July 24th Eugene's 38 points help destroy the Truckers 62-46. The 2nd game the Wings balance scoring took care of the Sonics 74-48.



The only cost incurred by the stockmen, this cost is for the hay, filler, molasses and the machinery needed to prepare the cube, put into bags and the cost . to deliver it from Casa Grande to the Livestock Complex. Overall the bag will save each buyer well over 1/3 of the commercial cost of this feed.

This feed will help to save your cows, take advantage of this and make your purchases through the Livestock Complex, 3 miles west of Sells, Arizona.
