The intrence to the barn will be from Kedzie, Van Buran, Spaulding and Jackson will have scrubby and greenery.


AUTOSERVICE CENTER COMING TO FIFTH CITY

Twenty or more people heard plans for the construction of the Fifth City Automotive Service Center and coporate reports of the Fifth City Industrial Promotion Corporation at its first annual membership meeting which was held February 14, 1981 at 3324 West Fifth Ave.

The Automotive Center which has been on the drawing board for several years is the latest venture of the Industrial Promotion Corporation. The other ventures are the Business Careers, the Neighborhood En vironment Corps and the Business Revitalization.

On January 23, I graduated from Fifth City Business Careers. I had accomplished so much in such a short time. Now it seems sad that it must end.

Fifth City Business has a full curriculum. All the time, the work, the effort, that the students and faculty had pushed into their ten weeks, the endless hours of typing, working the ten key calculator, work ing in a simulated office setting called the Lester Hill Corporation. And being an account clerk for a company called Moun tain View.

The graduation at which 34 graduated was at Stouffers Restaurant in the Prudential building. There were about 70 people present at the graduation, 20 CETA counselors from around the city, 27 students and the faculty from Fifth City and about 20 members of the business community.

Fifth City Business Careers Report

To Fifth City Industrial Promotion Corporation Membership February 14, 1981

Fifth City Business Careers opened on January 21, 1980 as a Eull time clerical training program with the possibility of training 27 CETA eligible This persons every thirteen weeks. program grew out of the community's plan in 1976 to have a commercial training program in Fifth City. At first we had an evening program(The Commercial School) that was able to train approximately eight women every 13 weeks. Seeing that this was inadequate to meet the needs presented by unemployment in the area and that there was a possibility of funding through CETA, we woved to initiate a full time program. The Mayor's Office of Employment and Training and the Illinois Office of Education agreed that an experimentation such as ours in the neighborhood was timely and needed as a demostration of a new dynamic relationship between government, business, community and education. contract for \$100,000 based on the number of students attending at any one time was signed and implemented. addition CETA pays students a minimum wage for the hours" on the job". staff members trained in imaginal education and business skills were hired. Prospective students sent to us by the Urban Progress Centers were interview and enrolled. Corporations and foundations donated money, furniture and equipment to provide a business like atmosphere

Haya la studi To date Fifth City Business Careers has touched the lives of 136 students, their counslors, their families and over 100 companies, Four Sessions has graduated a total of 94 persons, with a placement average of over 50% (at a time when unemployment has increased and the job market has become tighter than this country has seen for many years) and dition to the intensive training our students receive in this program, between 9 and 12 students a session prepared for their GED examination. Approximately half of those passed the exam the first time; the others have reinitiate study and will

take the exam again as soon as the regulations permit. In the first two sessions the school drew its students exclusivly from the west side of Chicago, but as it proved itself and the community demostrated that it welcomed people from all of Chicago, there has been an increasing number from the north and south (giving) more of Chicago a chance to see first hand what Fifth City is doing). It has become apparent that the changes in our economy are presenting us with a situation where those seekin entry level positions in the clerical field need to have data processing or word processeing background. fore, the current plan is to expand our program to include training in this arena. This means we must think through many questions such as expanded space use, the acquiring of the necessary equipment, the possibility of increasing the number of students and staff, a redesigning of our time design and the creation of additional curriculum, as well as creating an effective strategy to get adequate funding.

Fifth City Automotive Service Center

From the outset, the Industrial promotion Corporation has conducted research to identify significant new business opportunities and therefore MORE OBS for the Fifth City community. After studying many businesses, the corporation determined that an automotive service center would be a useful venture in the area. The Board of Directors then began working on four proposals.

- 1. Prepare a business market feasibility report
- 2. Acquire tha land for the Center at 212 South Kedzie.
- 3. Find a source of money to build the Center
- 4. Assist a new local auto business to be tenant of the Center.

The Board of Directors reports the following

Accomplishments;

1. FCIPC has received a \$672,000 grant from the Economic Development Administration to build the Center. This money will pay for 80% of the cost.

The total cost will be \$840,000. The grant requires that the remaining money (168,000). Come from a "private source" such as bank loan.

- 2. The Board has successfully negotiated a \$168,000 twenty-five year loan with the Nationsl Boulevard Bank, with the condition of a Small Business Administration (SBA) guaranty from the Local Developement Corporation (KDC) Program.
- a local Development Corporation and is now eligible for loans and guarantys. We qualified for this program because FCIPS has more than 25 members, has proven to be a strong organization in helping the community, and is dedicated to supporting the economic development of Fifth City.
- 4.A new local business called Fifth City Automotive the tenant of the Center. The Business will have three operations: a car wash, a NAPA auto parts store, and a 10-bay service garage. The business will provide at least 26 new jobs in the first years, increasing to 40 jobs after the seconds year. Sident of this

Plans for 1981 are as follows:

- 1. Fianl approval form SBA for the \$168,000 loan guaranty.
- 2. Begin the Auto Center construction by by March 15.
- 3. Hold a festive Ground Breaking Event in the Spring.
- 4. Grand Opening of business in November.
- 5. Rent payments from the business to FCIPS will be used to pay back the loan and help other future programs of the Industrial Promotion Corporation.

FIFTH CITY NEIGHBORHOOD ENVIRONMENT GROUPS

As a result of the need for some kind of team to care for the environment in 5th City, the community designed a program called the 5th City Neighborhood Environment Corps in 1976.

In 1979, the Industrial Promotion Corporation wrote and signed a contract with the City of Chicago the Department of Human Services which resulted in the actuation of that plan. From this contract we were able to provide 11 jobs in 5th City. The purpose of the program was to reclaim space streets and vacant lots, removing snow painting rurals, and organizing community work-days.

During the year under this program, we were able to employ six CETA workers, a coordinator, bookkeeper, mechanic, and two foremen. For most of 1980 we had a corps of men who were responsible for the environment and also with some community faciliyt maintenance. The eventual goal of this City-sponsored program was that it become totally self-supporting, either through charging for its services, or through having the community organizations support it. During the past year many things have been accomplised through this program. We have acquired a tractor with brush and snower attachments so that streets can be swept and vacant lots can be mowed. In winter the tractor is being used to remove snow from the Mall, sidewalks, and alleys in Fifth City. As well as the tractor, the Industrial Promotion Corporation has aquired the use of a dump truck with which many pick-ups and deliveries have been made. for gardens, materials for construction in the Community Center and Industry Center, as well as in-kind equipment and materials for Elder's Program have been delivered with this truck and with this truck and these employees of the Neighborhood Environment Corps Program. The men have worked with the Minizone (block-improvement) Program by roto-tilling gardens, putting up fences, watering and painting grass sod, etc. The equipment from this program has been used by many in 5th City, such as hoes, rakes, shovels, roto-tiller, snow-blower. water hose, wheel barrows brooms, etc. Another accomplishment has been the story of 5th City. The neighborhood Environment Corps, artist and Volunteers by his company, to paint the mural.

Since the creation of this project, the goals have been surpassed in many wavs. For example, relative to the organization of the Business Association, instead of holding two meetings during the first quarter, we held seven, with new members joinging each week. Instead of sponsoring one project during the quarter, the Business Association sponsored three. The first was the printing and distribution of the 5th City Business Association 1981 calendar. The Second was the Christmas tree and lights on the 5th Ave. Mall. Thrid project was the Las Vagas Night fund-raising event on Dec 19. 1980. Which netted over \$800. In accordance with the planned goals of the project, we have been able to provide technical assistance to at least four business, particularly in regard to legal and financial matters. Jim and Ato have been offering their services to Business Association members in dealing with things like how to purchase a building, and how to get insurance for your business. Verdell Trice has been able to provide managerial services to Superfoods on a daily basis, and has been crucial in the transition that Superfoods is going through to become a member of Certified. Ato Colemen has been made available to Floyd's Laundry and Drycleaners as a financial and managerial consult. This project has been able to prepare for the new Automotive Service Center by preparing the market feasibility study which resulted in a favorable report for the Automotive Service Center. Jim and Carolyn have been available to provide assistance in legal and financial matters for the Industryal Promotion Corporation and the Auto Center Project.

In the future, the Business Association becoming an important dynamic in the development of 5th City. Already, there has been serious discussion about how to use the money from the fund-raising events to improve the business strip. Cooperative efforts are now being made to help each other with information-sharing, and linking business oweners with the proper legal or financial institutions to deal with particular issues. It is anticipated that the members of the Business Association will soon be ready to engage in educational seminars which will improve individual abilities as well as increase the ability of the Business Association to make sure that the Auto Center becomes a successful business in 5th City. Expertise in management, finances, and legal matters will be offered in order to insure success.

We anticipate that the success to the existing Businesses, along with be construction of the Auto Center this year, will cause other business to come to 5th City.

Most of the paints were also donated by the company. Other men in the N.E.C. Program prepared the wall for painting. Because of this program we have been able to provide men to clean the mall and streets daily, some vacant lots, as well as provide men to do some minor repair and Industry Center, as well as to train the men in community housing maintenance.

After September 30, 1981, this program will no longer receive any funds from the City to carry out these enviromental activities, and beginning April 1 1981 the environmental activities will diminish in terms of the City contract. We are very pleased to report. though, that 5th City has already begun to make this enviromental care a community-supportive activity. The Shopping Center and the Industry Center are providing one salary for a full-time person to clean the mall, the Industry Center and part of 5th Ave., as well as to do other tasks like drive the tractor and truck when needed. Beginning April 1, 1981 we will be phasing the CETA workers more and more out of the environmental program and using them to enable the the set-up of some on-going structures in 5th City that will be able to handle all the environmental care and social programs. We have been able to acquire some good, usalbe equipment from this program that we will be able to use on our own in the future, with the support of 5th City organizations and individual who volunteer their services THE FIFTH CITY BUSINESS REVITALIZATION PROJECT

In accordance with the 1976 planning consult, and also due to what we are already doing in 5th City with some of the businesses, the 5th City Industrial Promotion Corporation wrote and signed a contract with the City of Chicago, the Department of Planning to do a Business Revitalization Project from November 1, 1980 to September 30, 1981. The geographical focus of the 5th City business district. the overall purpose of this project is to strengthen businesses along 5th Ave. increase the visibility and identifiability of the business strip, as well as to encourage new businesses. These are to be accomplished through business education activities, organization of the Business Association, store-front and street improvement projects, business counseling, and financial loan packaging.

COMMUNITY NOTEBOOK

What Is A MINIZONE?

The Fifth City Minizone Project is an extension of the Fifth City Citizens Redevelopment Corp., which is the Housing Program.

The minizone is a Beautification Program. It motivates the home own er to start block clubs.

We do projects such as community gardens, planning and seeding the front and back lawns, and concreteing the side walks. The minizone coordinator provides one third of the funds, the home owners provide the rest of the funds.

We have fund raising drives and that money is spent for fencin in vacant lots, buying sod and what ever is needed.

We do mini repairs such as; coors, windows, pourches and stairways
The home owner pays for the material and the minizone coordinator pays the contractor for the work from the minizone contract. We assist the home owner in making application for the weatherzation program and the home development loan.

The community gardens is coordinated through the Department of Human Services. We receive garden plants, seeds and lawn seeds. We also get our tools from the Department of Human services.

We survey the blocks to make sure that we can account for everyone in the block, then we plan meetings by the block. We try and have a leader ship meeting with the leader of the block club. We let the people decide what kind of services they need then we help them to acquire them. We participate in workshops such as:

- 1.) Self Help Workshop
- 2.) Health Workshop
- 3.) Community Planning Workshop

Industrial Promotion Corp

The Fifth City Industrial Promotion
Corporation, formed in 1976, works cooperately with other Fifth City Corporations
to enable comprehensive social and economic redevelopment in Fifth City. Fifth
City is commonly referred to as the area
bounded on the south by the Eisenhower
Expressway, on the north by Madison, on the
west by Garfiels Park, on the east by Kedzie Avenue.

FCIPC is a not-for-profit local development corporation established for planning developing and implementing economic redevelopment programs and activities consistent with the total plans of the City of Chicago. The five member board of directors, elected annually by over 34 person membership, meets monthly.

Successful ventures of the FCIPC are:
- Fifth City Business Careers. This unique award winning secretarial and office skill training school graduates over 100 students yearly and has a job placement rate of 50%. Operating and staff costs for the program have been funded through CETA. The professional staff of four are hired by and report to the FCIPC Board of Directors.

- Neighborhood Environment Corps. This program, funded in part through CETA recource serves the community through snow removal on all public sidewalks and areas, ongoing neighborhood beautification, street cleaning, building and vacant lot maintenance, and community outdoor art projects. Staff is maintained at eight, including one professional manager.
- Neighborhoods Revitalization Program. The FCIPC staff has formed an ongoing comprehensive effort with local business community through establishment of the Business Association, promotion of the Fifth Avenue business strip, no (or when appropriate low) fee management and technical services, and major research analysis of business expansion feasibilities. This program is funded in part c from Block grants funds of the Chicago Department of Planning and maintains a full-time professional staff of three.

Located at 3324 West Fifth Avenue, the 7,000 square foot multi-purpose building was acquired and rehabbed to house: Fifth City Business Careers, Neighborhood Environment Corps, the Industrial Promotion Corporation' staff offices, and space in which new businesses can operate with minimal capital, and have access to the daily managerial assistance and resources of the staff at the Center.

The Corporation has also worked with the Business Association in successfully locating resources to establish a revolving loan fund for local businesses. Assets of the fund are currently \$ 25,000.

Full time staff of 15 as well as 27 Business Careers students year round.
