

indicate the underlying contradiction of a lack of knowledge of what is happening and a failure to act when we do learn.

Local illustrations in Jackson are: the bridge in north Jackson for no useful purpose the housing project built by Hinds County hospital sitting empty City of Jackson for years refusing to build public housing churches sitting empty during the week

### **ECONOMIC ISSUES**

### In the arena of economic impact of government

the following blocks, government monetary policies
income of wage earners has not kept pace
lack of compulsory education law
lack of funding/planning for future growth
legislative blocks (by laws & industrial influence)
ignorance of benefits & availability of services

indicate the underlying contradiction of the feeling that big government is remote to the average citizen; inaccessability to actual power as source for means of change.

This is illustrated by: traffic problems and the form of city government restricts citizen input; asphalt plant pollution on Hwy. 51N (Ridgeland), entire sewer/drainage system, and cancellation of public transportation routes.

### IMPROVEMENT FOR BETTER GOVERNMENT & COMMUNITY

In the Arena of economic commonality

the following blocks, matching Federal Funds
sources of funding
special interest & community involvement
education & vocational training, no incentives for
new business

indicate that the underlying contradiction is social reform.

This is illustrated by: move to change the form of Civic Government street improvement bonds low income housing

### LACK OF JOBS

In the Arena of Economics, lack of jobs and industry

the fact that the slow adjustment from agriculture to industry

indicates that the underlying contradiction is lack of technical and vocational training in some and apathy in others.

This is illustrated by: high unemployment

high delinquency and crime rates

### FOR THE WELFARE OF THE PEOPLE

In the Arena of Politics

the following blocks, housing property assessment equality of jobs ethics of government

indicate that the underlying contradiction is leadership in government

This is illustrated by the fact that no communication takes place at the local level.

# SOCIAL POLITICS

In the Arena of Political Commonality

The following blocks, citizen apathy

understanding of benefits of a new form of Municipal government and lack of respect for the senior citizens skills, knowledge and housing accommodations

Indicate that the underlying Contradiction is the leadership is satisfied with the satus quo and people concerned with their own welfare.

This is illustrated by lack of the legislature to pass a mandatory education law.

# VOTING, HIRING AND PAY

In the Arena of Political (voting, pay and hiring equality)

the following blocks, unawareness of legislation & programs of action.

indicate the underlying contradiction non-exposure to and participation in political issues.

This is illustrated by the number of people that didn't show up for the "town meeting" People won't participate but will criticize what "others" do.

### LOSS OF INDIVIDUAL IDENTITY

In the Arena of political commonality

the fact that there has been an increase in crime
indifference to problems by citizens
lack of knowledge as to how to use the system to solve
problems
lack of local representation

indicate the underlying contradiction of a loss of individual identity and worth.

This is illustrated by the fact that problems have existed for a long time and nothing has been done.

POLITICAL CHALLENGES COND.

In the Arena of political commonality

the following blocks, people think that schools "aren't good enough" intergration scares people people are not directly represented by city officials

indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of proper information

This is illustrated by bad quality of schools, poor attendance at public schools, and the mayor and council form of government petition.

# Community Problem-Solving

In the Arena of Cultural Commonality

the following blocks, la

lack of education and training lack of communication as a community

inadequat attention to problem-solving

indicate that the underlying contradiction is that when people do get together to talk, they spend their time talking about what the problem is but do not work out solutions.

This is illustrated by,

frequent meetings in community centers that never come up with solutions also people are overly concerned about what they themselves need, not about what we can all do for that community to work together.

the lack of basic education on issues, lack of personal involvement and the small percentage of people voting in a given community

indicate the underlying contradiction of spiritual values are not applied to political decisions.

This is illustrated by

We believe that a return to Bible Doctrine in a deciding factor in our day-to-day activities and decisions is the first step to solving all of the social, economic and political ills we haved discussed at this meeting.

The individual separated from the system

In the Arena of Sociol- economic problems of society

the fact that there is an inadequate understanding of the process of invaling oneself in local government, and that there is a lack of organization among civic, cultural and social groups, and that available services are utilized by a few people, and that there has been a breakdown in standards.

This is illustrated by

inconvenience of paying a utility bill or having ulities connected, loss of esteem within the community of the public schools, buildings which do not provide for the handicapped, an unawariness by citizens of what steps can be tacken in grtting a problem solved.

propose to circulate community questionnaire to identify needs, publish the results, and gain commitments from organizations in advance to do whatever is indicated

through lining up commitments in advance, publishing the results (also in the sun) and designating one group to coordinate resulting activities

### CITIZEN PARTICIPATION

in order to sensitize both children & adults to local needs and to get them involved propose by printed material, citizens writing drafts of bills on issues they feel strongly on

through: writing, calling & demanding to be heard by legislators & school boards

### FOR AN INFORMED PUBLIC

We the citizens of the North Jackson Community

in order to present basic information to citizens

propose to conduct forums and/or panel discussions in the community and radio and T.V.

through: the use of printed materials, including names and addresses of legislators,
their voting records
newspaper articles
Senate and House Bills
urgent issues

### COMMUNITY TEAM WORK

We the citizens of North Jackson

in order to render individuals & elected representatives more cognizant of problems in which each respective group can be helpful to the community as a whole

propose to have neighborhood chairmen for meetings & black captains for assuring attendance at (a) monthly neighborhood meetings & (b) periodic meetings with elected representatives

- through: (1) Persuasive telephone committee for inviting individual participation in neighborhood meetings.
  - (2) A secretary to write R.S.V.P. invitations to elected officials to attend periodic mass mettings.
  - (3) A P.T.A. telephone chairmen to encourage school & neighborhood participation
  - (4) Lending assistance in getting these groups to attend Town meetings.

# ESTABLISH NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCILS

### We the citizens of North Jackson

in order to get people involved in solving their problems at a neighborhood level.

propose to organize monthly neighborhood meetings to discuss and solve existing problems and to acquaint them with services available for problem solving.

### through

- 1. Defining boundaries using real estate divisions
- 2. Obtain a roster of people within that boundary
- 3. Have a promotion of such organization
- 4. Have an organizational meeting
- 5. Elect a leader-spokesman
- 6. Form research committees to research problems and possible solutions
- 7. Meet to present problems and solutions for reaction from the entire group
- 8. Draw up a formal plan of action and present this action to the proper authority.
