HUMAN DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

Human Development begins with local people in local communities. The residents of 24 communities have demonstrated that human development is possible anywhere in the world. In these sites, local people are working in cooperation with both the public and private sectors to achieve economic self-sufficiency and social self-dependence. Each project begins with a week-long consultation during which residents and volunteer consultants from around the world share their expertise in building a plan to meet the community's needs. First, the consultation elicits from the community a picture of its hopes and dreams for the future. It then determines the major factors blocking this vision and designs practical proposals and specific tactics to ensure the implementation of the plan for comprehensive socio-economic development. Programs unique to each community are created by residents and auxiliary staff. Rapid simultaneous initiation of the programs is one key to the successful launching of the projects. Communities in 20 nations have invited the Institute of Cultural Affairs to use this model in establishing pilot projects. The ability to achieve dramatic signs of socio-economic transformation in apparently hopeless situations is being demonstrated by local residents in all 24 projects. In India, the State of Maharashtra, the first phase of a model to replicate the pilot model in 25,000 villages across that state is underway. At the end of the first twelve months, 25 villages were in some stage of program actuation. This demonstration has indicated that rapid development in multiple locations within a delimited geographic area is possible.

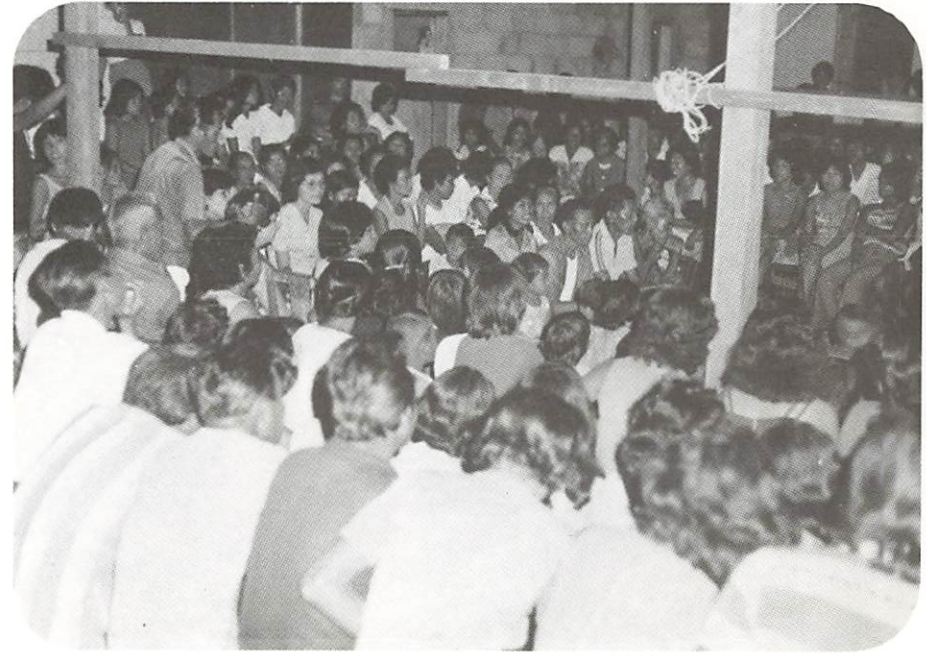

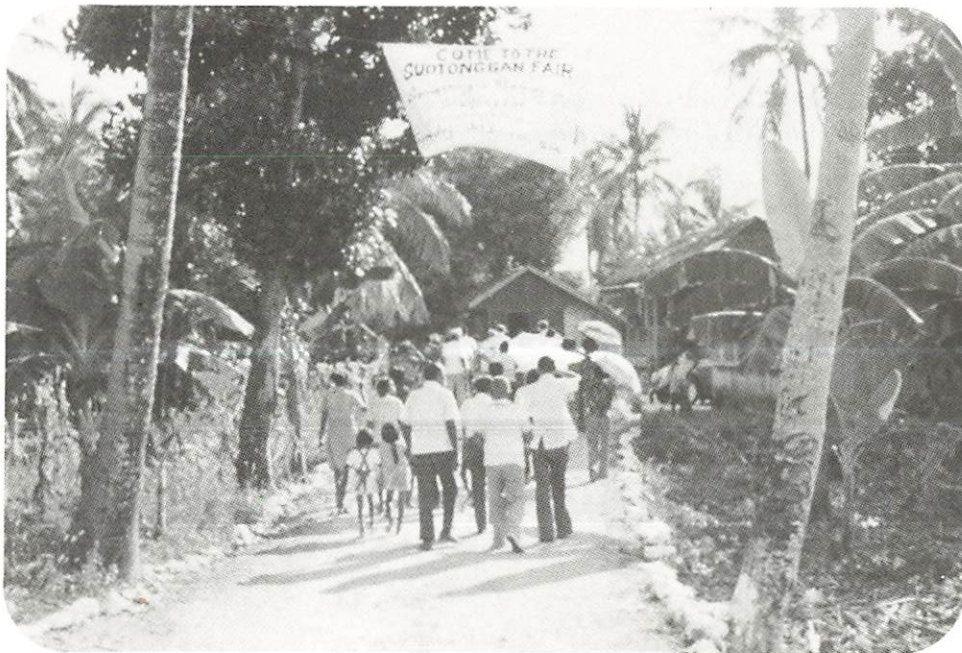

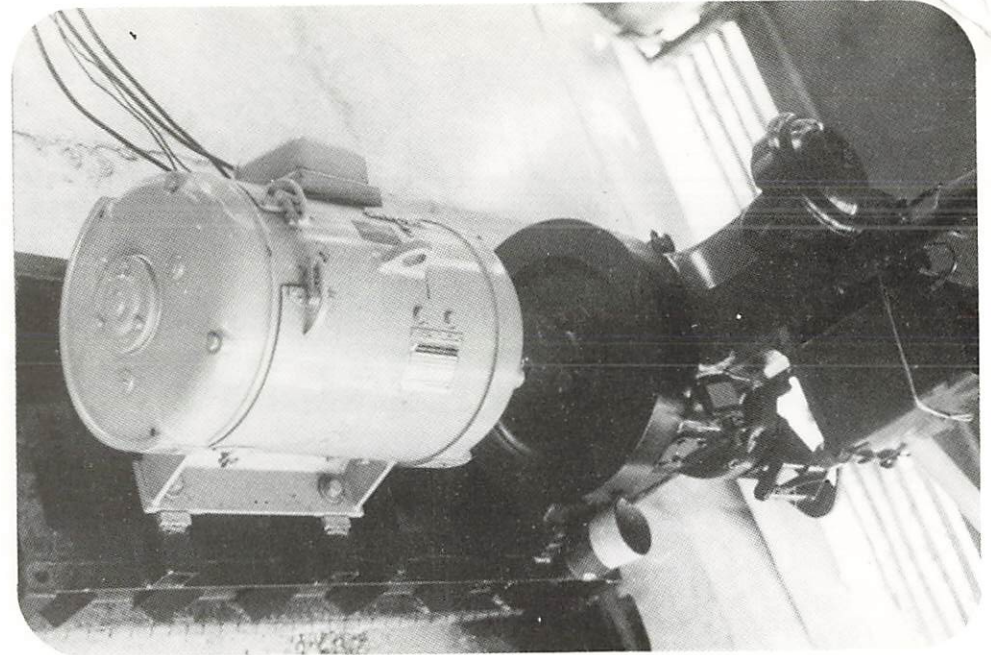

In the arena of Social Development, the results were:
The establishment of a fully operational health clinic with trained fulltime (8) and part-time (20) volunteer health caretakers ;
A nutrition program that serves 220 children daily, lowered infant mortality rate to zero and introduced home gardens for supplementary food sources;
The procurement of an electric generator, electrical poles and supplies enough to provide light to every house and industry in the village;
A pre-school for all children ages 2 to 6 years with 10 community staff and teachers trained;
An extension school for first and second grades, with an evening adult education program;
The training of over 120 villagers in sewing, crafts, buri furniture making, mechanics and teaching methods.

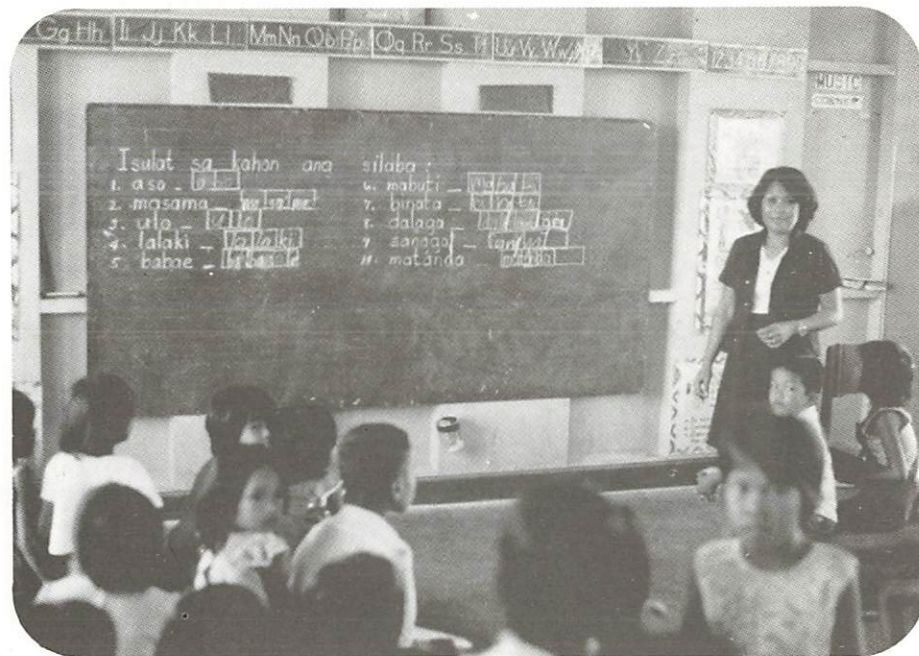

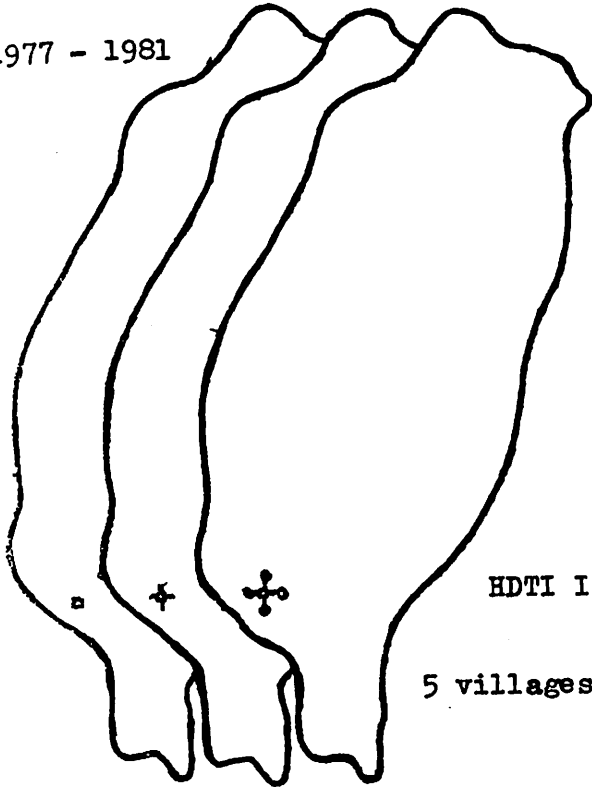

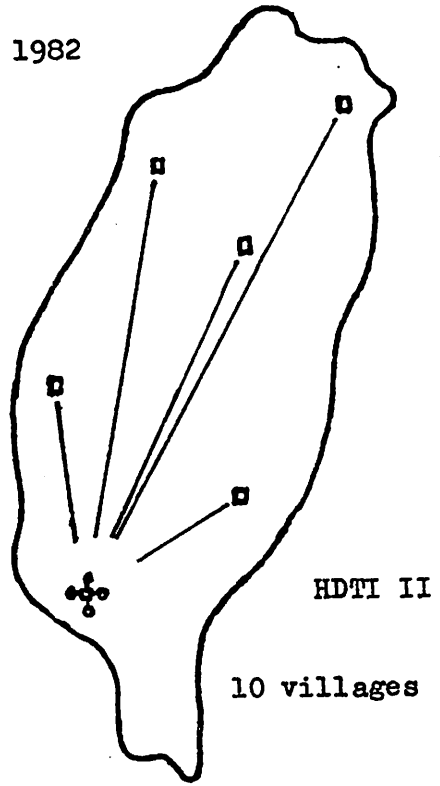
PHASE I Cluster Prototype

1977 - 1981



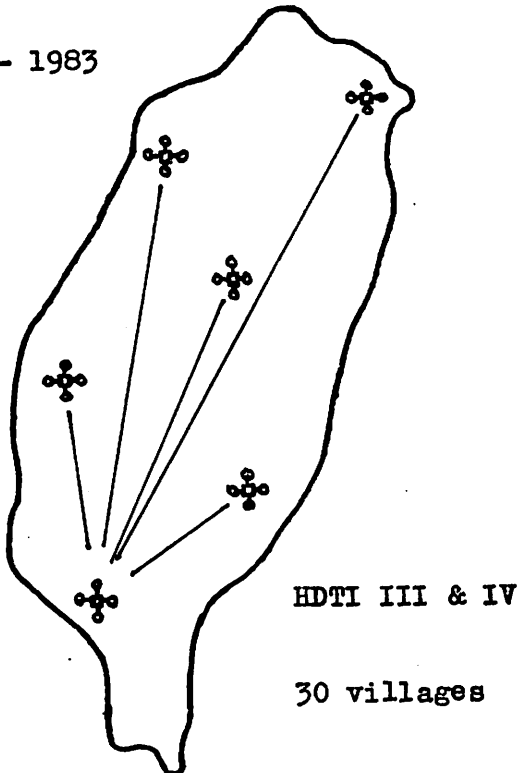
PHASE II Core Village Expansion

1981 - 1982



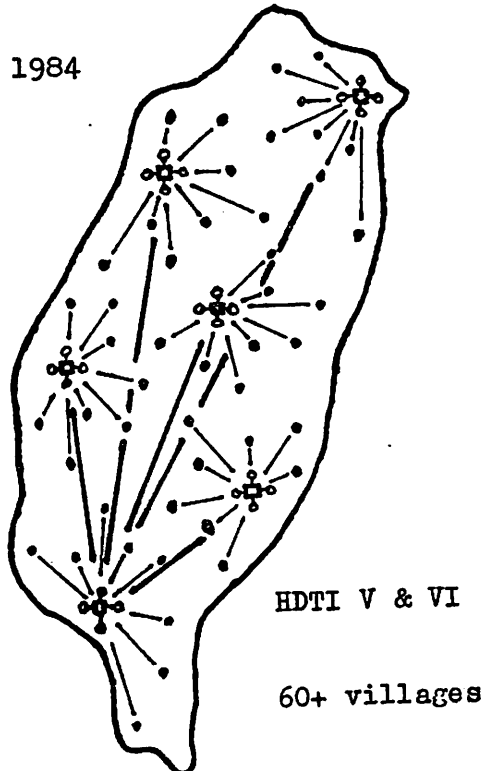
PHASE III Cluster Replication

1983 - 1984

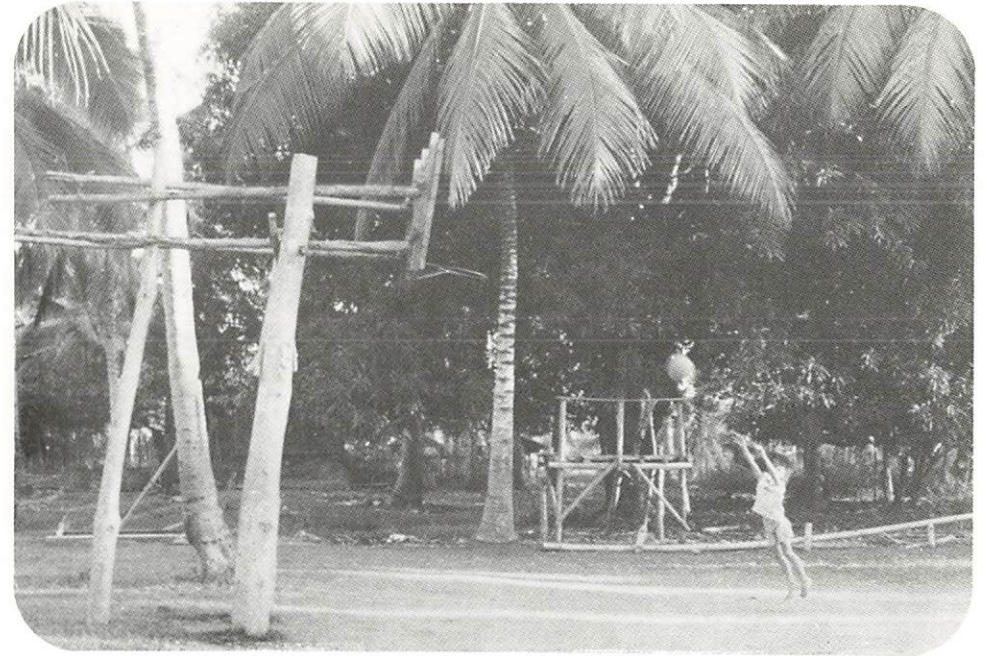


The Human Development Project intends to be a living demonstration of comprehensive socio-economic development in rural communities which could catalyze projects across the Philippines. Six principles of operation are necessary for such catalysis to actually occur. First, people will be able to see rapid transformation of a difficult situation which requires developing the model village quickly with dramatic transformation. Second, people will see trained local leadership who use practical methods to lead community residents and activities. Third, people will see the creative use of local resources and materials. Fourth, a visitation plan will be designed for other communities to visit the Project. Fifth, one-day community meetings utilizing consensus building methods used in the project will be held in other communities. Sixth, other local community leadership will explore the implications of undertaking a human development project with the ICA staff.

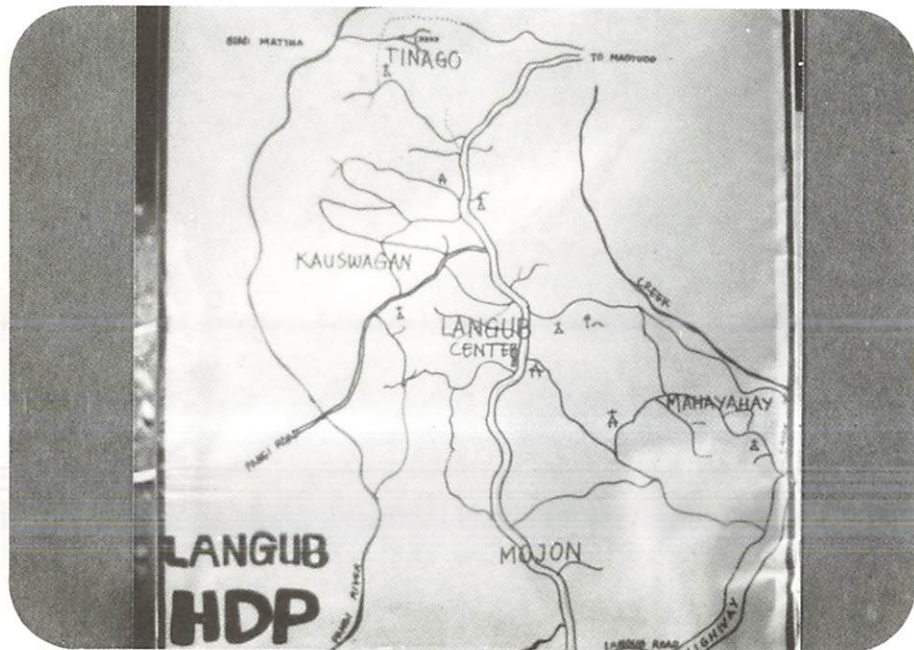
Since 1967, the Institute of Cultural Affairs has been working in the Philippines with persons concerned with the revitalization of local communities. The Institute is an international research, training and demonstration group concerned with the human factor in world development. The Institute, convinced that effective human development must be initiated at the local level, is engaged in planning and implementing community development projects in the first 24 locations currently in operation around the world. The Institute is incorporated in the Republic of the Philippines as a not-for-profit corporation. It has headquarters in Brussels, Bombay, Chicago, Hong Kong, Nairobi and Singapore. In addition, there are ICA offices in more than 100 major cities serving 25 nations. The Institute's programs around the world are supported by grants, gifts and contributions from government departments and agencies at the federal, national, provincial and municipal levels and from private foundations, corporations, trusts and concerned individuals.

The Langub Human Development Consult was the initial step of a comprehensive demonstration development project in the Mindanao region of the Republic of the Philippines. Langub, meaning "cave", derives its name from a gaping cavern in a deep ravine. It is located 12 kilometers from Davao City center on a dirt road branching off the Philippine-Japan Friendship Highway. It runs along the spine of a ridge overlooking Davao City and Mt. Apo. The project was begun through the cooperative efforts of residents and concerned citizens of the Philippines. The intention is to develop the community's agricultural and commercial base, provide for social well-being through educational and other community structures, and reconstruct the physical space by increasing services and facilities. The project is seen as a pilot program demonstrating methods adaptable to any village in the Philippines.

In the arena of Economic Development, the results were:
An improved agriculture stock with 41 new plants, the introduction of hybrid corn which trippled production and of temperature resistant sorghum;
The development of direct feeding techniques in the bangus fishponds;
A rabbit dispersal program and chicken poultry (600) raising;
The creation of 130 new jobs at increased incomes in the community and the opening of 80 new savings accounts;
An abaca craft industry with the development of export outlets for local crafts;
The development of the rock cutting into a major income-producing industry for building construction;
A buri furniture industry with 2 factories employing most of the unemployed in the village.

In the arena of Community Formulation, the results were:

- The operation of 5 community guilds, with over 100 residents responsible for the project implementation;
- Development of a village care network using purok and team divisions involving every person in the village;
- The renovation of the community square, road improvements, and community beautification through community volunteer workdays;
- The construction of 10 new buildings: the Health Clinic, a Bagong Lipunan School, Community Center, Agriculture Nursery, Utilities Building, 2 buri factories, a craft factory and a Training Center;
- Formation of the SHDP Association with a board, an Economic Commission, a Social Commission and a manager from the village for each program.
