Dear Guardian,

The 14th North American Guardian Consult will be held April 7-9, 1978. Our invitation letters always speak to the ever increasing cruciality of each upcoming session. We will meet this spring at a most crucial time when our participation in and visions for the future of the work of the ICA are more significant than ever before. Both the scope of the ICA's existing programs and the potential of new possibilities need the creative leadership that must come from the Guardians.

Since our last meeting in October, there has been an intensification of awakenment (impact) programs across the world. Global Community Forum is spreading across North America with a total of 2,787 Town Meetings held as of February 24th. Seventeen states in the United States and two provinces in Canada have had forums in each of their counties and districts. The remaining task is to complete the county coverage by the end of June and move to geographical intensification of the impact programs. Other signal events in the impact arena have been the Global Women's Forums held in North America, India, Europe, Southeast Asia, and Africa, and the LENS seminars held in Lusaka, Minneapolis, Chicago and Vienna. The current schedules for these seminars reflect a growing concern on the part of people everywhere to be effectively engaged in their local situation.

Acceleration of the 24 Human Development Projects is also an emphasis this year. By April, acceleration treks will have been to each of the 24 projects, covering economic and social programs and the living environment. New projects have been initiated in the Republic of the Philippines, Kenya and Zambia as part of the 28 new projects scheduled for this year, and a total of 52 villages have been initiated in the state of Maharashtra in India as part of the replication of Human Development Projects. A major focus for spring will be the launching of twelve projects in the United States, as well as four projects in Latin America.

The Guardians Consult will be at the Institute of Cultural Affairs, 4750 N. Sheridan Road in Chicago. It will begin on Friday evening, April 7th, with registration at 5:00 p.m. and dinner at 7:00 p.m. The closing will be on Sunday, April 9th, with lunch ending at approximately 2:30 p.m. The fee will be \$50 per person.

The fact that individuals finally are collectively responsible for the future is a reality. That we have a unique opportunity to appropriate that reality is our situation. We look forward to seeing you April 7th.

#### TASK FORCE DESCRIPTIONS

#### 1. LENS

Context: LENS is proving to be a powerful awakenment tool. Since the last guardian meeting in October, 1977, ten seminars have been held in three countries and in a variety of situations. In order to insure the most effective use of this tool, guardian expertise will be needed to design and implement a model for scheduling and staffing Fall seminars.

Contradiction: Incomplete marketing plan, including target accounts, sales aids, people to market and teach the seminar.

Products: 1. Target accounts and schedule for Fall LENS seminars

2. Pedagogue's profile, selection process and training model

#### 2. GLOBAL COMMUNITY FORUM

Context: On June 8, 1978, the miracle will be done. North America will have been turned gold with awakenment. Of the 3,341 counties and provinces in North America, 2,484 have held a Town Meeting/Global Community Forum. To successfully complete this victory of one Forum in every county, there will be eight major campaigns in the 13 remaining states and provinces.

Contradiction: Undeveloped means to symbolize the profound happening of the North American County completion.

Products: 1. A working draft of a National Report on the Journey of Town Meeting

2. A newsletter on "What Happens After Town Meeting"

3. 64 circuiters names for the 8 Town Meeting campaigns

#### 3. GLOBAL WOMEN'S FORUM

Context: The Global Women's Forum is a vital tool in the awakenment of "advantaged" women, as well as the disadvantaged 85%. Some 70 Forums have been held in the last two quarters, with treks to Furope, Africa, N.E. Asia, India and in North America. Guardian women are in the most advantageous position to determine new marketing and funding strategies for this impact tool. Further, they are needed as GWF leaders in North America and across the world.

Contradiction: Guardian leadership has experienced itself at the periphery of GWF programmatic development, and insights into new funding sources and new marketing approaches have not been implemented.

Products: 1. Marketing maneuvers, with targeted organizations and contacts within them

2. A step-by-step approach for new funding sources and related contacts

3. A timeline and assignment chart for courses in the coming quarter

#### TASK FORCE DESCRIPTIONS

#### 4. NEW SUPPORT SCHEMES

Context: In order to do the Human Development Projects and accelerate Town Meeting saturation, there exists a need for a breakloose of creative ideas and approaches in not only fund raising, but in all areas of support. Some new schemes that emerged in the past year have demonstrated dramatic results.

Contradiction: Undeveloped strategy for identifying and tapping new sources of support.

Product: 5 new support schemes or packages

#### 5. PUBLIC PRESENTATIONS DESIGNS

Context: As the work of the Institute has become more visible, numerous brochures, pamphlets and newsletters have been published and a variety of authorization and endorsement letters have been received. Increasingly, guardians are called upon to make presentations on the work of the ICA. Access to the diverse supporting materials will maximize the effectiveness of these presentations.

<u>Contradiction</u>: Inadequate system of access to available materials and constructs which will commonize and intensify the import of our presentations.

#### Products:

- 1. A one-page story of the ICA
- 2. Guidelines for effective presentations
- 3. A bibliography of presentation materials
- 4. A manual for holding "An Evening at The Institute"

#### 6. GLOBAL GUARDIAN INTENSIFICATION

Context: Guardians are those, largely in the established, secular world who care about the human condition and who help decide and then participate in practical forms of engagement. The guardian dynamic involves the contribution of time, talent, and resources, as well as individual growth which is vital to the historic movement toward a more human tomorrow.

Contradiction: A fragmented approach to the engagement of those known and yet to be known who care about the moral issue of our time.

- 1. A chart of the Guardians Consults Journey
- 2. A two-page brief on the history, journey and vision of the North American guardians
- 3. A compendium of engagement opportunities

#### TASK FORCE DESCRIPTIONS

#### 7. THE SIY SHOWPIECES

Context: June 30 is the target date for celebrating the completion of the first two-year phase of the twenty-four Human Development Projects around the globe. Specific events and skills are needed to move the projects from their current phase of actuation to full readiness.

Contradiction: Undeveloped guardian engagement in preparing the existing North American projects for showpiece readiness.

Products: 1. Six implementation plans for doing key maneuvers

Task description for key expertise person for each project.

#### 8. THE USA THELVE

Context: The timing is right for rural development in the United States. Town Meetings have covered the nation, resulting in the awakenment of many people. Before the end of June, there will be twelve rural Human Development projects launched in the United States. The initiating consults for the projects will be held in May in Areas San Francisco and New York and in June in Areas Chicago and Houston.

Contradiction: Incomplete maneuvers for coordinated project set-up, followed by rapid visible actuation signs.

Products: 1. Adaptation of the Maharashtra Actuation Formulae for the USA 12

2. Prioritized list of resources for the nine program arenas

#### 9. GSD FORCES MOBILIZATION

Context: By the end of June, there will be 12 new Human Development projects initiated in the United States, 4 in Latin America, and 5 in other countries across the globe. This breakloose will need the Participation of 350 consultants and 54 auxiliary.

Contradiction: Incomplete channels for guardians to pick up the recruitment tasks for project initiation in conjunction with the Areas.

Products: 1. A telephone "marathon" implementation plan for recruitment

2. Orientation materials and events for short-term volunteers

3. A multi-purpose information flyer for potential volunteer staff

#### THE SIXTEEN GLOBAL PRIORITIES

#### I. The Globalizing of the Global Community Forum

North America has been saturated with Town Meetings. Pilot projects and demonstrations of the Community Forum have been conducted in twenty-four nations. It is now time to begin the Acceleration Phase across the Globe.

#### II. The Mighty 250

There are approximately 400,000 villages in the nation of India. The Maliwada demonstration by itself would be only "a nice thing to do." We are doing 250 village projects across the state of Maharashtra to demonstrate seriousness about comprehensive village renewal: 250 symbolizes the feasibility and necessity of replication.

#### III. The Do-ment of the 24

By the end of 1977-78 the social demonstration of 24 pilot communities around the globe will be completed. That means 24 communities will be standing on their own, providing their own leadership and operating from a stance of self-sufficiency.

#### IV. The North American Counties Saturation

This priority refers to Town Meetings in North America. "Saturation" means that by the end of 1977-78, a Town Meeting will have been held in every county across the United States and Canada.

#### V. The PAKK Expansion Strategy

PAKK is in reference to the Philippines, Australia, Korea and Kenya. The expansion strategy will involve adding at least one more village to the list of Social Demonstration Projects in each of these locations in preparation for replication.

#### VI. The Singapore Strongholds

Three of the projected twenty-eight new Social Demonstration Projects for this year are to be located within the "fan of the Orient," Singapore, of course, being at the "handle" of the fan. Two will be in Indonesia, one in East Malaysia.

#### VII. The Latin American Beachheads

The initial step in turning on the continent of Latin America will begin this year by establishing Area Houses related to human development projects in Areas Havana, Mexico City, Rio de Janeiro and Buenos Aires. Supportive to the beachheads will be the training of Latin American staff at a school in Cano Negro.

#### THE SIXTEEN GLOBAL PRIORITIES

#### VIII. The Twelve U.S.A. Projects

Project expansion within the U.S.A. is to be by a factor of four-from four to 16. With the addition of the 12 new U.S.A. projects, nearly every citizen of the United States will be within driving distance, roughly 200 miles, of a project.

#### IX. The Impact Tools Intensification

Global Community Forum is but one of an array of impact tools at our disposal for awakening local people to the possibilities for new life in their communities. The Global Women's Forum, LENS, Community Youth Forum already have begun to pave the way for GCF in unexpected ways.

#### X. The Year of the U.K.

The United Kingdom is the strategic springboard into the European Continent. Practically, the Year of the United Kingdom will mean a second Human Development Project, and the initiation of Town Meeting in Northern Ireland, and one per county in England, Scotland and Wales.

#### XI. The Global Management Systems

Effectiveness of missional activity depends upon the unity of the Centrum Bands around the Globe. This is the year for Global Management Centrum to create the systems and discern the maneuvers that will enable global financial credibility and administrative effectiveness wherever the Movement appears.

#### XII. The Five Urban Signals

Isle of Dogs, Kreuzberg Ost, Fifth City, Ivy City and Kawangware are urban human development projects. This twelfth priority claims the input of sufficient resources to see that these projects work, and work well.

#### XIII. The Local Church Engagement

Those who have known the Institutes and the Order well have known that our determination to serve the local church has never diminished. This year we will be developing specific ways to deepen anew that commitment.

#### XIV. The Metro Circuit Formulation

This priority points to the concern for the care of Movemental colleagues through regularly scheduled and structured mailings and visits. The visiting of the Development teams is one of the primary means of providing this sort of care.

#### THE SIXTEEN GLOBAL PRIORITIES

#### XV. The Profound Humaness Research

The foundations of humanness go far, far deeper than the definitudes of any of the historical religions would imply. This priority is a commitment to spend this year in corporate reflection, based on the practical fact that our own band of colleagues has broadened recently to include many who share other established faiths.

#### XVI. The Global Panchayat Launch

Global Order polity is an experiment unique in the 20th Century. The time has come to give external, visible form to what we have, in fact, been operating out of for some years now.

- -Clothing--considering weather, living accommodations, likely tasks to be done, local customs, what clothing is most suitable.
- -Drinking Water -- availability of safe drinking water.
- -Medical Facilities--type of medical & dental personnel available locally.
- -Personal Effects & Tools--in addition to cosmetics, pharmacuticals and other medical and sanitation needs, cameras, cassette recorders for personal use, consider that writing supplies like felt-tip pens or markers, rulers, may not be available. The consultant may bring some of these items to leave with the Consult Team and Auxiliary for Project use.

#### THE HDP CONSULT

The key to planning a Human Development Project is the Consult involving ICA staff, outside expertise and local community people. The purpose of the Consult is to elicit from the local residents a comprehensive practical plan for the community s renewal. The Consult methods allow a comprehensive project model to emerge from the aspirations and efforts of the people themselves, so that it is grounded concretely in their own future. The practical work of the Consult is done through team structures, the design allowing for a maximum amount of time in team activity. The teams create their time designs to include field trips and other activities according to the requirements of their particular work.

The ICA has developed unique methodologies for comprehensive socio-economic development on the local level. The comprehensive approach begins by enabling the local residents themselves to articulate their own vision of possibility, to plot the under-

lying contradictions, to that vision, to create the practical proposals to release these contradictions, and then finally to build the tactical systems for the actuation of the proposals. This tactical system is designed into actuating programs of economic and social development. The methods are designed to deal with all the issues of a community at once. It is this comprehensiveness that generates the motivity necessary for actuation of the project by local people with their wisdom and creativity instead of super-imposing ideas from the outside.

CONTEXT:

June 8, 1978 - The miracle is done. We will have turned the continent gold with awakenment. Our present task is three-fold: (1) Completion of the counties in Qtr. IV, (2) Writing victorious story for the Town Meeting campaign, and (3) Draw together "What Happens after Town Meeting". To successfully complete the victory of one TM/GCF per county, there will be 8 major campaigns in the 13 remaining states and provinces. This means doing approximately 857 TM/GCF's during the next eight weeks.

This quarter will also see the launch of 12 new Social Demonstrations, bringing into a close, compatible working relationship the awakenment and demonstration programs in the North American continent. To accomplish both these tasks places a greater demand on Guardians and staff than ever before. For the awakenment victory to be, the Guardian presence in terms of time is crucial.

The purpose of this Task Force is to commit one Guardian or colleague per week in each of the 8 campaigns for the next 8 weeks; a total of 64-one-week time slots filled. This will entail phoning or visiting guardians present at the meeting, to enlist their committment for one week of time in one of the campaign locations. By Sunday Plenary, 64 names will be on the War Board. The Task Force will also pull together the journey of the Town Meeting Program to be used as a National Report; and will also pull together the results of Town Meeting to be used as a Newsletter to the towns.

A Compendium of Guardian Engagement

DOING IMPACT CAMPAIGN TM expansion and intensification has lead to greater guardian involvement in the doing of TMs. Guardians have gone to TM circuits, have telephoned for it, and have been co-ordinators for TM as well as orchestrators of the meetings. In addition, guardians have attended area counsil meetings, been involved in promoting and pulling off GWF, and in teaching LENS as well as participating in treks. Guardians have also manned the ICA office on an on-going basis.

SUSTAIN-ING GLOBAL EDGE

The Global Odyssey was an initial step toward enabling guardians to image themselves as global citizens. That exposure paved the way for guardians to pick up responsibility for Human Development Projects around the globe. Guardians have played a major role in initiating and sustaining HDPs in the following ways: Selecting sites for HDPs, acting as consultants, participating in acceleration treks, acting as auxiliary staff, and setting up research trips.

LOCAL CONTIN-UITY AND CARE

Guardians involvement has been acted out in many ways. They have assisted in acquiring religious houses and sustaining them. Order members and guardians share a common spirit by attending house church, ecclesiola, work week ends and celebrations. Guardians are called upon to provide food, drink, transportation, child-care, and entertainment. Because the guardian has special access to community information and contacts, he is able to help with job placements and setting up appointments with key local people. A vital role can be served by maintaining a personal fund of knowledge for local ongoing engagement.

PROVID-ING COMPRE-HENSIVE FRAMING

A role for guardians is to fill out a comprehensive framing network for ICA programs. Past examples include opening doors to US embassies abroad, AID in Washington, the White House, and getting funding for HDPs from the EEC and ITT. A frequent role for guardians has been smoothing out misunderstandings between the Ecumenical Institute on the one hand and its neighbors and the political bureaucracy on the other. Guardians make testimonials, write editorials, and lend use of their names for purposes of authorization and assisting in-kind contributions.

PERSONAL AUTHOR-IZATION

A guardian has risks being helpful in acquiring authorization, recruitment and funds. He was able to invite interested local people to a Night at the Institute, and set up business luncheons and appointments for development teams

## A Compendium of Guardian Engagement

OBJECT-IFYING PRES-ENCE Guardians have brought an objectifying presence to tactics and strategies through their "proven methods" sense. They have utilized business procedures, technical jargans or legal sense in reviews of written materials or summaries, legal consultation, and participation on boards or task forces.

PROVID-ING PRACT± ICAL SUPPORT The practical support given by guardians to global and local projects and maneuvers has shown up in ways ranging from in-kinding the use of WATS lines to inviting Kiwanis friends in for a week-end of work at the Kemper Building. A call to Cincinnati wanting someone to get a sno-cone machine made there to the project to Majuro resulted in a guardian getting his local church mission guild to locate and send a machine on its way in a few weeks. Along with their own personal support, guardians have called on their colleagues to furnish cars and a myriad of in-kind materials.

## MASS IMPACT

The MASS IMPACT column - comprised of three task forces (Lens, Global Community Forum, and Global Women's Forum) stood before the astounding power of Those Who Care to perform the miracle of covering geography. The work of the day was both a celebration of the victory already won and a sober resolve to build the supporting designs and models that ensure the continuation of the profound awakenment that is the birthright of every human being in every local community. Serious engagement for the most part marked the style of each task force as it creatively blitzed through the planning designs of its assigned arena. The hours of work at the drawing board, however, were punctuated by the cabaret provided by the "yellow bandidos" who cajoled, hyjinxed, and hyjacked guardians through-out the building for their time, treasure and talent in completing the work of the campaign. During the next 3 months, the affirmation of and resolve to do mass impact which was evident both within and beyond these task forces is a portent of the promise of the future.

Significant mass impact will be a webbing of the geographic and sociological coverage that is being effected by the combination of community forum, global woman's forum, LENS and Community Youth forum. It is this package of impact tools which we have to offer that is reinforcing awakenment experiences and pushing to engagement that will rebuild community. Mass impact as a force which engages the creativity of communities across this globe will only happen as growing numbers of people involve themselves in the tasks of a very serious work. It requires pushing our successes over the finish line and "giving as much attention to detail at the end as there was in the beginning" of our decided victory.

In awakening profound humaness, we discovered that it is important to know whom to awaken first in our multiple impact approach. We know that for our momentum to accelerate, it is OUR initiation of action that will precipitate action in others. Awakenment doesn't just happen once but is a life happening that happens to those who care and those who are caring.

## ORGANIZATIONS JUDGED MOST PROBABLE TO SPONSOR LENS

## CORPORATIONS

McDonald's Corporation. The company was presented a proposal in March, 1978, by Ray Carouso. The approach of the seminar would be operational effectivity of the marketing team, which would include middle and top marketing executives from McDonald's, Needham, Harper & Steers & Abelson Frankel (Advertising Agencies.) The course size would be between 40 - 50. Targeted date: September or October of 1978. LENS would be scheduled during the work work week on work time. The next step will be for a meeting bewteen ICA (Rick Loudermilk) and McDonald's in May, from which a final decision would be made.

Montgomery Ward, Chicago, ILL. Wayne Ellsworth secured an appointment to present LENS to WARDS system division personell director, after selling and gaining the support of his management peers to consider LENS for building teams and training managers. To verify the authenticity of LENS, the personnel director will have lunch with an executive of McDonalds, who uses LENS in his organization. To backup this direct approach, Wayne will pitch LENS to other training people, manager friends who would support and request LENS, and the people who will most likely make the final decision. As an alternative, 3 to 6 key managers will be recruited to an executive LENS where they will see its effectiveness first hand.

American Express. Focus should be on management development and team building. Contact at several levels, e.g. V.P. Corporate Personnel, Regional Personnel and local project teams where guardian has contacts. Contacts to Senior management should be backed with a written proposal demonstrating that the needs of American Express have been researched. (S. Cordis will draft). Contact should be by May 1978 for 1979 courses due to budget time frames.

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Nebraska The LENS program is proposed to be a course in the company's Management Development Program at the Midmanagement level. Primary Area will be Management Development. Within the next 3 to 4 weeks, a demonstration town meeting will be held for Line Management personnel, on a restricted topic. With the Town Meeting results in hand, LENS will be formally proposed for Sept. or Oct. 1978, and approval obtained. Money should be available. Contact is Charles Catlett of Omaha.

Michigan Dynamics Proposing Business LENS for the marketing and sales departments of Michigan Dynamics, Div. of AMBAR located in Garden City, Michigan. Division is concerned with training sales representatives in the field. Ats Matsuoka would be entry contact and would meet with the manager of sales representatives and Director of Marketing to propose LENS as supplement to technical and manufacturing training as determined by Management by Objectives. Training program would be presented to V.P. General Manager for approval. This will be set up in the next couple of weeks, with seminar presented in May.

As a result of the recent LENS seminar in Washington focusing on Youth & Community, the Juvenile Planning Corrdinator of Virginia Beach, Virginia has asked for a LENS for the city's Crime Prevention Steering Committee to be held in mid-May. Initial contact has been made by D. Galbreath and R. Loudermilk and Richard Dipeppi. An immediate letter on LENS credentials needs to be sent to DiPeppi to confirm date. The focus of the seminar would be on planning methods for implementation of plan by local citizenry.

American Society for Training and Development (ASTD) Discussing LENS with ASTD has two approaches: 1) contact and talk with leaders of the Community Development division during the National ASTD conference to be held in Chicago, June 18 - 23. They are already planning to visit 5th City during the conference. 2) Contact leaders, or provide leadership, to make a presentation on LENS to local ASTD Chapter meetings. Possibly a partial demonstration would be appropriate. Follow-up with those members interested in the method for their company.

Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) LENS seminars will be scheduled in state and area agencies funded by HEW office of Human Development Services, Region 5 (Chicago) and Region 7 (Houston), following the LENS scheduled for that office this fall. Letters of recommendation will be solicited from the participating regional program directors to be sent to their state and area counterparts. Local guardians will identify key contacts and present LENS as a significant tool for local consensus building and citizen input. Efforts to include allocations for LENS seminar in the budget should be made during the spring budget hearings.

Maricopa County General Hospital (MCGH) Initial contact with MCGH will be through J. Boyd, who will arrange a meeting with Hospital Health Dept. Adminstrators and LENS this spring. The new hospital director, Mr. Prekup is interested in increasing employee involvement and morale as well as aiding the hospital and health department to work as a more unified force. The final decision will be made by the Board of Supervisors who will be included in some of the initial meetings

American Medical Record Association. The entire decision making procedure is yet to be determined. Meetings should be initiated prior to the appointment of the new director in the fall. Initial course should include a representative from each state and regional courses would be a possible outcome in 6 months or a year

Arizona Health Plan (Health Maintenance Org.)

J. Boyd will make initial contact with Dr. Scholler, Medical Director, to set up a meeting with the decision making group. AHP is interested in maintaining an effective organization but does not have a "story."

## PEDAGOGY

The issue of the preparation of LENS seminar leaders is important but secondary to the need for increased marketing success. The basic model for preparation remains the "Take one, Observe one, Teach one" sequence with additional practice opportunity provided through weekend training sessions and individual study and lecture writing. The executive seminar planned in Boston is a good beginning point for those interested in LENS leadership or marketing. The possibility of a training session on a weekend in June and/or in conjunction with the GRA will be explored.

The Global Community Forum task force divided into 3 sub-groups each with a particular objective. One group created a national T.M. report to the President. The second group created a draft of a T.M. newsletter to be sent to all participants across the nation. The third group was action-oriented and recruited 85 Guardians committed to time slots for the 8 remaining campaigns to finish T.M. in every county.

The national report is seen as a significant gift to the President that is not out to give a national consensus but a report that will symbolize the positive resurgence of local people to creatively build our nation for the future. It intends to articulate the image of "the new pioneer for the third century."

The town meeting newsletter is titled "Town Meeting \_\_\_\_ - the Edge of the Future." The group brainstormed the format and then the contents. After gestalting, four sections for the newsletter were created: a program overview, what happened, accomplishments and creations, and the I.C.A. story. The group found in the research that TM was a motivating engagement for the communities and a hope for the nation. The vision is one newsletter for the 200,000 participants...."one for every coffee table and crackerbarrel in the nation."

The yellow-banded body snatchers recruited 85 guardians for the eight remaining campaigns by determining the underlying contradiction and arriving at two challenges which were acted out in a lunchtime presentation of a song, story and symbol. The joy of the day is that the North American campaign is assured, and more than 85 guardians will participate in the last weeks of the greatest victory of this century. The remaining 19 slots will be filled this evening in the halls and at the global village.

The significance of this day's tasks force work was found in focusing for a day to symbolize the completion of the T.M. victory by honoring our nation...through the report to the president; the participants by the creation of the TM newsletter; and the guardians who will participate in the wrap up of the greatest victory of this century.

## INTRODUCTION

The Global Women's Forum task force took the learnings of women setting up and participating in Forums across the North American continent over the past two quarters and created a marketing manual with particular attention to recruitment, practics and funding in order to double the number of Global Women's Forums this quarter.

#### RECRUITMENT

Global Women's Forum is for all women. In North America, the 4th Quarter goal is to offer GWF in 20 locations. Fourteen of the 20 are scheduled. The GWF task force requires the help of the Guardians assembled to set up the remaining six. There are four recommended methods of recruiting 50 women for each GWF:

- 1) Recruit 50 women, including at least these categories:
  - a) Government, educational and public organizations
  - b) Labor, business and professional organizations
  - c) Voluntary, social and private organizations
  - d) Other groups and individuals
- 2) Find organizations which will sponsor an in-house GWF for their own membership (i.e; League of Women Voters, Church Groups, Junior League)
- 3) Sell GWF as in-service training for institutions which employ large numbers of women (i.e; telephone company, public school systems).
- 4) Market GWF as a special event in conjunction with an annual event (i.e; National Secretarial Week, Convention wives programs)

For Quarter 4, the GWF task force recommends method #1. To build networks for future use, the task force has targeted the following groups to be included in recruitment efforts in all 20 GWF's: YWCAs, schurch women's groups, womenis studies department of colleges and universities. Thinking long range, Guardians are requested to make contact now in using methods 2,3,4, scheduling GWFs in the fall of 1978 and in 1979.

## **PRACTICS**

The key to practis in the GWF is to create a fine setting. Use of color enhances the meeting room and reception area. Decor focus should be on the tables, include flowers, and the wall decor can include framed (or matted) pictures that hold the woman's dynamic. Through experience, common tools have emerged for replicating GWFs around the Globe. (See invitation, calling packe, and weekly countdown timeline) A key tool is the inkinding of goods; luncheon, snacks and materials, which requires a team of two, well-rehearsed in the GWF story, a definite list of what is needed and why it is required. Inkinding can be fun and easy and when prepared the victory has already been won.

### INTENT OF FUNDING

The GWF must be funded in order to be a self-supporting program, assure continual research and to catalyze other impact events of the ICA. Funding allows the participant to share in making the Forum available to other women across the globe.

## BUDGET EXPLANATION

Each Forum is part of 100 Forums planned internationally in the next six months and the \$750.00 fee to ICA is designed to cost average those so that women in under-developed countries might also participate. Therefore, such items as \$200.00 per GWF for global travel enables a travel fund pool rather than a Forum in Indonesia having to have the difficult task of funding the actual \$2000.00 travel cost involved in doing a Forum there. Local expenses may vary with each GWF and can become a tool to increase local participation. Actual local expenses are dependent upon the donation vs. the renting of the facility as well as the in-kinding of food and promotional materials

### NEW SUPPORT SCHEMES

Task Force 4 was charged with preparing 5 new support schemes to enable the success of <a href="Impact Saturation">Impact Saturation</a> programs as well as the new USA 12 HDPS. Some 65 targets were brainstormed together with suggested schemes, strategies, pitches and human appeals. The 65 targets were gestalted into 5 categories: Corporations/Professions, Governmental bodies, Charitable organizations, special interest groups, and individuals. Schemes to enlist the support of each group were prepared.

## PUBLIC PRESENTATION DESIGNS

Task Force 5 prepared 4 products including 1) a 4 x 4 chart of the ICA story to be used in any presentation -- the 4 x 4 included poetic captions and practical, understandable terms 2) a 14 point guideline for effective presentations including reminders often self-evident but easily ignored or forgotten in effective presentations. 3) a bibliography indicating the source of presentation materials and audiences on which to use. Finally 4) an "Evening at the Institute" timeline and follow-up chart were prepared to suggest "musts" for successful evenings.

## GLOBAL GUARDIAN INTENSIFICATION

Task Force 6 brought up-to-date the Guardian Consult Journey chart covering the 14 semi-annual meeting span which covered poetically the challenging issues, key happenings, global demand, corporate resolve, and operating image of each of the 14 sessions (1972-1977). Also a new Para-Vocation Man Symbol was created indicating the time, talent and treasure aspects of a Guardian's involvement. Finally, a compendium of Guardian Engagement was prepared indicating in prose the many facets of the Guardian role.

Task Force 4 identified some 65 potential targets for support of our work, particularly North American GSD projects and Town Meeting intensification. Schemes, strategies, "pitches" were also brainstormed, and 5 primary schemes were created to offer a possibility for penetrating these organizations. The over-arching strategy in most calls for personally involving key people with the expectation that financial assistance will follow.

Our assignment was to prepare four products in the arena of Public Presentations. The first was a 4 x 4 chart of the ICA story including both broad, general poetic language and corresponding practical terms useful for adaptation to any audience. The second was a 14 point practical guide for effective presentations including self-evident reminders that so often are missed or inadvertently ignored. The third product was an annotated bibliography and delivery system report. The paper indicates the source, i.e., local house, area house or nexus, of audio/visual and other presentation materials with suggestions for their appropriateness for 12 particular societal groups. Finally, an "Evening at the Institute" timeline and enablement chart was prepared covering necessary pre-evening and followup events to insure effectiveness of the particular program.

## GUIDELINES FOR EFFECTIVE PRESENTATIONS

- 1. Be concise and uncomplicated.
  Have a clear idea of when you need to see a person or group.
- Be brief and to the point in initial telephone contacts. The prime objective is to set a convenient time for an appointment, not to sell the program on the phone.
- Be prepared, if they haven't heard of the ICA, to briefly state the purpose and ask for an appointment to explain further details.
- 4. Prepare an outline of your program before making presentation.
  Take into consideration: a. content
  - b. flow
  - c. personal pitch or group presentation
  - d. when and how to answer questions
  - e. how to have effective follow-up
  - f. audience make-up and concerns
- 5. Select style appropriate to you and your audiences.
- 6. Refer to successful projects and stories. When possible use personal experience.
- Anticipate need for support materials and have them at finger-tips in adequate quantities.
- 8. Gear presentation to acheive a specific response, i.e. cash contribution or personal involvement, but not both.
- 9. Acknowledge and affirm every response.
- 10. Anticipate the most common questions, i.e. funding, program monies, self-support, how "this" is different and have on tip of tongue.
- 11. Ask for donation or participation but not both.
- 12. Critique your presentation.
- 13. Deliver on promises.
- 14. Be enthusiastic.
- 16. Write a thank-you note and include any additional material that was requested.

## IMPACT SATURATION

In order to experiment as a laboratory for comprehensive curriculum to build wisdom, opportunities for financial development, and deeper commitment to involvement, we will:

- 1. hold phone set-up model training sessions on Wk. II of Wk 1 (in each field).
- 2. compile and write follow-up T.M. report by re-contacting communities.
- 3. create printed materials by end of Wk. 1 (schedules, posters, publicity materials, letters of introduction, invitations, brochures.)
- 4. decide 10 dates and locations of impact saturation experiments by fields at the end of Wk. 2 (saturation to be completed by the end of Wk. 7). Recommendations: Atlantic County, NJ and Washington, D.C., using opening available now as part of HDP completion.

## HDP PREPARATION

In order to launch 3 HDP's with adequate auxiliary, consultants, enablement and funding, Area New York will:

- 1. secure needed resources (funds and inkind) to provide a stable and powerful position for the initiation of the projects. This will be done through making specific assignments for inkind needs; targeting sources and geographical approaches for funding (existing, in the "air", and new resources); and timelining appointments. We will work out a model with consultants to allow them to raise their fees.
- 2. recruit adequate staff for HDP auxiliary, consultants and consult enablement in order to effectively launch the NY Area HDP's through eliciting past T.M. grads; holding additional metro briefings; securing and distributing USA 12 brochures; sending consultant confirmation packets; seeking consultants to fill expertise needs all during April.
- 3. make practical site preparation to assure that the physical needs of project personnel are met before and during the consult itself, such as housing, meals, transportation. This will assist the transition from consult into project implementation.
- 4. occasion pre-consult miracles to elicit a "yes" from local authorization and from the local community by talking with local and regional officials (Wk. 3 or 4), arranging for auxiliary housing (Wk. 3 or 4) and locating the consult facility (Wk. 5 or 6).

3. In order to recruit 6 consultants to serve at the 3 Area Consults and 2 to other Global Consults, we will raise supplementary scholarship funds and set up a home visitation program.

4. By April 15th a letter detailing what the project is about and how the Community Center is being used, will be sent to the following people: Mrs. Carter, Mayor Washington, City Council, Col. Staralun and Mr. Spaulding

## SELF SUPPORT

In the arena of self support we will select six people who can immediately be sent out for jobs. The six people chosen will have employable skills, the drive to look for a good job, and can be freed up from present assignment. In order to immediately deal with the cash flow, for the first 6 weeks, the six new permeators will get at least a temporary job for 3 days a week while looking for higher paying positions. A basic tool used in job hunting is a good resume. It needs to be up-to-date and crisp. A Guardian or working colleague familiar with the personnel selection processes in business will: hold collegium on the art of resumes; hold workshop to produce up-to-date resumes for job hunters; hold critique on the end product before release. Each House should send copies of its job seekers' resumes to all other Houses so that any lead to employment in the job seekers' city may be matched to skills known to the person who finds that lead anywhere. We will approach at least three Guardians in order to obtain three employment leads from each. Most Guardians hold high positions in corporations and businesses which employ many people, thus they wield heavy influence in them. They know what types of skills are needed, and can patch them into a list of available skills among Order personnel. We will contact at least 3 Guardians on the phone and explain the need to have these jobs secured in light of the coming demands of the Quarter. To quickly acquire cash without deploying additional "assignable" troops, each House will approach 3 colleagues during Week 1 and request they seek employment for Order self support. Houses will strategize the appropriate contexting and method of request for each individual.

#### DEVELOPMENT BURST

In order to secure the immediate funds needed for Qtr. IV and to assure and expand on-going support in both financial and human resources, we will engage in the following four "Do's":

- 1. Intensifying grassroots pledging
- 2. Securing Village Adoption Churches
- 3. Tripling corporation/foundation giving
- 4. Assuring self-supporting impact courses.

This will be implemented by the creation of a Development Strike Force; holding Evenings at the Institute; slide shows and Village Adoption Presentations; foundation research; creation of local promotional materials for corporation giving; asking for prepaid \$400 consult fees from consultants; info packet mailing to Area Guardians; local development gun to insure continuity; systematic newsletters, including pledge form; each field getting one church to adopt a village; local pledging maneuvers for 8 new pledges per month for each House.

#### CLUBAL SERVANT FORCE ENGAGEMENT

In order to objectify the incredible engagement opportunities and to secure specific consultants in all arenas, we plan these actions:

- 1. Hold a workshop to create a calendar chart and to fill out specific names for engagement in global and local events; this will engage the GSF in listing specific tasks and expertise needs, making assignments and identifying further prospective consultants, event set-up teams, etc.
- 2. Recruit GSF to consults, impact events, and pledging financial support by: identifying 2 key people from each community we know; mailing an imaginal chart of events and needs of the quarter's work; phoning and/or visiting; scheduling and inviting the GSF to events which release engagement.
- 3. Sustain the GCF by spiritizing events (like Eccesiola) and training events, for these and other campaign work.
- 4. Mail monthly newsletters from each House to report on the arenas of work and miracles; this is to be mailed to the local GSF and the other 12 Houses.

## TTY-TITY DEMONSTRATION

The intent of Ivy City demonstration maneuver is to increase the visability of Ivy City, create the symbol of permanence, ensure that local people are in charge and promote economic stabilization.

- 1. We will create rationale for how often a methods day course will be held and recruit 15-20 community leaders from all programs, using accumulative trained leadership as teachers for future courses.
- 2. In order to launch the Ivy Ciry Corporation quickly, 20 shares of ICCO used to be sold by April Oth at \$50 per share, by writing an article

## RECRUITMENT OF CONSULTANTS/AUXILIARY

A large number of people in the Atlanta Region have been impacted over the past two years by the work of the ICA and have shown great interest in the initiation of an HDP in North Carolina. In spite of the fact that the region has never been known as a "strong-movement" region, the key to HDP recruitment will be the mobilization of the region's latent guardian potential into an active guardian network. This will be done through attendance by some at the national guardian's meeting in April. Also, a regional guardians meeting will be held in Week 2 of Quarter IV. The guardians will be encouraged to take responsibility for the N.C. HDP including, among other things, the recruitment of the consultants and auxiliary.

#### INKIND

The Carolina project is being launched in the wake of a successful Town Meeting campaign where inkinding was done extensively, with over 220 different cources contributing. Many sources in N.C. also contributed to the PACE HDP, so we return with a winning story of HDP expansion. The vulnerability lays in the fact that we do not have a comprehensive enough vision to push all the appropriate sources. Also, there is a tension between using Day I troops for inkinding vs. self-support. The next moves are to get a "needs" list from Pace, engage colleagues in this task, and to launch the Affort out of our Charlotte stronghold.

## PRE-CONSULT ACTIVITIES

Advantages are expertise and wisdom from other projects, the training time in Pace, and our clarity on the role of town meeting in project preparation. A major vulnerability is the practics involved in the move of the house and troops to the site and concerns related to relocation of personnel. Major tasks include: setting up the town meeting, setting up local authorization, doing a local survey, preparing the consult facility, and involving colleagues and townspeople in consult prep committees.

#### THE CONSULT

The N.C. HDP concilitation scheduled for Week 11 will depend upon the global wisdom which has been gathered from the experience of colleagues around the world as they have sought to design the consult method so that a maximum effort is given to the community engagement as well as effective comprehensive planning. The consult will be carried o; ut so that local people are able to be fully engaged in all methodologies and procedures which will allow them to invest their being into the consult. Experts and consultants will be encouraged to employ skills critical to project actuation during the consult week. A coordination task will be carried out which will channel into the consult the necessary expertise which is particularly important for the N.C. HDP.

#### SITE SELECTION

The major advantage in site selection is the 108 completed town meetingm in North Carolina, the excellent framing and funding from the past two years work, the development of a strong colleague and guardian network, and anticipation of the project in the state. In addition, six counties have already been searched. The major vulnerability is lack of regional centrality in most N.C. site possibilities. Also, we are in danger of letting framing and funding advantages overwhelm other priorities in the choice of a site. In the next two weeks, one day is suggested for a research visit with Howard Lee and others in Raleigh to secure advice and one day is suggested for intensive searching in the counties of the "tobacco road" area of the state. Areas in the south couast of N.C. or even central S.C. cannot be ruled out completely at this time.

#### **AUTHORIZATION**

The N.C. HDP will establish an authorization network by week 7 which will utilize existing advantage which includes: one completed campaign which was fully funded by the state, assistance received from state agencies and businesses, and good impressions made upon state economic, church and political leaders. It is necessary to include various middle level state bureaucrats who were bypassed during the town meeting campaign. Authorization will require the creation of a grid of the organizational structures which exist within the political and economic networks across the state. Guardians will be involved in the authorization thrust which will discern the key visits to be made which will include Howard Lee, Lee Hammond and the Governor's Office.

#### FUNDING AND SELF-SUPPORT

The North Carolina IIDP finds itself standing with significant advantages both in local and global funding. Recently, ITT contributed \$600,000 for 3 different countries in the world. Mary R. Babcock and Duke Power Co. have given funding for No. Carolina Town Meeting campaign. At their request, a proposal for \$100,000 for funding the first yearsof the project has been submitted. One significant national breakopen in self-support has been the securing of VISTA salaries. Vulnerability is seen in existing Charlotte self-support debt and the fact that VISTA salaries are not available until October. Major moves within weeks 2-5 of Quarter IV would be to make application for VISTA salaries, relocate the existing facility, use guardian meetings for the project and for self-support, to make slide presentations to key sector churches, follow-up on the Reynolds proposal, do a major foundation funding blitz, and finally to use immediate troops to secure six weeks of double jobbing.

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## MEXICAN AMERICAN HDP

#### SITE SELECTION

Major advantages in site selection for South Texas include previous site hunt treks with existing records, as well as extensive visitation and coverage from Town Meetings. The major local network of Roman Catholic churches is readily accessible and complemented by the support of Bishops Drury and Flores. A large number of local leaders are friends thru their experience of Town Meeting and will also be of help in obtaining local authorization. Vulnerable points for selection are the lack of sites close to San Antonio or Corpus Christi, along with political controversy in Mexican American and border communities. Therefore, it is necessary to equip a pre-site selection team to pull together existing research data, check with key Town Meeting grads and check out local guides in order to replication in mind.

#### **FUNDING**

In the arena of funding we have reached a high advantage point with a variety of contacts in both the public and private sector, having a large number of old colleagues, a vast resource of new Town Meeting participants, having seen key statewide figures and having several foundations ready to give us financial support. One avenue of support lies within the Churches, as for as troop availability, financial support and auxiliary potential. Our vulnerabilities are critical at the point of self-support monies and the fact that there has been no major funding actualized in Texas. Some of the immediate tasks necessary are: Vista application, visiting key foundations for South Texas, brocure printed, prioritize first twenty five visits to key figures and schedule a Town Meeting in Sarita.

#### AUTHORIZATION

In the arena of authorization are advantages which lie with the county-wide coverage of Town Meeting. Along with the Town Meeting events is included authorization, sources of funding, troop reserve and a winning story for local community growth. We have countless letters, articles, and names we can use at any time. Our vulnerabilities are primarily in the realm of Mexican-American support. We have not seen any key Mexican leaders nor researched the important Mexican networks. We need to visit key Mexican leaders, and prioritize our crucial authorization visits on the state, regional and local levels. Some key figures on the top of the list would be Governor's office, Senator Bentson, Bishops, and the Chamber of Commerce.

#### MEXICAN AMERICAN HDP

#### RECRUITMENT

In the arena of recruitment of Consultants and auxiliary our colleagues and past experience with Town Meeting will be very useful. Old colleagues with and without consult experience abound. The recent continental mailing from centrum and the upcoming Town Meeting assembly will create an atmosphere of excitement and anticipation. Permeation, church and Mexican American networks and contacts stand ready and open as potential sources of recruits. And, graduation of academy participants is very timely. But we have not yet drawn up a prospect list and our timeline is short (3 months at maximum). We will also be competing with 11 other projects for recruits. We therefore propose to use house collegiums to draw up prospect lists with personal contact assignments and a reporting design. We propose an immediate phone blitz of the mass mail print-out from centurm. We will also contact universitieis, Catholic volunteer programs and visit Town Meeting grads. Also we can ask the Bishop to assign a priest to complete the model of 1 academy grad, 1 existing HDP person, 1 movement colleague, and 1 new person.

#### IN KIND

A past history of doing inkind in several areas and also the more recent experience of Texas TM manuevers has broken loose new avenues of sources, national contacts; and developed common expertise which allows us to inkind everything from meals to rooms to cars and anything else we need. The vulnerable point or disadvantage in inkinding for a project is a sense of overwhelmedness by the size of the task, the geography and the lack of common corporate story. Another major disadvantage is availability to troops and time aside from auxilliary staff. The quantity of goods needed for pre consult, post consult, and consult requires large donations by big companies or multiple small donations. In order to establish a usable inkind system, a tracking chart that is easy to use, comprehensive recording system, a method of acknowledging contributions needs to be established. Secondly, a list of needs for the first three months of HDP needs to be made, both for the consult as well as the establishment and initiation phases. Thirdly, a set of priorities needs to be established as to what needs to be done in or near a HDP site and by the houses in the region. In addition personnell needs to be assigned and accountability held across the state. Fourthly, a transportation and coordination model needs to be designed to allow timely pick up from sources and delivery to HDP site at or before time of need in order to keep inkinded items at peak quality and demand. For example, food, a method of storage at site needs to be designed to be received by visitors.

#### PRE CONSULT ACTIVITY

The advantage of initiating a Human Development Project in the spring of the year is that people are ready to begin doing new things. Another great advantage that we have in Texas is that we are springboarding off of the great victory of doing Texas in one quarter which provides trained tropps, internal excitement, and numerous Town Meeting stories from across the state. This all works to help build community excitement. Vulnerability faces us in the arena that the auxiliary troops have three unique full-time demands: 1) Continuing self-support until the and of the quarter 2) Establishing authorization, inkind and development and 3) establishing the base on site. Another disadvantage is the fact that the consult team will potentially be in slight confusion due to the fast pace of establishing #A HDP's simultaneously. The necessary tasks are: 1) To elicit an invitation from the community; 2) Locating and moving into a suitable Religious House 3) Locating consultant Housing and a consult site 4) A community wide Town Meeting including all ages needs to be held to help create excitement and a vision of what the consult and project can do '5) A community planning session needs to be held to allow the community to get engaged in preparing for the consult and a sign up list of enablement teams and local consultants needs to be started to further enhance the excitement. A baseline geophysical survey needs to be done to provide data for the consult, government applications, and for history

#### CONSULT

The consult week maneuver will be strengthened by the symbolic power of the 12 USA Human Development Projects, the very real possibility of key figures present, e.g. the Bishop, and the movement's own depth of experience with fown Meeting, particularly across Texas. We face the challenge of securing housing and facility for the consult week in a location very probably lacking in ; such resources. Other arenas needing to be dealt with will be the language and ensuring the committment of consultants. Necessary steps in preparing for the consult week will include: ensuring the presence of kew symbolic figures, representatives from other HDP's and the adequacy of other consultant resources; engaging the community as hosts for the consult and giving careful thought to enablement gun assignments in arenas of food, decor, and procurement of materials; and ensuring continual implementation during the consult week.

#### POST-CONSULT

The key to the post consult maneuver will be to utilize the momentum at the consult to immediately move the project out of the planning stage and into strong sustained actualization. The advantages of high excitement and motivity, the presence of outside expertise, and the high visibility provided by the consult week can be used to overcome the sense of letdown and the questions of how to begin on the massiveness of the task ahead which makes the post consult period vulnerable. Steps which will insure the winning of the post consult maneuver include ensuring the inkind production of the document; recruitment of consultants to include the post consult week (or more if possible) and immediate visible activity including the creation of miracles, engagement of auxiliary staff and community members in both actuation work and document creation. The immediate beginning of a weekly time design will be essential. Finally, the immediate post consult weeks will be critical for continued work toward ongoing funding.

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Authorization is strong with State Governmental Officals and influential colleagues. Oklahoma 100 provides an opportunity to establish local support across the State supported by printed documents and follow-through reports. Participate of economic institute programming in the past offer another channel for winning authorization. Vulnerabilities include the need for statewide framing for funding from community development agencies and contacts with the United Methodist, Episcopal, and catholic churches. Statewide authorization calls will include State and U.S. Senators and Representatives. Key pusiness leaders and agency directors will also by contacted. Special emphasis will be placed on county level authorization from the county judge, agricultural agents, school superintendents and other administrators both civic and religious.

Peaches and Peanut Maneuver - We will assign Bob Knutsen to represent the area in the Georgia Town Meeting campaign, to be conducted during weeks 1 thru 8.

The North Dakota 23 - We will hold one Town Meeting in each of the 23 remaining counties in North Dakota through use of a mail set-up campaign with two full-time troops and occasional help from Cannonball. Wks 1 - 6

The Rocky Mountain 17 - We will hold one Town Meeting in each of the 17 counties remaining in Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado and Utah during weeks 1 - 6 using appropriate circuiters, metro and house troops in each state.

Fort Belknap Consult - We will hold a one day consult with the Fort Belknap Indian Reservation to be set up through the Inyan Wakagapi project staff and to be held week 5.

Impact Saturation: In order to provide experience in what "saturation" might look like in the future we propose the following demonstrations:

These will be implemented at appropriate times in conjunction with the Cibeque HDP.

Special and appropriate extension impact near the San Francisco, Seattle, Los Angeles, Denver and Fhoenix houses will be planned during weeks 1 - 9 and implemented during weeks 10 - 13. This could include any or all of the impact events.

## ENGAGEMENT FOR PRIMAL COMMUNITY

## HDP Showcase:

By June 30th Area San Francisco will have a showpiece in Inyan Wakagapi. Taking advantage of the present momentum, the Auxilliary of 8 along with 3 volunteers and 30 full time CETA employees now on board will create a shiny penny for all the world to come see. In this maneuver of doment, we will accelerate all social programs through initiating a youth group, training day care teachers and getting our day care license, initiate an elders group, a young mothers group and will train local people in GED classes and Town Meeting methods and hold Town Meetings in the other six districts of the reservation.

In economic expansion we will see the expansion of the community store to three times its size, the initiation of an industry, a credit union, a green house and 20 acre truck farm and a tool repair shop connected with a community Junk Park.

In creating living environment we will build fences around 86 yards and create 5 demonstration houses, erect 4 parks and playgrounds and two multi-purpose playfields, reconstruct the Community Plaza, paint murals, erect 36 street signs, light the highway sign and remove 284 abandoned cars.

In solidifying community engagement we will initiate regular community cleanup, reorganize the Project Board along task oriented thrust, hold 6 Town Meetings and two community celebrations, recruit four local Vista volunteers and twelve consultants to May consults. We will solidify stake care through orchestrating community beautification at the stake level.

# Rural HDP Initiation:

Projects in Richgrove, Elk River, and Cibecue will officially begin with the consult opening May 28th. This will involve the full time of 6 project auxilliary initially and specialized forces from the metroes and regional houses. We move from the points of advantage of authorization of Town Meetings, stated interest by State agencies and organizations, the Camonball story and the readiness of the movement. Out of area councils project directors will be named and particular tasks assigned to houses and metros. The auxiliary directors will quickly pull together site research and establish residency near targeted site. Along with the area prior, the auxiliary directors will initiate visits and receive the receive the community invitations by weeks 3 and 4. Consult preparation will commence with creation of community task forces assuring their participation from the beginning. As the auxiliary move into local sites, week II

regional forces will begin to do catalytic events such as stake visitation, Town Meetings and community work days. Local authorization will happen through selected visitation of community leadership at all levels. Baseline data will be gathered through these visitations. The auxiliary leadership along with regional forces will complete auxiliary recruitment and assure consultant participation at the consult. The inkinding necessary to pull off the consult will be coordinated through regional houses in consultation with the auxiliary. The converging of all forces week 8 will be needed to hold the consult. During the consult, plans for funding schemes and program implementation will be laid to begin the day after the consult is completed.

## SUSTENANCE OF SERVANT FORCE

## Staff Self-Support:

The Quarter IV self support maneuver will involve each house raising \$230 in "Odds and Ends", similar to last year's cookie jar. Also each house will develop from regional colleagues enough money to cover the April house check which will be deleted. In addition the area priorship will work with management centrum to effect the transfer of our Religious House equity to our investment portfolio. The Phoenix House will complete the sale of the former house property, clearing \$15,000. The area will raise \$1,800 from the "Regional Family Fling", \$3,600 from the "Order Colleague Crash", both to be coordinated by the area strike force.

# Program Development:

\$30,000 is raised from 75 consultants.

Seed money of \$30,000 is raised from Guardians for 3 projects.

Up to 40 targeted proposals for program implementation are submitted: 10 to corporations, 10 to foundations, 10 to government agencies, and 10 to private organizations and patrons to develop \$30,000 per project.

Development blitz during consultation and proposal writing blitz during implementation week.



Dear George:

I would like to introduce to you, by means of this letter, the work of the Institute of Cultural Affairs, a private voluntary group implementing local socio-economic development projects around the world. The Institute has staff located in 25 nations and is currently involved in 24 demonstration projects and, in addition, a replication project involving 250 villages in Maharashtra State, India. The Institute is supported by private foundations, corporations, government program grants and concerned individuals.

The Institute uses a method that encourages strong local community involvement in both the planning and actuating of the projects. With an emphasis on practical in-the-field training, the self-help approach has been found to be effective in bringing about long lasting economic and social development.

In Latin America the Institute has established one project in Caño Negro, Venezuela, outside Caracas in the State of Miranda. The success of this project has led to considerable interest on the part of other Latin Americans in their work. I have been advised that in response to invitations to set up projects in a number of nations four additional sites will be selected in the next three months.

The Bank is in the final stages of negotiations with the Institute in order to make a grant to support a training school in Caño Negro for local people from each of the four new sites. The School is designed to equip villagers with methods and skills needed to assume leadership in areas vital to village development.

CONCERNED WITH THE HUMAN FACTOR IN WORLD DEVELOPMENT

#### GCF RESOUNDS GLOBALLY

Seoul: The village of Shin Chon II Ri in Kangwon-do (near Kuh Du E Ri) held a Town Meeting with 100 citizens while two more GCFs are being set up in Chung Ju and Choong Ju while a workshop leaders training session was being conducted for 20 faculty of the Ehwa Girls High School.

Kansas City: Back from his two weeks spent orchestrating GCFs in French in Quebec, Canada, Keith Fieldhammer reports that towns are experiencing much the same issues in Ontario as in Missouri.

Bristol, England: (Exerpt from their newsletter in Neyland, Wales) Neyland is a community living on borrowed time. There are thousand like it in Britain. There are millions throughout the world. How seldom people meet together now! Once there were public gatherings every week. The plaza drew us all together. Now, we sit at home behind closed doors, belonging more to Washington than to Neyland, where once storm doors were only shut to keep out storms and were always wide open to people. But it is no good sighing for the past. The old order changeth, yielding to the new. It is a pleasure to Write in support of those who seek a new sense of community in this tired old town. Perhaps it is not too late to reclain that borrowed time. (The newsletter also included the challenges, contributors list and quotes from the TM day.)

Tokyo: Tokyo has had two GWFs in English, translated into Japanese, and one in Karasuyama in Japanese. Miss Masayo Kashiyama, a student at the International College of Sophia University, gave the speeches. Two members of the "Lifelong Integrated Education Center" in Tokyo lead the workshops. Aija Karakowski of the Oyubari HDP and Fr. George Karasuyama added their expertise in Japanese to the more than 75 in attendance. The Tokyo international community will hold its TM in May.

Vancouver: A GCF was neld in Golden, in conjunction with East Kootenay Community College and the National Film Board. A GCF for Mount Waddinton regional district was initiated by telephone and mail. Forum interest is sparked in Sparwood. A letter came in from Kaiser Resources (coal mining) expressing interest in GCFs.

And the gold goes on! Hawaii, Pennsylvania, Quebec Saskatchewan, Manitoba Virginia, North Carolina, Idaho, the Yukon, North West Territories, Iowa, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Mississippi, Alaska, New Mexico, Utah . . .



#### TOWN MEETING: IOWA ASSEMBLY

On March 18, 1978, representatives from Iowa's 80 yellowed counties were hosted by the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation at their new facility in West Des Moines. The TM Assembly had as its theme "The Future of Small Rural Communities." Over 235 Iowans showed up to find out what other small communities are doing to tackle common problems.

The Iowa TMs were held on a one per county basis over a five-month period, November 1977 through March 1978. Of the 80 TMs, 25 were held in communities in the under 250 population range with an average attendance of 31. The largest number of meetings, 45, were held in communities with population between 250 and 500. The remaining 15 meetings were in communities of 500 to 1,000 with an average attendance of 44. All of the TMs were open to both town and country people, and, overall, a good balance was achieved. In many of the TMs, people talked briefly about the length of time they had lived in the community. Surprisingly, there was a good mixture of "old timers" and "newcomers." The fact that most of the meetings began with a potluch supper, with an effort made to extend personal invitations, drew a wide spectrum of people

The product of the day was a 50-page document containing a challenges chart, proposals chart, and "activating events" for each of the 20 proposals. This was where the group got down to practicality, with such proposals as new industry, business expansion, clean-up and beautification, community projects, community public relations, law enforcement and senior engagement. Each participant took home with him over 16 implementing steps for the 20 activating events to use in his local community. Other helpful tools included in the document were song sheets. Town Meeting methods charts and participants' names. The input of the 80 TM communities led to the creation of a clear, concise working tool that is bound to change the face of rural lowa.

GLOBAL COMMUNITY FORUM

#### OKLAHOMA 100 ONE YEAR LATER

On March 26, 1977, over 100 TMs were held in the state of Oklahoma. An intensive six-week blitz of recruitment, involving the circuiting services of many volunteers led up to that famous Saturday when TM orchestrators converged on the state. The TMs were as varied as the towns they represented. One year later, a "report" has been compiled from the towns responding to a questionaire sent to local TM hosts. The questions asked were: What have bee the activities and accomplishments in your town since the TM? How have individuals become involved? What accomplishment has had the greatest impact? How is your community different now? The response to the questionaire was overwhelming. Some reports were hand-written notes with lists of accomplishments scratched on a slip of paper. Other towns sent newspaper articles. Some typewritten reports were submitted. Where newsletters were an outgrowth of the TM, samples were included in the report. The following is a potpouri of images which chronicled the events of March 26:

Sterling: This community's 700 residents aren't letting money hassles get them down — they are hitting the rodeo circuit, holding drawings and drumming up contributions so they can prove Sterling's golden years haven't passed by. So far, Sterling's new 14-member town association has come up with a rodeo arena and is working on luring a bank, a clinic and a teen-town — and they are even holding weekly drawings to scratch up cash. "Sterling didn't have anything when I first moved here," association member Bill Harris, who bought the town's grocery store a year ago, admitted. "It still doesn't — but you better bet we're working on it." — exerpt from Sterling newspaper article

Depew: We have had so many projects we are doing for our community. Saturday we had a work day to help the city officials to work on our fire house and city hall. We had a big dinner that day. We had several people in our community to eat with us along with the men that were working. We are working more as a community than we ever have in the history of Depew. June Hilbert

Lawton: There have been different people involved since our original meeting. Several hundred new people are taking part. The greatest impact has been a general awakening of average citizen participation in practically every aspect of community life. K.A. McClure, Postmaster

Burns Flat: Annexation of 900 homes on former Air Base, consolidated policing between town and industrial complex, initiating procedures to obtain city water system, additional one cent sales tax voted. Richard T. Schaffer, school main. engr.

Erick: I believe that our TM made a significant contribution in bringing about the following projects: senior citizens center established, Main Street cleared of old buildings, museum committee formed, funds for construction of a new tennis court, plans made for a retirement housing project. J.W. Rosson

Meeker: The Town Meeting group sponsored a "get acquainted" reception for the newly elected city councilmen. As a result, we feel Meeker citizens are more concerned with the town's political scene. At the reception, a group of school children sang the Meeker song that was written at the TM. They also sang "Something to Sing About." —Celia Graham

#### GEMEINDEFORUMS IN THE RUHR VALLEY

"Today marks the beginning of a new time for our community, a time of action!" Statements like this one, made during the Plenary of a Town Meeting in Duisburg-Hochheide, have highlighted a series of 17 TMs in the Ruhr Valley area of Germany. With 101/2 million people, this 100 kilometer strip city between Duisberg and Dortmund is the most densely populated port of Europe. The major cities of Duisburg, Oberhausen, Bottrop, Essen, Bochum and Dortmund are small communities of every sort - old villages, company settlements, new high rise communities, isolated dock areas, torn-up inner city areas and lovely suburban communities and model cities. It is an area facing complicated problems, with mines closing, the foreign worker population increasing while the German population decreases, and unemployment among the youth a growing concern.



Groundwork was laid for a major Town Meeting maneuver in this area during the summer of 1977, with pilot Forums in communities in Essen, Oberhausen and Duisburg. The Protestant church proved to be a powerful network with the pastor serving as entry contact into most of the communities where Forums took place. In 1978, set-up teams made the Ruhr Valley their home and picked up on the earlier contacts and intensified the Forum invitation with the story, "We will only be here until Easter." Of the 17 Forums that materialized, most were full-day events with a four-week preparation period. They were held in all types of communities, with an average of 100 people participating. Participants frequently asked, "How do we give concrete form to the beginning we have made today!" Very often proposals were implemented before the plenary was finished - letters written, phone calls made, groups organized. The ever-recurring refrain of "we have learned to work together, let us continue " proved true when steering committees began the building of new structures, usually composed of members of the churches as well as from secular organizations. The profound response of residents of highrise communities to the TM was particularly heartening. The reinforcement of the community's self-image was always a rousing experience, as new songs were written, sung and applauded. The childrens' program was another highlight.

In Wesel-Feldmark, a drama took place during the plenary. A long-standing eyesore in the community was a hole in the marketplace. At the end of the TM, someone stood up and said, "In my backyard there is a beautiful tree. Next Wednesday I am going to dig it up and plant it in the hole. Who will be there to help me? Twelve people stood immediately and the following Wednesday the tree was planted.

#### THE PATRONS' TREK

Fifteen individuals representing ten families spent 23 days together visiting Human Development Projects in India, Africa, and Europe. From February 7 until March 11, this group experimented with a Development maneuver designed to capture the imagination and create commitment to the funding of ICA Projects around the world.

The Patrons Trek, called an "International Odyssey," engaged participants in site visits to local villages at Maliwada and Maliwadgaon in India, at El Bayad in Egypt, and at Kreuzberg Ost in Berlin, Germany. Around these occasions, the group was impacted by tours through the cities of London and Bombay, Delhi, Katmandu, Cairo and East Berlin. Visits to the Ajanta and Elora caves, the Taj Mahal and the pyramids underscored the power of former gifts to civilization.

The preparation for a future Patrons' Trek is underway. Registration for the month of November is now being accepted.

#### **ENGAGEMENT FOR EDUCATION**

In Chicago the Student House has sent seven graduating eighth grade students to the Human Development Training School: Caracas and a year's participation in HDPs in Latin America. Those launching the experiment are Ray Knutsen, Kevin Woodward, Peter Whitney, Kathy Tomlinson, Helen Worden, Trudi Meuller and Becky Appenfelder. They understand themselves to be pioneering on behalf of the other 20 graduating eighth graders in the Student House and youth everywhere. During the year the students will continue their studies through the American School correspondence course which is now an accredited option for all deployed youth and may compose much or all of their high school training. Perhaps as significant as any other aspect of the program is the fact that it is being funded entirely from the earnings of a part-time job of bagging and distributing advertisements which the Student House has undertaken over the past six months. In addition to being a relevant rite of passage from Student House structures to the adult structures of a House, the ninth grade year of deployment to HDPs promises to yield a new depth of understanding of high school training methods and to challenge the selfhood journey of each student while it engages the student in creating the sign of a mobilized Phase I across the globe.


# operations

MOVE, ACT, AND KEEP TAB

One of the tasks of the Continental Council held quarterly at Maliwada is to create the common models and operating structures of the Nava Gram Prayas. The March Council produced several field manuals which are currently being used by Project auxiliary and other NGP staff involved in the Maharashtra replication. The TAB Manual (Tactical Action Book), a spiral bound workbook, is the handbook of the local auxiliary staff in keeping track on a daily and weekly basis of a quarter's tactical action. MOVE (Monitoring Operations for Village Engagement) is the companion to village monitoring teams. It contains visitation designs, hints, constructs and procedures for effective village monitoring and town calling. ACT (Auxiliary Corporate Thrust) includes contexts, procedures, formats, designs, rationales and operating principles for the corporate life of an auxiliary to daily maintain its thrust in action. The Replication Consult Manual consists of designs, procedures and checklists for doing the three-day Replication Consult. The Acceleration Manual has guidelines, models, checklists and the design and schedule for one-week acceleration treks for Quarter IV. Guild and Stake Manuals were also created for use of the village auxiliary in conducting these meetings. They include designs, formats, and specific curriculum for the quarter. Quarter IV, students in the HDTS will be introduced to these tools while, in the field, they will be used to further test and commonize the operation of NGP.

### management GLOBAL FISCAL SYSTEMS

In a recent trip to Asia, Management Centrum reviewed the operation of its global fiscal systems. At Hong Kong and Singapore Nexus the procedures of the new Nexus financial manual were discussed and report formats were clarified. The manual has been particularly helpful in establishing a common financial system and daily operating procedures. It has also paved the way for two national audits in Australia and the Philippines, with word coming from India that they have just completed their 1977 audit. Helpful discussions on global cash flow indicated the need for further reflection at the Global Council Quarter I. Particular issues raised had to do with funding global treks, currency pools and transfer mechanisms. With all the systems now in place, the Centrum will next turn its attention in this arena toward putting out the first global income and expense statement.





#### HUMAN DEVELOPMENT AND THE THIRD CAMPAIGN

Human Development Projects around the world have become a focus of engagement that has catalyzed a broad trend toward concrete and effective service to the globe in local communities. In India, the *Nava Gram Prayas* is a grassroots movement toward the reconstruction of rural villages that presently numbers 500 full-time volunteers and involves many other part-time consultants and short-term volunteers. Among these are four residents of Kawangware (Kenya) who, after participating in the HDP

in their own village, raised the money to go to India and help out with the work there. Another group of Kawangware residents—a construction crew—after building the new auxiliary residence in Kamweleni, the new Kenya Project, has requested to follow the Kenya expansion from village to village demonstrating and training local people. In the Philippines, ten college women volunteered for a one-month sojourn at the Sudtonggan HDP. In Egypt, 100 Jesuit School students gave three days of work to the El Bayad HDP, along with 16 architecture students who designed a village plaza. Oyubari HDP in Japan has a regular influx of students from Sapport who volunteer on a one-month basis. In Mississippi, 65 employees of Rank Xerox Corporation spent a day working with the local people in the Delta Pace HDP to build a park. In addition, many individuals from various backgrounds have volunteered their time, sometimes at considerable personal cost, to make significant contributions in Human Development.

Rick Luedke, a business consultant from Milwaukee, participated in two economic acceleration treks. He spent two weeks in the Cano Negro HDP (Caracas) and three weeks at the Isle of Dogs HDP (London). At the Isle of Dogs he helped to create an industry brochure and set up the bookkeeping systems for the Bulk Buying Enterprise which will lower the price of consumer goods to conform to prices "off island."

Jan Ames, a preschool director from Oak Park, Illinois, who volunteered for the Delta Pace acceleration trek, helped to renovate the facility and inkind construction materials, furnishings and equipment for the new community restaurant. Size also researched the next stage of the Worm Farm and Chicken Industry, accelerating this community's march toward self-sufficiency.

Rich Wampler, an emergency room surgeon from Portland, Oregon, who participated in the El Bayad HDP consult 18 months ago, has since been involved in acceleration treks in Ijede (Nigeria), Inyan Wakagapi (North Dakota) and, most recently, in India. In Ijede he played a major role in leading the acceleration work. In India he worked with other medical personnel to construct and launch a Health Caretakers School to train staff from all of Maharashtra in local health care. He has made Human Development a part of his professional life, his work schedule, his total care.

Bob Rye, a Wisconsin Farmer, spent six weeks in El Bayad working with the local community and the auxiliary to reclaim desert land.

Bill Henshaw, a banker from Bellingham, Washington, ten months ago participated in the acceleration that prepared Kwangyung II for the World's Fair. He started a community grocery store which from the beginning was a financial success as well as a service to the community. In order to return home with the confidence that this fledgling enterprise would not flounder, he created a manual of management procedures so that the local people could keep track of things. The Korean government has now made that manual available to local communities across the country.

Audrey Ayres, a middle-aged housewife from Naperville, Illinois was a part of the acceleration trek that visited several Projects in SEAPAC. At the Hai Ou HDP (Taiwan) she researched and set up suppliers for the community store and helped to set up the Duck Farm. At Kelapa Dua (Indonesia) she set up the first stage of a cottage sewing industry. She also helped with the launching of the new Philippines Project. At all three locations, Audrey was key to catalyzing the engagement of village women in the Projects.

David Butler, a Minneapolis lawyer who was a part of the same SEAPAC trek, joined the team in Nam Wai (Hong Kong). Working closely with local Guardians, an architect and a community developer, he helped with the legal wording of the new community corporation by-laws, breaking loose a way for the community to maintain control of its land and to develop it rather than selling out to an outside developer. This is an exciting new happening at this moment in Nam Wai's and Hong Kong's history. For David this was, in his words, "the most rewarding work I've done as a lawyer."

There are many other stories like these to be told and a great many yet to be enacted. Short-term expertise is needed in:

#### HUMAN DEVELOPMENT: THE NAVA GRAM PRAYAS

Since September 1, 1977, 27 new HDPs have been initiated in Maharashtra, India, bringing the total number of replication villages to 41. For those doing The Mighty 250 every quarter feels like the beginning of a new year.

The quarter begins and ends Week 9 with the Continental Council held at Maliwada in which the quarter's assignments are made and the new villages are commissioned. The Council comes at the conclusion of the eight-week HDTS in which ten villagers from each of the selected villages are trained to be project auxiliary staff. Immediately following the Council, new project auxiliaries will relocate in their assigned villages, and begin preparation for the Consult which formally launches a new project. From two to four weeks later the Consult will take place and project actuation will commence

While the School is in session the next round of villages is being selected, representatives of each of the new villages journey to the divisional pilot village for a Demonstration Visit in which they see with their own eyes what could happen in their villages, and Gram Sabhas (Town Meetings) are conducted in each of the new villages to secure the commitment of the total village to be a Human Development Project and a part of the Maharashtra scheme. The actuating villages are monitored by the division gun, an Indian national, who at least once a quarter visits each village in the division. (Maharashtra has four divisions.) Within the division a group of two to four villages is the responsibility of extra-national, i. e., non-Indian, support forces who circuit from village to village spending two to three days in each village each week backing up the project director, usually a Training School graduate with three to six months previous project experience, and maintaining relationships within the district and between projects. Bi-weekly Project Directors Meetings, held mostly now at the division level and once or twice quarterly at the state level, provide a corporate planning, reporting, coordinating, training and spiritizing function for all projects. Social and economic acceleration treks to villages over three months old enlist the support of the public and private sector in linking up resources and expertise necessary to accomplish the rapid development of the villages. Currently 29 acceleration treks are scheduled for April and May. Efforts are now being made to establish a Guardians Advisory Panel, an informal group of skilled and prestigious persons to whom the village staff could turn for guidance in establishing new programs and maintaining ongoing acceleration in every Project.

This is the activity of Human Development going on in Maharashtra. They call it the Nava Gram Prayas (New Village Effort). "No longer is it Maliwada or Kendur or Vaviharsh that sustains us," said one Project Director in his State of Nava Gram Prayas Address at the last Council. "It is Nava Gram Prayas — a movement, a network." By June, 1979, that movement will have put 232 villages on the road to Human Development.

# LATIN AMERICAN HDPs ARE LAUNCHED San Miguele

Global Priority Seven,
Latin American Beachheads, is a fact. Areas
Rio de Janeiro (Bananeiras, Brazil), Buenos
Aires (Sol de Septiembre, Chile), Havana (Woburn Lawn, Jamaica) and
Mexico City (San Miguel,
Guatemala) have launched
their HDPs. Along with Cano
Negro in Area Caracas, this
represents an HDP in five
of the six areas in Latin America.



The necessary initial national and local authorization has been going on during the past two months by one staff couple in each location, and is completed. The village selection has been finalized and school recruitment is well along the way, with funding moving. A brief sketch of the four villages follows.

Bananeiras, Brazil is a village of 900 people about an hour and a half drive northeast of Rio de Janeiro in the foothills at the end of a valley. The population is predominantly mestizo. There is no electricity, the school functions part time, and a daily bus connects the village with the city of Rio.

Woburn Lawn, Jamaica, is an entirely black village (slava descendants) of about 600 people located in the mountains an hour northeast of Kingston. There is one school through the sixth grade. The village has no electricity; housing is of adobe and cement. Sol de Septiembre, Chile, is a mestizo village of 500 in a flat valley of good farmland one half hour northwest of Santiago. Villagers work on the farms raising maize, chiles, tomatoes and sorghum. Adequate drainage is a critical need and an unused irrigation system needs to be utilized.

San Miguel, Guatemala, located one and a half hours northeast of Guatemala City, is a village of about 1,000 mestizo inhabitants who do subsistance agriculture of corn and beans. A health team visits the village one afternoon a week. The village has no electricity. Water is currently secured from shallow wells.

All of the four locations are working toward having 20 nationals (10 from the village and 10 other nationals) form the auxiliary staff with the first step being attendance at the Human Development Training School in Cano Negro, April 9 through June 4. Initial reports are that each Project already has its national staff lined up.

The Consult schedule is as follows:

Bananeiras, Brazil June 11 Woburn Lawn, Jamaica June 11 Sol de Septiembre, Chile June 25 San Miguel, Guatemala June 25

Latin America extends an invitation to global consultants to attend the Consults.

#### HDP PROGRESS REPORT

Kelapa Dua: One year ago, most villagers from Kelapa Dua HDP had never tasted vegetables or meat. They could not afford to eat any that they had grown. Their main diet was rice, krupuk (potato chips) and sometimes fish. Beginning this month, the Community Kitchen cooked 30 extra nutritious meals a day and sold them to the village. This is the beginning of a self-supporting meal program as well as a push for physical vitality. Also all the children in the preschool have gained weight. Over 124 children are in education programs.

Nam Wai: On March 1, 1978, the Nam Wai Electronics Factory opened its doors in a donated facility in the village. A shipment of 1,000 transformers was received by seven full-time employees. The factory inserts "E" and "I" metal plates into the copper wire core of the partly assembled transformers and then returns them to the contractor for final assembly. The workers produced 4,500 units the first week and 5,170 in the first four days of the second week. Within a week the factory will be ready for expansion to 10 employees toward a total of 16 in a couple months. Plans have already begun to expand the work to the complete assembly of transformer adaptors.

Sudtonggan: A government/business development foundation interviewed the villagers, evaluating two years of assistance. When asked if they could continue without ICA staff, one village teacher said, "Now we are like small babies who can just crawl, or stand only holding on, but we are learning very fast, and by next year we will be able to stand tall without assistance."

Inyan Wakagapi: The HDP was recently assigned a CETA short-term work force of 21 men and 2 women. To date they have painted walls, floors and tables and benches of the Congregational Church meeting room, delittered the community plaza and established twice weekly trash pick-up, designed and constructed a community green house, begun the renovation of a community gym for the expansion of the shopping center, created signs and decor for the shopping center, designed and painted Indian designs for the day care center, the shopping center and plaza, designed, painted and constructed street signs for all of Cannon Ball and secured the posts to install them.

#### CAPSULES OF 3 NEW VILLAGES

Kuh Du E Ri is located two and one half hours northeast of Seoul near the provinical capital, Chuncheon, of Kangwon Province. It is a village of 570 people who are descendants of the "slash and burn" farmers who formerly roamed the mountainside, cutting trees, planting and moving on. The village has piped water to 40% of the houses, many of which are mud-walled and thatch-roofed. The main cash crops are grapes, apples and peaches. The local government is providing the money to construct a village hall for the Consult, which is now under construction. The HDTS graduates have prepared a daily timeline of consult preparation with four commissions set up. The Kuh Du E Ri Consult begins April 23.

Tairgwaith is located in the Lliw Valley in the county of West Glamorgan in South Wales, population 480. The only entrance into the community is under part of a large coal washery. On two other sides are open pit mines with huge machinery and lots of dust. The remaining side is a sloping hill with a few sheep and cattle farmers. Over 80% of the working residents are employed in the coal mining industry. Within five miles of Tairqwaith are the two largest and most modern anthracite pit mines in Wales. The auxiliary has moved into the community, obtaining an old miner's flat with the help of the local councillor. The ten year old community center is being used for the Consult, with local residents making arrangements in their homes for consultants. Over 60 villagers showed up for the first steering committee meeting. The Tairgwaith Consult begins April 23.

Kamweleni is a village of about 500 located in a subsection of Machakos, Kenya. The villagers are primarily engaged in subsistence farming. They received famine relief last year. They are burdened with poor health, inadequate housing, severe water shortage and no water delivery system, advanced land desertification and educational structures. The community leadership meetings draw 85% of the adult population; more than 50% of the villagers attend stake meetings. The district forrester brought 2,000 trees for the village and demonstrated how to plant them. The community water project is begun.

#### EDGE in Action

It's February in Lorne de L'Acadie, New Brunswick, cold(-20 C), snowing(5 ft.), and the sawmill is closed until spring. The 12 members of the community sawmill staff traditionally on unemployment rolls for the season have gathered on their own time to plan their first full season of operation. The sawmill was started last August with the help of the ICA staff of the Lorne Human Development Project. Questions on the docket include: "Will there be enough saw logs for us to buy locally?" "Do we need to invest in a kiln or a chipper?" "How much working capital do we need to raise?" And above all, "What markets do we have?" EDGE was there, invited to help design management controls and systems. It was a great three days ending with new decisions and models, a victory before the victory.


#### What Price Success

EDGE received news of a new marketing campaign in the Marshalls Human Development Project (MHDP). The local businesses involved are members of the wholesale cooperative, TASC.

#### What Price Success (cont.)

These prices amount to an average reduction from the going retail price of over 11%, and due to the geographic spread mean that such price reduction is for the very poor also, those who can not afford transportation to the larger shopping center.

The practical implication for EDGE has been an effective doubling of our volume of shipments to TASC, \$34,000.00 in February to \$72,000.00 in May. More people are being helped and it is the people who need it most. The contradiction, however, comes in the demand for more credit. To buy twice as many goods means twice as much collateral (credit) is needed. So.....it's back to the drawing boards on new sources of credit.

Using this L/C collateral pool over the last two years has allowed EDGE to finance over \$800,000.00 in cash sales enabling the Marshall Islands to be one of the very few places in the world where the cost of living has decreased.
