CRIME - PUBLICITY - FEAR

In the arena of Economic Commonality the following blocks, fear of physical harm/ inferior merchandise indicate the underlying contradiction of publicity of newspaper and rumor not factual regarding crimes, which is illustrated by bad publicity regarding shopping in Dixie Square and downtown Harvey.

Guild A

COMMUNITY PRESERVATION

In the arena of community preservation the following blocks, unemployment, crime rise, and declining tax-base indicate the underlying contradiction of decline of community leadership, pride and preservation which is illustrated by businesses leaving, crime rate increase, loan funds unavailable and voter apathy.

Guild B

LACK OF CITIZENS INVOLVEMENT

In the arena of corporate welfare the following blocks, concern with personal problems, lack of education in economic problems, redlining, and lack of community services to homeowners indicate the underlying contradiction of apathy, relevant education, failure to take advantage of opportunity which is illustrated by lack of participation in meetings such as this, lack of care for property and failure to take advantage of opportunities existing.

Guild D

ECONOMIC

In the arena of economic (common production) the following blocks, fear, apathy high taxes, high wages, poor city planning originally (lack of land availability) indicate the underlying contradiction of unassured people which is illustrated by people leaving Harvey, industry leaving due to high taxes (example - Perfection Gear, Allis Chalmers - Material Handling Division).

Guild D

THE NEED FOR ECONOMIC/POLITICAL LEADERSHIP

In the arena of Economic and political, the following blocks, lack of planned efforts to obtain industry and new housing start indicate the underlying contradiction of a lack of political and economic leadership by the city administration which is illustrated by the fact there is no city dept. for economic development, no comprehensive plan for industrial expansion - only 2 new housing starts in last 4 years; and small amount of new mortgage dollars lent in Harvey.

Guild D

ECONOMIC COMMONALITY

In the arena of common distribution the following blocks, non support of local businesses, unemployment, young people moving away indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of personal and community pride which is illustrated by houses and businesses boarded up, littering and conditions of alleys.

Guild C

PARTICIPATE

In the arena of economic commonality the following blocks, lack of people involvement indicate the underlying contradiction of the dependency of people on others for their survival, causing higher taxes which is illustrated by present problems.

Guild D

INEQUITABLE JUSTICE SYSTEM

In the arena of political - corporate order and justice the following block, uneven application of the law indicates the underlying contradiction of loopholes and backlog corruption, which is illustrated by the crime rate.

Guild A

PEOPLE NOT WORKING TOGETHER

In the arena of political commonality the following block, insensitivity, indicates the underlying contradiction of polarization, which is illustrated by lack of response or action by the total community.

Guild A

THE BUCK STOPS HERE

In the arena of Harvey, Illinois politics the following blocks are poorly functioning judicial and criminal justice systems, school curriculum (political system) and inadequate city services indicate the underlying contradiction of apathy, indifference (city fathers and citizenry), lack of funds (tax base) and need for change in our judicial system which is illustrated by mishandling of the Timothy Johnson felony case, stray dogs on the streets of Harvey, Police Department inadequately staffed to protect and serve 35,000 people.

Guilds D

GOVERNMENT OF THE PEOPLE, FOR AND BY THE PEOPLE

In the arena of political systems are the following blocks, apathy and political ignorance which indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of avenues of communication by the public and misinformation by information sources which is illustrated by the local media which fail to stress local issues and lack of confidence in politicians and leaders.

Guild B

POLITICAL COMMONALITY

In the arena of political commonality the following blocks are apathy in general and lack of communication and breakdown of family structure which indicate the underlying contradiction of the lack of caring (what's the use!) which is illustrated by people not voting, breakdown of family structure, redlining and juvenile and adult crime.

Guild C

LACK OF UNDERSTANDING

In the arena of cultural commonality the following blocks are parents negligence and lack of understanding which indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of understanding each other which is illustrated by the Park District program.

Guild C

CITIZEN PARTICIPATING

In the arena of communal styles of cultural commonality the following blocks are lack of parental participation in youth program, lack of economic responsibility and lack of understanding of common problems which indicate the underlying contradiction of people who don't think participation will matter or change anything which is illustrated by people talking down Harvey, social ills of township are dumped on Harvey and lack of voting participation.

Guild C

DEVELOPMENT OF TRUST AND RESPECT

In the arena of communal wisdom the following blocks are lack of trust and respect which indicate the underlying contradiction of mistrust of those with varying ideals, and racial background which is illustrated by name-calling, social clusters and mobility of population.

Guild A

INVOLVEMENT OF YOUTH AND RELIGIOUS LEADERS

In the arena of communal styles are the following blocks, fear of safety, peer pressure, economic pressure, lack of parental involvement and lack of religious leaders outreach which indicate the underlying contradiction of turned-inwardness of leaders, fear and economic limitations which is illustrated by petty crimes, loitering vandalism, lack of participation of all age groups.

Guild A

CULTURAL COMMODITIES

In the arena of cultural commonality the following blocks are lack of funds, communication and concern for each other which indicate the underlying contradiction of unemployment and lack of industry which is illustrated by boarded up homes, industry moving out, fear, prejudice and lack of communication among people.

Guild D

IF IT'S WORTH HAVING, IT'S WORTH SAVING

In the arena of cultural commonality the following blocks are that we're all "too busy" to help remedy problems, nobody wants to take the responsibility for leadership, there is a lack in communication between parents and their children, and we all at least sometimes try to live above our means which indicate the underlying contradiction of a lack of communications and cooperation among teachers, students and parents which is illustrated by individuals who use personal business as a means to attain apathy, real estate panic peddlers who cause rapidly changing neighborhoods and the few students in any school who are troublemakers and who give students in general a bad name.

Guild D

COMMUNAL WISDOM

In the arena of communal wisdom the following blocks are citizen apathy and ignorance of issues which indicate the underlying contradiction of love and concern which is illustrated by neglect in care of private and public property, child welfare and drug addiction, lack of concern in news reporting and voter turn-out.

We, the Citizens of Harvey, in order to make Harvey a better place to live propose to make use of advisory groups, to seek and entice new industries, to utilize existing resources, to refurbish 154th Street and employ more people from Harvey and have voter and education in-service work shops through seminars once a month.

We, the Citizens of Harvey, in order to improve better government participation propose to educate the voting public through establishing accountability procedures which publicize pre-election promises.

We, the Citizens of Harvey, in order to improve our community propose to turn around the negative public image, through media campaign, promotion of literature, events and community meetings.

REDIRECTING THE POLITICAL ASPECTS OF OUR NATIONAL HOLIDAYS

We, the Citizens of Harvey, in order to have a better knowledge of our community and make ourselves better citizens and neighbors propose citizen monitoring of civic structures through court-watching by citizens having church and service organizations observe city council meetings and include citizen participation in subcommittees of the Council.

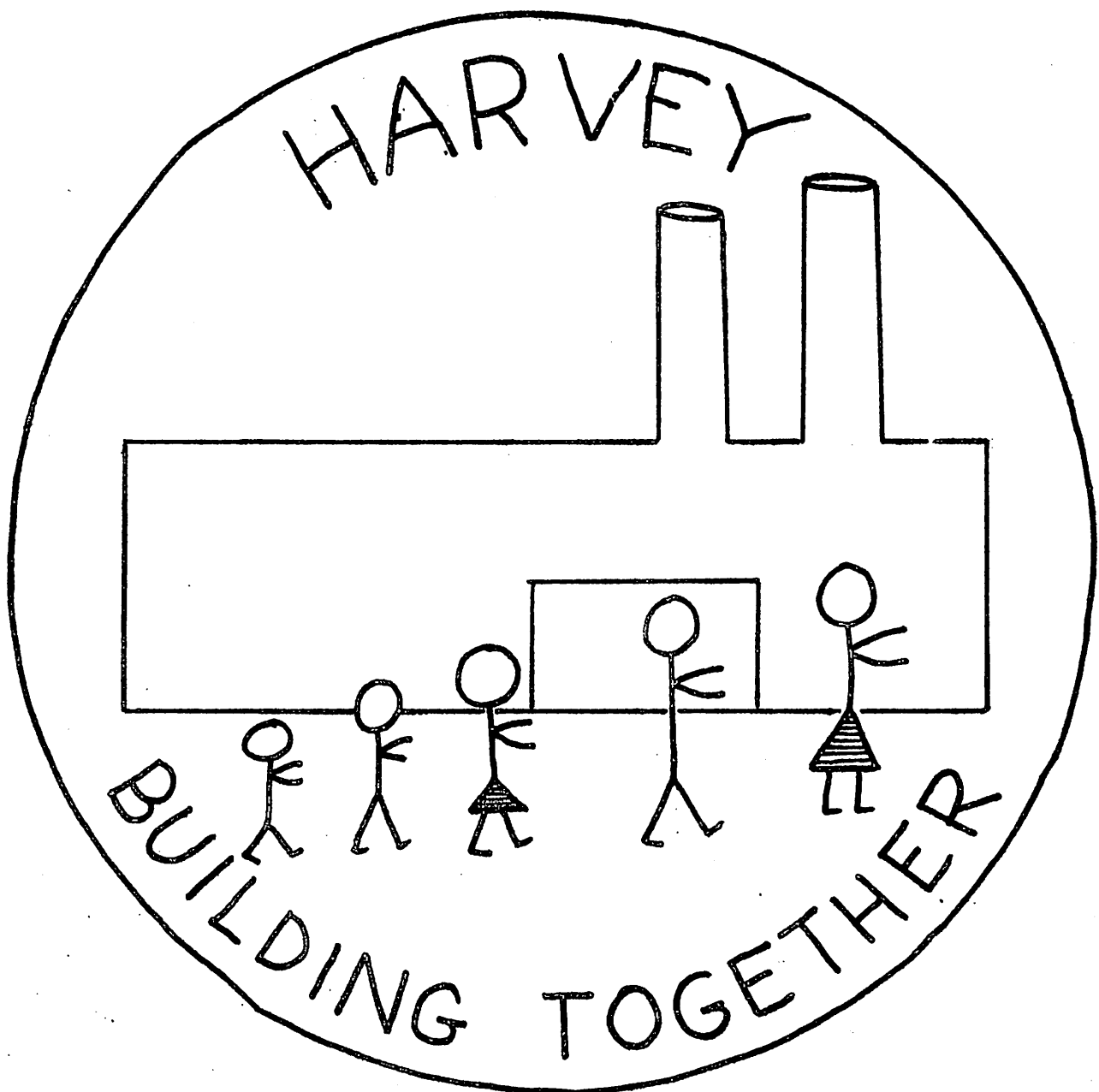

In 1893 there was the Century of Progress--Chicago World's Fair. Turlington Harvey came to the Fair and stayed to father the City of Harvey. Not only the town, but two streets were named for him. In the spirit of progress, industry and the railroads came. Our people built the original township high school, which has since become known for continuing academic excellence. Harvey can be proud of her achievements in education, sports, patriotism, and her work to achieve brotherhood.

The Harvey of today is a growing city of approximately 36,400. It has at least a dozen different types of industry, a bus line, cab company, and railroads. It has three banks, a shopping center and a complete school system. The people of Harvey are working together to solve our city's problems and stop them before they start.

Fourth of July, 1986, Harvey's mayor, along with other city officials joined in the first birthday of downtown Harvey's shopping mall. A City-wide celebration was underway with 46,000 citizens lining the downtown mall and surrounding side streets. It was grand to watch such a multitude of people involved, so full of pride. The festivities were over at 9:00 P.M. The grounds and streets were left clean. No windows were broken. Senior citizens were taken home, and everyone knew he was never alone; that good neighbor would always be there to help.

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

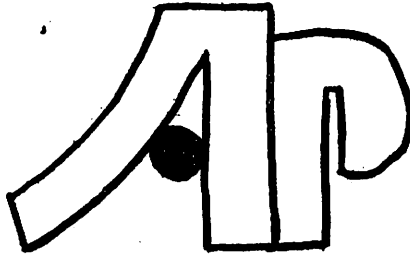
We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. . .

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And, for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

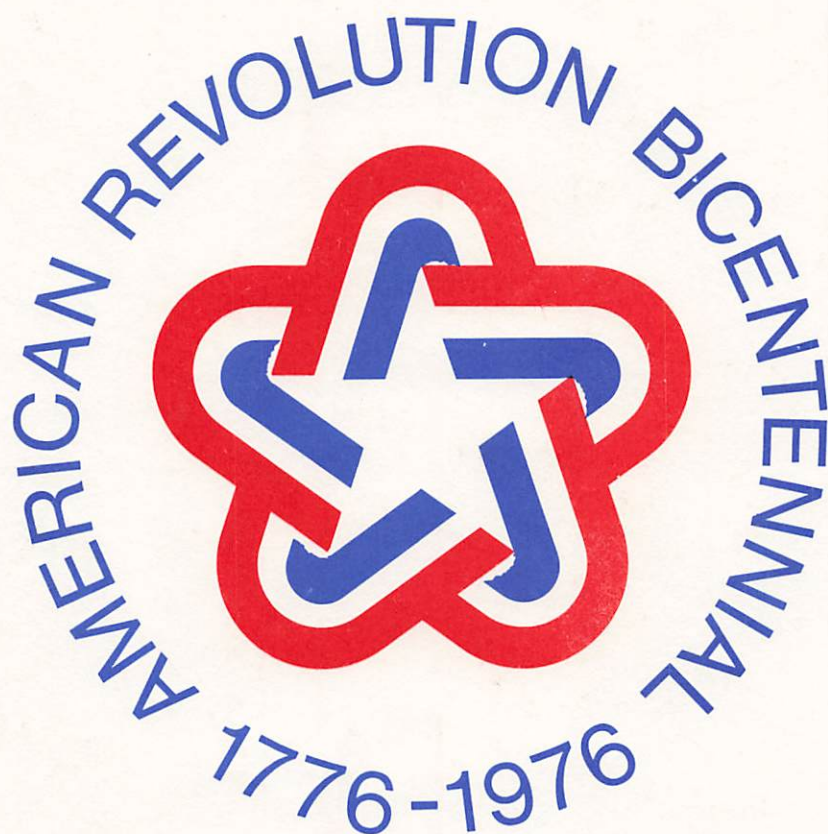
