BEAUTIFUL HILLS

The town of Belmont was named for beautiful hills. It was settled in the 1850's. It was primarily a farming and sawmill town with cotton being the chief crop until the 1930's. The railroad came through Belmont, creating new experiences in that local people were used to build the road beds with mules.

In the 1940's the first industry moved to our area, Blue Bell, making garments. Industry has grown with more garment factories, furniture, metal dinette suites, remodeled and rebuilt piano factories and others that furnish parts for mobile home industry and furniture assembly plants.

Belmont has in recent years realized how important it is to keep their young people at home so parks and facilities for recreation have been upgraded. We hope that with the completion of both the Natchez Trace and the Tenn-Tom Waterway that Belmont will see improved roads, schools, and town improvements that have not been here before. We can make Belmont the true Gateway to the Baysprings and Northeast Miss. areas. Pride in our own community can make for a better tomorrow for our children and other people to be proud of.

In the area of zoning, the following conditions exist: 1) people are afraid of it, 2) officials are reluctant to enact zoning codes because of fear that city couldn't or wouldn't enforce them. This indicates the underlying challenge of making public aware of what zoning codes mean and how they could be beneficial. This is illustrated by no zoning codes and no building codes.

In the area of downtown redevelopment the following conditions exist: 1) lack of local capital, 2) people who rent stores don't want to fix-up somebody else's property and the landlords have no incentive, 3) lack of agreement on how to implement town plan for facelift. This indicates the underlying challenge of getting public to show their support and interest in backing the town project. This is illustrated by storefronts and sidewalks need improvement, congestion in traffic downtown, courthouse needs renovation.

In the area of city services the following conditions exist: 1) lack of money, 2) lack of interest by policemen, 3) no charge for garbage pick-up. This indicates the underlying challenge of beginning to charge for existing and expanded services in order to an adequate job. This is illustrated by no regular pick-up of large rubbish, security and upkeep of new park and no full-time police dispatcher which leaves no backup in crucial situations such as last year's tragedy.

In the area of full time promotion the following conditions exist: 1) Chamber of Commerce not active, 2) Lack of funds, 3) Those who are able to do long range promotion don't have time. This indicates the underlying challenge of getting community cooperation between existing businesses, industries, officials and citizens. This is illustrated by no organized effort to attract industry, need of full time city manager and no one working on highway to Baysprings.

We the citizens of Belmont in order to gain and build support for our townlift program, propose to have a "City Hall Beautication Month".

Thru:

- 1) Have Board mak decision,
- 2) Business men calls and invitation,
- 3) Planning meeting,
- 4) Publicize results.

We the citizens of Belmont in order to inform people as to the benefits of zoning codes, we propose to have a three pronged communication effort on zoning. Thru:

- 1) Club presentations, letters and set scheldule,
- 2) Newspaper series - write and publish,
- 3) Public hearing in October.
