

#### THE PURPOSE OF TOWN MEETING

Every community, from the smallest rural town to the sprawl of an urban neighborhood, has untapped resources waiting to be channeled into the task of improving economic and social conditions. The greatest resource, and the key to all others, is the creativity and energy of the residents, 85% of which is never called upon for the good of the community. This resource, when released, is able to revitalize and rebuild human community far more effectively than any private or public program ever offered. It represents a direct and personal approach to solving the social problems which plague every city and town, and finally contributes to the rediscovery of neighborly cooperation and care.

The Town Meeting format created by the Institute of Cultural Affairs is a community event which allows people to consider the major challenges facing their town, and to discover the possibilities at hand to respond to these challenges. It motivates participants to begin active cooperation in various projects, such as cleanup days, building renovation, a community newsletter, and services for youth and elders. It's effects are felt as a renewed community spirit pervades the whole community. Mayors often mark the Town Meeting day as a turning point in their community. The Town Meeting encourages all citizens to put the care they have for their community into action.

#### THE FORMAT OF TOWN MEETING



The Town Meeting consists of two workshop sessions, each introduced by a brief presentation. The citizens discuss their hopes and dreams for the community, identify for themselves the economic, political, and cultural issues, and then state the underlying challenges for their community's future.

An Interlude follows, perhaps with a meal and community singing.

The proposals workshop allows citizens to create the practical activities to deal with the identified challenges. Community identity is the focus of a separate workshop group which creates the community song, story, and symbol.

The results of the workshops are reported at the closing plenary session where everyone receives a printed document of the meeting's results.

#### PHASE I: INITIATION --- 1974 - 1976

The Town Meeting Project began in Texas as "Town Meeting '76", an official Bicentennial program. During the Bicentennial period 32 Texas communities held Town Meetings, usually holding them as all day Saturday events.

#### PHASE II: DEMONSTRATION ---- January - August 1977

A concentrated effort in East Texas, called the "East Texas 25" resulted in 25 Town Meetings being held on one day, June 4, 1977. It was here that small rural towns were first introduced to the Town Meeting project, and their response was overwhelmingly enthusiastic. In addition, Town Meetings happened in other widely scattered parts of the state.

#### PHASE III: ACCELERATION ---- September 1977 - April 1978

The objective was clear — to hold a Town Meeting in at least one community in every county in the state. And by the middle of April 244 of Texas' 254 counties had been the site of at least one Town Meeting. The remaining 10 counties have a Town Meeting scheduled for later in the spring. Most of these events used a condensed format and were held on week-day nights from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

# Rosebud Chamber of Commerce sponsors open meeting for all

Say what you want, ask what you will of anyone present, but get the facts firsthand. This is the purpose of any meeting, and especially an ol' fashion town meeting, the likes of which is being held in Rosebud this Monday evening.

Sponsored by the Rosebud Chamber of Commerce, the meeting will take place at the Rosebud Intermediate School Gymnasium beginning

promptly at 7:00 p.m.

A face-to-face fact finding (but no fist-fighting, please) open meeting with officials of the city, the school, and even the county government (should any official be present) is what the meeting is all about. There is nothing to sell and nothing to buy, and there is nothing to gain but ideas and information and a new outlook on the affairs of the community. The principal thing is to come and participate!

Following is a news release from "Town Meeting: Texas" that controls the meetings over the state.

Citizens of Falls County will participate in a statewide program called "Town Meeting: Texas" on March 20, 1978. Scheduled to take place at the Rosebud Primary School gym from 7 to 10 p.m., the meeting will be a workshop in which citizens discuss how they can work together to make improvements in their community.

The Rosebud meeting will be hosted by Rosebud Chamber of Commerce. All residents are invited to attend, and representatives from other towns in the county will also be welcomed.

The town Meeting is a civic event, begun as a Bicentennial program in 1975, in which participants decide the basic challenges facing their community and propose activities to meet the challenges. A song and story are also created to celebrate the town's history and future prospects.

The meeting is an example of a new kind of public forum that gives everyone the opportunity to fully partici

pate.

In the last two years, meetings have taken place in 185 Texas communities in 148 counties. Demonstration meetings are taking place in each of the remaining counties during March, and an assembly of representatives from participating towns is planned April 8 in Austin.

The program is endorsed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe and a statewide committee of 60 business and professional people. In his letter, Briscoe says, "I am pleased to encourage the citizens of our state to participate in Town

Meetings.

"Town Meeting: Texas" is a program being offered by the Institute of Culture Affairs, a private, not-forprofit association of concerned citizens. The entire effort is staffed by volunteers and supported by contributions from individuals and businesses.

#### THE STORY OF LANE CITY


PAST: The town of Lane City was founded by the Lane and Arnam tmilies in the 1800s. The railroad and canal companies were first to come to the area. At one time the canal was the largest irrigation operation in the world. At one time the town consisted of a hotel, lumber yard, drug store, general store and a railroad depot, rice warehouse and cotton gins. The highway was constructed about 1937. It was the site of two schools, one for the white students and one for the balck students. The district was consolidated with Wharton Independent School District in 1963.

PRESENT: The community now consists of approximately 375 people...Czechs, Germans, Blacks, Mexicans and many others. The streets were paved some years ago. The town is made up of a post office, two stores, a gas station, four churches, one grain dryer, one dance hall and individual family dwellings. It is in the midst of a farming and ranching community. Some oil is found in the county. FUTURE: The future of Lane City is quite favorable because it lies on the fringe area of Houston and because of the effects of the nuclear plant in Matagorda County. The major needs include jobs, new homes, public services and recreation facilities. Another factor that lends itself to growth of the town is the intersection of Highway 60 and the Boling Highway, which brings considerable traffic through the town.

#### More Town Meetings

The Town Meeting: Texas project will continue to hold Town Meetings in towns across the state upon request. Some of these will be elaborate all day meetings while others will be shorter evening events. Volunteers from Town Meeting communities who wish to participate in the program beyond their own town will assist.

#### Signal Counties Will Have Multiple Town Meetings

Beginning in the summer or early fall of 1978 several Texas counties will host multiple Town Meetings in an effort to allow every community and every group in the county the opportunity to participate in the Town Meeting event. Some of these will be "special focus" Town Meetings, such as school Town Meetings, businessmen Town Meetings, women Town Meetings, and elders Town Meetings.

#### THE ASHERTON HUMAN DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

In additon, one community in Texas has been selected to be the site for a Human Development Project (HDP). Asherton, located in Dimmit County in South Texas, has invited the ICA to be on-site consultants in a two year demonstration project. The project will provide a laboratory to demonstrate how communities in our state can meet economic, political, and cultural challenges with the resources available to them. Asherton will join the ranks of some 40 HDP communities across the world, and will lead the way for Texas's local community renewal.

The Project will be initiated on June 18, 1978, with a week long planning consultation. The planning process for the consult is similar to that of a Town Meeting, but allows for a great deal more data analysis and future planning by the community. The consult will be held in Asherton, and will be attended by community residents and by volunteer consultants from across the state.
