



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

We experiment with the dramaturgical form of the Daily Office by trying to recover the presence of the Mystery. One key to this recovery is the sense of Holy Space, awe before a physical location; another is the sense of interior space, where the awe is experienced before every event of life. The intentionality of the Daily Office is a key to recovering the Mystery. For the intensification of all dynamics opens up the service for the Mystery. Intentionality of words and rhythm express the tension of the solitary and decisional. Every word is intensified by the relentless beat which freights the corporate TES, but seems to flow through the unhurried pacing. The Liturgist is the chosen high priest of all for the day. His preparation to play the role, his rehearsal, and his bearing express his election. He uses his voice to hold the congregation present in the Daily Office

#### ROLES OF THE LITURGISTS

- lst Takes responsibility for entire office in representing the Mystery. In charge of ell liturgists and their performance. Carries rhythm of Office.
- 2nd Leads the Congregational and community left response throughcut liturgy and responds on behalf of Congregation during offering. When no 6th, 2nd is gonger and clapper.
- 3rd Reads Old Testament (chooses brief section from Lectionary for day) Leads Community Left in response.
- 4th Reads from New Testament, (chooses brief section from Lection-) ary for the day) Leads Community Right in responses.
- 5th Gives no more than 3-5 minute witness regarding event of the Word in his Life. Presents offering and leads community Right in response.
- 6th Leads Community Left in responses and presents offering with 5th Liturgist Gong and clapper.

#### PREPARATION

- 1. Total time for Office is 20 minutes.
- 2. The 1st and 2nd Liturgists are responsible for setting up room, aitar and offices.
- 3. When gathering for Daily Office, we gather in preparation for the rehearsal of life, not "to wait for the rest of the crowd to get there."

4. After the Daily Office the offices and Bibles shall be returned to their proper place.

#### THE PROCESSIONAL

- 1. The Community and Liturgists gather in silence, engaging in solitary prayer and brooding.
- 2. At 5:30 there is the sound of one gong.
- 3. The lat Liturgist then lights the altar candle.
- 4. After the lighting of the candle the 1st Liturgist leads the community in the singing of the 1st verse of "Holy, Holy"
- 5. After the singing of the lat verse of "Holy, Holy" the Daily Office begins with the ringing of the three gongs.

#### THE OFFICE

The offering is received by the 5th and 6th Liturgists. The offering basket is not passed until the start of the dialogue between the 1st and 2nd Liturgist unless a large number of guests are present.

# THE RECESSIONAL


After the three gongs, the Community rises and sings the 2nd verse of "Holy, Holy, Holy." During the singing the 1st Liturgist extinguishes the altar candle. At the end of the song the gong is rung once. The Community then goes forth.

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#### MCCLESIOLA CONTENT

The Declesiola is the structural rehearsal of the dynamics of the Church. It is a corporate happening in which the community is called to radical consciousness—of the self in relationship to the Mystery, of the League throughout history, and of the suffering neighbor in contemporary society. It has three dimensions: the College, the Seminary and the Sociality.

The College is the Contemplative dimension where the individual is called to self-awareness in standing present to the Awe in life. Through song, liturgy, accountability, and celebration the present is affirmed as the gift that it is, and through the conversation the experience of the individual's present is pushed to transparency revealing overyman's experience.

The Seminary is the Meditative dimension where in confrontation with the Other, new images are created and meaning is revealed. Through the study of the wisdom of the past, both ancient and modern, the community develops common memory and reflects on the implications for the self, the Church and society.

The Sodality is the Prayer dimension in which the community forges a response to the suffering of the world. Through model building, the situation is analized, essibility is discorned, and direction for the future is explored. The Sodality releases and focuses man's expenditure—it occasions vocational re-engagement.

These three dimensions of the Ecclesiola are one dynamic which is care and which is one demonstration of corporateness, that enables a people to be engaged in mission.

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#### CONTEXT FOR "JOURNEY TO INTLAH" CONVERSATION

The Ixtlan conversation is designed to appropriate the account of a spirit journey in secular terms. The conversation is designed less to increase one's interior stew than to provide some provocative images and practical insights which focus and order the interior chaos one is in. The methodology has 3 questions.

- 1. If you saw a spirit walking down the street, what would he look like? How would you know him?
- 21 If you had to replace the poetry used here, what other poetry comes to mind?
- 3. Where have you run across this in your experience? Who comes to mind as someone who embodied this poetry?

The conversation focuses on the participant's experience of the episode more than the details and images of the book. It draws out the poetic images needed to capture a picture of the secular-religious man.

#### PREPARATION

Read the episode aloud. Emphasis on smooth flow more than histrionics will enhance the conversation. This conversation has the mood of nonchalant table talk more than intensified spirit probing. The conversation should be brief.

#### CONTENT

The Journey to Ixtlan is an exploration of the detachment required to look at the world from the perspective of Being itself. A being is immersed in Los Angèles, in cars, in loving and being loved. Being itself is power, it is detachment, it is perspective, it is the excitement of continuous creativity.

Carlos Castaneda is the apprentice. The guru is Don Juan, a Yaqui Indian sorcerer, the priest, the bridge, the teacher. At his side is Genaro, the embodiment, the one as much at home in the "real" world as Castaneda is in the world of "phantoms."

There are miracles, strange happenings. A sorceress hops ten feet at a time, a car disappears and reappears, strange shapes move in the night forest. They exist only as diversions, subtly snipping ties to the world of food and friends until the eyes are free to see reality, the mind prepared to know the unknown, the body steeled to touch the power that pulses within Being.

The sorcerer and the warrior. Two images of the man who has "stopped" the world of reason and discovered the mystery and wonder that he is. He discards his personal history, his attachments, surrenders every defense. His own death awaits, a shadow always stalking his field of vision. Beyond knowing and doing, he is action springing directly from his being. Always the strategist. Aware of his finitude. Yet sensitive to the power that pulsates within the rock, upon his special hill. He hangs between the terror and wonder of being a man.


