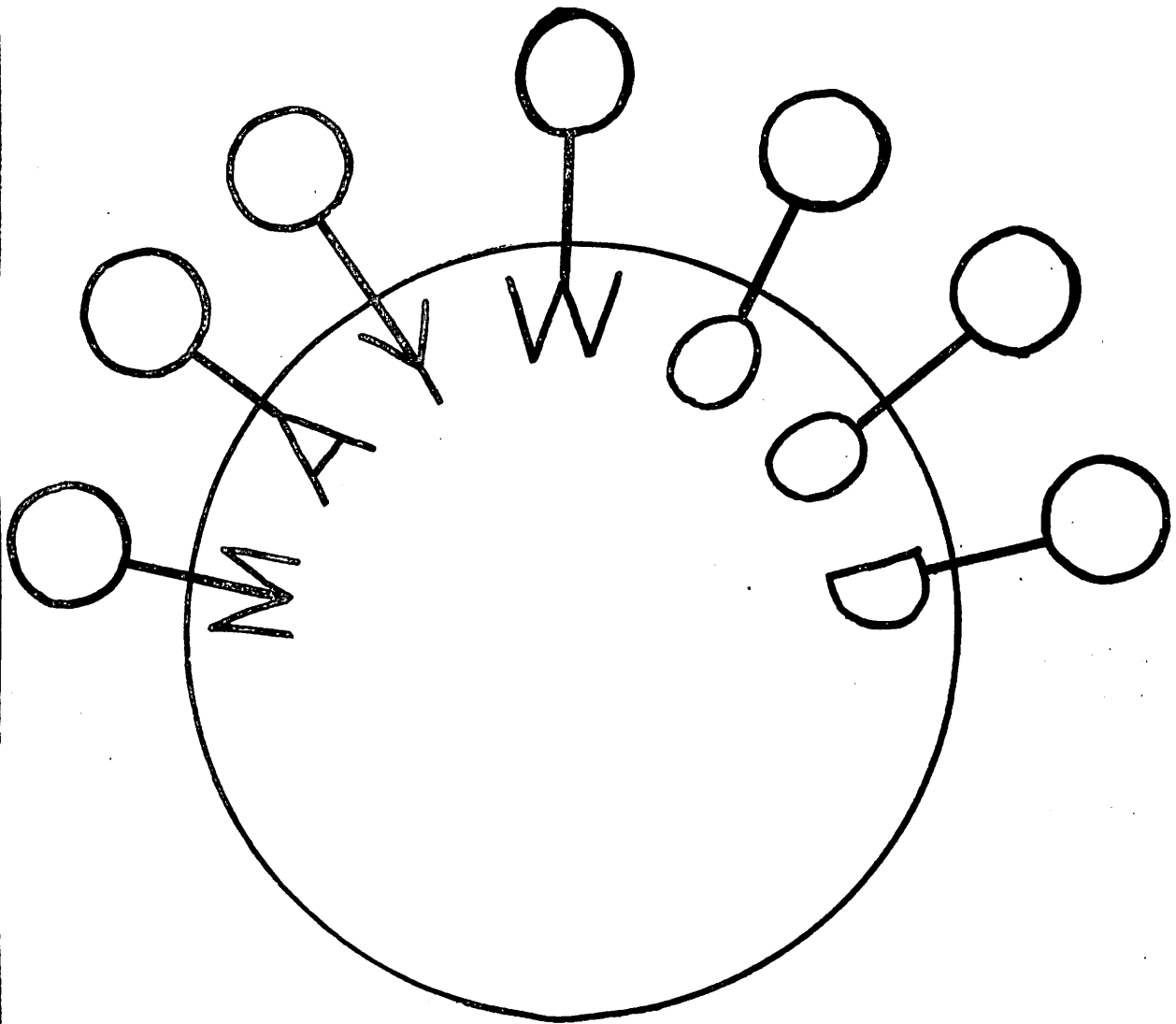

## TALES OF EARLY MAYWOOD

The following history of early Maywood was compiled from, and is in part direct quotation from, the papers of the late Harrison P. Nichols, a brother of Col. Wm. T. Nichols, in whose mind was conceived the founding of our Village. H.P. Nichols came to Maywood in 1869, a short time after the charter for the Maywood Company was granted, and lived here until his death in 1912.

Maywood, was the creation of a joint stock corporation, the charter of which was obtained from the Legislature of the state of Illinois on application of seven Vermont gentlemen whose names were: Col. Wm. Nichols, Robert B. Barney, H.O. Gifford, Allen S. Eaton, P.S. Peake, J.P. Willard and A.M. Moore. This charter of the Maywood Company was obtained in April, 1869, and from that time until his death in 1882, Col. Nichols was president of this corporation. For the first thirteen years of Maywood's existence, he was the creative genius of its development. A short time before this enterprise was started, his daughter May died, and in memory of her, the Village was called "Maywood".

The original plat of Maywood was 1 3/4" miles north and south and 1/2 mile east and west of the Des Plaines river with the Chicago Northwestern railroad running almost through the center. The portion of ground lying south of the tracks was a farm owned by M. C. Niles of Oak Park who sold it to the Maywood Co. for \$100 an acre. To the north of the tracks were several farms the largest of which was owned by E. W. Hoard, also of Oak Park, who likewise sold to the Maywood. Co. This farm house was located near the present site of the Lincoln school.

In the year 1870 great progress was made in the development of our town and 25 or 30 houses were build, the hotel completed and filled with guests. The Chicago and Northwestern Railroad stopped trains here, school was opened, a grocery story started, a postoffice was established with George R. Hall the first postmaster. Church services were held regularly, and altogether the town took on some semblance of organized society..

"Among the very first religious services held in Maywood were, I believe," wrote Col. Nichols, "those held by a Presbyterian preacher by the name of Hare, Rev. Samuel Hare; then a Dr. Roy of the Congregational fold and Rev. Ambrose, a Methodist. Also I should like to pay my tribute of respect to the memory of Mrs. Brabrook who, from 1870 anf for many years thereafter worked with the children in the Sunday School with a constancy and fidelity that was very touching".

Between 1869 and 1875 a number of ladies and gentlemen had formed what was known as the Maywood Library Association, of which the Carnegie Library erected here, is the legitimate product. The first local newspaper, Home News, began publication in 1884.

In October, 1871, the great Chicago fire occurred, and this was a thing of great importance to Maywood as well as to Chicago. Because of a very liberal arrangement entered into between the Maywood Co. and prospective settlers, a large number of houses were erected in 1872, not less than 100, and Maywood seemed on the high road to success, when the very next year, the Panic of 1873 occurring, all semblance of prosperity ceased and for more than 15 years following, Maywood's progress was very discouraging.

"These are the days," wrote Col. Nichols, "I do not like to talk about, for they stand in the past as a nightmare stands in the story of our dreams. To be frank with you -- my friends and neighbors, I prefer to talk of today and the days to come. Not in the yesterdays but in tomorrow and the coming days are the promise and the potency of better things."

# **The Present Challenges**

**Session One**

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ECONOMIC CHALLENGES

Challenge 1  
Key is the Motivation

The present challenge in the Economic Spectrum underlying the lack of Political Education, lack of social involvement and poor communication in motivation as seen in participation of school board meetings, village board meetings and all areas of local government.

Challenge 2  
Unattractive business district

Economic development of community underlying loss of business. Lack of parking, law enforcement, community appearance underlying lack of centralized business on 5th Avenue as seen in the conditions.

Challenge 3  
Lack of economic development

The arena of exchange mechanisms of the economic condition of the community i.e. the entry and survival of business — no reinvestment into the community and lack of confidence in self and community as seen in 5th Avenue business district/ no adequate consumer needs for the whole community.

Challenge 4  
Concern of elected officials for citizens

The present challenge in election of officials underlying apathy of citizens is access and motivation to the vote and participate as seen in poor turnout at local elections.

Challenge 5  
Lack Compromise

The present challenge local government underlying vandalism, conducting interest between the railroad and village, underdeveloped business community; is lack of compromise between two parties, as seen in still not having an overpass for emergency vehicles, village being unable to bring business into the area and, complaints not being dealt with.

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ECONOMIC CHALLENGES

Challenge 6  
Lack of community  
awareness

Lack of community awareness and know-how, on how to support and do something about such issues as decline in capitalization, removal and repair of condemned houses, building codes and unemployment.



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POLITICAL CHALLENGES

CHALLENGE 1 STATEMENT	The Present challenge in Maywood's common welfare underlying lack of communication and involvement is getting more citizens response as seen in participating in the local political process.
CHALLENGE 2  IMPROVING SERVICES	The present challenge in public services is being blocked by the lack of input from the community as seen in the poor maintainance, unclean streets, poor housing.
CHALLENGE 3  BROADENING POLITICAL PAR- TICIPATION	The present challenge in political arena of more participation in community political structures underlying lack of communication between office holder & voter, need for younger people in office, & continue influence of m.p. in Maywood School System is a lack of communication which builds up individual problems, & poor public examples of small attendance at great community events, social awareness in homes creates tension, Melrose Pk. politicians not wanting to lose control
CHALLENGE 4  EFFECTIVE LOCAL CITIZEN ACTION CLUSTER	The present challenge in effective citizen involvement and Police & local officials cooperation underlying more police protection, more fine enforcement, fewer promises and more action, and lower taxes is local citizens are unable to get action on clear, blatant problems relative to the health and safety in their neighborhoods, as seen in private homes health violations not prosecuted, reckless driving & speeding in the neighborhood, and poor lighting of our streets.

CHALLENGE 5  
VOTER  
APATHY

The challenge is to overcome the decline in voter interest & registration which is due to a lack of knowledge in gov't procedures results in lower participation at the polls and failure to past low income housing by Maywood voters.

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CULTURAL CHALLENGES

Challenge 1  
Improved Cultural  
Services

Poor teaching and education are the social blocks that prevent improved cultural services as seen in local schools and the lack of bi-lingual skills of foriegn residents.

Challenge 2  
One Community  
United

The present challenge in wisdom arena, underlying the blocks of not knowing everyone, dishonesty in politics, and limited economic possibility is seeing ourselves as one community in the midst of varying culture and changing environment, as seen in people leaving Maywood. High rate of burglarly, drug usage in schools, and changing population weakens churches.

Challenge 3  
Lack of Common  
Understanding

The present challenge in the social structures underlying the community needs is a lack of common understanding of different groups in Maywood as seen in the emphasis only on recreation for youth, and the racial discrimination evident in some local churches.

Challenge 4  
Better Communication

The challenge for better communication between the citizens and officials and racial groups aimed at dealing with the power structure in an effort to achieve common goals through home rules, with tangible results for all citizens.

<p>Challenge 5</p> <p>Community Reluctance to Change</p>	<p>The present challenge in education and involvement of senior citizens and youth underlying apathy, racial tension job related education and meaningful involvement in work and community is the community's reluctance to change as seen in racial segregation in schools lack of aggressiveness for new businesses, and lack of relevant <u>involvement</u> of senior citizens and youth programs.</p>
<p>Challenge 6</p> <p>Lack of Cultural, Park and Senior Citizen Programs</p>	<p>The present challenge in cultural activities has the social blocks of lack of programs for all ages, lack of citizen planning and a fear between the various ethnic groups. There is the underlying disease of apathy and lack of <u>real</u> social and cultural integration as seen in <u>lower</u> involvement of newcomers (Blacks &amp; Latinos) in planning, white fear of using and participating in cultural affairs and facilities all over Maywood and the problem of most groups in the community being mostly from only one ethnic group (churches, community organizations, senior citizen clubs, etc.).</p>
<p>Challenge 7</p> <p>Inadequate Social Services</p>	<p>The present challenge in providing better services underlying lack of money and participation of citizens is poor planning and communication as seen in the recent assessment of property taxes and cuts in programs.</p>

# **The Practical Proposals**

**Session Two**



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THE ECONOMIC PROPOSALS

EMPLOY- MENT OF SKILLED LOCAL CITIZENS	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to address the problems of unemployment, propose to hire local unemployed citizens in redevelopment programs through a recruitment plan.
TAX INCENTIVES	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to improve the economic climate of the village, propose tax relief through (1) lower corporate taxes, (2) tax advantages to businesses which have on-the-job training programs, (3) tax relief to citizens with transportation pools, and (4) tax relief to citizens for home improvements and maintenance.
FEDERAL REVENUE FOR MAYWOOD	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to develop Federal revenue and resources, propose research on employment data, poverty levels, commercial enterprise, and housing situation through Village survey to update 1970 census data, study of Federal revenues and proposal guidelines.
COMMUNITY PARTICI- PATION IN REDEVELOP- MENT	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to enable beneficial engagement through common cause and job training, propose monthly to quarterly meetings to discern what we are out to do as a community through research of basic needs, Block Clubs, advertising and on-the-job training.

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THE POLITICAL PROPOSALS

FIRST IN SAFETY--- FIRST IN SERVICE	We, the citizens of Maywood, in order make Maywood a secure community with efficient services, propose increased citizens participation and respect in all phases of Village government through formation of block clubs, community education, community awareness, and increased citizens participation.
VOTER EDUCATION	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to thoroughly educate the citizenry on the significant political issues that effect the community life, propose active and effective participation of community in politics, education and social services, by better voter registration drive, door-to-door canvassing, education of the population, encouraging voluntary pollwatching and holding political officials to their work. This can become a reality with the formation of public meeting small groups in neighborhood meeting with officials in the news papers and to establish a system to attain Block Captains who would inform the local government on the concerns and ideas of the community. Better education of the voter with the government will represent the view of the voter.
CITIZENS GOVERN- MENT COMMUNICA- TION	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to provide grassroots government communication, propose a "block" level communications structure through elected communication Board from North, South, East and West.
MAYWOOD CONGRESS EVALUATION OF SERVICES	We, the citizens of Maywood, Illinois, in order to insure ongoing village-wide citizens evaluation of services propose to call together all inclusive coalition groups to pursue goals in a continuing process through (1) commitment of Village government to this evaluation and helping to organize such (2) contact all existing groups, (3) organizing of local block clubs, (4) training in a common method of evaluation, and (5) Seek outside expertise to help form and keep together the coalition (i.e., C.A.P., I.A.F., etc.).

THE CULTURAL PROPOSALS

Creation of Cultural Board. We the citizens of Maywood, Ill. in order to generate better communication between our citizens propose to take first steps to create a Cultural Board through the Appointment of six (6) citizens and one trustee, to act as the nucleus in the formation of the Cultural Board.

Creation of Programs For All Ages

We the citizens of Maywood in order to create programs for all age groups, propose to make citizens aware of present services & determine from them what they want, thru making surveyed desires available to Village Board; bringing all age groups together to discuss methods for getting suryed desires met; setting a deadline for implementation.

Build a Sense of Community We the citizens of Maywood Ill. in order to Build citizens awareness, price, and concern for each other & the community, to establish block clubs, community organizations, volunteer service groups, and additional citizens involvement in decision making. Recruiting block captains, evaluating, governmental services, identifying volunteer service needs, and holding semi-annual town meetings.

Greater Use of Existing Resources We the citizens of Maywood in order to utilize our existing resources like Maywood Library & Triton College, propose to use existing community, cultural, & religion organizations to disseminate information about these already existing resourses, three newsletters, group activities, meetings, visits, & other programs.

Maywood Information Board We the citizens of Maywood in order to better communicate & disseminate local information & activities with all ages & groups propose a Maywood Information Board through forming a citizen action workshop group, writing local news events and making use of the local church as a meeting place.

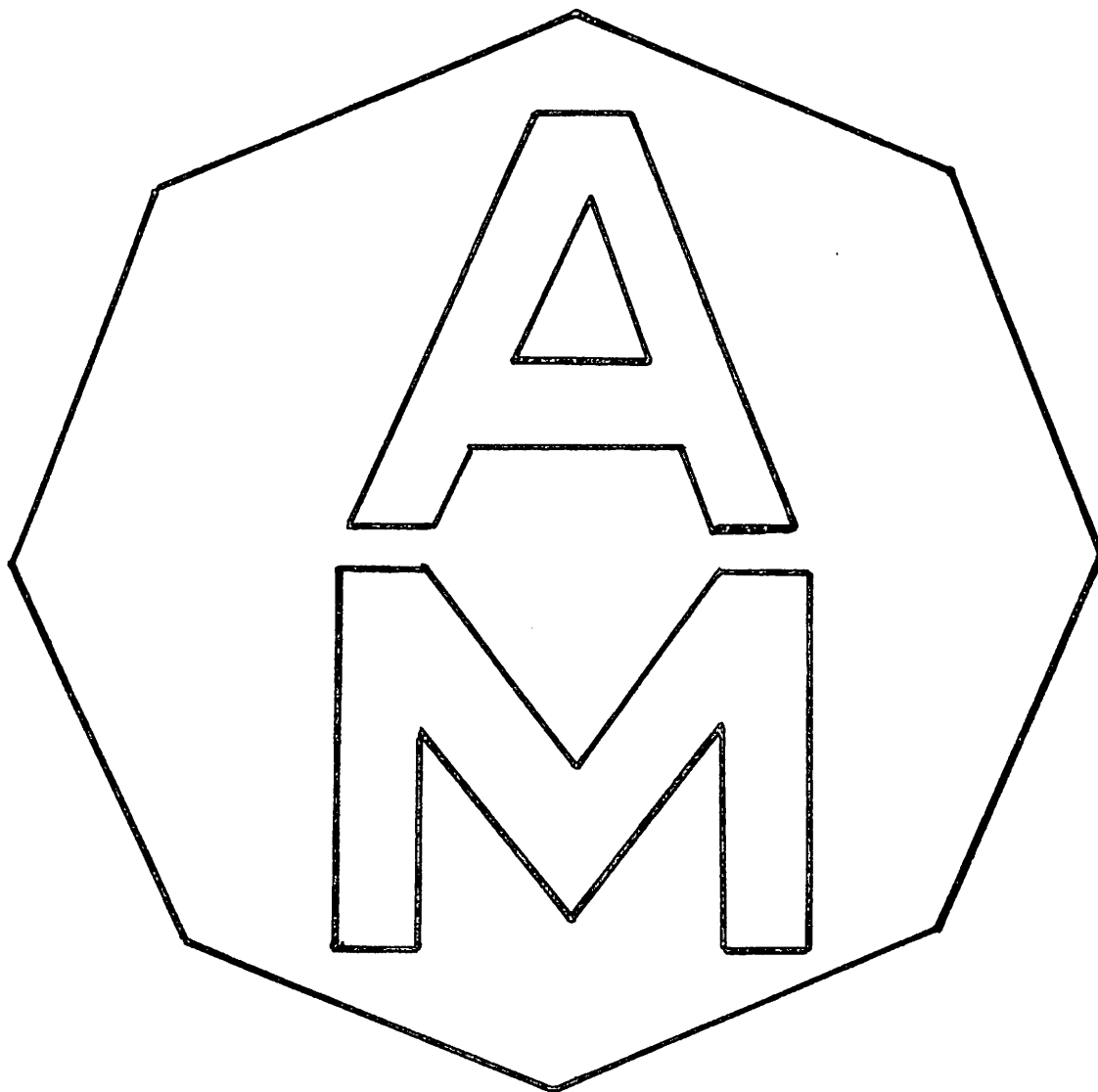

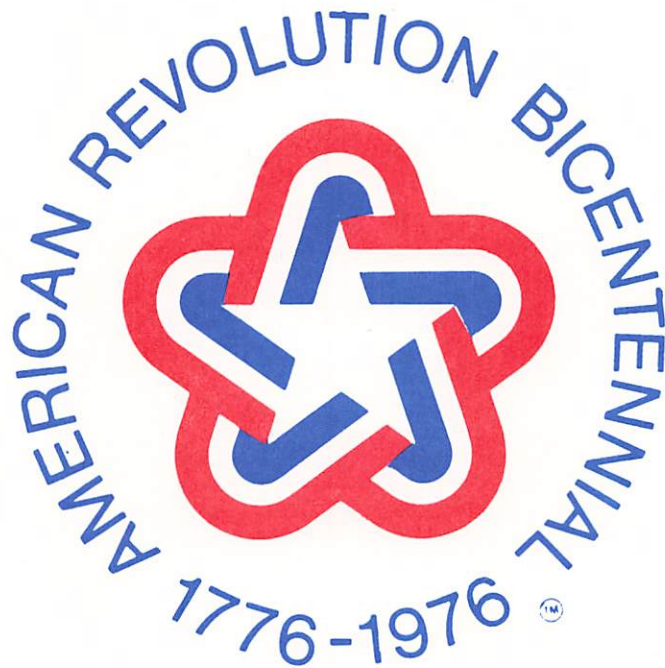
