

Implementing Town Meeting '76

STEERING COMMITTEE

A. Create a Steering Committee of 6-10 people—minimum of 6, 2 co-chairmen and 4 task force leaders—see Sponsor Committee Task Brief.*

DATE & LOCATION

B. Set a tentative date and location for the Town Meeting in consideration of other major community events. (This is confirmed at first Organization Meeting of larger sponsors group.)

COMMUNITY SUPPORT

C. Invite interested members of other community groups to attend an Organization Meeting to brainstorm creative ideas of everyone on how to do the 12 Sponsor Tasks. An ICA consultant is available for this workshop to tell the Town Meeting '76 story and to demonstrate the workshop method—see *Invitation Letter* * and *Town Meeting '76 Questionnaire*.*

TASK FORCE WORK

- D. Meet as a Steering Committee often enough to coordinate the task forces. The key initiating actions are:
 - --publish a Town Meeting '76 letterhead;*
 - --print a simple brochure * with registration form attached;
 - --create a *community organization roster* * on a wall chart and establish attendance quotas by obtaining commitments from each group;
 - --obtain an official proclamation * of Town Meeting Day from the Mayor, showing date, time, place, etc.;
 - --write a news release * for the media;
 - --establish a Town Meeting '76 checking account and mail \$100 initiating commitment to ICA, along with endorsement letters and items above as completed.

PROMOTION & PARTICIPATION

E. Coordinate and schedule speaking engagements for community groups to obtain more co-sponsors to help with manpower support, attendance commitments for the Town Meeting day, and financial or inkind contributions to the project.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING


F. Schedule a leadership session to train sponsors in local leadership roles of Town Meeting '76. See Town Meeting '76 Leadership Roles.* (The ICA provides two leaders for the Town Meeting event itself and assumes responsibility for training, or providing, workshop leaders—see Leader Training Session Announcement & Registration.* The ICA staff will meet with the Steering Committee, and other workers, the night before the Town Meeting to coordinate set-up and to complete workshop leader training. ICA consultants are also available for visits in the community during the implementation process.)

Reflections (by individual paragraphs) on the Profoundity of Town Meeting '76: Decision to deal with community image and stance (relation with other communities) Decision to deal globally More TMs sentering on corporate leaders Decision of Clinton Town Meeting: (Ipwa) "It's possible to do something in this town again," -----I attended a Murphy-Blair town meeting a couple of years ago, and the major significance for me was a new awareness of Murphy Blair's history. (I worked on the myth guild.) It is difficult to remember because it was a couple years ago, and little follow-up was done. In fact, present staff do not seem to have records of that meeting, (in relation to impact of Town Meeting)....no difference immediately, but by presentations and discussion presented to various participating governmental representatives will result in better face-to-face communications between at least two of the representatives and the people they serve. TM Columbia was a starting point for future meetings, hopefully to take community problems to the city council; problem: timing. Effect—has stimulated a nucleus that will probably initiate future Town Meetings type of ongoing community involvement and participation. Better communication between ICA & Town Meeting Committee as a whole. More student participation. previous attempts to have town meetings (not ICA current format) gave bad impressions so community found out it could be effectively done. Impact: people discovering that they can communicate with each other.

Impact: aware people who did not take part were made aware that people can be heard.

I believe the T.M. brought a combination of people together who otherwise might not have ever gotten together to discuss their own community, its problems, and possible solutions. However, I think everybody who shows up for a TM is already concerned and involved in their community through one or several organizations, and I think it's an unfortunate indication of a general feeling of "apathy" in America today, that it takes such an expensive "promotion" such as TM 76 to get people to do what they can and should do on their own every day of the year.

Town Meeting '76 is an event which creates fresh consciousness in local people about the actual vacuum and fragmentation which exists in American society at the present time, but goes beyond this awareness through a format to a way for citizens to move in relation to all the issues which lie beneath the present situation in 1976.

Highlights:

- 1. Bob Runnels, new guardian, leaped to the front of the room to tell people how to do Town Meeting '76 in a town.
- 2. Social Demonstration slides at Interlude gave profound context to the Assembly.
- 3. Hector Mahady, new workshop leader, shot rabbits, brought group back to question of implementing Town Meetings.
- 4. Four new families into what we re doing.
- 5. Unarticulated concensus present to move it on TM76 project in the Region.

Accomplishments:

- 1. First meeting of the Regional cadre.
- 2. No one had any problem with the corporate living arrangement of the House.
- 3. Demonstration of methods that honor the expertise of every man.
- 4. People saw themselves going to the GSDCs.
- 5. Suddenly understood what Town Meeting is all about.
- 6. Runnels explosion image related to acceleration and actuation-getting people from other towns to town meetings.
- 7. Movement nurture = do more Town Meetings.
- 8. Dept of afternoon spin: moved people into their own lives; secular RS-1 offense delivered.
- 9. Context for action was done a) concrete sharing of implementation insights addressed with actual style of doing TM set-up and b) offered national and local plug-in possibilities and engagement.
- 10. Regional strategy was clearly articulated.
- 11. Everyone is ready to move, House included.
- 12. House broken loose across three states.
- 13. New catalytic role for Region as a whole.

Issues:

- 1. Tension between moving and bringing colleagues along to do it.
- 2. This thing is not easy—hard for people to sort out the dimensions of actually doing it.

TM 76 ASSEMBLY IMPLEMENTATION

Practical Vision

To move transrationally and with dispatch to break loose an operating weekly rhythm which engages the House across the entire geography of the Region, thereby launching the entire expansion of the GCF project to the 5000 level. This means a simultaneous doing of the Acceleration and Actuation Phases, where in the case of St. Louis Region the end of the Replication Phase occurred in the TM 76 Assembly, May 15, 1976.

This indicates 30 Town Meetings across the Region for late summer and fall which are the "showpieces" for all remaining Town Meetings. The practical vision therefore involves setting up 30 Town Meetings to which all other targeted towns are invited, and thereby broken loose to possibility of Town Meeting in their own locale.

Contradiction

There is a tendency to continue to operate from "behind" the project, which involves doing tactics focused on random, signal Town Meetings, rather than walking out "beyond" the project as a whole (the 5000 level) and vanking (or pulling) her into victory. The primary concommitant illusion is that something like a "town meeting movement" should be occurring throughout the nation's populace that might somehow have the spiritual strength to take the risk and to do the catalytic work of having 5000 Town Meetings. The primary imaginal block is the refusal to behold and to live out of the literally infinite possibility which exists in the well-spring of people (resources and motivity) which exists from every Town Meeting held in the Replication Phase. The practical manifestation of this block is the refusal to invent ways to "run for daylight" to the 5000 level through Town Meetings already held in the Replication Phase.

(Note: A "Demonstration" Town Meeting is one which showed that Town Meetings could be done in particular places. A Replication Town Meeting is one, among others, which resulted from a transrational implementation model done across a completely circuited geography. The people of the Replication Phase Town Meetings, who have experienced themselves through the transrational, catalytic presence of the House are now ready to replicate themselves in what for us is the Acceleration Phase, TM 76 Assembly: St. Louis, May 15, 1976, in which steering committee people from all four socio-political communities participated (inner city, suburbs, small city and small town), articulated the consensus to expand the project to other towns. The delimitation of the project (by walking out "beyond" her) to the 5000 level is now necessary for building tactics which can be comprehended by everyday people within the timeframes and constraints of everyday life.)

Anyway, we thought people who were at the Town Meeting might know of people in these towns, or other places, who could help in getting a Town Meeting started.

Is there anyone, perhaps an acquaintance of yours, you would recommend we might talk to....?

The key is to call all the participants of a Town Meeting in order to obtain every conceivable possibility for access to new towns,

Core sponsors of the Town Meeting, and other contributors, would be a second list of contacts to make.

CONSULTANT'S FRAMING CHART

Questions to ask your contact about his town:

Who do people check with? Who knows what's going on here? Where are the community nodes? Who really cares about this town? Who do people respect here? A prominent person from each phase? How do decisions get made here? Which groups have been successful at getting people out? Who is the town gossip? What woman is a doer? Who is the most responsive political leader? Where is the center of town? Where do people go to have good time? What restaurant serves a top notch meal? Who has traveled widely? What has happened that people are talking about? Most influential group? and person? Who sets the community's calendar? "Who runs the school board? Who is the mayor?

Who is the president of Rotary? Who would be interested in Town Meeting? What relationship are these folks to you? Major industry? Who in upper management is being groomed for top leadership? Key religious figures with authority and credibility? Where do people go to talk things over? Main flow of traffic travelled daily or weekly? Political movers in town? elected & volunteer Young Turks who make things happen? the constructively dissatisfied. Major service clubs and when they meet? Most powerful, active women's clubs? Who is your informal leadership? the movers? Who is not jaded and cynical? Which businessman does the mayor check with when he makes a decision? Which groups have been most successful in getting people out to large events?

Questions to ask your contact about his town:

Who active in statewide politics, clubs?
Board of the United Way?
Most colorful characters?
Who is your local character-millionaire?
Most significant community development event?

Who gets things done? Who would come to a meeting? Who can you get to a meeting? Who would you see? Mayor Newspaper editor League of Women Voters Business & Prof Women Chamber of Commerce Most popular clergymen Jaycee head YMCA Board A banker School Superintendent Service Clubs... Jaycees, Kiwanis

Guidelines:

Out to set up presponsor's meeting as product of questioning.

Older phases can "get away" with asking more direct questions.

Use indirect methods, nonchalant stance.

Be careful of someone setting up a failure of a meeting when he has little faith in his town or the program.

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
