Guild, like Boivin, has 'fallen in love' -- with Maliwada and Uptown.
