



# New Building Head Plans Attack On Lead Poisoning

On January 23, a city council committee endorsed Joseph F. Fitzgerald as building commissioner, after the department was criticized by Alderman Leon Despres. Despres charged that the department is in a "crisis" of laxity and corruption. He commented later that the candidate's appointment by Mayor Daley "is perhaps as good as we can get."

Fitzgerald said "an all-out attack" on buildings judged to be lead-poisoning hazards would be his "first order of business." Later that day, a building department official disclosed plans for a sweeping new lead-paint inspection system that would enable the city to survey as many as 100,000 buildings a year.

## Should State Board Control Local Police?

Senate Majority Leader Russell Arrington (R-Evanston) introduced bills that would give the State Police Training Board major powers over the standards of local police departments. The bills were proposed in the Illinois General Assembly on January 22. The board would get its new powers through control of Federal funds for upgrading local police departments.

The board would: (1) administer direct state financial aid to local departments; (2) be responsible for setting minimum standards for recruiting and training policemen; (3) conduct research and decide how to advise police departments about enforcement of laws.

"I would hope that, in the near future, new recruits would be required to have a high school education and those in higher positions a college degree," Arrington stated. He added that our policemen are not now prepared to cope with all of the law-enforcement problems that confront our society.

"Policemen themselves are not at fault. We are. We have not given our local police departments the support they need," Arrington said.

Pueblo Captain's Choice:
Between Wrong and Wrong



Commander Lloyd M. Bucher of the intelligence ship Pueblo testified January 23 that he agreed to sign a spying confession after his North Korean captors threatened to shoot his crewmen one by one.

The North Koreans captured the intelligence ship

he was commanding in waters off North Korea a year ago. Bucher surrendered when it seemed that the Pueblo had no chance of escape.

The commander and his eighty-two-man crew were recently released by the North Koreans. Bucher is now under questioning by a Naval Court of inquiry. He was warned on January 22 that the investigation may turn into a courtmartial.

Bucher testified that the North Koreans beat and tortured his crew and himself and had threatened to shoot him. It was only when they threatened to shoot his men that he agreed to sign the confession.

### NY to DC in Two Hours

New York and Washington were linked Wednesday by 110-m.p.h. rail service designed to woo the public away from congested highways and airways.

The sleek Metroliner trains cut one hour from the normal four-hour running time between the two cities.

Transportation Secretary Alan S. Boyd said if the high-speed concept is a success, it could restore railroads to their former leading position in the passenger business.

The service is a market test sponsored by the government and the railroad to see whether the public will ride trains if the service is equal to other forms of transportation.

Similar tests are planned for Chicago.



## Nigerian Cease—Fire Pushed by Kennedy

Senator Edward Kennedy (D.—Nlass.) called for the U.S. to cease being a spectator and begin pushing for a cease-fire in the Nigerian Civil War. Fifty other Senators and ninety House members urged that more food must be sent for starving Biafrans. Kennedy said that US involvement in the war should go beyond merely providing food, although he said that the food is necessary.

The US should try to negotiate a cease-fire, using every possible diplomatic tool. The cease-fire which Kennedy recommends would be monitored by observers from countries which have no direct interest in the war.

## Chinese Red Guards Lose Favor with Mao

In the past three months, the Chinese Red Guards have been deprived of their favored position as unquestioned leaders of the "Cultural Revolution" in China.

Since August, 1966, all Chinese schools have been closed. Youth were paid and fully supported by the government to remove any government officeholder or private citizen who seemed to the youth contrary to the ideals of Communist China. The Red Guards began serious fighting among themselves starting in the summer of 1967. They began to cause chaos in the urban centers, and to be a threat to the Red Army.

The Red Guards have recently been replaced by older teams of workers, soldiers, and peasants. These teams are responsible for returning to power some of the officials who were deposed by the youth, and have the task of re-educating the youth themselves.

The Red Guards are surprised and offended at their sudden loss of power. Even more offensive, however, are two of Mao's recent demands of youth. First, they should move into rural areas to develop the land, and leave the city. Second, they should receive no more education, but should become farmers instead.

### Man Creates Enzyme, Key to Life

An enzyme, one of the chemical structures necessary to every aspect of life, has been created by scientists, it was announced Thursday, January 16 Both Rockefeller University Laboratories and Merck Sharp, and Dohme Laboratories created the enzyment about the same time.

The man-made enzyme is *ribonuclease*, which is only one of about one thousand similar chemical structures which are necessary to bodily functions. This particular enzyme is one without which the body cannot digest food.

Dr. Denkenwalter of Rockefeller University, one of the scientists who worked on the project, said that this discovery is a major breakthrough in the struggle to create life in the laboratory, but that many more will be necessary.

The healthmobile is to be used as an extension of health care for the community.

Parents worked out ways in which they might teach reading at home. It was decided that word cards, language records, and books could be used by parents and older brothers and sisters to teach younger children.

The major imperative is that all children in 5th City be able to read before they go to the first grade.

### Guest of Honor Pickets His Own Dinner

When seminarians picketed the Church Federation of Greater Chicago's dinner honoring Dr. Edgar H.S. Chandler on January 30, the guest of honor joined them.

Dr. Chandler, former executive director of the Federation, said that members of the Seminarians Organized for Racial Justice asked him to join their demonstration. They picketed the dinner in an effort to get



picketed the dinner in an effort to get DR. CHANDLER all of the Federation churches to participate in Project Equality, a job-training and employment service program.

"Their complaint was against the whole church in its approach to racial justice," said Dr. Chandler, "and not directly against the Church Federation, so I joined them."

Contract Buyers — Strength In Unity

The Contract Buyers League contends that real estate firms sold homes to Black people at inflated prices during a wave of panic selling by Whites in 1959 and 1960. They also claim that agents discouraged buyers from seeking conventional mortgages at lower interest rates.

The CBL members are witholding payments on their homes while the League pushes a federal court suit in hope of getting their home contracts renegotiated. Members have witheld \$136,000. in home payments to date. None of the threats of eviction or loss of salary which are being levelled at them have been carried out yet, however.

## Young Senators Challenge Old Law

A modification is now being proposed in the Senate that would require only a three-fifths vote to cut off debate on a bill under discussion. At present, a two-thirds is needed. This move is being spearheaded by the increasing number of young Senators.

It is very difficult in the Senate to get a two-thirds majority. As a result, this rule, known as Senate Rule 22 or the "anti-filibuster rule," allows minorities in the Senate to exercise a great deal of power when they so desire. For many years, a conservative minority composed primarily of Southern Senators has been able to use this rule to its advantage.

Proposals to change Rule 22 have come up often in the Senate, but they all have been defeated. Although this proposal is also most likely to be defeated, it should do better than any of those which have come before.

The younger Senators offer the possibility of a new sort of power bloc in the Senate in the future.

## US and Communists Disagree In Paris

American and Vietnamese negotiators say they are making little progress in peace talks in Paris on the Vietnam War.

US Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge called at the session for a withdrawal of both American and Communist troops from South Vietnam and suggested restoration of the demilitarized zone as the opening step toward peace.

"The other side did not agree with our proposals," Lodge said. "It's too bad."

Tran Buu Kiem, the chief Viet Cong negotiator, called for political change in the government of South Vietnam, making the regime more representative of all of the people of the country. He said that this was the first step toward successful peace negotiations.

Xuan Thuy, the chief North Vietnamese negotiator, said that little was accomplished because of the American position. He felt that his delegation spent all of its time rejecting American proposals.

## INDIA-Winning The Battle Against Hunger?

For the first time, India no longer seems forever doomed to live on the edge of hunger. Within four years, despite its approximately 540 million population, which is increasing at the rate of 13 million a year, India expects to achieve self-sufficiency in food production.

This ''green revolution'' is the result of a combination of ambitious new ideas: widely-used new high-yield strains of rice and wheat, chemical fertilizers, and advanced irrigation techniques.

Despite the obvious progress, government officials are guarded in their enthusiasm, lest it slow the momentum of the new agricultural programs as well as the government's massive educational and medical efforts to reduce the birth rate.

## Czechslovak Youth Gives Life As Protest

A Czechoslovakian youth, twenty-one year old Jan Palach, burned himself alive in Wenceslaus Square in Prague two weeks ago. In his overcoat was a note with two demands: first, that the government put an end to all censorship, and second, that the government prohibit the Soviet newspaper.

Since Czechoslovakia was invaded by the Russians in August, resentment has run from sabotage to debate to demonstrations. Palach's self-burning has released a new note of desperation. Massive crowds marched to his funeral. It is not clear whether his demands will be met but his act has had great impact on the Czech people.

## TANZANIA—Culture As a Tool for Freedom

The Tanzanian government of Julius Nyerere has been staging a cultural revolution of its own. Like other African nations, Tanzania is struggling to develop its own style of nationhood. The structures and cultural styles which the Western nations imposed upon Africa are not easy for the Africans to shake loose.

Miniskirts, as a symbol of Western culture, have been rejected by the government, as have been large cars, and excessive income by government employees.

The Tanzanian Youth League, called the "Green Guards" because of the color of their uniforms, have met with some resistance in trying to carry out these cultural changes,


Nevertheless, the Youth League is determined to press on, and so is President Nyerere. They called for a ban, as of January 1, 1969, on everything symbolizing "the cultural enslavement of the African." Besides miniskirts, the ban includes wigs, tight pants for men or women, and chemicals used to bleach skins and "dehumanize the African people." Hair-straightening devices, and all cosmetics have already been condemned.

## CTA Will Change 54 Bus Routes

The Chicago Transit Authority plans to change the routing of fifty-four bus lines out of a total of 128 in Chicago. The basic purpose is to feed passengers more directly to rapid transit trains, particularly the new lines being prepared in the median strips of the Dan Ryan and the Kennedy expressways.

The Transit Authority plans to increase use of rapid transit trains by rerouting the bus lines. Buses will be used only as feeders to and from areas which are distant from rapid transit stations. Thus, most of the rerouting is to eliminate bus lines which parallel rapid transit routes, and overly long bus routes. At the same time, fourteen new rapid transit stations are being added to the system. Nine will be added on the Dan Ryan and five will be added on the Kennedy.

George L. DeMent, CTA board chairman, said that schedules on both buses and trains will be shortened, so that waiting will be reduced. Under the new system also, travel time should be reduced by as much as fifty per cent.

#### Illinois Financial Crisis

Governor Richard B. Ogilvie told a joint session of the legislature on February 4 that Illinois is "on the brink of bankruptcy". He proposed a five-point plan to meet what he considers a major financial crisis in the state. He also recommended the development of new taxes to help balance the state's economy.

Ogilvie's immediate five-point plan is a short-range one, aimed at balancing the budget before the end of the present fiscal year in June. It includes the following:


- The state should cut expenditures by ten per cent in all of its departments and agencies;
- 2. All capital spending should be frozen, except for emergency projects necessary for the public health or safety;
- Extra government workers who were hired out of political patronage should be fired;
- 4. All new purchases by the state government should be delayed; and
- 5. Strict controls should be imposed upon spending at all levels of state government.



### Anti-ballistic Missiles In Question

The Nixon Administration is questioning the proposed construction of the Sentinel anti-ballistic missile system. President Nixon and Defense Secretary Melvin Laird are also uncertain whether or not the funding for the system will be blocked in the Senate.

Talks are being planned between the US and Russia for this spring on arms control. The intent of the meetings is to push toward smaller scale defense systems by both nations against each other. Those who favor halting the anti-ballistic missile system do



so in part because they say that the US would then move ahead faster in these upcoming negotiations.

The Sentinel system consists of radar, computers, and rockets designed to track and shoot down all incoming rockets. Its cost is estimated at about \$40 billion. Senators Edward Kennedy (D-Mass.) and Charles Percy (R-III.) were among those who are leading the Senate struggle to cut off funds for the Sentinel program. They contend that the system would not be effective, and would cost billions of dollars needed elsewhere. They also said it would cause Russia to build similar and larger anti-ballistic missile systems, and would block the upcoming arms talks with the Russians.

Those who favor the Sentinel system claim that the national security demands it against both Russia and China. They also argue that the arms talks would move ahead faster and more favorably if Russia saw that such a system was in the hands of the US.



KOMSOMOL CELEBRATION IN MOSCOW


### USSR's Komsomol Youth Celebrate 50th Anniversary

Komsomol, or the Russian Youth League, marched thousands strong through Moscow last week, carrying their red banners to celebrate their fiftieth anniversary. The Komsomol is the Russian youth group for ages fourteen through twenty-eight.

The Komsomol, boasts a proud heritage. In 1918, when Russia's civil war was at its height, the newly-begun youth movement gave the Bolshevik cause some of its most dedicated fighters.

The Komsomol has mushroomed from the 22,000 it had in 1918 to its present size of 23 million. Since 1950, almost two million of these Russian youth have given up summer vacations and sometimes whole school years to work on development projects in Siberia and in the Soviet Far East. They helped to build a major hydroelectric station, and are now participating in constructing an automobile plant. Millions participate in the giant task of the annual

### US and Israeli Spies

Iraq hung eleven men last week who were accused of being Israeli and American spies, and then put their bodies on public display in Baghdad. Although Israel was infuriated, she has not made any move against Iraq. Israel has not moved because she fears that the 2,500 Jews living in Iraq would be endangered if she were to attack the Iraqis. Also, such an attack would increase the possibility of the US and Russia stepping in to settle the whole crisis. Israel wants to settle directly with the Arab nations herself.

For the other Arab nations, Iraq's hanging of the spies was a severe blow to their world image. The brutality of the murders is not the style that the Arab nations wish to convey to the world in their struggle against Israel. Arab radio stations and newspapers kept grim silence about the executions.

Washington, died Saturday, February 15, after having pneumonia for over two months. The Millers have had no heat in their apartment since they moved in, in July, 1968.

Other tenants in the six-unit apartment building said that there has been no heat in the building all winter. They said they knew that the Miller child was ill, but could see no way to help.

Mrs. Miller said she had complained by herself repeatedly to the building owner to turn on the heat. Her single requests were ignored, however.

## University Operation Threatened by Protests

Nine hundred National Guardsmen and five hundred local police were called out to maintain order at the University of Wisconsin on Wednesday, February 12. By Sunday, February 16, Chancellor H. Edwin Young agreed to five of the sixteen demands made by the students. These included the admission of an increased number of non-white students, and the demand for increased black studies.

Young noted that it is the responsibility of the state to keep the University of Wisconsin operating peacefully.



Meanwhile, San Francisco State College was bombed on February 16, and a number of windows were blown out. This is the most recent event in the clash between the students and the college administration and law enforcement agencies. The conflict was touched off by the suspension in early November of instructor George Murray.

S. I. Hayakawa, acting president of San Francisco State, has pledged to keep the college open and to maintain its services at whatever cost is necessary.

### Department of Youth Being Considered

Special staff in the Nixon Administration are considering the possibility of putting volunteer service organizations such as the Peace Corps, the Teachers' Corps, and VISTA under a single administration. To go with that move, it is suggested that a Department of Youth be developed, which would coordinate all of the volunteer groups and other federal programs which deal with young people.

### Pakistanis Reject Economic Emphasis of President Khan

President Ayub Khan of Pakistan has faced violent opposition to his emphasis on economic reform in the last three months. He has recently suggested a meeting with the ten more conservative opposition parties in Pakistan to change the constitution. Eight of the parties have accepted the invitation.




Opposition to President Khan is focussed in four cultural and political areas: first, the poor education and health structures; second, the Constitution's focussing of power upon President Khan; third, the government's refusal to allow the urban masses and professional classes to participate in the government; and finally, Ayub's own failure to win the support of East Pakistan. East Pakistan has been left almost totally in the hands of its governor, Abdul Monem Khan, an ally of the President.

### Nixon Will Visit Europe Prior to USSR Talks

President Nixon will begin an eight-day tour of Western European capitals on February 23. His trip is planned as a series of working sessions with the Western European leaders to prepare for up coming talks between the US and the Soviet Union in regard to arms control.

Nixon will begin in Brussells, the headquarters of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, and then proceed to London, Bonn, Berlin, Rome, Paris, and the Vatican.

The Kennedy and Johnson administrations dealt directly with the Soviet Union without much direct regard for the intervention of the European powers. Nixon, however, has said that he sees his administration using a different approach. He will emphasize taking the recommendations and needs of the countries off Western Europe as the context for the relationship of the US to the Soviets.



### Ghana Police Arrest Russian Fishermen

The crews of two Russian trawlers are being removed from their ships in waters off Takoradi, Ghana, in this picture. The fifty-two Russian crewmen were arrested for questioning, suspected of carrying guns to guerillas in the area. Ghana also charged them with violating her territorial limit in the waters off the coast of Ghana.

### City Elections Hint At Democratic Shift

A special aldermanic election held March 11 in six Chicago wards resulted in four easy elections of the regular Democratic candidates, and two upsets. In the second ward, Independent Democrat Fred D. Hubbard won over the regular organization candidate, Lawrence C. Woods. One noticeable aspect of his victory was mass support for Hubbard by the voters in lower income public housing facilities, who had formerly been vigorous supporters of Woods.

In the 44th ward, a runoff set for April 8 was forced by William Singer, another Independent Democrat. Finally, Independent Democrat John J. Stevens came within 743 votes of forcing a runoff in the 42nd ward, on a platform advocating Black power and racial cooperation.

Mayor Daley observed that he considered the election a great victory. Hubbard noted that the election was a sign that the party is beginning to feel the effects of Black power participation.

### Daley Test Case Won by Gregory

The Supreme Court ruled on March 10 that the Chicago police were in error when they charged Dick Gregory and thirty-nine other people with disorderly conduct during a protest march in front of Mayor Daley's house on the evening of August 2, 1965. The judges said that the march from downtown to the Mayor's house had been an exercise of the group's right of free expression, until a crowd gathered and began throwing rocks and eggs. The demonstrators were arrested when they refused to disperse as ordered by the police.



## Pres. Nixon Approves Disputed Missile System

President Nixon approved the development of an anti-ballistic missile system last week, designed to protect American defensive missile sites. He noted that the system is not designed to protect city populations, because such a system would be more likely to draw attacks upon the cities.

When fully in operation, the system would consist of twelve sites in the United States, able to send off both long- and short- range Spartan missiles, and equipped with extensive radar.



The decision still must come before Congress, where it is not fully supported. Some senators see the system as mechanically outdated. Others stress that such a large defense expenditure is not what the national budget needs. Still others question the effect of such a move upon other nations, who may decide to increase their weapons as well.

### Ray Convicted, But Questions Still Remain


James Earl Ray pleaded guilty on March 10 to the murder of Martin Luther King, rather than risk a death penalty. He was convicted after an hour and fifty-five minutes of deliberation by the jury, and sentenced to ninety-nine years in prison.

Following his conviction, Ray stated that he disagreed with the theories that he committed the murder alone, without participating in a conspiracy.

Judge W. Preston Battle, in whose court Ray pleaded guilty, said that he feels that there are still many unanswered questions about the case which must be solved before he will consider the case closed.

### **USSR** and China Continue Border Clashes



The disagreement and distrust which bitterly divide China and the Soviet Union have exploded twice, on March 2, and on March 15, along the border between northern China and eastern Russia. Both eruptions reportedly resulted in as many as fifty casualties, with many wounded as well.

The area along the Ussuri River, where the clashes took place, has been in dispute for a long while. Both the Soviets and the Chinese claim the same territory along the river.

A "reasoning" session was set up by the Soviet Union on March 12, but it was not successful in cutting back the mutual hostilities.

## Latin America: Birth Rate Slows Social Progress

"Too many people too fast" is seemingly one key to the problems of Latin America. The Agency for International Development reported to Congress recently that the goals of that group cannot be reached until the people of the Latin American nations begin to control population growth.

In a report to a House committee, the Agency said that there had been great progress toward ecomomic, political, and cultural objectives of the Alliance since its start in 1961. But such gains had been largely "cancelled out" in terms of individual lives, because of the staggering birth rate.

## Pakistani Opposition to Ayub Khan Continues

About two million public utilities workers and a large number of factory employees went on strike in West Pakistan on March 17, demanding better working conditions and a pay increase. The strikes were called by the West Pakistan Federation of Trade Unions in continuing opposition to the regime of President Mohammed Ayub Khan.


Electrical power workers of the government water and power development authority announced that they would switch off power for two hours in the major cities, including the capitol, Rawalpindi.

### Library Moves Back to the City

The Chicago Library Board began consideration on Monday, March 24, of a survey report that suggests major shifts in the public library system in Chicago.

The report suggests that the city's present 62 library branches should be changed to a system of ten major regional libraries throughout the Chicago area, and one hundred small neighborhood branches, some of them in storefronts.

The report noted that the Chicago Public Library has put its major emphasis in the past into the suburbs, and that it now sees the necessity of concentrating its services in the inner city.

The Library Board is also considering the possibility of rebuilding the Main Library, now at the southwest corner of Randolph and Michigan.

## **ADC Mothers Wanting**Work Outnumber Jobs

A plan to find jobs for welfare mothers has produced more than twice as many applicants as jobs.

County Commissioner Harry H. Semrow, who initiated the program last February 19, said that 1,648 women drawing Aid to Dependent Children checks had filed applications for jobs. But only 600 jobs have been provided or pledged by Chicago area businessmen who were asked to participate in the program. He said that the National Alliance of Businessmen had promised to make up the number of jobs needed for the program.

# African Warning Rejected

The Republic of Kenya's Minister for Economic Planning and Development, Tom Mboya, was shouted down last week by Harlem residents who angrily objected to his statements that black Americans should not move to Africa. Eggs were thrown and the police were summoned during the uproar at a talk sponsored by the Harlem Morningside Committee.

The outbursts by the audience began when Mboya said, "I was once asked whether I support the movements of Afro-Americans from the United States to Africa. My answer was, no. I do not believe that we should run away from the struggle."

### Percy Notes Breakdown In Housing Plan

Senator Charles H. Percy has obtained figures on the operation of the 1968 Housing Act which indicate that it has distorted its goals during its first year of operation. He noted that less than nine per cent of the new homes made possible by the government housing subsidies will be situated in the inner city. More than fifty per cent will be located in upper-income suburban areas.



## Communist Disunity Threatens World Meet

The international Communist meeting now scheduled in Moscow for this May is meeting with great complications because of the ever-increasing disagreement among the Communist nations. Events of this month have shown that Moscow has seemingly lost hold of her onetime complete authority over world Communism. The month began with the battles between China and the Soviet Union on the Ussuri River, which divides the two nations. Russia was infuriated with the fact that the other Eastern European Communist nations did not thoroughly support her violent hatred for the Chinese.

More recently, a Communist congress in Belgrade, which Russia boycotted, was warmly supported by many Communist nations both from Eastern Europe and around the world.

The Communist monolith, as under Russia of Stalin's era, is no longer a possibility. The upcoming Communist meeting in Moscow will point to a new direction in world Communist relations.

## West Moving in on Biafran War

As the war between Biafra and the federal troe of Nigeria stretches on over more than 20 mont the large nations of the West are becomincreasingly involved. The British and the Russi are in hot competition for Nigeria's arms sales. United States supports Nigeria, but will not sell at to either side of the conflict. The French support Biafrans' right for self-determination, and have be sponsoring a small airlift of food and supplies.

Just as the positions of the federal Nigerians at the Biafrans are increasingly unwavering, so are stances of the Western powers in their involvement the war. The Biafrans are quoted as foreseeing at that could drag on for five years. They say that the are prepared to hold out that long, but their milit strength would not seem to support that belief. Biafrans' stength, such as it is, is simply their stay power.

## Student Property Damage Made Criminal

The Illinois State House of Representatives' Judiciary Committee approved bills last week which would designate damage done to college buildings supported by state or federal funds as a special category of crime. The measures were aimed at student or nonstudent demonstrators taking over buildings, a tactic used by demonstrating students across the country in a number of recent instances.

The penalty for damage to the college buildings would be up to one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine for damage under \$500. For greater damage the penalty would run up to \$5,000 and five years in jail.



## Daley Celebrates Record in Office

On April 24, Mayor Daley celebrated his 5,117th day in the office of Mayor of Chicago. Fourteen years and three days is the record for length of term in office of any Chicago mayor. The former record-holder was Edward J. Kelly.



## Nixon Shifts Programs Out of OEO

President Nixon announced to Congress last month that the Headstart Program for pre-elementary education will be shifted out of the Office of Economic Opportunity, and into the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare as a separate office in itself. Headstart will be the new Office of Child Development.

At the same time, Nixon announced plans to cut the Job Corps program by one-third. This will force the closure of at least 57 of the 82 rural and 24 urban training centers for youth around the country. The Job Corps will be moved out of OEO into the Labor Department.

These shifts will leave only the Community Action Program, now under review in congressional committee, remaining in the Office of Economic Opportunity.

## \$ 9 Million to Clean Up Cities

President Nixon has appropriated \$9 million to clean up the damage of the past few years' inner city uprisings. The funds are designated to a number of cities in the United States in which violence has taken place in the past few years. Chicago is included in the funding.

At the same time, Nixon demanded that Congress speed up its present work on legislation to appropriate major funding for total urban complexes.

### US and Peru Tension Growing

Washington will soon be forced to end all aid to Peru as well as buying sugar at special prices. The political consequences of such an action are cloudy, but the economic effects are clear. Peru would lose at least \$50 million a year in United States trade and aid. Our diplomats in Peru fear that the embassy may be the scene of massive violent protest.


The conflict between Peru and the United States revolves around a Standard Oil of New Jersey subsidiary, the International Petroleum Company, which has been pumping oil out of Peruvian soil since 1924. Last October, only six days after they had overthrown President Fernando Belaunde, Peru's new military masters seized the oil property. American law rules that the U.S. shall give no aid or special prices to nations which seize American property and do not make compensation.

## First Chinese Congress Held in 11 Years

For the first time since I958, Mao Tse-Tung opened a national political convention this month. After more than two years of chaos in China in the name of the Cultural Revolution, Mao needs both to calm the turmoil of the past years and also to rebuild the Party.



### Dubcek Removed – Replaced by Soviet Supporter

Last week Czech President Svoboda announced that Alexander Dubcek, the Party First Secretary, and symbolic leader of the country, was removed from his office under the pressure of the Russians. The Soviet Union first took over Czechoslovakia last August in a crackdown on the liberal policies which Dubcek's government promoted.


The new First Party Secretary is Gustav Husak, one of those Czechs who see the necessity of cooperation with the Russian overlords. Husak's appointment, as well as major shifts in the governing structure, are Russia's response to anti-Russian riots by the Czechs on March 28 in Prague, in which much damage was done to Russian property.

The fact that the congress was held is strong evidence that the Chinese are making some headway in their struggle to keep order amid diverse rivalling groups. The Congress will finalize a new party constitution and recognize Lin Piao as Mao's chosen successor.

## x-ray Services in the Health Center

Chest x-rays and tuberculosis skin tests are available daily at the 5th City Health Center, 3352 W. Jackson Boulevard. These services are free to everyone. Since beginning this service on May 12, 1969, over 350 x-rays and 40 TB skin tests have been given.

Mrs. Josie Cotton, Health Guild Board Chairman, is chief technician.

Every person is encouraged to come in for this examination. We live in an area in which the TB rate is very high.

The grand opening of the x-ray service was celebrated on Tuesday, May 20, 1969, with many officials from the TB Institute and the Municipal TB Sanitarium present. Guests included Dr. M. Lichtenstein, Medical Director of Municipal TB Sanitarium, and Mr. John Egdorff, Executive Director of TB Institute.

### 5th City Moves on Bus

Barn Explosion

On Monday, May 5, there was an explosion at the CTA bus barn in Stake 4, when a bus backed into another bus which was refueling at a tank of propane gas. The blast blew out windows in many businesses and homes in Stakes 3, 4, and 5. Several people were injured by flying glass and debris.

5th City Jets have swept the streets and picked up the broken glass in many areas where the broken window glass was a hazard for passers-by.

At the Guild meeting on Tuesday, May 6, 5th Citizens laid out plans for what the community needs to do to repair damages done by the blast and to settle the claims due on those damages.

Those who need assistance in settling damage claims should drop by the Legal Aid Clinic, held at the 5th City Node on Monday evenings between 6 pm and 8 pm.

A petition is being prepared by the Political Guild to request that CTA fuel tanks be kept underground at the Bus Barn. This would radically reduce the possibility of even more serious explosions and fires threatening 5th Citizens in all of the Stakes.

## Toothless Housing Bill In Senate

The State Senate in Springfield is now considering a bill for fair housing presented by Senator W. Russell Arrington (R-Evanston). Democratic senators referred to the proposal as "toothless". It can only be enforced if the party who is wronged files a lawsuit. The senators observed that such a procedure is both lengthy and rather expensive. There are also few Republicans who support the bill. Senator Frank Ozinga (R-Evergreen Park) noted, however, that the bill is the "best yet" of all of such proposed legislation to reach his committee. Ozinga was especially critical of the absence in this bill of adequate enforcement structures.

### First Teachers' Strike Held

In Chicago

Just as in other cities all across the country, Chicago teachers went out on strike on Thursday, May 22. This is the first teachers' strike in Chicago's history. Mayor Daley failed on Wednesday night to bridge the differences between the Board of Education, represented by Superintendant of Schools James Redmond, and the Chicago Teachers' Union, whose president is John E. Desmond. Teachers were out at elementary, junior high, and high school levels throughout the city.

The vast majority of teachers agree that something must be done immediately to improve educational facilities and standards throughout the city for the sake of all of its students. In some instances, however, Black teachers did not strike at this time because they did not think that the time is strategically right. Others refused to strike in protest against the Chicago Teachers' Union itself. They claim that the union is not fully representative of its membership.

Schools were closed to students on Thursday and Friday by Redmond because of the strike, but teachers were asked to report.

## Cornell Students Win Demands

On Saturday, April 26, 120 Black students took over Straight Hall, the student union at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. They were protesting the decision of a student-faculty committee to punish three out of seven Black students who held a demonstration in the same building in December. They pointed out that the decision violated university by-laws. A major issue underlying both demonstrations is Cornell's refusal to make their program of Afro-American Studies into a separate college run entirely by Blacks.

White fraternity men tried ineffectively to take over the hall, and the Black students armed them selves for defense.

By Sunday, the Faculty Senate and President Perkins gave in to the demonstrators' demands to release both themselves and the three December demonstrators from punishment.



### **Deadly Campus Battle**

At Berkeley

The first student was killed in a US university uprising this year, and another blinded in a clash between faculty and students at the University of California in Berkeley, and police last week. The students and faculty were led by Student Body President Don Siegal in attempting to take over a lot cleared by the university a year ago.

The area had been converted into a park by students and local residents, with the financial aid of local businessmen. The university plowed the area over last week and began putting up an eight foot fence around it. Students and faculty then marched to the park and clashed with County Sheriff's deputies. The police carried twelve gauge shotguns with birdshot against the students, who threw bricks and debris.

A second eruption took place at the university later last week, and National Guard troops now occupy the area.

Governor Reagan noted, in regard to the use of shotguns by the police, that he would not send police into such disturbances without adequate arms. Chancellor Heynes commented, "That's a hard way to make a point, but that's the way it has to be."



In analyzing his decision, President Perkins said that he agreed to the demonstrators' demands, in spite of their violent format, because he thought that the university could not be "a police state" in which civil law enforcement is called in to settle internal disturbances.

## Chinese and Malays Battle In Kuala Lumpur

Last week, rioting between Chinese and Malays in Kuala Lumpur, capitol city of Malaysia, destroyed a major section of the city. About six hundred people were killed, most of them Chinese. The fighting erupted over the gains made by Chinese parties in the parliamentary elections in early May. This cut into the strength of the established Alliance Coalition, a party which combined Malaysia's three major groupings, Chinese, Malays, and Indians and Pakistanis. While the Chinese and Indian groups are represented in the coalition, they have long expected that the Malays would eventually push them out as present laws favoring Malays in education and employment bore fruit.

The Chinese control a major portion of the country's business. They needed the political strength of this election to maintain their economic power in the nation. When the Malay's saw the gains made by Chinese in the elections, they began burning, killing, and looting in Chinese sections of the city. The Chinese retaliated by invading Malay villages and burning them down.

Malaysia is located between India and Vietnam, in Southeast Asia.

### "Moon Men" Go Up



The Apollo 10 space capsule went into a perfect circular orbit around the Moon on Wednesday, May 21. On Thursday, Astronauts Stafford and Cernan flew the "lunar module", a small craft for close-range examination of the Moon's surface, to within 9.3 miles of the Moon.

This trip by Apollo 10 is a "dress rehearsal" for the Apollo 11 flight planned for July 20. On that trip, the lunar module will land on the Moon. The Apollo 10 tested out remarkably well. It was only eleven minutes off schedule on arrival at the Moon, and it picked up some of that time on the trip back to Earth. The Astronauts recommended that the second site chosen for the landing of the module was quite favorable for landing in July.








### Jets Trip to Iowa

## Health Center Offers TB Tests

The 5th City Health Center is now the first community health center in the country to have its own chest x-ray to service the community.

Chest x-rays can determine whether or not you have TB. Many people have TB without even knowing it. If TB is not noticed early, it can be a very serious health problem.

All community residents are urged to come down to the Health Center at 3350 W. Jackson any weekday between 9:00 AM and 4:00 PM for both chest x-rays and skin tests to check whether or not you have TB. There is no charge for either service.

### Red Rooster Closed

The Red Rooster store at 606 S. Independence, along with three other stores of that chain, have been ordered closed for ten days as a penalty for short-weighing meat. The stores had faced the threat of having their licenses removed altogether during hearings from January 20 to April 14.

This is the first time that Mayor Daley has ordered such a penalty. Mrs. Jane Byrne, city commissioner of consumer sales, said, "I think this is a fair penalty. This is the equivalent of closing one store day and night for forty days."

The other Red Rooster stores ordered closed for ten days are at 5225 S. State, 2433 S. State, and 6248 S. Dorchester.

### Rev. Jackson Pushes Hunger Bills

The Rev. Jesse Jackson said on June 2 that Mayor Daley should back a state legislative program to end the "Illinois hunger disaster". He recommended that public aid allowances be increased by 30 per cent, that income tax which charges the same rates for individuals and corporations be opposed, that a percentage of new income taxes be set aside for the relief of malnutrition, and that a program be established to ensure school breakfasts and lunches for all children who need it.

The Rev. Jackson had sought a meeting with Daley at 10:00 AM on June 3, but Daley said that he was too busy.

Thomas Bradley of Los Angeles was barely defeated in the race for Mayor.

### Yorty Wins-Barely

On May 28, Mayor Sam Yorty of Los Angeles won a runoff election by a very small margin over City Councilman Thomas Bradley, a black integrationist. Yorty, who never expected Bradley to gain the popularity that he did, conducted an offensive campaign, denouncing Bradley and his supporters as "black militants and left-wing extremists", communists, and "anti-police". Many had denounced Yorty's campaign as sheer name-calling.

On the other hand, Thomas Bradley campaigned mostly on accusations of Yorty's wrongdoings in his past eight years as mayor.

When the returns were finally in, it seemed that Yorty's scare-tactics were successful. His tiny winning margin was seemingly made up of liberal white areas which had earlier appeared to lean toward Bradley.

### Spend Arms Funds on Food

Barbara Ward, a noted economist and author, suggested on June 2 that the Western nations should spend the money they now invest in the arms race to fight the problem of hunger throughout the world. She noted that overcrowded inner cities and high unemployment rates are not only an American problem, but a problem in every major city in the world. She warned that the biggest threat of the 70's is that the populations of Asia, Africa, Latin America, India, and the Middle East are growing faster than their economies.

Mrs. Ward said that the money spent by the US and Russia on the arms race is wasted, because both countries have such technological skill that one can only beat the other for a short time before the other catches up. This money, she recommended, should be devoted to foreign aid. "Let's take the military-industrial complex and make it into the urban-industrial complex," she said.

### Chaos in Argentina

Last week the two rival factions of Argentina's huge General Confederation of Labor united for the first time in a year to call a nation-wide general strike on May 31. They were reacting, as have the Argentine students, to the extremely conservative policies of the present government, headed by Lieutenant General Juan Carlos Ongania. The Ongania regime took power by force in 1966, and restored order where it seemed impossible, but the price of a well-ordered nation has been severe political repression.

When the government heard of the strike plans, they declared the strike illegal and said that it would be crushed by military force. Students and workers went ahead in open warfare with the police and the army in many cities, and factories, transportation, and communications were paralyzed throughout the week. As the violence continued into the weekend, the government was faced with the alternatives of either liberalizing their policies or totally cracking down on all of the demonstrators. Either way, the nation is faced with extreme chaos, even to the possibility of a civil war.

### Black Woman Educator To Head Experimental Woodlawn School Project

Mrs. Barbara Sizemore, one of Chicago's first school administrators to emphasize black pride in inner-city schools, has been appointed director of Woodlawn Experimental Schools Project. The Board of Education voted 7 to 3 in favor of Mrs. Sizemore's appointment. Mrs. Sizemore pledged too be "responsible and accountable to the needs of the community as the community sees those needs."

Mrs. Sizemore has been an outspoken advocate of community control of black schools.

Under the Woodlawn experiment, a local school board operates Hyde Park High School and Wadsworth School. The Woodlawn Organization strongly backed Mrs. Sizemore, and has a dominant voice on the local board.

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## Anti-Pollution Bill Signed by Gov. Ogilvie

Gov. Ogilvie last Wednesday signed into law a bill giving Attorney General William J. Scott new powers to move against water and air pollution.

Under the new measures the state receives the power to seek court action closing down polluters throughout the state. In addition fines for polluters are increased from \$500 to \$5,000 and jail terms raised from 30 days to 6 months.

This now gives Illinois the toughest anti-pollution laws in the United States.



## New Style in Black Revolution

REPORT FROM BLACK AMERICA was the feature report in a recent NEWSWEEK magazine. The report covered many aspects of the Black man's struggle in America. Running throughout the different articles as a major theme was a new emphasis among the new Black leadership. An article

entitled "New Faces, New Voices, New Styles" spoke of a common awareness that any basic change will come only at the grassroots level.

"Institutions have failed because control isn't in the hands of the people who live in the communities," commented one of the new voices. The stress on local autonomy — politically, economically and culturally — reflects the stance of the 5th City model for reformulating community.

Another significant new direction which is now being clearly recognized is the concern for solidarity: "Most are unwilling to desert their brother in the ghetto — whereas before they were concerned with individual success. That's the big change, a new sense of community. The lack of it before has always plagued the Black people."

### **Headstart Expansion**

Assistant Health Education and Welfare Secretary James Farmer has announced that he wants to extend the Head Start program into the home — to work with children 3 years of age and younger, and with their parents.

With this move Farmer hopes to enable parents to begin the early education of their children.

### Peru Announces Land Reform


The government of Peru has announced the details of a sweeping land reform law. The new law limits the size of holdings, strengthens small and medium land holders and opens a way to convert into cooperatives the large land holdings that supply industrial crops. The President said the law will be applied equally to all groups.


This means that the lands of many foreign companies will be taken away. For example, a spokesman of the W. R. Grace Company announced that they will be losing lands valued at \$10,000,000.

The foreign-owned lands will be sold to cooperatives, peasant communities, agricultural societies with social interest and to persons previously judged qualified.

To be considered for a family plot, a peasant must be a citizen of Peru, eighteen years of age or older, head of a family, without land and a resident of the area.

The law represents a new Peruvian nationalism and may very well serve as a model for other Latin American countries in the future. Owning land is an important symbol of humanness in Latin America, and the reform may enable the Peruvian peasant to participate in a new way in the creating of his own destiny.





### Australia Turns Eyes Toward Asia

Last week a five-nation conference on the joint defense of Malaysia and Singapore was held in Canberra, Australia. The reason for the conference is the future pull-out of British combat troops scheduled for 1971.

This meeting is a sign of the growing orientation of Australian foreign policy toward Asia. "Seventy-five percent of our diplomatic activity is now concerned with Asian affairs," a senior Australian official concerned with foreign policy commented recently.

Much of this recent concern with Asia is in the context of efforts to maintain stability in the East, the area which Australia now sees as the greatest threat to world peace.

Australian officials see the formation in 1966 of the nine-nation Asian and Pacific Council, ASPAG, as the real beginning of Australian identification with Asia. The other members of ASPAC are New Zealand, Japan, South Korea, Nationalist China, the Phillipines, South Vietnam, Thailand and Malaysia. ASPAC is a non-military organization for the exchange of information on economic and social planning where long-range ideas about the future of Asia are developed.

## US May Sue Chicago School Board

After many years of complaints by the black community the U.S. department of justice has now charged the Chicago board of education with maintaining racial discrimination in its assignment and transfer policies for teaching staff.

U.S. Attorney Thomas A. Foran said a federal suit will be filed against the board if it does not take steps to change its "segregated patterns of faculty assignments and to equalize the distribution of certified and experienced personnel and substitute teachers by the Fall."

Whiston and Redmond from the board here have denied the charges. "We have never practiced segregation of faculty in Chicago," the statement said., "but we have permitted seniority choice of schools by our teachers."

An investigation of the board's practices was precipitated by complaints in writing received in the Attorney General's office from black parents living in Chicago. The investigation was led by Assistant U.S. Attorney Charles Todd and was begun over a year ago.

The justice department expects to continue investigation of the policies of the board in the future.

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## New Leader For Mexican—Americans

What is at stake in the strike of the grape pickers in California is the battle for the full role of the Mexican-American in U.S. society. In some respects it is a limited battle, but it is a symbolic battle for the rights of the nation's second largest deprived minority.

The driving force behind the battle is Cesar Chavez. one well acquainted with the plight of migrant workers. Chavez has given himself totally on behalf of the Mexican-Americans in their struggle for justice. Says one observer of the situation, "He focused attention on the farm worker and made the Mexican - American proud to be Mexican-American. Chavez must be given credit, I think, for really starting the Mexican-American civil rights movement."

Through the non-violent methods adapted from his model, Gandhi, Chavez has made a large part of the nation conscious of the forgotten minority in our midst.



## Black Man Elected Mayor Of Fayette, Mississippi

From across the nation many prominent political and social leaders converged on the little town of Fayette, Mississippi to join in the inauguration of Charles Evers as mayor. The importance of the event lies in its symbolic power as it speaks to the entire world. Evers, in his address, committed his administration to creating a government that will work for everybody. His recent election as mayor marks the first time that Mississippi has had a black mayor.

## African Leader Mboya Is Assassinated

Last week Kenya's Minister of Economic Planning and Development, Tom Mboya, was assassinated. He had stepped into a pharmacy to buy a bottle of lotion. As he emerged, he was shot in the chest.

Thirty-eight year old Mboya was a famous African leader who had worked hard for a "United States of Africa." He was also responsible for many of the important documents of the government of Kenya including its constitution.

Mboya was regarded as Kenya's greatest hope for the future. He was acquiring a political base of such magnitude that probably nothing short of death could have held him from being the nation's next chief executive.

Although Mboya had many political enemies on both the right and the left as well as personal enemies there are as yet no clues about who the assassin might be.



## Returning Emissaries Report

Recently a dinner was held for those who participated in the 5th City High School Emissary Program this past school year. Twelve of the emissaries were present and reported on their experience. 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### NYC Aids in 5th City This Summer

Aiding in the 5th City programs this summer are more than 200 Neighborhood Youth Corps (NYC) workers from across Chicago. These are teen-age youth who work during the summer in a variety of positions for employers throughout the City.

In 5th City the NYC are involved in the Jet program, the pre-school, the Urban Craft Shop, a community clean- up project and are serving as general assistants to the board of managers.

## Pre-School Teachers Make Presentation to Academy

On Monday evening, July 14, the 5th City Pre-schooling Institute presented a program to the Academy at the Ecumenical Institute for new parents of pre-school children. 5th City songs and rituals were sung and live demonstrations were given of what happens in the Pre-school. The highlight of the evening was the presentation of the 5th City Model by Mrs. Ruth Carter. The presentation enabled the parents to understand the role of the pre-school in the entire 5th City model.

## YCS Begins New Summer Program

The YCS is meeting this summer in the front office of the Jet Hangar from 9 to 5 Monday through Friday. The mornings are set aside for preparation work for the General Equivalency Diploma. From I2:30 to 2:30 a course on Black Heritage will be taught. Other activities include: excursion trips once a week; Wednesday evening skating parties; and dances every Friday and Saturday evenings at 8:00 PM. The program is for the young men of the community in their late teens and early twenties.

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# CHICAGO TA

State Supreme Court Approves New Tax

Friday the Illinois Supreme Court decided that the new state income tax is legal. The tax will be withheld from paychecks beginning in August. The tax will be levied at a rate of 2½ per cent for individuals and 4 per cent for corporations. Governor Ogilvies has declared that the new tax will enable the state to avert financial disaster. He feels that we will not have to increase the tax rate again for a long time.

The tax is expected to provide \$765,000,000 in its first year.

### Air Controllers Resign

With the recently projected resignation of from 4000 to 6000 Air Controllers across the country scheduled flights especially at large airports like O'Hare are likely to come under assault. Even without the resignations traffic at large air terminals has long been over crowded.

The resigning Air Controllers have complained that the long hours and hectic pace of their work is making them nervous wrecks and destroying their families.

What ever the outcome of the resignations, it appears that crises in air travel are in store for the near future.

## Little Hope for Chicago School Aid

Last Friday in a press conference Governor Ogilvie virtually ruled out the possibility that the Chicago Board of Education could get more state aid to rescue itself from a budget crisis this year.

Ogilvie said the Illinois supreme court ruling that the new state income tax is constitutional does not mean that Chicago schools could not get more money.

Asked if there was a chance that Chicago schools could get a grant from a special fall session of the General Assembly, however, Ogilvie replied, "Very unlikely."



Dr. Spock Acquitted By Court of Appeals

The First U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Boston has recently overturned the conviction of the "Boston Four" (Spock, Michael Ferber, William Sloane Coffin Jr., and Mitchell Goodman) for conspiring to counsel draft evasion. Sloane and Goodman, however, must face retrial. The decision held that the conviction of the four men was tainted by Judge Francis, J.W. Ford when he ordered the jury to answer ten leading questions about the case in addition to finding the defendants guilty or not guilty.

Spock expressed his pleasure at being acquitted but voiced his persisting concern that Americans are continuing to die. "It seems to me absolutely tragic that young Americans will continue to die in Viet Nam...and that young men have been imprisoned for doing what their consciences dictated. I think we ought to work all the harder to remove ourselves from Viet Nam."

President of the Chicago Board Frank M. Whiston has announced that the Chicago schools need \$29 million to meet commitments to the Chicago Teachers Union and to avoid cutbacks.



## Man Reaches Out To The Moon

After thousands of years of speculation and a decade of preparation the first men have walked upon the surface of the moon. Neil A. Armstrong, Edwin E. Aldin Jr. accompanied in the mother ship by Michael Collins are those men representing all mankind on the venture. The total time spent on the moon was 22 hours. 24 billion dollars has been spent in preparing for the shot, a fact which has bothered many people who feel that the priorities demand that the money be spent elsewhere.

While on the moon Armstrong collected samples of rock and dust. Several scientific experiments were done including the recording of the vibrations beneath the moon's surface, and a lasar experiment.

For better or worse, the event symbolizes a major turning point in the history of the earth. With the help of television cameras and photographs all men now have the possibility of "standing on the moon" and seeing that the entire earth has now become just another country.

It is this kind of event that makes us aware of what we already know---that it is no longer possible to live our lives isolated from the rest of humanity but that we are now global people and must live in the context of the whole world.

### Nixon Visits Roumania

President Nixon has planned a visit for this week to the Eastern European country of Roumania. It is difficult to know what the significance of the trip will be but some Nixon aides have suggested that it is part of a plan to bring the U.S. and the U.S.S.R. closer together.

There are many signs that this is true. Soviet Foreign Minister Gromyko in recent speeches seems to be openning the doors for long-delayed talks on strategic arms limitations with the U.S. This is in sharp contrast to the angry words he has recently directed towards Communist China. Also, Moscow has been holding open house for many visiting Americans: Hubert Humphrey, Arthur Goldberg, McGeorge Bundy, Asst. Secretary of State Joseph Sisco, Astronaut Frank Borman and many show-biz personalities.





## CONSPIRACY TRIAL BEGINS IN CHICAGO

Chicago is the scene of what some reporters have described as the "most important political trial in United States history." Eight defendents, including Black Panther leader Bobby Seale, are presently on trial for organizing a conspiracy to cause a riot during the 1968 Democratic Convention here in Chicago.

Many see it as a test of a provision in the 1968 Civil Rights Act which makes "intent" to incite a riot a criminal offense.

The trial promises to stretch out to months and a verdict of guilty is expected by the defense lawyers. It will be appealed and the final verdict will have a great significance as a guideline to the limits of dissent in the United States.



## AUSTIN WINS BIG IN DETROIT PRIMARY



AUSTIN AFTER PRIMARY

Richard Austin, a black county auditor from Detroit, won that city's mayoralty primary last week. He now qualifies to be elected as the third black man to be Mayor of a large American city. Mayor Stokes of Cleveland also won his primary and is expected to be re-elected.

Mr. Austin is a soft-spoken moderate who waged a strong campaign to defeat his challengers. He will have to convince Detroit's 60 per cent white majority during the next few weeks of his qualifications and skill in order to win. As he announced last week, "when elected we will be mayor of all the people, not just some of the people." He has the backing of the powerful United Auto Workers Union which could be decisive in his favor.

## RACIAL DISCRIMINATION IN UNITED STATES MILITARY?

The Michigan chapter of the NAACP is charging that Black American soldiers jailed by the army in Vietnam are the objects of "degrading and inhumane treatment."

Other reports have been circulating that suggest increasing racial friction in the military. This is a new development, since the military has been one place where blacks and whites have worked and lived together. One good sign is that black soldiers are doing serious studying and talking in the services, and will be ready and eager to do grass—roots community reformulation when they return home.

## AFRICAN WOMAN TO LEAD UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY

For the first time in history, a black woman will hold the highest position in the United Nations

— President of the General Assembly. She is Angie Brooks from Liberia, in West Africa.

Miss Brooks is the daughter of a minister and foster mother of 47 children. She worked her way through all—black Shaw University in Raleigh, North Carolina as a dishwasher and laundress and also studied in Wisconsin and London, England.

President Brooks is well known not only for her diplomatic skill but also for her stylish dress. Instead of wearing business—like suits, she prefers the matching /appa (skirts) and turbans as shown in the picture. Many expect her to be a demanding leader, ordering a halt to idle speechmaking while pushing ahead the important business of the U.N.

## HO CHI MINH DIES: LIFELONG REVOLUTIONARY

Ho Chi Minh, leader of North Viet Nam, died last week at the age of 89. He leaves behind him a legacy of a great revolutionary who fought for his people against the French, the Japanese, and the Americans during his entire life. It was just 24 years ago that he proclaimed his country indpendent of France. Every day since he has had but one vision—to unite the North and the South of Vietnam under one government, as one people.

Whatever one thinks of this goal, all must acknowledge his deep concern and his personal discipline to dedicate his life toward one goal.

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

Mr. Fair is President of the Board of Directors of the 5th City Citizens Redevelopment Corporation which will direct the plans. The commitment is a strong beginning toward future rehabilitation of buildings.

## 5TH CITY CONGRESS PLANS FOR FUTURE


Last Saturday evening the Ninth Quarterly 5th City Congress was held. The highlight of the Congress was the Iron Man address by Reverend Bridges of Milwaukee. Reverend Bridges, who is instrumental in beginning a 5th City in Milwaukee, challenged 5th City to become a symbol of community power wherein the people decide what happens in their area. The 5th City Pre-Schooling Institute sang 5th City songs.

Key recommendations passed for the fall quarter were that full services be initiated by the Outpost Health Center, that salaries be provided for four more community teachers in the Pre-Schooling Institute, that the Afam Kraf Room install more counter space and display cases, that the Jet Hangar be leased to 5th City, and that all abandoned cars be removed from the streets.

### **HEALTH CENTER NEWS:**

Blood Donors: The 5th City "Blood Assurance Plan" is in dire need of blood donors to stay in effect. The age limits have been lowered to 18 years and raised to 66 years of age.

Lead Poisoning: All children ages 8 and under should be tested for lead poisoning at least twice a year. This is vitally important as any traces of lead in a child that go untreated become very dangerous. For further information call 722–3444, Ext. 27.





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## CHARLIE STEWARD TEACHING IN AFRICA

## MORATORIUM FOR PEACE OBSERVED IN CHICAGO

On Wednesday, millions of Americans joined together to protest for peace and an end to the Viet Nam war. Many activities took place here in Chicago. Universities were closed, teach-ins were held, special services were organized in churches, and many groups were on the streets talking to others about peace.

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In general it was a peaceful, nonviolent show of public opinion. It is hoped by those who participated that the President will take notice of the great support given the moratorium, and escalate his efforts to bring about a settlement in Viet Nam.

Wednesday's observance was noticeably different from what took place in Chicago last week-end. Led by the Weatherman faction of the SDS, thousands of young radicals took to the streets to engage in open and violent confrontation with the police. Their belief is that our society is in such miserable shape that only after a process of dissolution can it be rebuilt to meet human needs and fulfill human desires.

## RACIAL TENSIONS IN CITY SCHOOLS

Chicago has experienced a rash of incidents in the high schools, especially at Austin, Kennedy, and Tilden, that have required police action. These incidents have had racial overtones and cause community concern over increased friction between white and black students.

Although many people seem to know the reasons behind such incidents, no one seems able to come up with a solution to the problem. Black and whites will always attend schools together, so means need to be found to insure that their confrontation is fruitful and not destructive.



## HAYNSWORTH APPOINTMENT GIVES NIXON TROUBLE

It becomes increasingly doubtful that the Senate will confirm President Nixon's appointment of South Carolina Judge Clement F. Haynsworth to the Supreme Court. If the Senate denies confirmation or if Nixon finally withdraws the nomination, the President will have been badly beaten in what has become a crucial battle.

The reason why so many senators oppose Haynsworth is his financial dealings while sitting on the bench. Many people feel this is a conflict of interest, especially when the question of judicial ethics is so vital.

Others, including Senator Edward Brooke of Massachusetts, oppose Haynsworth because of his poor civil rights record.

This issue brings to focus what many concerned people feel is Nixon's hesitancy to pursue the justifiable goals of the Black Revolution. His leniancy to Southern school districts when they fail to meet integration and equal education standards is an example of this. And his talk about "Black Capitalism" has died down to a whisper. We all need to closely observe the President's actions in these areas.

## POLITICAL BELIEFS LEAD TO DISMISSAL

Miss Angela Davis, a young black woman who teaches Philosophy at the University of California in Los Angeles, was dismissed by the California Board of Regents for being an avowed Communist. A black militant, Miss Davis said she would not separate her political beliefs from the classroom.

The student body is solidly behind her on the issue of the academic freedom of professors to hold whatever beliefs they wish. She is expected to make a test case of her dismissal and informed sources say that the courts will uphold her rights.

### NEW LEADERSHIP EMERGING IN CHINA

After months of rumors that suggested Mao Tse-Tung was dead or dying, the Chinese leader took part in his country's celebration of the 20th Anniversary of Communist rule. Alongside him was the heir apparent, Lin Piao, who gave the major speech to the half million Chinese gathered in the main Peking square.

There have been many recent reports that Mao has lost much of his personal power and that a form of collective leadership is beginning to develop. The Mao "cult" or worship of Mao and his Red Book seems to be de-emphasized compared to the time of the Cultural Revolution and the Red Guards.

Most leaders seem anxious to avoid any further major disruptions of Chinese society. A corporate leadership group, made up of men who would be held responsible to each other, might be the best political set-up to enable China to move ahead.

## SOVIET UNION LAUNCHES ORBITING SPACE STATION

In a space mission of fantastic significance, the Soviet Union launched three spacecraft carrying a record number of 7 cosmonauts. Soyuz 6, Soyuz 7, and Soyuz 8 are presently hurtling around the Earth with the likely possibility of connecting up to put together the first permanent orbiting space station.

If this is what in fact happens, another great step will have been taken in man's exploration of space. An orbiting space station would serve two functions, as a laboratory and a launching platform. Teams of researchers would go up to work for a period of time, living under normal conditions. Satellites would be assembled and launched there, eliminating the necessity of the giant-sized booster rockets that are now used.

### NEW GOVERNMENT IN WEST GERMANY

After 20 years of Christian Democrat rule, West Germany will soon have a change of government. Due to a parliamentary coalition, the Social Democrats led by Willy Brandt will control the political destiny of a nation that has become the most powerful economic and political force in Western Europe.

Probable positions that the new government will take include support of European unification and expansion of the Common Market by the admission of Britain. Also the promotion of a warming-up of relations with the Soviet Bloc— including East Germany. West Germany could very likely be the driving force during the 70's of the breaking down of the Cold War barriers in Europe.

During the summer, 5th City began signal rehabilitation of community housing and property. One of the most exciting fruits of 5th City's labor was the construction of the play lot a 331 S. Homan. The lot can be seen from the street and provides recreation area and equipment for the 5th City kindergarten. The adjacent building is decorated with a large 5th City symbol.

### **EDUCATIONAL EMISSARIES**

Their names are Frank Hoover, Eddie Silas, Roosevelt Gaston and Claudine Lee. Two weeks ago Frank, Eddie, Roosevelt and Claudine were students at Marshall High School. But not anymore - now they are out in three different areas of the United States - each one finding new and different ways of expanding and exploring their possibilities for continuing education.

Frank and Eddie are living in Lexington, Mass. They are staying in the home of Rev. Richard Harding while attending a special experimental high school which is connected with Harvard University. Frank and Eddie, along with two other inner city youth from New York, will work and study this year in new ways of being students in the Twentieth Century.

Roosevelt is in Pittsburg, Pa. He is staying with Rev. William Burdick while attending an inner city high school which is about 60% Negro. Many new things are coming about in Pittsburg in relationship to inner city education, and we feel fortunate to have Roosevelt there as our representative.

Claudine is in Seattle, Wash. Iiving with Mr. Carl Burg. She lives on Bainbridge Island which is located in Puget Sound. Claudine is the only inner city youth enrolled in the high school which she attends. However, she will be meeting and studying with youth from all over the world under the international student exchange program of the U.S. government.

### JETS TAKE OFF

Another opportunity for the youth of 5TH CITY will be coming up November IO. They will be traveling to the Detroit Area Friday, returning Sunday evening, November I2. The riots in the City of Detroit make it clear that the JETS program, and especially 5TH CITY leadership development are crucial at this time.



#### SEEK END OF LAKE POLLUTION

### CITY ZONING TO CHANGE

Local officials and leaders in Washington are moving quickly to secure laws which would end the dumping of huge amounts of waste materials into the Great Lakes.

It is necessary to do this immediately if the fish and plant life in the lake are to survive. Many areas of the lakes are already unsafe for people to swim in.

The people of Chicago are especially concerned as our drinking water comes from Lake Michigan and our beaches are also threatened.

STATES TO AID EACH OTHER

Governor Kerner and Governor Knowles of Wisconsin have concluded talks that made arrangements for the states assisting each other in cases of emergency. Examples of this would be the sending of equipment and men such as occured last winter during the January snowstorm. National Guardsmen could also be sent at times of civil disorder.


A full investigation and the rewriting of the city laws governing the division of the city into various areas for various activities is being done.

It is hoped that the new zoning laws will better protect the interests of business and citizens of Chicago. A key problem is the location of businesses in residential areas and how they might meet the conditions of the law without being forced to move out of the city.

#### FIRE PROTECTION JEOPARDIZED?

City Alderman, Edward Scholl has called for a full investigation of the city fire department. He is charging that men are being assigned to other activities rather than fire stations and that much of the equipment is old and in bad repair. The head of the fire department has denied this and says that the citizens of Chicago are getting excellent protection.

## UNITED NEGROES USE POLITICAL POWER

Cleveland and Gary represent metropolitan areas which have had long histories of racial tension and violence in some of the worst ghettoes in the United States. Local city administrations of the past years have largely ignored these problems.

However, the negro communities of these two cities united almost to a man to insure that this will not be so in the future. The mayoralty election of Carl Stokes in Cleveland and Richard Hatcher in Gary definitely shows the political power which negroes of the inner city possess when they choose to unite.

It is hoped that this election will point the way for negroes in other large cities of our country and that Carl Stokes and Richard Hatcher will continue to receive the support they will need to deal with the many existent urban problems.

### ANTI-BALLISTIC MISSILE SYSTEM

Defense secretary Robert McNamara has announced the decision to build around major American cities a system of missiles to stop enemy missiles before they hit. The system will cost 5 billion dollars and be finished in the 1970's. It is not a complete system but one that McNamara says would defend the U.S. against a Chinese attack, not a Russian attack.

The decision has been widely attacked as one which will lead to an increasing arms race, greater danger of atomic war and the expansion of a system that could cost the U.S. 40 billion dollars for so-called fool proof protection.

### INNER CITY INSURANCE?

The U.S. Congress is beginning an investigation of racial discrimination by auto insurance companies Representatives in Congress have shown copies of insurance company maps with certain areas marked out. In these areas no auto insurance is to be given These areas are always located in the inner city with large concentrations of negro people.

This sort of hidden economic discrimination is difficult to prove but must be discovered and eliminated if we are to have economic justice in the inner city.

### RHODESIA

In nearly two years the white government that declared its independence from England has strengthened its position and today talks less and less of equality for the vast black majority of its people.

The economic blockade that England set up to ruin the white government has failed mainly because of the support of the Portugese and South African governments. These countries are interested in protecting their own all white governments They are fearful that if the white government in Rhodesia falls they will be next. The black African Nationalists are training men to lead a revolution in Rhodesia in hopes of seizing the government for the black people.

### JAPAN GROWS

From almost complete destruction at the end Of World War II. Japan is today one of the richest and fastest growing nations of the world. She builds the biggest ships and the smallest TV in the world, and everything in between. Japan's great economic growth has led her to assume a leading role in the economic life of Asia. Her businessmen and engineers can be found throughout Asia, buying, selling and building.

There is increasing concern that Japan should also assume a political role in Asia. Her small army is only for protecting the country, but her economic power makes many people wonder if Japan should not rearm and assume a greater role in the crisis of Asia. Many people in Japan who remember the defeat of World Wa: Il oppose this course, but with Japan's growing economic power, the political influence and military development seem sure to follow.

### CHE **GUEVARA — DEAD**

Where is Che? This is the question that has been asked for the last two years in both North and South America. Che Guevara was the righthand man of Fidel Castro in Cuba until his disappearance in 1965.

Since then there have been many ideas about what happened to him. The Bolivian government showed pictures and papers which seemed to prove that Che was the leader of several hundred revolutionaries fighting the Bolivian army in the jungles of Southeast Bolivia.

And then, the Bolivian Government announced that he had been killed in a battle with the army. These reports have proven true. Che's death in the jungles of Bolivia has raised him up as a symbol to all Latin American Revolutionaries of what is demanded to bring off a revolution of the people.

### 22ND SESSION -- UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Representatives from around the world gathered in New York City for the opening of the U. N. General Assembly, The Secretary-General, U Thant, opened the session with a speech that ended the high spirits of the delegates. He spoke of the armaments race, poverty, and racial strife that threaten world peace. He also spoke of the war in Vietnam and the Arab-Israeli Crisis.

The speeches following his by the U.S. delegate Goldberg and Soviet Union delegate Andrei Gromyko said little that was new or promising for solving these problems.

The foreign ministers of the U.S., England, France and the Soviet Union have met with U Thant to talk of ways to deal with the great threats to world peace that exist today in Vietnam and the Middle



### SUPER SMOG HITS CHICAGO

A combination of dense fog and polluted air has produced the smog that has blanketed Chicago for over a week. Last Sunday the air was so polluted that O'Hare was closed for nine hours.

Although no deaths were reported, Doctors issued warnings for persons with respiratory problems, elders, and young children. It is the sulphur dioxide in the air that is dangerous, and high levels were recorded just below the critical point.

Attorney General Scott announced that air pollution has reached a "crisis" in Illinois. He might file an anti-pollution suit against the airline companies as the first step in solving the problem.

## PRODUCE BLACK GAINS


Last week's elections produced no big surprises. The most significant result was Mayor Lindsay's re-election in New York City. He beat both the Republican and Democrat candidates by uniting the Liberals, the Blacks, and the Jewish voters. Many think he is now free from party ties and open to attempt new programs that are desperately needed in the city.

Mayor Stokes was also re-elected in Cleveland, after doing what many consider a great job during his first term. Richard Austin, a black man running for mayor in Detroit, was just narrowly defeated.

In Atlanta, a black lawyer was elected as Vice-Mayor. Meanwhile, Thomas Bradley, who was defeated for mayor in Los Angelas, is thinking about running for a high level state office in California.


## END SEGREGATION NOW SAYS SUPREME COURT

It has been 15 years since the famous ruling for the integration of the schools, and yet segregation is still allowed. The Supreme Court has now issued a decision that calls for the end of all segregation within the schools "at once".

This is a refreshing sign to all those who are concerned about this problem in our nation. It also gives a good start to the new Chief Justice, Warren Burger.

The order is limited to the Southern school districts that still operate dual systems, one white and one black. There is talk however, that it will affect Northern schools too. And especially Chicago, where over 200 schools have completely black student bodies and other schools are all-white.

## TRIBALISM THREATENS KENYA SECURITY

The East African nation of Kenya has lived in relative peace and security since its independence six years ago. That situation has been changing however, since the popular young Tom Mboya was assasinated last July.

Last week the country had its worst riot in its history. The government's response, under President Jomo Kenyatta, was to arrest political opponents and turn Kenya into a one-party state.


Kenya's political stability hangs by a thin thread. Tribalism is on the rise and the practice of oath-taking has returned to haunt people of the Mau Mau fighting of a generation ago. The question whether African tribalism can express itself politically in non-violent ways is being tested today in Kenya. The popularity and strong leadership of Kenyatta might prove to be Kenya's greatest asset.

### U.S. – JAPAN RELATIONS TENSE OVER OKINAWA

Thousands of students are fighting with police in Japan in opposition to United States control of Okinawa. Millions of other Japanese are also opposed but do not join them. The political situation is becoming very tense these days in Japan.

Premier Eisaku Sato is preparing to come to Washington to talk with President Nixon. The students want to prevent that. The entire Left in Japan wants the security treaty broken. The treaty allows American bases in Japan, and United States control of Okinawa in return for our military protection of Japan.

There is a rising tide generally against the United States. Many Japanese are angry at our involvement in Vietnam. Their anger will rise if the Okinawa problem is not settled quickly.

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## 5TH CITY STAKES THANKSGIVING PARTY



### **CON-CON RESULTS**

Illinois voters have elected representatives to rewrite the state constitution. One hundred ten men and women will meet in Springfield the first week in December. The Convention is fairly evenly divided between Democrats and Republicans, with a large bloc of Independents holding the edge. Approximately 10% are Black.


After they write a constitution, it will have to be voted on by the people. Leonard Foster and Edward Rosewell are the delegates from the 5th City district.

### LAKE AIRPORT SITE FAVORED FOR CHICAGO

The city's third major airport will handle the super-jets and the 60 million people they are expected to carry each year. It will be built 8½ miles off 55th Street and will be about 5 miles in diameter.

The major obstacle is the weather conditions over the lake during the winter. Some new form of transportation will also have to be built to handle travel to and from the Loop.

The 1970's promise not only 400-passenger super-jets for Chicago, but an airport in Lake Michigan! Plans are now being made which look final for a giant "lakeport" to be built in a diked-off section of the lake bottom.





### PINKVILLE INCIDENT SHOCKS NATION

The citizens of the United States are being daily exposed to a vicious picture of the Vietnam War. The exposure of the Pinkville incident, in which American soldiers killed hundreds of civilians, is the cause of this.

The army is officially charging Lt. William Calley with the murder of IO9 civilians. Witnesses to the crime are speaking out, adding more details to the crime and general doubt about the whole subject.

Some think this is merely one of many such unpublicized instances in Vietnam. Senator Percy called for a thorough investigation, "fair to the soldiers involved, and fair to the truth, no matter how much it hurts."

### CRIME COMMISSION BLAMES POVERTY

The National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence cited the United States as the "clear leader" in violent crime among modern nations.

The Commission found that violent crime was concentrated in inner city ghettoes. Milton Eisenhower, chairman, made it clear however that "the correlation is not one of race with crime. The correlation is poverty with crime."

Some suggestions were that the national urban policy ought to be aimed at removing poverty and social isolation of minority groups in central cities, interracial police teams, and increased police — Community relations.

### INDIRA GANDHI WINS SUPPORT



The nation of India is known for its great problems of starvation and over-population and for its great leaders like Mahatma Gandhi and Nehru. Mrs. Indira Gandhi, the daughter of Nehru, is the present prime minister. When she was first elected, no one expected her to be a strong leader.

A power struggle has occurred in India which has demonstrated both her power and ability. The old-guard leaders of her party, the ruling Congress Party, tried to throw her out of the party. This split it into two warring camps. She had no choice but to seek support from the Indian people. She proved her appeal among the masses and won a clear vote of confidence in the Indian Parliament.

India's problems are not over. There are dangerous quarrels between the states and the central government, and the religious fighting between Hindus and Moslems continues. Indira Gandhi will be trying to consolidate her support and continue her work. Her main appeal is her freedom from any regional, linguistic or caste bias.

### **APOLLO 12 RETURNS—** NOT AS EXCITING

For the 21st time since Alan Shepard's daring 15-minute flight over Cape Kennedy, the United States has sent men into space and waited for their succesful return. This time the wait was the longest—a 10 day voyage to the moon and back that wrote new pages in human history.

Three men went in Apollo 12 and two of them walked on the moon. The purpose was to do a systematic and scientific survey of a specific lunar region.

They set up a package of scientific experiments called ALSEP which will transmit information back to the Earth for one year. Before a splashdown in the Pacific, the three astronauts held the first press conference from outer space.

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

### BLACK PANTHER HAMPTON KILLED

In a pre—dawn raid a week ago Thursday, Illinois Black Panther Party chairman Fred Hampton and colleague Mark Clark were shot to death in their apartment at 2337 W. Monroe. This killing has shocked the entire Chicago community.

Apparently there is a national effort to "get" the Panthers, as other raids and shoot-outs have occurred throughout the country. Many serious questions have been raised concerning the action of the Chicago police. The killings have brought increasing protests from Chicago civil rights, church, and other organizations. Some have called it "murder" and demand immediate attention. The mayor of Maywood, Hampton's hometown, suggested that the policemen be tried. The autopsy has been contested and there is a possibility that the Justice Department may look into the case.

The funeral was held Tuesday. The 5th City Presidium was postponed in commemoration and a 5th City representative was in attendance to symbolize our deep sympathy and sincere concern.

### MENTAL HEALTH CARE CENTERS

Many changes have been happening in the treatment and care of the mentally ill people in our society. These include new "miracle" drugs, group therapy, and family counselling.

One of the most exciting changes has been the setting up of "half-way" homes or care centers away from the hospital. This is where patients can go after they've been at the hospital to begin to prepare for normal life back at their homes and jobs.

Last week it was revealed that many of these care centers in Chicago are substandard, dangerous, and unlicensed. Health officials state that until proper housing facilities are made available, these patients should return to the hospitals. The problem is getting worse and a strong drive is underway to make the care centers really serve the needs of the mentally ill.



### TALK ABOUT HUNGER ACHIEVES LITTLE

An important meeting was held in Washington to discuss the problem of hunger in the United States. Politicians, businessmen, social activists, and other concerned people were there. President Nixon came and talked about a "moral imperative" to end hunger.

Many ideas on how to do this were debated. Guaranteed annual incomes, increased food stamp aid, and free food distribution were all discussed. The delegates called on the President to declare a "national hunger emergency". Nixon did not respond but many believe that hunger is such an emergency disaster that he will have to respond with massive programs soon.

Politics are always getting in the way but people are beginning to understand that starving children are more important than politics. Hunger can not cure itself — something has to be done right away!

### DDT REMOVED FROM MARKET

The "miracle" pesticide DDT has been famous for its ability to control harmful insects. It has helped increase food production and control malaria-carrying mosquitoes and cotton-infesting boll weevils.

Scientists however have long known about its harmful side effects. It is a hazard to fish, wildlife and human health, and has probable cancer-causing qualities. Last week the Department of HEW halted all but a few uses of DDT, putting an end to all crop dusting. New chemicals are being produced and will have to be continually produced to replace DDT.

### EUROPEAN POLITICS HAS NEW LOOK

Stirrings are taking place in formerly peaceful post—war Europe which could very likely have great significance for the entire globe.

The first is the efforts at reducing East-West tensions. This has been led by the Chancellor of West Germany, Willy Brandt. He has made overtures to Soviet bloc countries to begin talks. On Monday, the Soviet Union agreed to begin negotiations against the use of force as a political weapon.

Another area of importance is the Common Market. It is 12 years old now but is still far less than the glorious dream of its founders. Last week there was a summit meeting of the 6 participating nations to discuss its future. Pushed again by Chancellor Brandt, the leaders discussed Great Britain's membership application.

## ANOTHER VIETNAM EMERGING IN LAOS?

Not very many people have heard of Laos, a small country bordering Vietnam. Things are going on there however which should vitally interest everyone.

About 20,000 Chinese troops are busy building roads in the Communist-controlled area of Laos. It is thought that the Chinese are planning to step up aid to the Laotian rebels. Many American troops are also active in the small country. The CIA is secretly working there too. Most of the United States involvement is kept secret. It needs to be revealed before we become trapped like it happened in Vietnam.

## GREEK GOVERNMENT ACCUSED OF EVILS

"The Greek Question" is troubling both the nations of Europe and the United States. A group of Army colonels seized power 3I months ago because of the supposed threat of a Communist uprising. Since then they established a military dictatorship, trompling on the political and human rights of Greek citizens.

The Council of Europe, a small "United Nations" of Europe, is seriously considering banishing Greece from its ranks. This has never happened before. The Greek junta is morally unacceptable to the rest of Europe. The United States is against this action because Greece may leave NATO. Many organizations and individuals in the United States favor it however on moral principles.
