SUMMARY REPORT

The Social Model PSU #2 met Week 5 of the Winter quarter to analyze the effective services available in Uptown 5. This was the second Problem Solving Unit, the first having focused on the problems and innocent suffering in this community. As the work of this PSU is examined, expanded, and corrected by the whole Guild, a third PSU will attempt to delineate a comprehensive statement of the problems of Uptown 5 and an effective practical vision and model for comprehensive care of this community.

The PSU reviewed the agency listing done during Summer '73, and corrected and updated that list. It, further, compiled a list of those agencies located adjacent to Uptown 5 and serving the community, though not located within the boundaries of the target area.

After a lengthy review of this data, the PSU evaluated the effectiveness of the service in each of the 45 programmatic arenas analyzed in the 5th City Model. The attached chart shows the ratings on a 0 to 10 scale (10 = most effective). The uncolored boxes are the 15 most effective areas served, the solidly colored blocks are the least effectively served, and the "cross-hatched" boxes are the middle 15. A careful analysis of this report, based on a more specific level, shows some difference from the first PSU, though it has large areas of agreement with it.

Included are paragraphs which describe the agencies serving each arena of the Social Model and the discerned contradiction currently being faced there.

THE ECONOMIC GUILD

NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH

1. Community Medical Center

Within Uptown 5 area there are:

- Chicago Lakeshore Hospital
- Weiss Memorial Hospital
- Cuneo Hospital
- Fox River Hospital (mental health)

On the surface these facilities would appear to be adequate for servicing community health needs. However, these facilities are called upon to absorb a large number of health problems generated from the numerous nursing homes and shelter care facilities in the area. Uptown 5 also has an unusually high proportion of senior citizens, children under 6 years of age and persons who have been released from state mental hospitals, groups which are heavy consumers of health care services.

2. Home Care Services

There are no centers for these services in Uptown 5. Agencies which are outside of Uptown 5 but still service the area are:

- Visiting Nurses Association
- Invalid Case Service
- Meals on Wheels
- R.S.V.P.

The effectiveness of these services has not been evaluated.

3. Public Health Outpost

Within Uptown 5 area there are:

- Uptown Neighborhood Health Center
- McCormick Boys Club Dental & Vision Clinic
- Edgewater-Uptown Mental Health Council
- Uptown Community Clinic (Drug Abuse)
- Department of Mental Health

Outside of Uptown 5 but serving the area is the Department of Public Health.

Summary: Neighborhood Health

Services would appear to be adequate but consumer need is heavy. The need for health care services in Uptown 5 is great because of the particular groups which make up a large percentage of the area's population. An unusually heavy demand for mental health services is present to support the large numbers of released mental hospital patients. Response to the health care needs of Uptown 5 residents has been adequate, but there is room for improvement.

ECONOMIC SERVICES

4. Job Development Agency

Within Uptown 5 area there are:

- Tri-Faith Employment Service
- Just Jobs
- U.S. Army Recruiting

The effectiveness of these services has not been evaluated.

5. Business Promotion*

Within Uptown 5 area there are:

- Chamber of Commerce
- Argyle Businessman's Association
- Hipsing Association

With the exception of the Hipsing Association, there seems to be very little effort being made to either actively support existing business or to encourage new business in the area.

* In the Fifth City Model this category is Home Economy Bureau, but there are no agencies in this category in Uptown 5 and the associations in the present Business Promotion category could not be included elsewhere.

6. Consumer Protection Board

There is no center for this service in Uptown 5. Outside of the area is the office opened by Bernard Carey. There is a definite need for service in this area.

Summary: Economic Services

The economic services of Uptown 5 which play a sustaining role in the community are definitely weak. When viewed historically, Uptown has moved from a state of being the second business center in the city to a collection of islands of small and in some cases collapsing businesses. Job opportunities are not abundant and protection for the consumer is nearly non-existent.

COMMUNITY HOUSING

7. Local Planning Commission

Within Uptown 5 area the Chicago Housing Authority is the only agency performing this function.

8. Uptown 5 Redevelopment Corporation

Within Uptown 5 there are:

- Voice of the People
- Uptown Chicago Commission, Housing Committee

Outside of Uptown 5, but influencing redevelopment of the area, is the City of Chicago Planning Commission.

9. Neighborhood Residents Association

Block Clubs in the Uptown 5 boundaries are:

- Margate Ainslie Neighbors
- Winona-Foster-Carmen-Winnemac Block Club
- Lakeside Place Block Club

Outside the area but influencing Uptown 5 are:
Block Clubs
Aldermen of 46th and 48th Wards

Summary: Community Housing

There is a great deal of interest in the housing issue exhibited by all of the block clubs and community organizations in Uptown 5 and outside the target area. City plans exist for the development of the North Side. Desires of the community and plans for development seem to have a difficult time in being translated into action.

Summary: Economic Guild

The sustaining services of Uptown 5 appear to provide adequate, if strained, health care services. Job opportunities are not, with some exceptions, abundant. The business community is not thriving and housing is one of the key problems in the target area. Much interest in action on the housing problems is displayed by community residents and organizations but little effective progress has been made in solving these problems. There seems to be neither financing nor mechanisms to encourage the growth of business or the development of family housing units.

The contradiction is in channelling the interest and energies of community residents and organizations into pathways of community business and housing revitalization.

THE EDUCATIONAL GUILD

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

10. Infant Care Center

There are no agencies within or outside of Uptown 5 which deal directly with the education of the infant child. The contradiction is that there is no structure that educates the child at this the start of his most formative years. The child is therefore started on the life journey not as rapidly as he could be, and also the mother, who the child is receiving his education from, could be released to work.

11. Community Mini School

There are no agencies within or outside the Uptown 5 protoparish which come to grip with the child of 18 months to 3 years as to their educational process. The ages of 18 months to 3 years old are formative years in the child's educational growth, yet in Uptown 5 there are no structures to enable the human enrichment of these formative years.

12. Uptown 5 Preschool

There are 8 preschools in the Uptown 5 proto parish:
Uptown Lutheran
Winthrop
Christopher House

Pilgrim
Lakeside Square
Hull House
NE Illinois
The McCutcheon Headstart

Several preschools are the product of agencies outside of the target area. The preschool is to be found in some form all over Uptown 5, but there is no screen through which one can view how the preschool education is in relationship to comprehensive curriculum in the education of the preschool child.

Summary: Child Development

The educational development of a child starts at age 3 in Uptown 5 proto parish, but Madison Avenue knows, judging from its sale of educational toys, that the first 3 years of a child's life are his formative years. It seems that educational methods and structures go wanting in this very important part of a child's development.

SCHOOL SUPPORT

13. Local Community Kindergarten

There is in the proto parish one community kindergarten run by an agency outside of the target area. It is Hull House. This again is seemingly an inadequate way of deciding the total educational care of the preschool child from a comprehensive view point. There is only a piecemeal holding pattern until he reaches age 6 and public education can take over.

14. Public School Commission

The public schools are well represented in Uptown 5. They are:

Goudy School
Goudy School Branch
Stewart School
St. Thomas of Canterbury
Edgewater Primary (Jewish)

There are PTAs attached to the public schools of Stewart and Goudy. There is the Middle School Council and also the 24th District PTA. Several agencies not in the target area are an impact to the area: Disney Magnets and Immaculata. The education seems to be adequate in the arena of public education when it comes to education per se. This can be also found in private and parochial education. One may wonder if depth is enabled when dealing with large numbers. Is the education in Uptown 5 by rote or is it imaginal? Does it enable life to be lived or does it just pour in facts to be used in some future time?

15. High School Tutorial

There are two agencies in Uptown 5 which enroll high school students in some form of tutorial program: McCutcheon School Branch and Prologue H. S. There is no high school tutorial program to a large extent due to a shortage of high school students in the area of the Uptown proto parish. The reason for the shortage is that once it

ADULT EDUCATION

16. Functional Skills Institute

The need for Functional Skills Institute is met within Uptown 5 by; the Mini College and by agencies that are located on the outside boundaries of Uptown 5 yet have an impact on the target proto parish (Hilliard Adult Education Center, Lake View High School Evening School). The various agencies see ways to give people technical skills that would enhance their ability to get jobs. In the skilled labor market, the need is for maturity and a self story that can break loose possibility within the midst of everyday tasks, rather than just teaching a skill.

17. Continuing Education Center

A number of agencies within and outside the boundaries of Uptown 5 strongly impact the parish in the arena of Continuing Education, that is, random courses of study on special skills which attract the interest of residents. The following agencies are involved in such programming: Model Cities Education Council, Northeast Illinois University, Uptown People Center, Uptown Chicago Commission Education Council and Mayfair College.

18. Advanced Education Referral

Agencies outside Uptown 5 protoparish enable one living within the protoparish to participate in a program of study leading to a degree at a college or university. Agencies with programs that impact the target area would be Mundelein College, Loyola University and De Paul University.

Summary: Adult Education

Adult Education is strong in the areas of training, yet lacking in the sustaining aspects--motivity of the individual and how one can see himself to be in the midst of an exciting adventure at every moment of his life. It seems that man spends his life getting trained to live his life, rather than living in the present tense.

Final Summary--Education Guild

In the arena of education, the major contradiction seems to be the mind-set of constantly training to live life, rather than enabling each man to live every moment of his life. The question is, how do we enable man to grasp each moment as it comes, and live it to the fullest.

SYMBOLIC GUILD

INTERFAITH RELATIONS

19. Community Clergy Collegium

Uptown 5's thirteen religious institutions (churches and synagogues) are in theory brought together because the Consortium of Religious Organizations provides a means of interchange and communication among the clerical leaders of Uptown 5 and Uptown. Unfortunately, at present, only a few of the clergy are able to get together at a time to focus on the community. Also, many of the thirteen churches and synagogues are not represented in this group.

20. Local Congregation Interchange

To the extent of which it functions, the Consortium of Religious Organizations also serves in the realm of Local Congregation Interchange through its bringing together of lay and clerical members from different religious institutions. Again, the theory is there, but the participation is lacking. Smaller attempts between two different religious institutions within Uptown 5 have been seen in events like joint Thanksgiving services or other holiday celebrations.

21. Parish Action Council

The thirteen churches and synagogues serve their parishes with only some of these institutions being more active in the vein of a Parish Action Council. These few churches bring the church out into the Uptown 5 Community seeking out problems and furthering solutions. Unfortunately, these active churches lack coordination with each other with respect to functions and planning.

Summary: Interfaith Relations

Interfaith Relations in Uptown 5 are weak and unorganized. The Consortium of Religious Organizations is not as present as strong or well represented as it should be, but there are signs of resurgence with new members seeking total community involvement. If the Consortium succeeds and both lay and clerical members can instill a vision in their individual churches, they will become more community oriented as Parish Action Councils. These Councils can lead the important symbolic happening of communal consciousness throughout Uptown 5.

LOCAL ARTS

22. Community Art Center

Uptown 5 has no single comprehensive Community Art Center nor any agency within its boundary that provides space for a Community Art Center. Outside Uptown 5 there is still no central Community Art Center, but the Hull House, the American Indian Center and the Bezazian Library provide places for displays of art and hobby work.

23. Neighborhood Talent Mart

No centralized Comprehensive Neighborhood Talent Mart exists within Uptown 5. Serving as mini talent marts are the Boys Club and the Mini

College. Outside the Uptown 5 the Green Hill provides a place for neighborhood residents to perform.

24. Visiting Artists Series

Aragon Productions provides some attempt at a visiting artists series in general. Their program is not necessarily related to the Uptown 5 or Uptown Community. Peoples Church has no regularly scheduled visiting artists series, but they are more geared to community enrichment needs when planning programs. The Dance Center of Columbia College shows potential for a visiting artists series in the realm of the Dance art form to serve both its students and the Uptown Community. Bezazian library occasionally sponsors dance and music programs for the community.

Summary: Local Arts

Local Arts in the Uptown 5 area are emerging in small spots throughout the area, but the identity of these Local Arts is overshadowed by the lack of a local centralized Community Arts Center with sufficient space for performances and displays which are of community interest, not just for commercial gain.

COMMUNITY IDENTITY

25. Local Environmental Board

Again, no centralized agency in the Uptown 5 serves as a Local Environmental Board. The various block clubs within Uptown 5: Margate-Ainslie Neighbors; Winona-Foster-Carmen-Winnemac Block Club, Lakeside Plaza Block Club, the Agatite Block Club and 5030 Marine Community and those outside Uptown 5 serve as a Local Environmental Board with respect to street conditions, etc. In theory, the 40th and 48th wards are charged with the local environment. They lack the capacity to inspire comprehensive community input.

26. Community Events Council

No clearing house for information about Community Events or for planning community events for Uptown 5 or Uptown really exists. The Uptown Chicago Commission in the past has sponsored a community Christmas decorating contest, a good sign but too rarely held to hold significance as a viable symbol.

27. Global Relations Commission

No agency within Uptown 5 or Uptown acts as a Global Relations Commission. Most organizations in the Uptown area are too concerned with their own individual problems, seeking the outside world only as far as the limits of Chicago and the governmental structure from which they need money and services.

Summary: Community Identity

Uptown 5 lacks real Community Identity. Small individualized agencies attempt to instill some identity, but lack of coordination through a viable Community Events Council makes their accomplishments stay close to home. They are not generated throughout the community and without a Global Relations Commission they will never be visible throughout the

Globe. Uptown 5 must know what it is.--All agencies--all people--it must foster cooperation and disseminate its wisdom to the Globe.

Final Summary--Symbolic Guild

The only recognizable symbol of Uptown known to those within and without the area is the Aragon Ball Room. The Aragon makes those within and without look to the past for answers to problems. The Urban Crisis as depicted in present day Uptown shows us what is to be faced by Urban areas in the future. Urban areas must be the symbol for the world of the future. Religious organizations can no longer stay to themselves--they must relate to one another and to peoples of all faiths. Individuals must be aware of themselves and their gifts. They must realize other peoples gifts. Local Arts is a way of instilling this with a good community basis which should be brought to the rest of the world.

SOCIAL GUILD

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

28. Elementary Jets Club

The agencies that are serving elementary aged children are Lincoln Park Margate House, McCormick Boys Club, Boy Scout-Troops and Cubs, Girl Scout Troops and Brownies, and the YWCA, all of which are physically within Uptown 5. No agencies outside this community appear to have influence here. The current contradiction is in finding a way to give guidance for the future to this age group in relation to their community and the world.

29. Hi-School Student House

The agency serving high school aged young people is the Canterbury House Teen Center. No outside agency seems to have an impact on this age group. The contradiction has to do with making more locations available which operate beyond entertainment to futuristic possibilities.

30. Young Adult League

No agencies serve young adults in this community. The Neighborhood Youth Corps from just outside the area provides make-work opportunities for earning money. The contradiction lies in the arena of providing opportunities for genuine useful involvement and responsibility.

Summary: Youth Development

The basic contradiction in Youth Development is in breaking loose comprehensive programs that open up the community and the youth in such a way as to enable a vision for the future in which they will want to invest their lives.

SOCIAL SERVICES

31. Exception Care Agency

The thirteen exceptional care agencies serving Uptown 5 are in two categories: shelter care homes which includes Grasmere Hotel, Hazel Wilson, Approved Homes, Somerset Hotel, and the Retarded Children's Fund; and rehabilitation services which includes Ex-convicts United, Inc., Alcoholics Anonymous, ATA, Community of US, CFLC, Alternatives, sheltered workshops, and thrift shops. Two agencies from outside the immediate area which also service in this arena are the Japanese-American Center and Trilogy. The contradiction is in enabling the existing agencies to cooperate in programs that push beyond a care-taking role.

32. Family Development Bureau

Family Development is served by the Lutheran Family Service within the community. An agency of Edgewater Community Council serves the community from outside. The contradiction involves the development of a comprehensive program that will enable families to look beyond their own immediate problems and to have a common thrust.

33. Community Elders Association

The Community Elders are served by the Admiral Hotel, Lawrence House, Chelsea House, and the Wilton Hotel. No agencies serve the social needs of Uptown 5 Elders. The contradiction here is to move community elder social engagement from physical care and entertainment to their role as full human beings who embody a vast reservoir of wisdom on which the community depends.

Summary: Social Services

The contradiction in social services is moving beyond a reduced image of individual sustenance to an image of total involvement in a larger responsibility.

COMMUNITY CARE

34. Neighborhood Stake System

The groups involved in the arena of neighborhood stake system are the block clubs. No outside agencies influence this arena. The contradiction is in breaking loose the vision, the interrelationship of all the communities with each other, the city, and the world so as to enable active cooperation among them for the sake of authentic, lasting change.

35. Human Relations Center

The seven groups within the protoparish which work in human relations are the Chinese Society, Council of the Mojave, Inc., St. Augustine Indian Center, St. Augustine Drop-in Center, Edgewood-Uptown Senior Center, Uptown Senior Citizens Organization, and the Net and Paddle Club. The agency which influences the community from outside its borders is the Council on Human Relations. The contradiction in human relations is enabling a more comprehensive approach to human relations that involves the whole community in full responsibility for the future.

36. Uptown 5 Promotion Bureau

No agency within Uptown 5 cares for community promotion. Outside the area the Uptown Community Council does work in this arena which has some influence in relation to the protoparish. The contradiction has to do with developing signs of renewal and a self-story of the community as a sign to the city and to the world.

Summary: Community Care

The contradiction in Community Care lies in developing an image of care that entails involvement in creating the future of the community on behalf of the city and the world.

Final Summary--Social Guild

The large number of exceptional care agencies along with a relative dearth of other kinds promotes an image of a problem-filled community. The contradiction in this arena lies in enabling a positive image of total care for the community in relation to the long-range future which would permit close cooperation and even some coalescing among existing agencies for a single thrust.

POLITICAL GUILD

CIVIL RELATIONS

37. Legal Aid Clinic

There are two agencies in this arena: The Uptown Neighborhood Legal Services and a service out of the Model Cities program (located just across the street from Uptown 5). There seems to be a very minimum of legal services for those who cannot afford them, particularly in an area in which legal recourse seems to be necessary to protect local concerns.

38. Government Relations Board

The political parties represent the only agencies in Uptown 5 in this arena. There is no Uptown 5 group focusing specifically on the community's relationship to the government. The regular Democrats and the Republicans have party offices in Uptown 5 for both the 46th and 48th wards. The Independent Precinct Organization has workers in Uptown 5, though the coordinators for the wards live outside the target community. The White Panthers have an office in the proto-parish. The Attorney General's office has a community service office that serves Uptown 5 and the Model Cities offices represent the community to city and federal agencies. While the Aldermen are generally responsive to the community, there is little concerted way for the community to affect the various levels of the government. On specific issues, specific groups have their representatives, but few who can speak for the whole community.

39. Problem Solving Seminars

There are virtually no agencies or opportunities to do extensive thinking through of the major issues facing the community, thus reducing the community response to immediacy and emotional responses.

Summary: Civil Relations

The major contradiction in the Uptown 5 Community's Civil Relations is adequate representation of the community to the levels of government, primarily due to the lack of opportunity for forging comprehensive and common visions by the community.

PUBLIC SERVICES

40. Urban Services Office

The Travellers Aid and Immigration Service, through the Open Hand office, and the offices of the state representative for the 12th District and the Congressman for the 9th District are located in Uptown 5. The Mayor's Office of Information and Inquiry is located just outside the proto-parish and serves the whole community. Short of using one form of the government against the other, the community has little effective means to exercise consistent care for the whole community, though particular residents can get specific services met.

41. Community Information Center

Aside from the newsletters of the Uptown Chicago Commission and the various block clubs, there are no means for conveying information and positive images in Uptown 5. The community does have relative access to radio station WJJD, the Lerner Newspaper for Uptown and the Bezazian Library, whose offices are beyond the community though extending across it. This means that very few within Uptown 5 have an adequate grasp of what is happening within the community, and have their basic image of Uptown communicated to them by those who live outside the community.

42. Local Security Commission

There are no viable agencies concerned with the security of Uptown 5 located within the community, and only the city police and their affiliated groups; The Beat Representative Program and the 20th District Steering Committee from outside the community affect the security. The Whistle Alert program, sponsored by the UCC is aimed at reducing street crime. This means that the community is primarily the site of forces exploiting it encountered by the police while local residents stand by powerless to significantly affect either.

Summary: Public Services

The major contradiction in Public Services is in maintaining comprehensive care for Uptown 5 which secures quick enough response from city agencies to maintain an image of good repair instead of deterioration.

COMMUNITY ORGANIZATION

43. Local Guild Network

The Block Clubs are the major groups concerned at the local level of the community with dealing with its major problems. The following clubs operate within Uptown 5: Margate-Ainslie, Winona-Foster-Carmen-Winnemac, Lakeside Place, Agatite, and the 5030 Marine Drive Community. ONE, Organization of the NorthEast, which has its focus to the north of Uptown 5, is striving to be an overarching community organization for Uptown, Edgewater, and Rogers Park. Uptown Peoples Action Program, with offices just outside Uptown 5, is a more local confrontation style organization. There is no adequate network of local people which operates out of a vision for Uptown 5 arrived at commonly and seeking the releasing directions instead of conflict of ideas.

44. Community Managers Board

The only agency to approach a body of people devoted to common care and support for the diverse efforts of a comprehensive plan of reformulation of Uptown 5 is the Uptown Chicago Commission, which suffers, for this purpose, from an extremely restricted staff, and tends to operate from an economic perspective. Thus, the creation of a catalytic body to care for the whole range of the community's life is a necessity.

45. Uptown 5 Citizens Congress

Only the UCC Annual Meeting even approximates a Community Congress and its constituency is limited and program is necessarily narrow in focus. Thus there is no adequate vehicle for the community's decision-making to be commonly symbolized and a oneness of purpose forged.

Summary: Community Organization

The contradiction in the Community Organization of Uptown is in the competitiveness of various organizations that prevents the emergence of a common vision for Uptown 5 which can focus the power of the community on its problems instead of the turned-inness of internal power struggles.

Final Summary--Political Guild

The major contradiction in the Political Arena for Uptown 5 is in the multitude of diverse opinions about the role of Uptown that have solidified into long term antagonisms in the absence of adequate methodologies for forging a consensus across the whole community.
