

PHASE I: INITIATION

The Town Meeting Program in Kentucky began with <u>Town Meeting'76</u>. During this phase there were four town meetings held in <u>Kentucky</u>.

Kenton County	Covington	March 27, 1976
Knox County	Corbin	November 13, 1976
Jefferson County	Louisville	November 13, 1976
Pulaski County	Somerset	February 19, 1977

PHASE II:

During April and May of 1978, a Town Meeting demonstration was held in the remaining 116 counties. 14 of those were "mini-meetings" lasting less than ½ hour. The others were 2-3 hour meeting with attendance ranging from 2 through 44.

PURPOSE

Today our society is at a crossroads between the past and the future of local community. Citizens experience the loss of neighborliness, family disintegration, chaos in educational institutions, the increase in crime, and cynicism about the political process. At the same time, the ability of local community to deal effectively with these problems is diminishing as its identity and cohesiveness is absorbed in growing complexity. The apathy resulting from this dilemma often robs communities of valuable citizen initiative and creativity.

A serious question facing small and large towns alike today is how can more local citizens become motivated, trained, and effectively engaged in the vital task of meeting our challenges? Or, how can the spark of community pride and local initiative be rekindled?

The Town Meeting is one answer to the dilemma. A local community forum; it provides an opportunity for a representative number of citizens to meet those challenges using the resources available within the community.

The Town Meeting: KENTUCKY Project will continue to hold Town
Meetings in communities across the state on request. Volunteers
from Town Meeting communities who wish to participate in the program
beyond their own community will assist.

Special Focus Town Meetings
Town Meetings with a "special focus" will also be held. Senior citizen
groups, youth organizations, businesses, churches, crime prevention
agencies and several other concerned groups have already held Town
Meetings that focus on a particular issue.

Human Development Project In addition, one community in West Virginia has been selected to be the hosting community for a Human Development Project (HDP). With the training assistance of on-site ICA consultants, the community will engage in a two-year demonstration project. The project will provide a laboratory to demonstrate how communities in this area can meet economic, political, and cultural challenges with the resources available to them.

The Project was initiated on May 28, 1978 with a week-long consult. The planning process for the consult is similar to that of a Town Meeting but, because of its length, allows for a great deal more data analysis and future planning by the community. The consult will be attended by community residents and volunteer consultants from across the nation.
