Civil Relations Commission

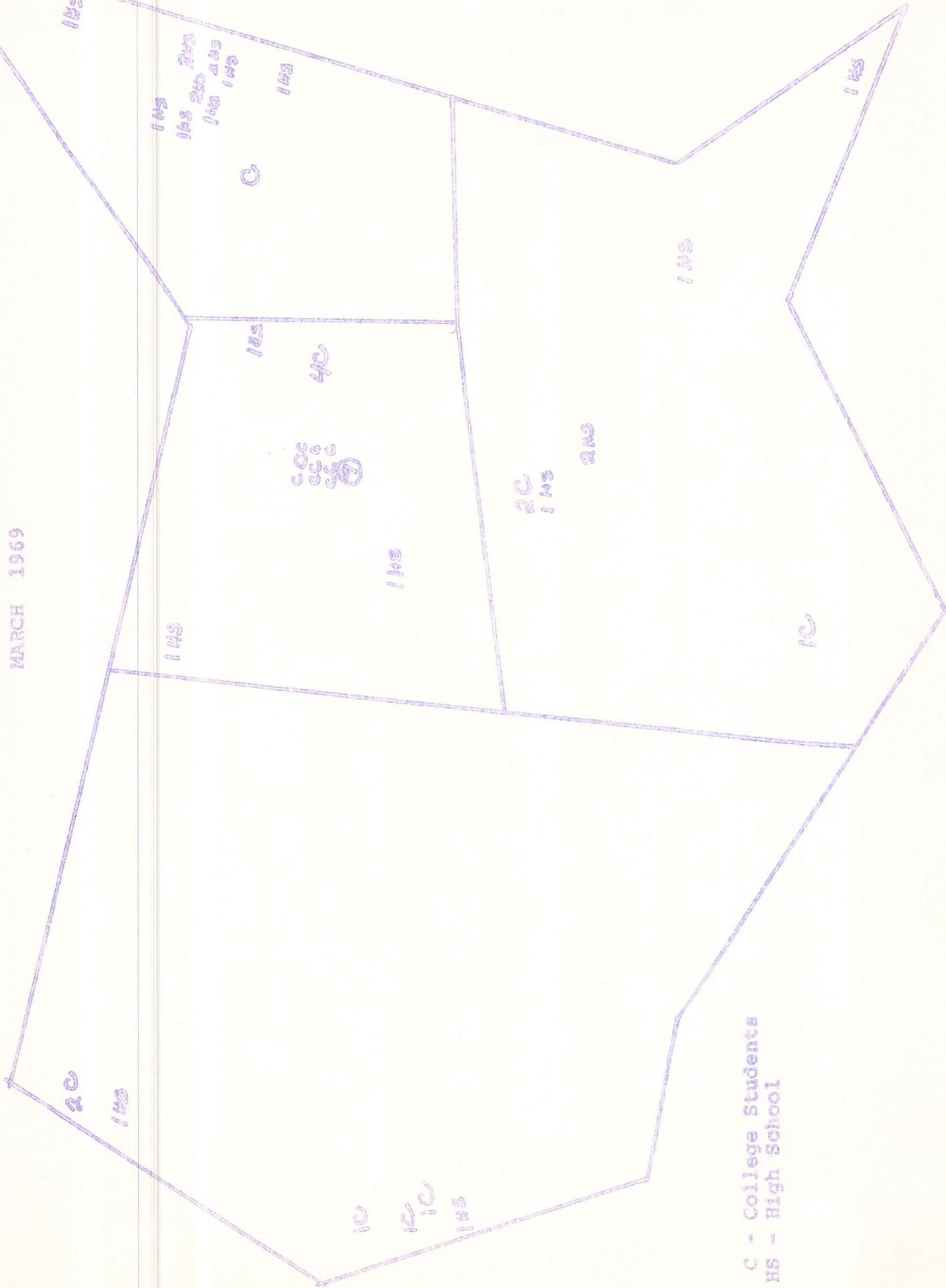
1. That the community bulletin boards be put up in every stake.

Major Accomplishments

The Board of Managers and the Presidium present to the 5th City Quarterly Congress the following report of activities in the Economics Guild during the past quarter A January thur March.

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The recommendation that was made to the 5th City Redevelopment Corporation on December 14, 1968 was completed. It consisted of 150 unit package that was submitted by F.C.C.R.C. to FHA. for rehabilitation. Now F.C.C.R.C. is in the process of enlarging the package to 200. The consumers report the establishment of the credit union as of March 3, 1969. It has assets of \$1000.00 +. The credit union is having a charter membership drive. To date we have six charter members. Initial contact with businessmen in the area has been made in order to re-establish the Businessman Association. A businessman luncheon is being planned for next week. The Income Security Bureau reports that the employment out post referred several community people to training programs in the city. The Health Guild reports that there is a good possibility of acquiring a vehicle from three sources. Three volunteer dentists are providing free dental examinations, three times a week at 3352 West Jackson. Eighty patients have been seen. A volunteer doctor comes to the pre-school weekly to examine the children. Fifty pints of blood have been added to the 5th City blood bank and fifteen pints have been given to Fifth City Citizens. this quarter.

MAJOR CONTRADICTIONS

The housing section reports that the primary block for N.R.A. being incorporated was a lack of funds to pay a lawyer. The Health Guild has not been able to secure a full time physician due to the lack of an adequate back-up hospital. The employment office was not opened because there was no staff person to operate that structure. The Fifth City Consumer education program was not established due to the lack of funds.

INSIGHT

In order to establish a consumer education program it is necessary to consult the businessmen in the area. The Health Guild sees the need for a strong stake-hold structure in relation to a health network. In Income Security there is a need for fund raising to pay staff to operate the office.

The Board of Managers and Presidium present to the 5th City Quarterly Congress the following report of activities in the Center of Urban Education during the past quarters April thru June, 1969.

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the winter quarter of 1969, the Education Guild initiated a one night a week community reformulation course for all 5th citizens in the Urban World Academy. 18 participants attended the five sessions taught by the board of managers on the philosophy, structure, organization and methodology of community reformulation. Practical tools such as model building, creation of symbols gave the participants an inside view of the 5th City model enabling effective leadership development in all 5th City programs.

KEY INITIATIVE

The Public School Community Teachers are a key to bringing about the new relationship between the community and the public schools and instituting an imaginal mode of education in the classroom.

MAJOR CONTRADICTION

Inadequate recruitment of volunteers and lack of clerical help to work with college placement, general education diploma (GED), and public schools.

5th City Quarterly Congress

March 22, 1969

The Board of Managers and the Presidium present to the 5th City Quarterly the following report of the activities in the Style Guild.

MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENTS.

The Jet program began in January with 80 5th City youth in attendance. Four community Jet staff in a daily teacher training program. Five Y.C.S. and nine youth participated in the Urban World Academy, which was for a total of eight weeks where they studied Community Reformulated from 5 a.m. to 8 p.m.

MAJOR INSIGHT

The Style Guild discovered the difference between an educational and stylistic curriculum and are clear now that Style deals with vocation, discipline and corporationess, using symbols and education as tools.

MAJOR CONTRADICTION

The Style Guild feels that there was not enough community volunteers to begin work in three of the guild boards. In order to maintain the High School House two staff people and salaries are needed. The youth center requires ten adult volunteers which were not available. The one person for the Board was not hired because of the lack of a salary.
