I

Authorization

INVISIBLE FRIENDS

It is the intent of this maneuver to re-establish our good standing with the public and private sectors and to remove the current cloud of suspicion about the ICA that will release funding and support. The major emphasis of this maneuver is to broaden and deepen the national web of support. It will be accomplished by involving our national guardian clout in contacting and visiting key central government officials as well as mustering our international supporters, such as Ambassador Young, Senator Percy, A. Vanisteendal, etc. in key contacts and visits. A second aspect of this maneuver is to rebuild the state level authorization network. This will be achieved from two directions, one of expanding our support and network on the taluka and district level and secondly by approaching the top figures in the state government. A third aspect of this maneuver is to actuate the buffer projects in Delhi and Calcutta. During the Council the timing of their actuation will be decided and the particular maneuvers will be designed. The fourth aspect of this maneuver will involve mobilizing our international public and private sector support through service clubs, extranational government agencies in India, multi-national corporations and banks. It is imperative that specific authorization maneuvers be built by Development Centrum staff in India in conjunction with Global Development Centrum and other critical staff from India.

II

Funding

LIVING OFF THE LAND

The intent of this maneuver is to expand and intensify a full blown development operation in order to provide the ongoing funding for sustenance, program and expansion. This will be accomplished by increasing the number of staff assigned to Development Centrum to 8 and implementing a transnational circuit design for the Divisions, Bombay and other area centers. Work will be continued on cultivating the government relations and corporate support in order to realize the 35 CCA status and to unblock our relations with PADI. A third aspect of this maneuver includes establishing an intentional in-kind operation that pulls together common needs across the state and insures delivery of material and services to the projects. Finally, an intentional effort will be organized to build a broad grass-roots base of supporters within each district. This will have back-up support from the development office, but will primarily be implemented in the field by the circuiters and auxiliary.

III. Guardians

WISE COUNSELORS

The intent of this maneuver is to bring self-consciousness and organization to a large number of guardians now participating in Nava Gram Prayas. This will be the first step in creating a structure of the 15% to participate with the 85% in recreating the future of the nation. The forces will be primarily on economic development help and the guiding sustenance needed to all projects. This will occur fundamentally on two levels; statewide strongholds in Bombay and Pune, and district level strongholds. We will move from our point of advantage by formulating the guardian strongholds in Bombay, Pune and Kolhapur. The Kolhapur circuit will involve the guardians in maneuver planning, circuiting, consult leadership and industry monitoring. This will be rapidly replicated to other district circuits. To broaden the guardian network, the IENS will be held in Bombay and/or Pune, in adopting companies and one for State Bank of India personnel. A select group of guardians will be asked to be the team leaders in Quarter I consults. To net and globalize the guardians of India, a newsletter will be circulated every month. The Global Guardians Meeting will be held in Bombay in November. To insure the steady supply of guardians the service club adoption for each project will be done and development circuit will be used as a point of contact. The Board of Advise and Review will be formalized by October and a brochure enlisting the role of BAR printed.

IV. Training

FORGING THE STEEL

The replication scheme is demanding the formation of strong auxiliary leadership in a relatively short period of time. The intent of this maneuver is to enable every project director and assistant to gun a project by strengthening their methodological prowess, deepening their vocational resolve and expanding their reflective capacities. The entire auxiliary force will experience training in the midst of doing by giving form and intentionality to their practical doing. It will occur in designated district projects that are staffed to be "teaching villages" (much like teaching hospitals) in which the learning is accomplished by doing the project. Particular emphasis will be placed on the shadow principle, English language, village organization, work assignments and accountability, corporate planning and on intentional and disciplined corporate life style. A second aspect of this maneuver is strengthening the prowess of the national support forces so that leadership for the back-up implementation and planning falls more heavily on their shoulders. This will be accomplished by increasing the number of nationals in all aspects of circuiting, centrums, acceleration and repository dynamics and intensifying the shadow role played by the extra-nationals. A third aspect of this maneuver is the restructuring and reimaging of the IDTS. The recruitment, training and follow-up to the school will be revised with a greater emphasis on evoking a vocational decision among the students. The fourth aspect of this maneuver will reimage the journey of auxiliaries by creating a two-year leadership development rationale. This will be accomplished by revising a quarterly rhythm to schedule training events such as modules from the IDTS, for new and old auxiliaries, and a two-week advanced command school for project auxiliaries who have been in the field. It will also require the creation and revision of manuals already existing in India or from the globe.

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V. Spirit Life

CUTTING THROUGH TO THE CENTER

The incredibly rapid growth of auxiliary staff requires the rehearsal of the self-conscious auxiliary role and their relationship to Nava Gran Prayas and the global movement. The intent of this maneuver is to raise the vocational issue which must be dealt with by allowing them to reflect on their journey and by grounding their experiences in the traditional culture as well as the mythology of the global movement. One aspect of this maneuver will require the translation of much of the material we now use for the auxiliary such as the Daily Ritual, Red book, etc. and by the introduction of common global decor into all of the projects such as the Turn Symbol and Grid. A second aspect of this maneuver is to create an ordered existence and intentional life style. This will be done by having a highly intentional and well decorated collegium space in each of the 25 district projects including tables and chairs in all and by the use of the internal life manual and regular internal structures. A third aspect of this maneuver is the intentionalizing of the tools and occasions for solitary and corporate reflection on their life, experiences. This will include using a solitary journal as well as collegiums and evening sessions as times for corporate reflection. The fourth aspect of this maneuver will be to emphasize and demonstrate order and discipline through regular and manageable formats for Project Directors Meetings, Councils and other movement gatherings which are orchestrated and enabled with care and finesse.

VI. Economic Do-ment

THE TIGER CLAW

We intend to turn our dream of local man's seizure of economic power into reality. The transformation will begin with our emphasis on the economic life of the total community in small scale operations. We will advance it through concentration on fundamental local economic issues such as the use of water. In order to promote rapid capital generation we will fortify the villages with legally constituted LEV's, with the restoration of credit availability to villagers, and with bank "adoption" schemes for each village. We will make the economic development process ready for demonstration by analyzing and documenting the progress of initial successful ventures such as papaya and cattle, and by documenting village attainment of the triple income objective. To explode local man's vision of economic possibility, we will find the key to rapid replicability of 5 industries, and the methods to build broader networks of business coordination between villages, including a cinema distribution chain. Some of our villages are ready to export know-how at this moment. The geographic route to expansion lies in the taluka with its unique natural and human resources which we will explore during the course of this year.

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VII. Do-ment

SECURING THE FORTS

The intent of the Securing the Forts maneuver is to demonstrate the visible concrete signs of 75 renewed villages, to motivate and train the villagers to tell the victory story of Nava Gram Prayas and to train the auxiliary in catalytic action. This intent will be accomplished by commonizing the do-ment throughout the state through creating and monitoring quarterly checklists of do's; conducting district quarterly preschool curriculum building sessions; preparing demonstration streets; creating images of organized space in villages; establishing comprehensive funding corporations; establishing housing societies; and conducting regular Health Caretakers Training. Involvement at the district level will be possible by establishing district cooperation and scheduling quarterly self-conscious intervillage networks and by promoting taluka and district publicity. Do-ment of 75 projects will be polished by creating special demonstrations of designing and building a 300 sq. ft. house with kitchen, latrine and bathroom and by demonstrating on sanitation village. The securing of the forts will also be done by stabilizing the auxiliary by using project continuity as a major assignment principle and intentionalizing auxiliary presence in the villages. Conducting impact events in the village like CYF, GWF will catalyze youth and women in each village. A consensed operational principle of projects finishing their two years will also be articulated to demonstrate the do-ment of the projects.

VIII. Command & Control

MOBILE COMMAND POST

The complexity and diversity of the Maharashtra replication demands fluidity and mobility among the personnel resources available. The intent of this maneuver is to bring maneuverability, coordination and comprehensiveness into the operations of the sub-continent. One aspect of this maneuver is the inclusive scheduling of all the events and programs of the sub-continent. This particularly includes the scheduling and implementation of the buffer projects, area operations, global treks and programs, i.e. LENS, GWF, CYF as well as the Maharashtra replication. It will also include regular communication and the introduction of maneuver methods into all phases of operations. A second aspect of this maneuver is the design and maneuverability of the replication schemes which will enable the completion of phase I and the launching of phase II, the 2,500. A saturation phasing design will be created along with a quarterly rhythm for site selection, consults and gram sabhas. A third aspect of this maneuver is to design the tactical operations at councils that facilitate sommon do-ment maneuvers quarterly across the state. It will also require the redesign of the Gram Sabha model. Fourthly, this maneuver consists of recreating the centrum dynamics. We will acquire a new facility in Bombay to replace the existing house and beef-up the centrum dynamic by placing 8 people in Development, 8 people in Research, 8 people in Operations and 4 people in Management. Nationals along with extra-nationals will be assigned to all the centrum dynamics.

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IX. Circuiting and Monitoring

BLACK HORSE MANEUVER

In the midst of the rapid growth of the Nava Gram Prayas remaneuvering relative to refining and expanding the circuiting and monitoring dynamics needs to be done. National support forces will be trained in monitoring at the same time that the web of project villages is created which will promote and sustain one movement. The traveling team dynamic will be intensified in order to deliver effective training, maintain a strong chain of command and utilize individual projects to bring one another off. The self-consciousness of all staff and villagers of being part of a network will be practically released through participation in circuit activities and cross project meetings. Finally, passing of circuit development will allow for demonstration of district and taluka saturation to occur by the end of the year. This circuit intensification will be accomplished through the revision, translation and publication of existing manuals like TAB, ACT and MOVE and the creation of new circuit modular training units. Village leadership will be equipped with practical tools and methods allowing for effective circuit participation and project interchange and for acting a Nava Gram Prayas ambassadors throughout the state. Models will be created and used which will allow for effective monitoring such as report formats for tactical breakthroughs, internal life constructs and actuation checklists. The circuits will be designed to reflect quarterly maneuvers so that part of each quarter will allow for strike force configurations to be formed which will facilitate do-ment of the projects. Circuits will be designed to include training, debriefing and commonization of methods and celebration. In order to enable this maneuver arena the quarter I thrust will be to secure a printing press, 4 jeeps, 25 motor cycles and 50 crash helmets. As the replication will add 4-5 times the number of existing projects the quality of circuiting is critical, therefore 25 trained extra-national ICA staff will need to be assigned for circuits (or 1 per district) in the coming year.

X. Repository

BORDER RAIDS

The high degree of visibility and the increasing scrutiny of Nava Gram Prays places a radical demand on us to produce in each of the projects. The intent of this maneuver is to intensify the working repository in order to deliver "on site" the necessary goods, schemes and services that will insure the projects do-ment. One aspect of this maneuver will document and catalogue the current resources, personnel, equipment, expertise and organizations, both locally and globally that are available for use. A second aspect of this maneuver is to deliver on the ancillary industry and to establish 4 multi-village industries in the first quarter. A third aspect of this maneuver is to package and deliver government and private sector schemes to the villages. This means an expansion of the "bank" scheme with the State Bank and Grindley's

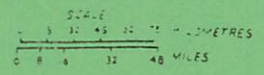
Bank and an expansion to new industrial houses to provide additional schemes. A fourth aspect of this maneuver is to provide "how to" actuation briefs on schemes and industries available to the villages. This will also include a rationale for major impact of industries and designs on a statewide as well as local basis. Particular emphasis of the repository needs to be on breakthrough in housing, agriculture and multi-village industry. This maneuver will require four people assigned to it on a full time basis, but will allow for maneuverability and personnel shifts within that framework.

MAHARASHTRA STATE

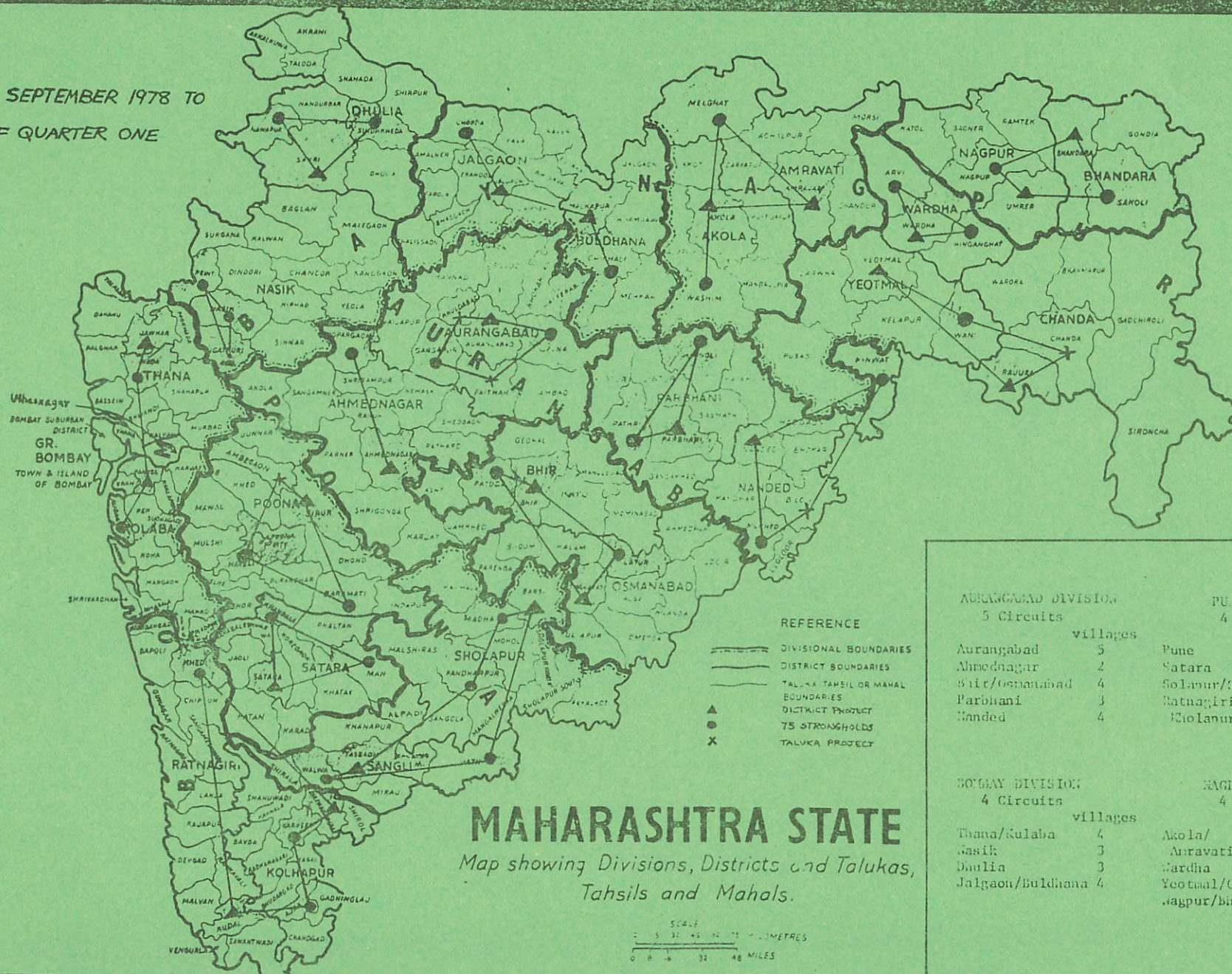
Map showing Divisions, Districts and Talukas,
Tahsils and Mahals.



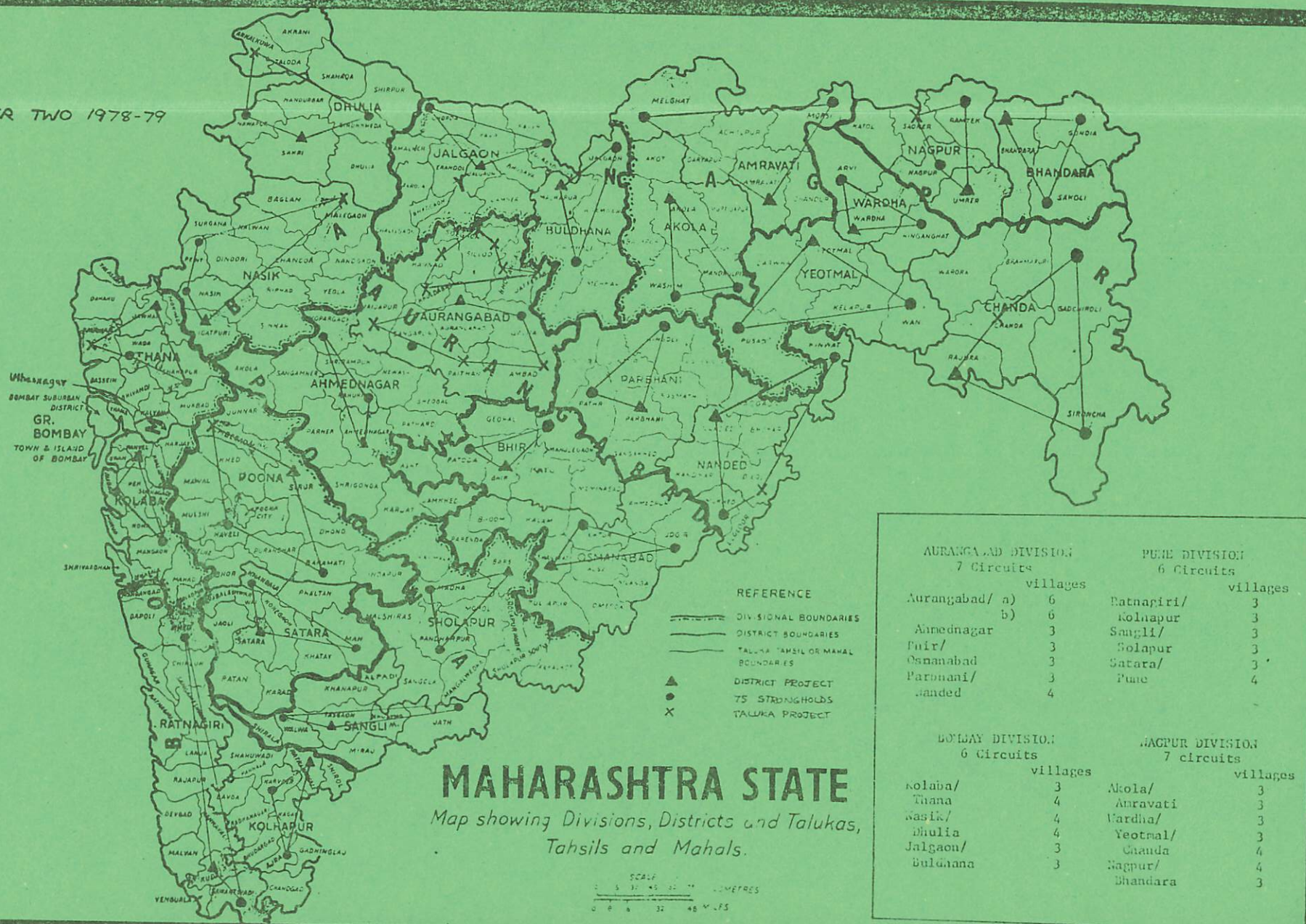

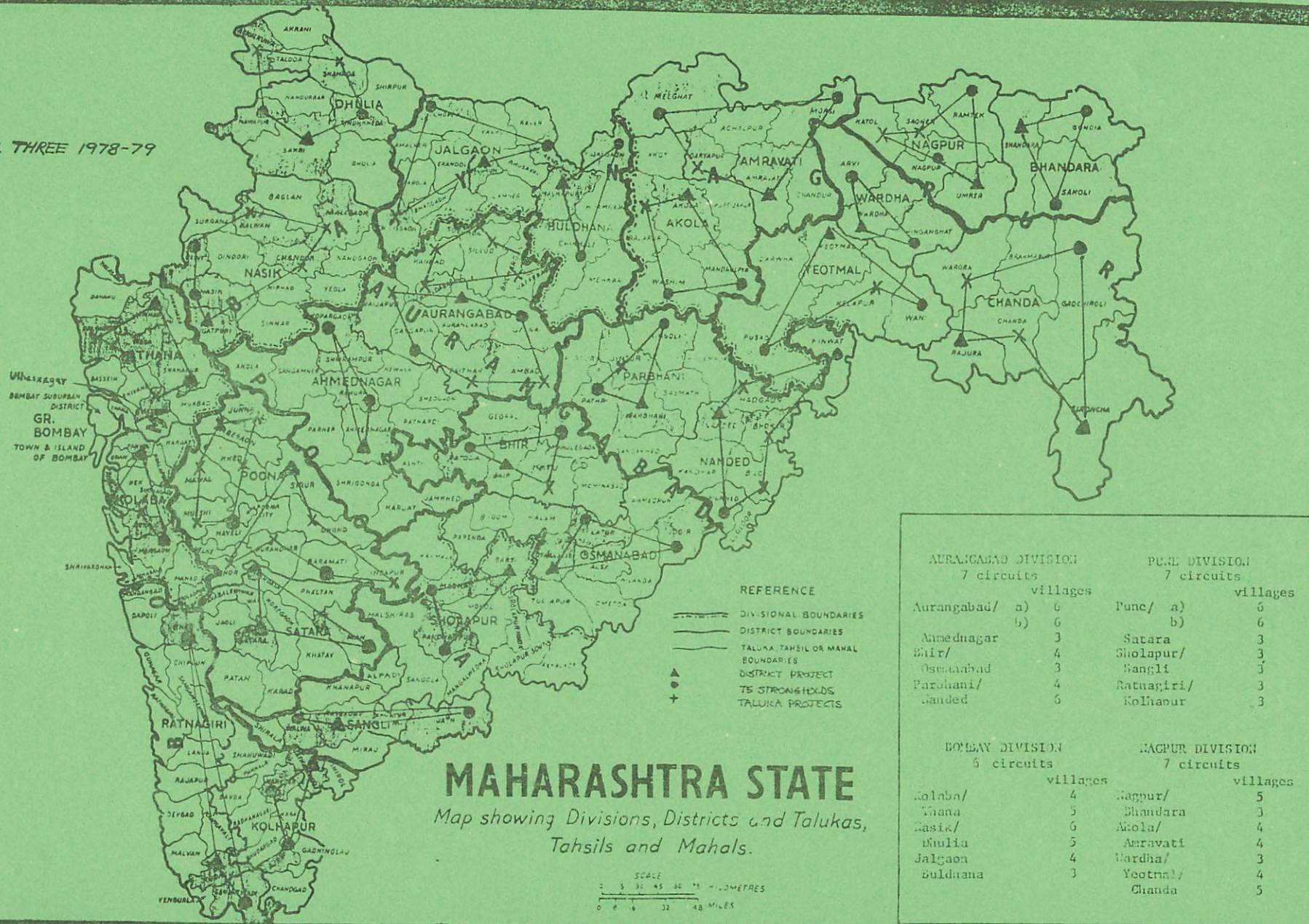
Map showing Divisions, Districts and Talukas,

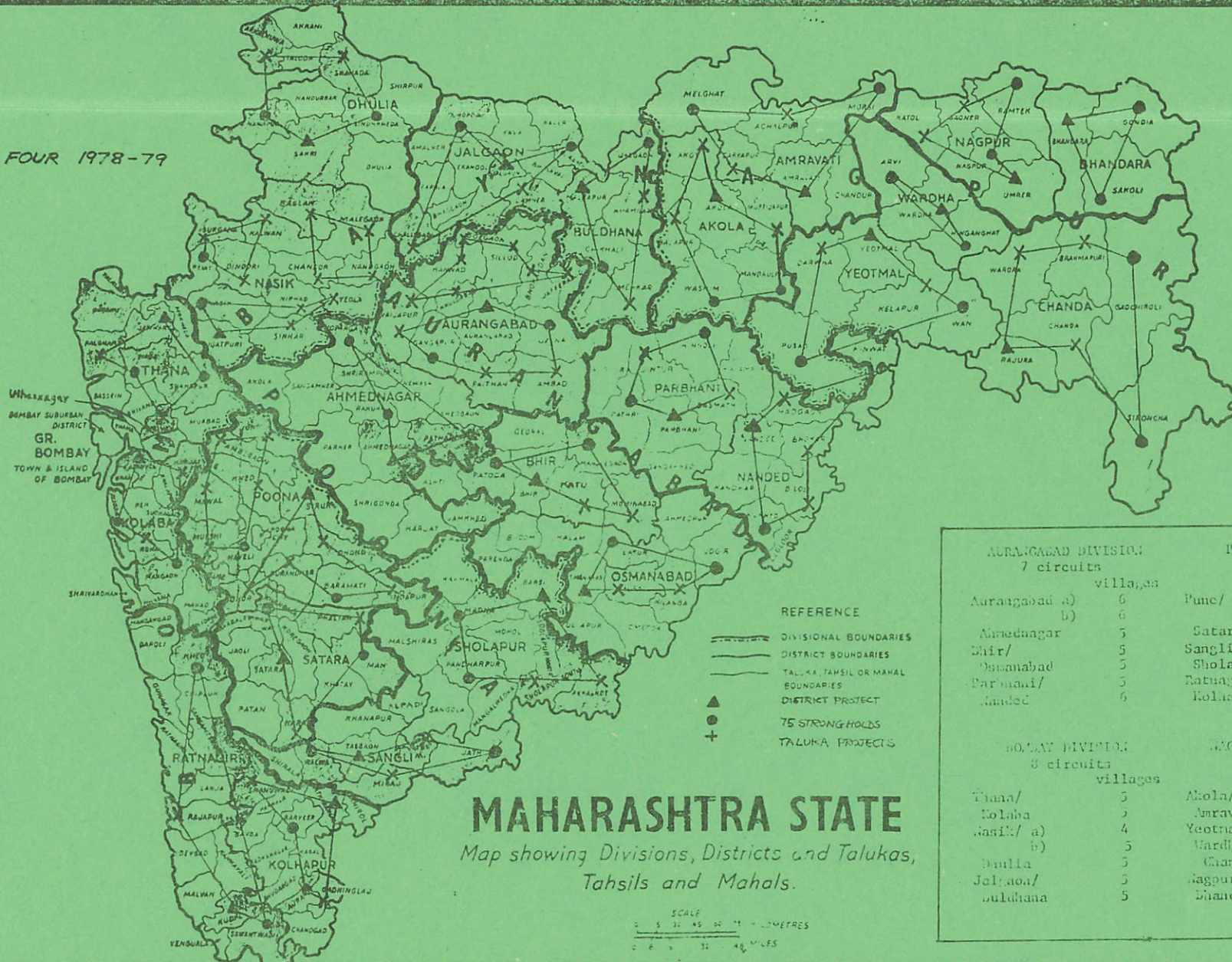

YEARLY TIMELINE AND QUARTERLY RHYTHM

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Replication Schemes

REPLICATION

Replication will continue the March to the 250 with consults in September, November, February and May. A total of 148 villages will be actuating by June 30, 1979. The replication tactics will be altered to combine site selection, Gram Sabha and consults into a four week campaign. After the consults the project will be in a better position to evaluate and select students for the next quarter's HDTS. In quarter four the remaining 84 villages will be selected, completing the 250.

DO-MENT

The focus of do-ment will be on 75 projects, three in each district. These will be launched by November. Each quarter two campaigns will be done: A four week individual project campaign and a four week statewide campaign. The divisional forces will reconfigure during each of the statewide campaigns in order to provide special strike forces, acceleration teams in addition to the regular monitoring circuits. Each quarter will have a three week emphasis on impact courses. These will be LENS, GWF and CYF.

SATURATION

In each division one district will be saturated by having all projects in that district complete. The Aurangabad district, Pune district, Nasik district and all Nagpur districts will be saturated. This will be done by combining division forces for these saturation consults.

TRAINING

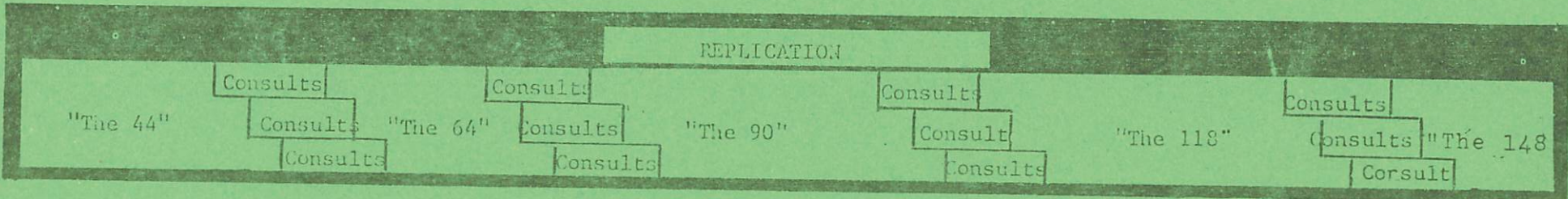
The HDTS will be held each quarter with 232 students each except Quarter I which will emphasize urban recruitment and will graduate 150. In addition, two advanced command schools (ACS) will be held each quarter to equip the present leadership and prepare new project directors and support force shadows. The HDTS will be expanded to include four weeks of field training in the 25 district projects. This will expose them to disciplined auxiliary life and field maneuvers of the statewide campaign. The next quarter will be seen as an internship program in a project where continuing training occurs. The entire 2 years in Nava Gram Prayas will be reimaged as a two year village university.

COUNCIL

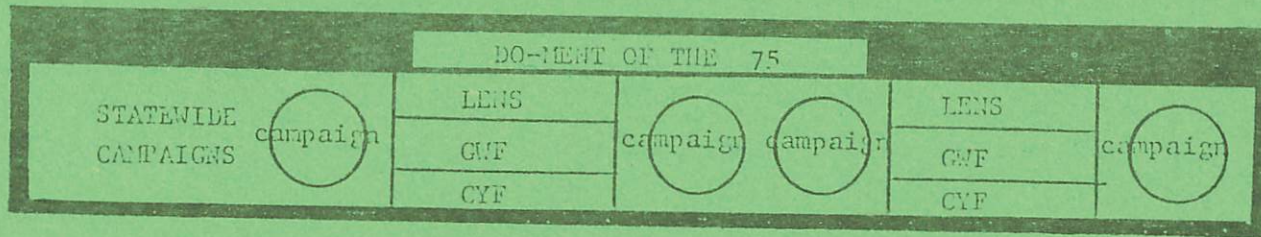
Each quarter will finish with a Continental Council at which time the school graduates will be commissioned to their new assignments, ACS candidates selected, and the do-ment campaigns planned.

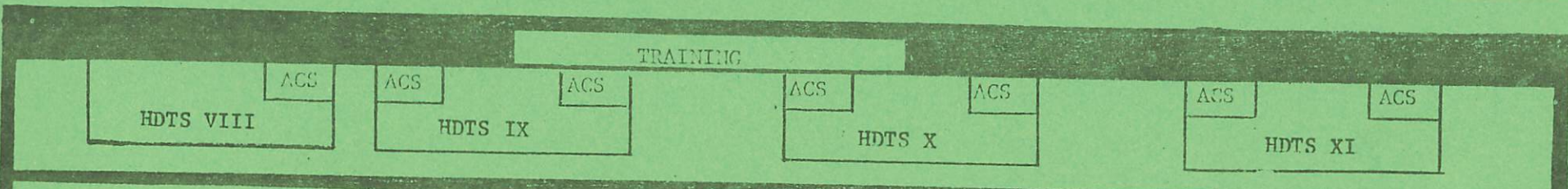

ACTUATION
TIMELINE

The actuation timeline is built on the following rationale. The total number of consults will be systematically increased each quarter for the next four quarters. During that time the divisions will be phased to emphasize district saturation. Aurangabad district will be saturated during Quarter II. Pune district will be saturated during Quarter III and Nasik district during Quarter IV. All 7 districts in the Nagpur division will be saturated by the end of quarter IV. By the end of Quarter IV the taluka villages will be selected in all the other districts to reach five villages per district. The total number of villages with projects launched, having held consults and having auxiliary on site, will be 148 by July 1, 1979. All remaining 84 taluka villages will have been selected by this time.

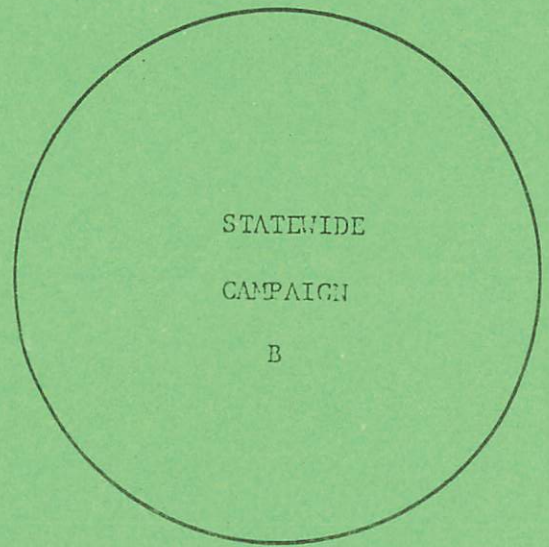
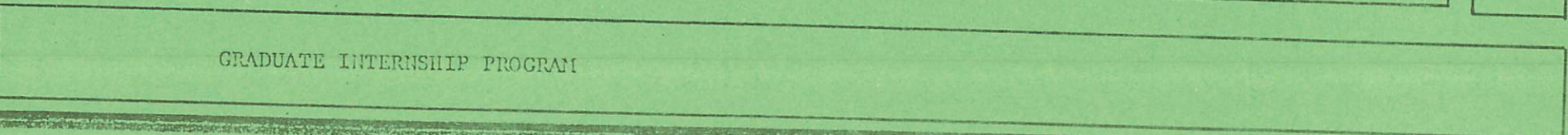
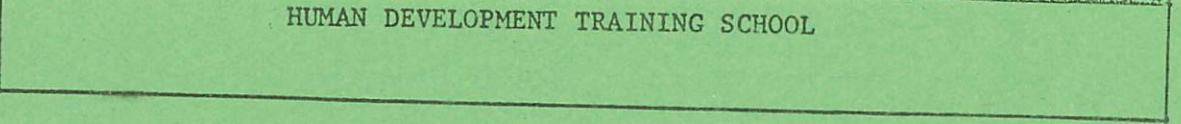
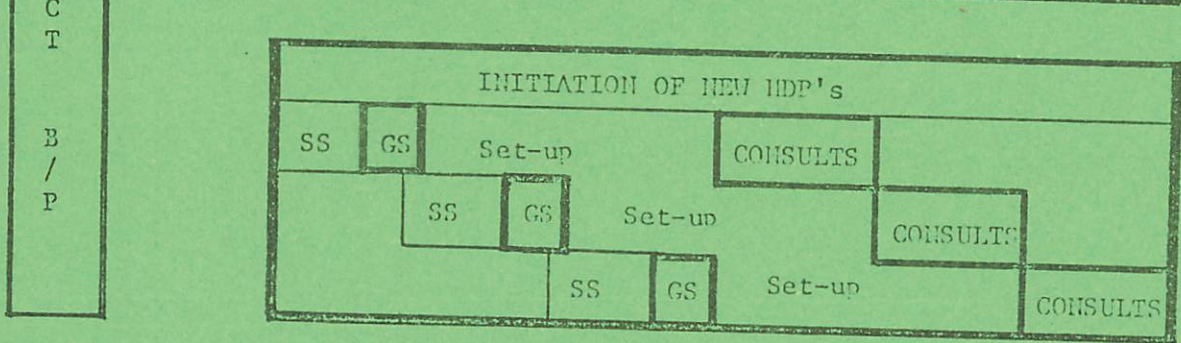
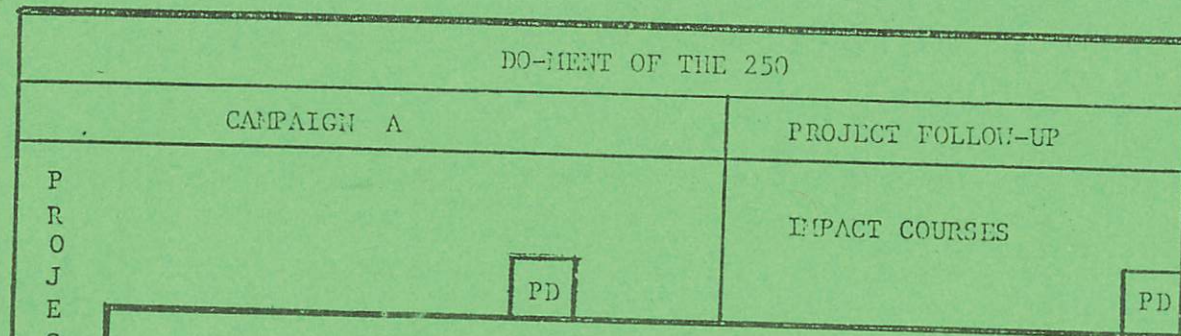
