COMMUNITY STORY

FROM BLACK DIRT TO ASPHALT TO BLACK DIRT

After the blackhawk wars, the first settlers of Schaumburg township were from the Eastern U. S., including New England. The area thrived as an agricultural community. German settlers followed in the 1840's and St. Peters' Lutheran Church was founded in 1847.

The community remained agricultural, dairying truck farming, and basically German through the 1940's.

In the middle 1950's the available open land became attractive for single family development. Hoffham Estates, was developed by F & S construction, and the old Hammerstein home later became the first Hoffman Estates Village Hall. Schaumburg's development began with Campanelli's Weathersfield development in the early 1960's. Schaumburg incorporated in 1956 and Hoffman Estates in 1959.

In the 1960's and early 1970's residential, commercial, and industrial growth exploded. However, leadership and philosophies of the two communities often deffered.

Schaumburg township now has a population in excess of 85,000. The problems of the 1970's and 1980's, mass transportation, health care, water, open space, and solid waste, are not separated by village boundaries.

While the problems of this area are significant, the future is encouraging. The challenges of the 1970's and 1980's, can only be met by the return to the co-operation, hard work and interdependence of our early settlers of the Salt Creek vicinity better known as Schaumburg township.

ECONOMIC CHALLENGES

FORUM FORCE MOMENTUM

In the arena of economic commonality the following blocks: momentum required to change outdated traditions, lack of consumer force, initiative and control; lack of local employment, no forum for establishing priorities; indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of forum force and momentum. This is illustrated by lack of local employment, lack of information on housing from wide economic range, lack of economic counseling, confusion over many taxing districts; don't know where to go to start cable TV.

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MISINFORMATION

In the arena of management of common resources the following blocks: development and significance of conservation; indicate the underlying contradiction of (1) misinformation and (2) personal desires (greed). This is illustrated by (1) mismanagement of water run-off and (2) local leaders not communicating the priority and the threat of natural resources.

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ECONOMIC UNDERSTANDING

In the arena of common distribution, the following blocks: lack of scope (history, future planning, present factors), resistance to change, self-interest, community pressure, poor investigation and evaluation; indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of willingness to look at ourselves (evaluate our own values and acts). This is illustrated by school spending hassles, inflation (lack of preparedness), job situation.

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ECONOMIC COMMONALITY

In the arena of economic commonality, the following blocks: lack of political cooperation and citizen apathy, indicate the underlying contradiction of community wants and needs vs. citizen responsibility for local action. This is illustrated by lack of community agreement on one hospital; lack of long-range planning on water resources; and lack of agreement on re-distribution of tax resources.

ECONOMIC CHALLENGES

WISE UTILIZATION & BEAUTIFICATION

In the arena of wise utilization and beautification of open spaces, the following blocks: apathy, production and maintenance, and priorities; indicate the underlying contradiction of low priority. This is illustrated by Woodfield leading towards urbanization and high density dwellings.

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LOW INCOME HOUSING

In the arena of low and moderate income housing the following blocks: fear of undesirable people, lack of understanding of low income housing; indicate the underlying contradiction of substantial need and little availability. This is illustrated by young people and old people who can't afford to live in Schaumburg Township.

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HEALTH AND WELFARE

In the arena of health and welfare, the following blocks: Awareness and apathy and economics; indicate the underlying contradiction of economics. This is illustrated by lack of mental and physical health, recreational facilities in the community.

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POLITICAL CHALLENGES

INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

In the arena of Intergovernmental Cooperation the following blocks: each village looking out for its own interests sometimes without much concern for impact on neighbors, indicate the underlying contradiction of one village's development and planning does effect people in a regional area, yet regional impact is not always considered. This is illustrated by high traffic in our whole area; flooding caused by Woodfield and other big developments; apartments in one village bordering single family development in another.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

In the arena of Public Transportation the following blocks: slow moving RTA indicate the underlying contradiction of the political bureaucracy. This is illustrated by the fact that there is still no public transportation in this area.

JUVENILE COURT AND POLICE PROTECTION

In the arena of Juvenile Court and Police Protection the following blocks: cultural recognition of problems indicate the underlying contradiction of services to back up the court and police department, communicate local need to chief judge, increase economic support of police department. This is illustrated by lack of coordinates between similar existing agencies, increase number of juveniles in area.

ABSENCE OF LEGISLATIVE CONSENSUS

In the arena of Corporate Justice the following blocks: lack of education and communication indicate the underlying contradiction of legislative consensus. This is illustrated by Village Board executive council sessions, traffic court, political conventions.

ENTHUSIASM RENEWED

In the arena of Significant Engagement the following blocks: escapism and lack of involvement indicate the underlying contradiction of sense of isolation. This is illustrated by low voter turnout and low participation in community activities.

POLITICAL CHALLENGES

LACK OF COMMUNICATION

In the arena of Government the following blocks: uninformed citizenry, inflation, too many governments indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of communication of community projects. This is illustrated by lack of knowledge of how community leaders vote, not published in newspapers regularly.

MASTER PLAN

In the arena of Corporate Order the following blocks: communication - difference in expectation of life style, lack of community leadership in direction of education, encourage parental control and development of a community group, indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of people involvement and interest in community affairs. This is illustrated by need of combined use of tax needs and process of taxation for transportation, needed housing, medical welfare need and use of protective police force.

THE GAP BETWEEN THE PEOPLE AND THE POLITICAL POWERS

In the arens of Economic Distribution the following blocks: lack of organized communication, funds, master plan for future of community, indicate the underlying contradiction of gap between Federal Housing needs of local people and leaderships' (plans for local people). This is illustrated by lack of foresight in planning for community hospital - resulting in NO hospital at all.

INDIVIDUALISTIC LIFESTYLE

In the arena of Political Commonality the following blocks: individualistic lifestyles at the personal, community and business levels indicate the underlying contradiction of demands for services (communications and cheap transportation) that they will not use. This is illustrated by lack of using facilities available - school buses, trains, local newspapers and newsletters and possible funding that does not include "strings."

CULTURAL CHALLENGES

COMMUNITY SPIRIT

In the arena of cultural communal styles the following blocks, lack of time and money community concern with youth activities and thinking of self instead of community; indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of community spirit. This is illustrated by (1) organized athletic groups monopolize recreational facilities (2) Additional recreational facilities require significant capital. (3) Housing in the community is limited in price range. (4) Mass transportation is not locally available.

CULTURAL COMMONALITY

In the arena of cultural commonality the following blocks, officials unaware of community concerns and lack of public education and awareness; indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of public interest in the community. This is illustrated by poor enforcement of environmental ordinances, government seems intimidating and no meaningful local media.

COMMUNITY AWARENESS

In the arena of cultural commonality and communal wisdom: the following blocks, lack of common values, lack of community identification, lack of involvement; indicate the underlying contradiction of community awareness. This is illustrated by no hospitals in community, incomplete coverage of community in the local media.

CULTURAL COMMONALITY

In the arena of cultural commonality, the following blocks, lack of funding, apathy, diversity of interest, lack of communication indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of broad based industrial tax structure, transient populace, general apathy, elitist local government. This is illustrated by street repair needs, community participation (voting, town meeting) lack of cultural and recreational opportunities. 25% population turnover per annual.

CULTURE

In the arena of culture for Schaumburg township; the following blocks, limited funds and uninterested people; indicate the underlying contradiction of fast growth and increased taxes. This is illustrated by lack of interest in cultural affairs in Schaumburg township.

ECONOMIC PROPOSALS

BUILDING PLAN - SCHAUMBURG TOWNSHIP

We the citizens of Schaumburg Township in order to form comprehensive building plan for housing, hospitals, natural areas and recreation, propose to review current studies through increasing awareness of residents through media

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PROSPERITY THROUGH AWARENESS

We the citizens of Schaumburg Township in order to design, through awareness, comprehensive zoning laws to provide recreational and health care centers that will insure quality, propose to create public awareness through use of mass media.

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CONSUMERS EDUCATION

We the citizens of Schaumburg Township in order to educate the public on their consumers right propose to inform them on all rights that are available to them through a consumers rights booklet and the use of the news media.

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FINANCIAL RESOURCES

We the citizens of Schaumburg Township in order to facilitate financial planning and resource evaluation, propose to evaluate private and public sector funding availability through local and regional planning agencies

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POLITICAL PROPOSALS

INTER-COMMUNITY NEWSLETTER

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates-Schaumburg in order to provide effective channels for information exchange, propose the establishment of an inter-community newsletter through (1) an organizational meeting of interested parties; (2) the establishment of a format and of parameters of content; (3) the determination of the most effective modes of distribution; (4) cooperation of existing informational services.

ISSUE-FORUM PROGRAM

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates-Schaumburg in order to motivate and involve people in community activities, propose an issue-forum program through (1) establishing a feasibility committee; (2) community support (petitions, flyers, news media); (3) presenting final proposal to authorized parties.

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INTER-GOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates-Schaumburg in order to establish intra-governmental cooperation, propose to form a dual municipal intra-governmental coordinating committee (DMICC) through (1) preparing a presentation (2) establishing timetable (3) putting proposal on agenda of Board of Trustee meeting of both villages (4) building public awareness via village newsletters and newspapers.

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A LOBBYING PROGRAM FOR LOCAL AVAILABILITY OF JUVENILE COURT AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates-Schaumburg in order to obtain local availability of Juvenile Court and Public Transportation Services, propose a lobbying program to (A) impress upon the Chief Judge of the Juvenile Court the very real needs of the Northwestern suburban area for a branch court in our immediate area, and (b) impress upon the RTA board the very real needs of the Northwestern suburban area for convenient public transportation through (A) tabulation of juvenile delinquency statistics for our local area to establish need; and presentation of this information in testimony before the Chief Judge of the juvenile court, and (B) detailed surveying of transportation needs and projected utilization, including proposed routes, rates, and scheduling; and presentation of that information in testimony before the RTA board.

CULTURAL PROPOSALS

RECREATION

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg in order to increase recreational facilities to reach the needs of the entire community : propose establishing bike routes, create non-assignable recreational areas and also establish existing areas to be used as multi-purpose cultural center through a joint effort between parks, schools and local governments to better utilize existing facilities for community recreation.

COMMUNICATION

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg in order to better inform and to motivate the constituency propose the formation of a community council through an Intercommunity Agreement establishing boundaries and responsibilities, communicating through a newsletter and establishing sub-committees to promote specific communication projects.

PARTNERSHIP

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg in order to ensure proper planning and intelligent decision - making on matters affecting citizens of both communities propose Intergovernmental coordination and sharing of practical studies and experiences through 1) establishing a joint committee authorized by the Corporate Authorities and composed of elected officials and citizens. 2) The committee will meet on a regular basis to discuss common problems, I.E. a municipal bus service, and arrive at solutions that could be implemented by both Village Boards. 3) Encourage Village Officials to refrain from pointless criticisms of neighboring entities. 4) Periodic joint meetings of the 2 Environmental Committees launched by a joint Poplar Creek clean-up.

SELF CONTAINED COMMUNITY

We the citizens of Hoffman Estates and Schaumburg in order to provide a more self-sustaining community through wider diversity propose that the plans commissions outline their comprehensive plans and a promotional committee seek developers within those perimeters through 1) Influencing the private sector. 2) Encourage the plans commissions to review their proposals. 3) Establish a promotional committee. 4) The village boards should encourage developers through special advantages.
