In the arena of recreational activities the following bloks exist:

indicates that the underlying challenge facing us is getting available
land for recreational park. Local examples of this challenge arena
are: a swimming pool would pay for itself, school ball field isn't
large enough, looking ahead for swimming pool, tennis court, baseball
field.
