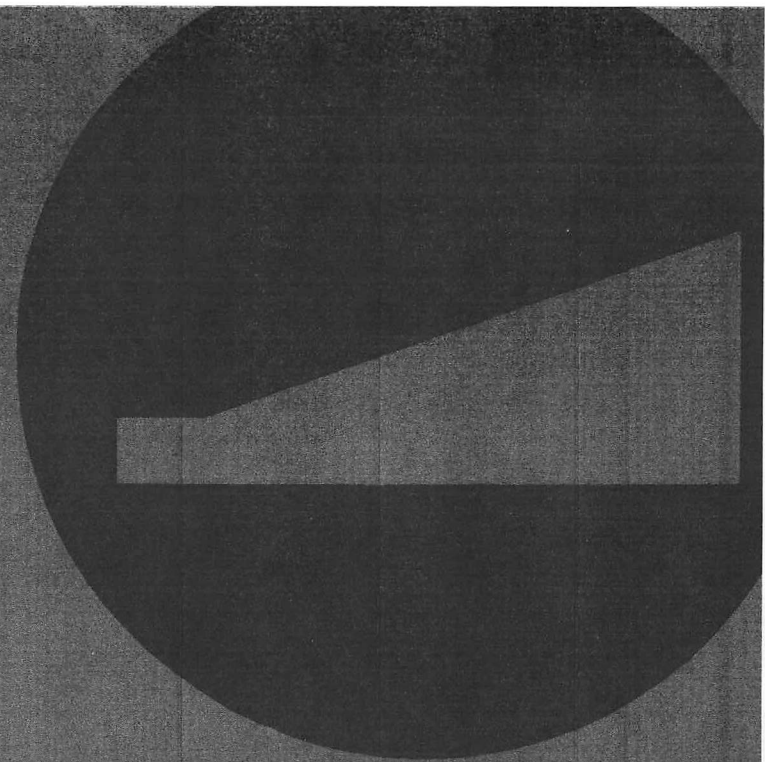

5th CITY PRESIDUM - DECEMBER 10, 1968

ECONOMIC

Health - Home care service established. Lead poisoning test still existing. Equipment exchange operating. Blood Bank operating for all 5th City Citizens. Plan Parenthood - information given for teaching NYC volunteers going on.

In Spring quarter - Economic Guild did research on qualification and specification for Neighborhood Federal Credit Union.

In summer quarter - worked in conjunction with Jewel T. Surveyed the feasibility of constructing a market complex; what kind could be supported by community this size.

Winter quarter - Credit Union charter acquired. Board of Directors secured. Credit Committee functioning. Supervisory Committee recommended.

INCOME

Employment outpost functioning with some jobs for several neighborhood youth and men potential job training after Dec. 15. Key punch training going on. Staff has been trained to do instructing. Screening test has been given. Operating four nights weekly. Average of 15 hours per week.

REDEVELOPMENT

356 South Homan near completion. - **three units.** Preliminary approval received on package of 96 units. Housing program underway. Full time architects working on rehabs and new construction.

The Economic Guild recommends:

A functioning health mobile unit be available to all 5th Citizens with a daily home service operation in the clinic.

The establishment of a consumer education program.

Reestablish Business Men's Association

Open Employment Center.

Hire new Board of Managers.

Establish liaison person with businessmen.

Have one Board of Manager assigned to Development.

FCCRC submit 3rd package of 15 units to FHA.

Incorporation of NRA.

Political Guild Reports:

1. Local Peace Commission, met with Police officials and discussed relations of police to 5th City youth.
2. Legal Aid Clinic, continues to operate Monday nights offering free legal assistance to Fifth Citizens.
3. Civil Rights Association, successfully co-ordinated rent strike at 422-424 So. Homan Ave. Also, Fifth City successfully stopped plans for the building of a central police station and gained community participation in future decisions made by City of Chicago affecting 5th City.
4. In the Public Maintenance Commission, 5th Citizens picked up responsibility of cleaning own community on a weekly basis.
5. Neighborhood Voters League, co-operated with League of Women Voters to bring off voter education and registration drives.
6. Community Information Center, is continuing weekly delivery of the Voice.
7. The 5th City Guilds, in coordination with the 5th City Councils was responsible for all quarterly planning of 5th City programs.
8. The Stakes participated in monthly summer celebrations, cultural events, and a special Thanksgiving celebration.

Recommendations:

1. That the Local Peace Commission establish a community watch.
2. That the Public Maintenance Commission establish a comprehensive rat control program and continue 5th City cleanups.
3. That the Urban Assistance Exchange develop program funds from within 5th City and from outside sources.
4. That the community information center erect community bulletin boards.
5. That the Legislation Promotion Corps be initiated and begin research on laws and proposals that affect 5th City.
6. That community participation be broadened thru the following means:
 - A. Guild Boards meet once a month
 - B. Quads meet once a month
 - C. Presidium meets once a month
 - D. Congress be continued quarterly - every 3 months

HEALTH GUILD REPORT

SPRING

Initial contacts were made with medical schools in Chicago for Dr. recruitment. Proposals to Christian Medical Society, L.A.O.S., and individual physicians were made for volunteer doctors. Letters to approximately 100 Doctors in Chicago area who had taken courses at E.I., in an effort to recruit them for Health Center. Also visits were made to the Board of Health and the U.S. Public Health Service.

SUMMER

N.Y.C. Health assistants-(6 High School 5th City youth interested in Health careers) worked in a work study program, working with health guild members. They made home visits to recruit for the lead poisoning testing program and blood program and assisted in the actual testing for lead poisoning. This was done weekly in our Health Center. The doctor was provided by the Urban Progress Center. The health assistants taught a first aide course to the 5th City Pre-school teachers and became very proficient in being able to administer first aid. They made a number of trips in connection with their training such as to Miles Square Health Center, Schaub Rehabilitation Center and the Abbott Pharmaceutical Co.

LEAD POISONING

Approximately 250 children were tested for lead poisoning. A number of positive cases were found and were treated thru. Municipal Contagious Disease Hospital. It was during the summer that one 5th City child died of Lead poisoning. An effort to have the child tested had been made by the health guild, but the mother had not decided to have done.

BLOOD PROGRAM

The spring and summer blood program continued, and 50 pints were added. 25 pints were given to 5th City residents in several different hospitals for illnesses varying from circumcision to gun shot wounds.

EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES

THRU. CONTACTS WITH DOCTORS, MEDICAL SCHOOLS, AND MEDICAL EQUIPMENT COMPANIES a large amount of used and new equipment and supplies for the health center has been donated. This includes such things as examining tables, blood pressure machines, desks, and stock drugs. In addition to this, 750.00 was given by an individual to initiate a Family Planning Clinic.

FALL

Chest x-rays were taken by a mobile unit from the T.B. Institute. 350 5th Citizens were x-rayed. Following this, the T.B. Institute agreed to give an x-ray unit for x-raying chests(on permanent loan) to the 5th City Health Center. Extensive wiring had to be done and was completed in November and the x-ray unit is scheduled to be installed this week. Health guild members will be trained by the T.B. Institute to make the x-rays as well as to do T.B. skin testing. They will process the x-ray films for us, making this service free.

EQUIP. AND SUPPLIES

Mrs Leona Sparks from the Health guild, along with one Staff member from the development office of the E.I. visited the American Hospital Supply Co., presenting a list of equipment needed and give the needed amount asked for. This was accepted and a

of equipment and supplies needed for the Health Center. This was accepted and agreement was made to give the entire amount asked for, (approx. \$1,500 to \$2,000)

FAMILY PLANNING CLINIC

Recruitment was begun for a volunteer doctor for our Family Planning Clinic. To prepare for the operation of this clinic, two Health Guild and one Style Guild member took a 3 day training course at Planned Parenthood. Pharmaceutical Representatives were contacted and teacher aids and contraceptive supplies were contributed

(A volunteer doctor (a female specialist) has been secured and plans on being available about January 1st. of 1969)

ON GOING PROGRAM

The Blood program is continuing . No blood was added during the fall. 14 pints were given to 8 5th Citizens during the fall. Information re-Blood Program was given thru. WVON and other radio stations. The equip. exchange loan\$ forms were printed and inventory and organization done so as to better enable the use of this hospital type equip. for all 5th Citizens.

LEAD POISON TESTING continues thru U.P.C. Names are taken by the Health Center, recruitment is being done by the guilds and stakes, and sent to U.P.C. who provide transportation for children to be tested.

H OME VISITING continues by the guild doing informal teaching and providing assistance to many people. Examples would be teaching of a family where there is a chronically ill member and assisting a new mother in knowing how to care for her babb.

TRAINING

A C.E.P. worker has been assigned to the health center and has been trained as receptionist and health team member. Two volunteer workers were trained to work with the health guild.

GOALS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1) Secure Health Mobile Unit and begin operation of it.
- 2) Begin Family Planning Clinic
- 3) Initiate daily service at Health center; TESTING, DIAGNOSTIC SCREENING of various kinds, such as hearing tests, T.B. testing etc.
- 4) Follow up contact with Loyola Medical School for probable affiliation with them: their supplying of full physicians' ^{service} etc.
- 5) Set up effective referral service until such time as a full time doctor ~~is~~ ^{is} available.

Education Guild

The Education Guild reports the following accomplishments of the last 3 quarters for the Center of Urban Education.

Community Pre-school Institute:

During the spring quarter 5 C.E.P. teachers were sent to a special re-school and day care training course. Lela Mosley and Charlie Steward were transferred from the pre-school to the 5th CITY Board of Managers. Regular parent-teachers meetings began and are being held every 4th Sunday.

56 5th CITY pre-schollers graduated in the summer quarter and are now attending public school. A head start party for West side head start parents was given in the Program Center.

Open house in the pre-school began in the fall quarter and pre-school community teachers and N.Y.C. teacher aids studied the cultural curriculum. 8 sessions of the Imaginal education course were given to 20 Lawndale community teachers.

Public School Auxiliary:

The urban education lab conducted the LIBRA reading weekend with 22 students in attendance this spring to encourage reading and sharpen reading skills.

In the summer quarter 5th CITY tutorage was held in conjunction with the Academy.

The teachers union at Marshall High School revitalized contact/visits with Ericson and Austin P.T.A.'s this fall. Mrs. Mary Brown is now representing 5th CITY at Ericson during the experimental classrooms project of the Model Cities program. 4 community volunteers are manning the 5th CITY tutorial center this fall with 15 students on the role.

Functional Education Centrum:

Community pedagogues staffed a special course for L.I. elementary school visitors this spring.

An Imaginal Education weekend course with 18 participants and 5 staff members (including Lela Mosley and Charlie Steward) was held this fall to train community volunteers workers.

Career development now has a motivational education model.

Urban World Academy.

The spring quarter kicked off the Board of Managers community reformulation study and also contact of recruiters for college placement.

A 9 week corporate living experiment with 20 high school graduates was in operation this summer and the urban leadership academy sent out a total of 24 students during the fall quarter. Finally the 5th CITY Board of Managers are now participating and teaching in a 4 day a week training course of the urban leadership academy.

Education Guild

The education guild recommends the following:

- 1.) That Imaginal education training continue to develop master teachers in order to have one master teacher per preschool class with a rotating plan in operation and that hiring of new teacher aids take place.
- 2.) To do follow up work on 5th CITY pre-school graduates and local students and to retain contact with Ericson's model grant for experimental classes.
- 3.) To enable the Study Center to be self perpetuating with 4 more adult community volunteers.
- 4.) Hold one imaginal education weekend and develop a one-day volunteer training program.
- 5.) Begin operation of a week night Basic Learning Center.
- 6.) Begin educational training in relation to the careers development skill training.
- 7.) Set-up orientation nights for volunteer workers
- 8.) Continue to develop faculty for all training programs.
- 9.) Continue preparation and placement of high school graduates in college.
- 10.) Provide a mini-manual for stake and guild study.

The Symbol Guild

The Symbol Guild reports that on April 20, 1968 the 5th City Ensemble left for a tour of the East Coast. Places visited were Kalamazoo and Detroit, Michigan, Camden and Patterson, N. J., Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, Pa., and Washington, D. C. Since the troop's return, they have performed in 5th City, Evanston, Ill., North Central College, Naperville, Ill., and Waukegan, Illinois.

Record sales of the 5th City performers have gone exceedingly well and are still being sold.

The Urban Crafts Shop was opened in May featuring goods made by neighborhood people. The Craft Shop will reopen next week, next door to its previous location.

The Cabaret was opened in July with once a week gatherings featuring readings from the Theatre. The Theatre presented 2 plays this past summer. The actors and actresses were NYC youth working in the Summer Program. In the fall, persons from the Theatre presented readings at various Stake functions.

The Community Cultural Nexus has had several guests from foreign countries.

The 5th City Choir was started in the fall.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The 5th City Ensemble present their production of the story of the Black Man this spring to the West Coast., to spread the 5th City Story.

The Cabaret reopen with once a month presentations. The first performance being an authentic African cultural show or dance. Projected date of the first performance January, 1969.

Expansion of the Community Cultural Nexus.

Entertainment nights by the 5th City Choir.

The Theatre present 2 plays this quarter and establish the Playhouse.

OPERATION VOLUNTEER

The Symbol Guild recommends that anyone present here tonight with knowledge of painting, music, photography volunteer some time to help establish classes in the above areas.

MATRIX OF URBAN STYLE REPORT

In its work since the last Congress, the Matrix of Urban Style has accomplished the following:

- I Youth Development Corps
 1. The Jets travelled to San Antonio to represent Fifth City at the World's Fair last Spring.
 2. 150 Jets participated in the Summer Jet program, and eight community staff were employed according to the recommendation of the last Congress.
- II Urban Student Union
 1. High School House was held in residence in Spring, 1968, with twelve students, who are now deployed as emissaries.
 2. In carrying out the Congress recommendation to deploy Fifth City youth, seventeen students were sent out as emissaries in Spring, 1968, and forty were sent in Fall, 1967. A mailing and visitation system was set up by which youth stay in contact with Fifth City.
- III Social Development Center
 1. YCS has established itself as director of the Youth Center, and began teaching preparation and leadership experience.
 2. The Youth Center was initiated with six dances held this summer and five held this fall.
 3. According to the last Congress' recommendation, the Family Services Bureau met bi-weekly during the Spring to develop family models. It is now concerned with information distribution, and has enrolled four mentally retarded children in school.
 4. In trips to Washington, D.C. and Maryland last Spring, the Elders began their experiences as travelling teachers. They also held Black Heritage Pedagogy classes in Spring. They are now perfecting their skills in teaching, especially in the area of the Fifth City Story.
- IV Fifth City Community Foundation
 1. Three public relations luncheons were hosted by the Elders.

Recommendations

The Matrix of Urban Style requests the approval of the Presidium on the following recommendations:

1. That one new Board of Managers be hired to work with Style Guild. The Guild recommends Eugene Beasley.
2. That the Jets and the Youth Set begin operation by the last week in January.
3. That the High School House be expanded, and that two trained community volunteers be sought.
4. That the Youth Center be opened with ten trained community volunteers.
5. That the Elders' Community Union initiate involvement of all Fifth City elders, and continue their teaching and hosting roles.

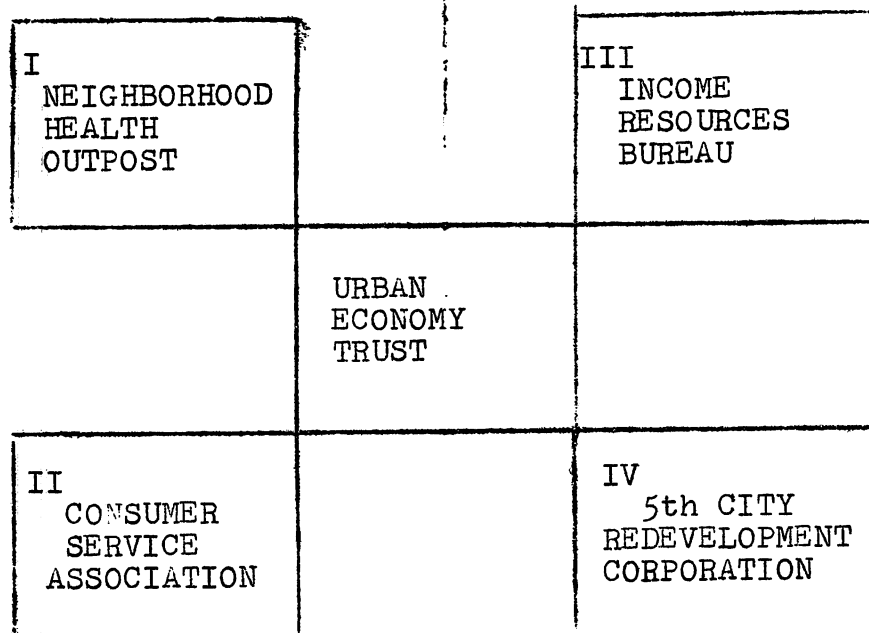

The Board of Managers and Presidium present to the 5th CITY QUARTERLY CONGRESS the following report of activities in the Urban Economy Trust during the past three quarters (April thru December, 1968):



I. NEIGHBORHOOD HEALTH OUTPOST

1. Home visitation by the health team was continued.
2. 250 children were recruited for lead poisoning tests. one out of every 10 were found to have some degree of lead poisoning.
3. The blood bank gave 38 pints of blood to 5th Citizens at no charge to them. 20 pints were added to the 5th CITY blood bank supply.
4. A family planning course was taken by the health guild members after which 100 NYC workers were given classes in family planning.
5. The TB Institute X-rayed 360 people with a mobil unit in September, and decided to provide 5th CITY with its own X-ray unit to installed in the health clinic.
6. A volunteer doctor for our family planning clinic has been seonred and the clinic will be open soon.

II. CONSUMER SERVICE ASSOCIATION

1. The research on qualification and specification for a neighborhood federal credit union began last spring. This fall the charter was aquired and the credit union began operation.

III. INCOME RESOURCES BUREAU

1. The Employment Outpost has begun to function with several jobs secured and potential job training secured for neighborhood youth and adults.

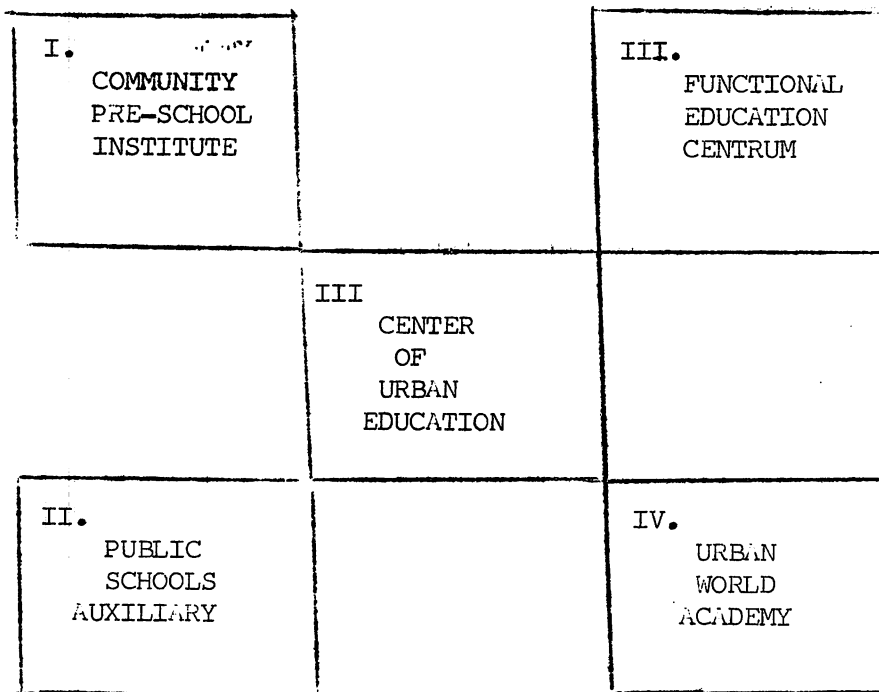
III. INCOME RESOURCES BUREAU (continued)

2. The IBM training began this fall and key punch training is done 4 nights a week (average of 15 hours). Screening tests were given and 6 women are now being trained.

IV. 5th CITY REDEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

1. An architectural clinic with 2 full time architects and 2 trainees began in the summer. They have been hard at work making the necessary plans for rehabilitation and new construction to develop 5th CITY housing and business community.
2. The house at 356 Homan is near completion. Preliminary approval has been received on an FHA package for rehabilitation of 96 units.

I. COMMUNITY PRE-SCHOOL INSTITUTE:

1. 5 CEP teachers were sent to a special pre-school and day care training course. Mrs. Lela Mosley and Mrs. Charlie Steward were transferred from the pre-school to the 5th City Board of Managers. Regular parent/teachers meetings are being held every 4th Sunday in the pre-school.
2. 56 5th City pre-schoolers graduated in the summer quarter and are now attending public school. A Head Start party for West Side Head Start parents was given in the Program Center.
3. Open house in the Pre-School began in the fall quarter and community pre-school teachers and NYC teacher aids studied the cultural curriculum. 8 sessions of the Imaginal Education course were given to 20 Lawndale community teachers.

II. PUBLIC SCHOOL AUXILIARY:

1. The Urban Education Laboratory conducted a LIBRA reading weekend with 22 elementary students in attendance to encourage reading and sharpen study skills.
2. 5th City Tutorage was held in conjunction with the Urban Leadership Academy and 4 community volunteers are manning the 5th City Tutorial Center with 15 students on roll.
3. Contact visits with the Ericson and Austin P.T.A.'s are being made by the Teachers' Union. 5th City is being represented by Mrs. Mary Brown at Ericson during the experimental classrooms project of the Model Cities Program.

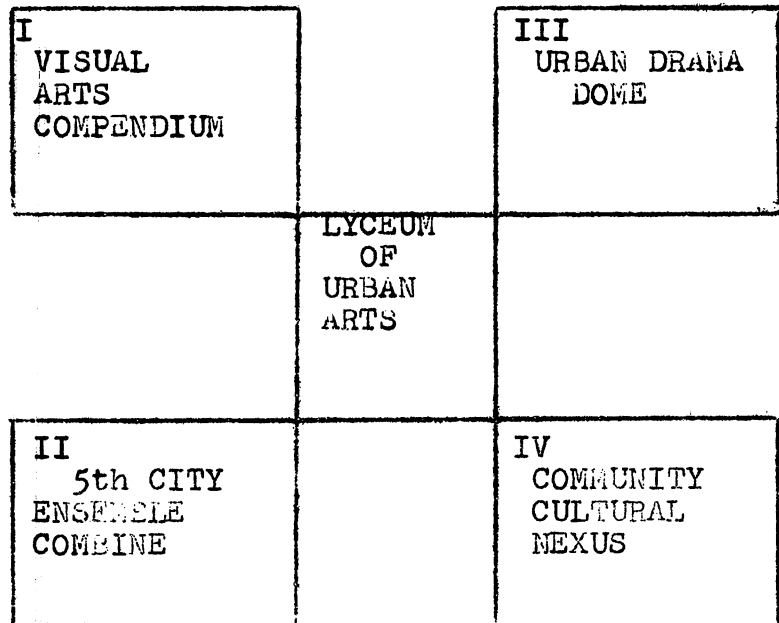
III. FUNCTIONAL EDUCATION CENTRUM:

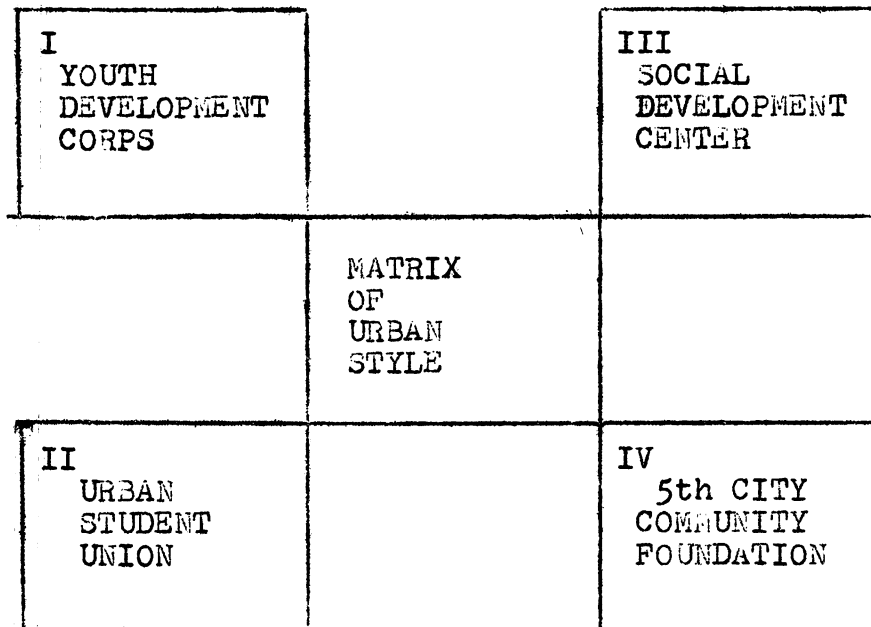

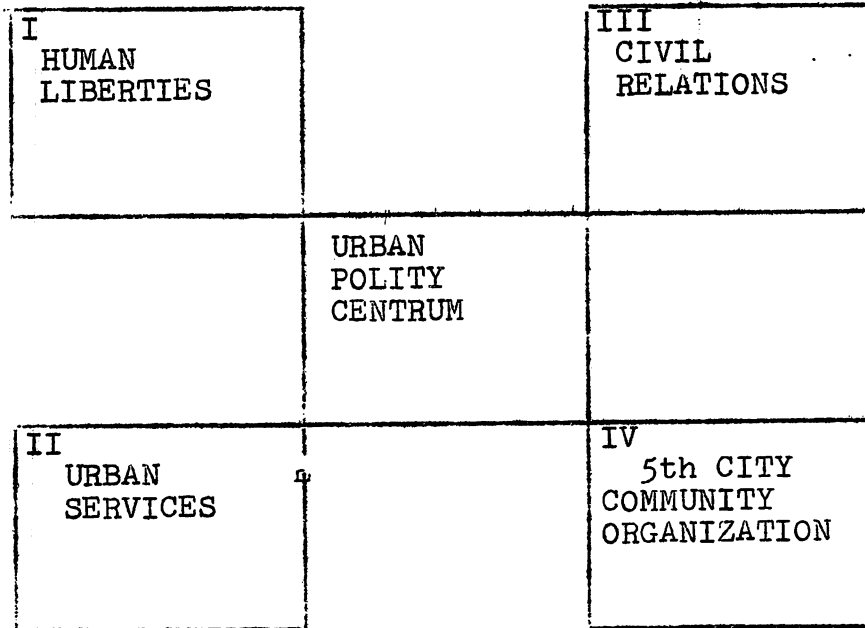

1 - LIGHT INDUSTRY - Accomplishments

On October 14, the Economic Development Commission of the City of Chicago and several major corporations dedicated the new Industrial Development Center at 3324 W. Fifth Avenue. The Grand Opening was a gala happening for everyone, especially the Preschool teachers who came to sing for the crowd. The Qube-Cor Industry created test market models and brochures, and the sales began. Five hundred storm windows have been constructed for community homes by Win-door, with sales of \$6,500. to date. A tool rental business is being developed which will rent automotive and home repair tools. Many job seekers have been by to look for jobs. Other businesses included auto alarms and radio installation, home TV and appliance repair and Nu-Start, rebuilders of alternators, generators and starters. An accounting firm has now moved into the center to work more directly with businesses in the community.

- Projections

In the future Win-Door expects to produce other building products for the community, including screens and screen doors. Qube-Cor will be doing more marketing, as well as build other items such as book cases. A Management Training Program has begun and will equip new businessmen to operate their businesses more effectively. The offices for the new businesses will be set up and a C.P.A. has been hired. It is expected that professionals will be invited to participate in the business planning activities.

2-AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE CENTER - Accomplishments

Over the last four months the Automotive Service Center revised the submitted loan request from \$500,000 to \$450,000. New bids and financial statements have been completed. Mid-City Development Corporation has proposed that the 10,000 projected square feet be divided in the following manner: Car Wash - 2,000 square feet; Auto Parts - 4,000 square feet, and ten Bays - 4,000 square feet. The Nu-Start Industry which is presently rebuilding generators and starters for automobiles will be relocated eventually in the new Automotive Service Center.

- Projections

In the future the next step is to acquire a new facility for a body shop which will complete all the automotive services. At present an automotive equipment catalogue center is being established in the Industry Development Center. A wholesale parts purchase and delivery service is now in the design stage.

5-COMMERCIAL SCHOOL - Accomplishments

The Commercial School began its third session this past quarter with 20 new students. Several graduates have secured jobs due to skills developed in the training school. The Commercial School staff and students also participated extensively in the Education Exposition in bringing money people together with a variety of educational resources for all ages. The need for management training has emerged due to the new businesses being developed in Fifth City. A preliminary curriculum has been developed and the first classes held in January 1978.

- Projections

The new directions being taken include curriculum revision and further development of the small business management course. The goal in the future is total community staffing and expanded curriculum for both the secretarial skills and business management divisions of the Commercial School.

6- NEIGHBORHOOD ENVIRONMENT - Accomplishments

The 3400-35-- Van Buren "Minizone" Project was begun last summer during the Environmental Campaign, by the 3500 Van Buren Block Club and the Department of Human Services. Emphasizing housing and property improvements many projects were completed, including: 25 trees planted along the boulevards; installation of yard lamps in front of eleven homes; painting and tuckpointing of seven homes; and ten families applying for Rehab Home Improvement Loans. Regular workdays by the residents each saturday kept the streets and alleys and vacant lots clean and safe for play. In December colored Christmas lights were placed in the yard lamps and Christmas toys, fruit and candy were given to the children and senior citizens.

- Projections

In 1978 Minizone plans to reconstruct the broken sidewalks along both sides of the street. Repair and painting of porches and clearing of vacant lots for parking and play will be done. Grass and flowers will be planted along all boulevards. In the spring, the block club hopes to see construction begin on vacant buildings and some new homes.

IX-INFORMATION INTERCHANGE - Accomplishments

The community newspaper, the 5th City Voice, began again this past september with a greatly expanded Bi-weekly issue and format. Articles and announcements about community activities and events of every kind have appeared. The addition of advertisements by local businesses has helped pay the cost of production. 2800 issues are delivered door-to-door and through businesses twice a month. Several youth have been employed part-time as delivery boys with help from a volunteer circulation manager.

- Projections

A professional printing service will be set-up in the industry center to produce the Voice and provide other printing services to the community. Increased advertising by local business will permit a larger paper with additional sections on sports, school activities, and editorials. The staff of the Voice, which is all volunteer, will increase to include residents from each stake, in order to provide the widest possible coverage of local news. Distribution through block clubs, businesses and delivery boys will be supported by a subscription charge for regular readers.

- MENS CLUB - Accomplishments

The Men's Club historically has been the genesis of many new ventures in Fifth City. It is they who established the first Business organization which built the shopping center, who organized the Safe Streets Patrol and initiated the local contractors association. Most recently they have been instrumental in rehabilitation of 321 South Trumbull, the Men's Club Center. They have also provided entrepreneurship in starting up the first industry, Win-Door interior storm windows and were major promoters of the environmental campaign and winterization campaign.

- Projections

The future plans of the Men's Club include completion of the 321 Trumbull project and opening there of a Men's Club facility. They also want to promote the new housing ownership development and continue to encourage industry and jobs development.

- Projections

There will be additional staff for mini and infant school. The "Iron Man Palace", a benefit family restaurant, air conditioning in the classrooms this summer and stable heat in the winter are among the anticipations for the near future. The acquisition of a copier is foremost on our list and obtaining a mini-bus is imperative. We hope to join other community residents in opening the Infant Care Center, creating a new playground at buildings C and B, and in caring for the streets around the school. There will be a computerized recordkeeping system established, a community picnic held. We will also have a bake and rummage sale, acquire a fire alarm system for the Infant Care Center, and promote sports teams at the Recreation Center. By 1980 there will be a mini bus pick up service, a new facility and renovated playground space, new equipment, a new curriculum rationale, and all staff having obtained degrees. Look for a Preschool flower garden.

14-ELDER ACTION CENTER - Accomplishments

Fifth City elders sponsored and participated in several events including "little brothers of the Poor", sewing, knitting, crocheting, creating preschool uniforms, cooking for the Community Thanksgiving feast, attending craft classes, stake calling, and delivering the 5th City Voice. The Health guild, exercises, and the Thursday night songfest were other engagement activities as well as a cooperative effort with C.A.M. **FUN NIGHT, INFORMATION PLEASE.**

- Projections

We anticipate a new relationship and contact between the police and elders of Fifth City through the safety patrol. We hope to see a health center here and expect to be working in the Infant School, to sell arts and crafts, and to help sew preschool uniforms. By 1980 we anticipate an even wider scope of activity, accessible bus transportation, and entertainment of V.I.P.'S at the Elders center of the 17th floor. We invite others to participate by cooperating with the elders program coordinator at 3700 Congress.

15-RECREATION FACILITIES - Accomplishments

The reactivation of the Recreation program has enlisted new supervisors and investigated heating possibilities for the gym. Many groups have made good use of the Recreation Center space and the most visible accomplishment is the activity in the center itself.

- Projections

The benefits of last quarter's research for heating possibilities in the Recreation Center will show this quarter. Many would like to see a more regular scheduling of gym activities that include open nights two nights a week, a women's night on Wednesdays, and one hour reservation slots for the remaining days of the week. The "old timers" or "slower movers" have already requested time on Sunday afternoons. By 1980 we anticipate a regular, well equipped, variety of activities for all ages sponsored and supported by groups throughout the whole community including local churches, local business men, block clubs, and concerned individuals. Worknights, fund raising, and equipment are needed.



