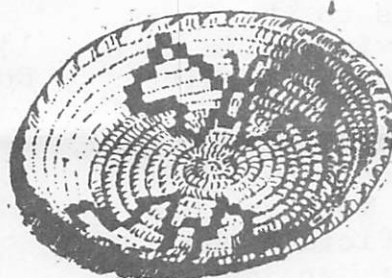

The younger kids painted the backstop poles before they were put up at the new field.

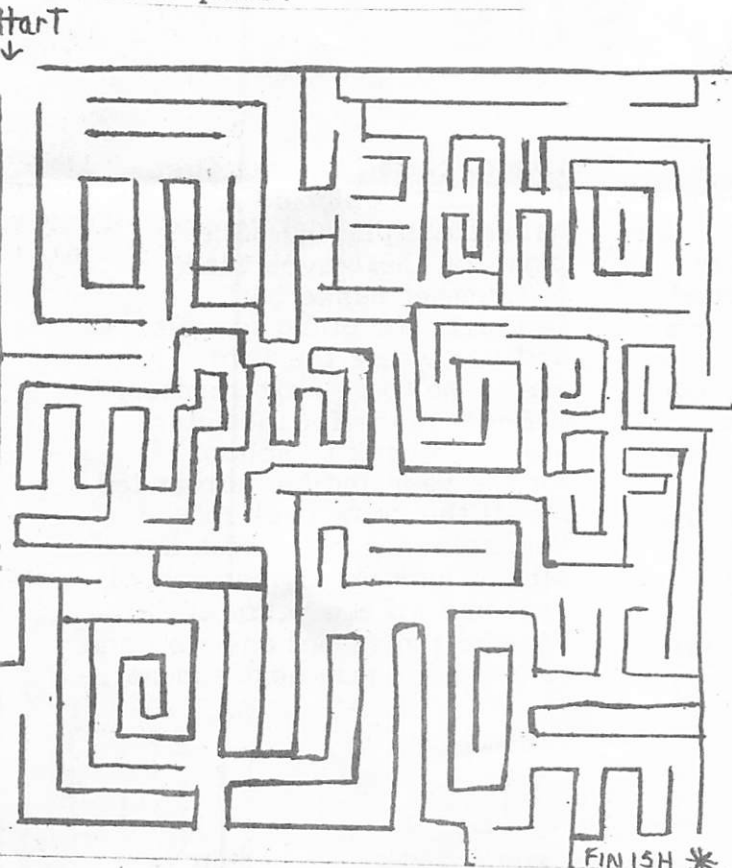
On Wednesday the workers were ready for another hard day of work. Kenneth Antone and his helpers were busy painting a Pisinemo District sign. The sign will go up

July 24th Eugene's 38 points help destroy the Truckers 62-46. The 2nd game the Wings balance scoring took care of the Sonics 74-48.

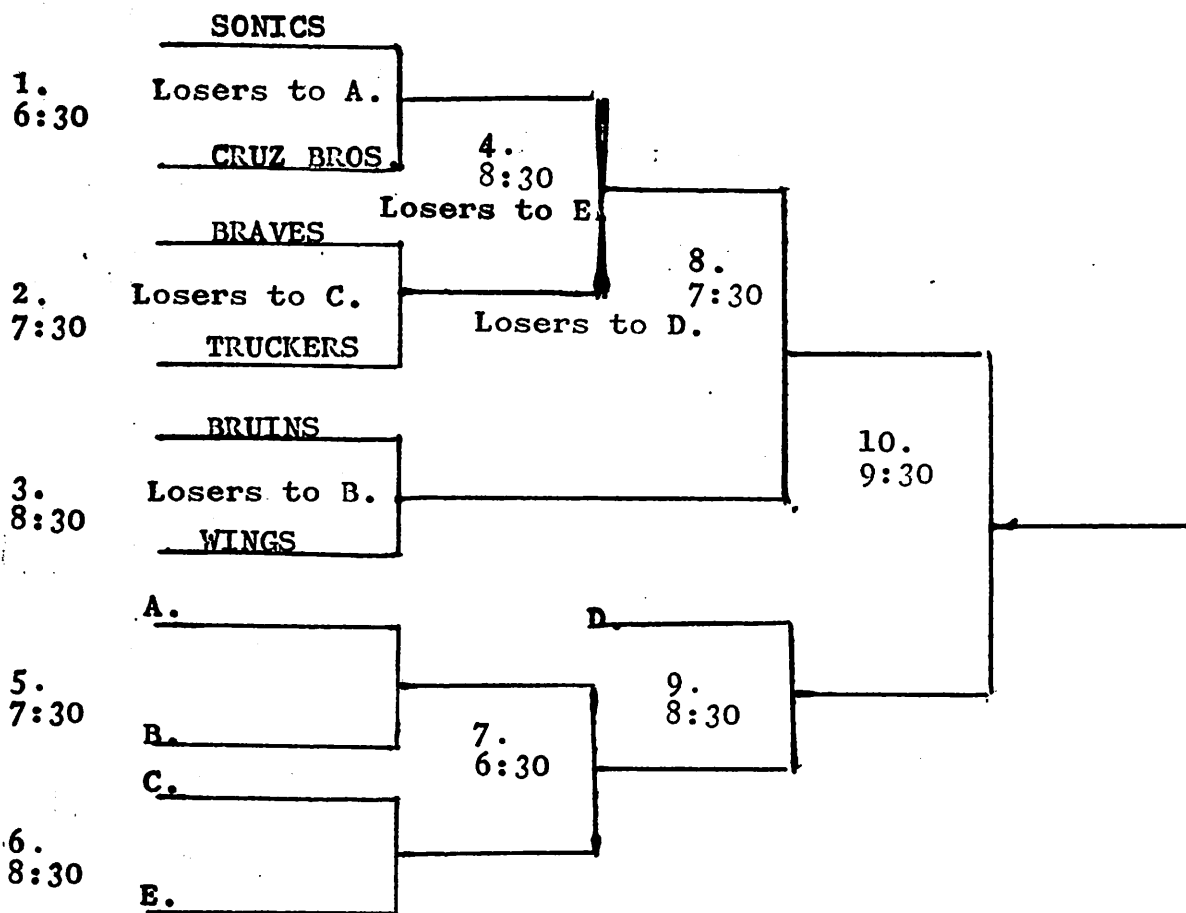

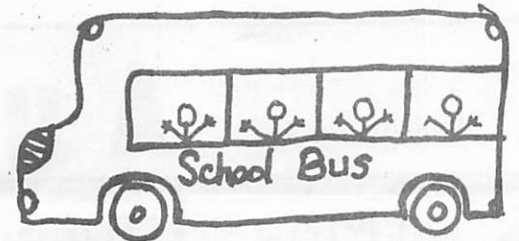
WOBURN LAWN HDP (Jamaica)

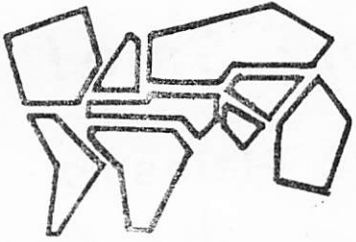

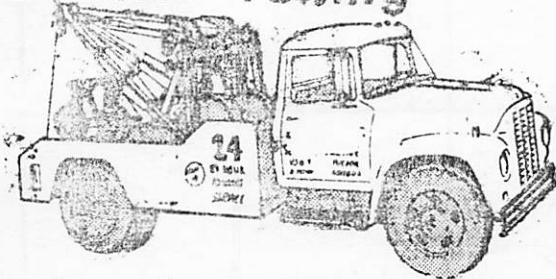

Agriculture provided information on irrigation, markets and new crops as well as old crops. Community newsletter development was covered in Community Life along with fund raising and community events.

Special expertise was provided from Flagstaff, Phoenix, Tucson, Casa Grande, Sells, and, of course, Pisinemo. Pisinemo residents and members of the Pisinemo HDP staff hope some new ideas for community improvement will help start community projects. A big thanks to all who participated.

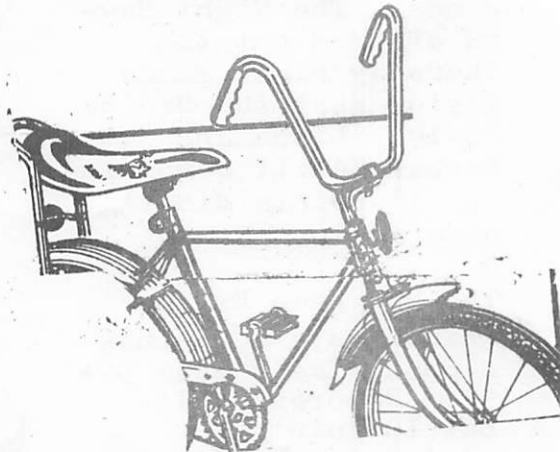
DIET CLUB


NOTICE

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will make available FREE corn that will then be processed into a 3/8 inch cube which will have mixed into it alfalfa hay, a filler straw molasses for palatability and bentonite to bind together the corn, hay, straw and molasses.

Cattlemen feeding drought stricken cattle should consider for maintenance purposes the feeding from 8 to 10 pounds of the mixed cube per cow per day.

The feed in bags of 50 pounds capacity will sell here at the Livestock Complex for \$3.00 per bag. The only cost incurred by the stockmen, this cost is for the hay, filler, molasses and the machinery needed to prepare the cube, put into bags and the cost to deliver it from Casa Grande to the Livestock Complex. Overall the bag will save each buyer well over 1/3 of the commercial cost of this feed.

This feed will help to save your cows, take advantage of this and make your purchases through the Livestock Complex, 3 miles west of Sells, Arizona.
