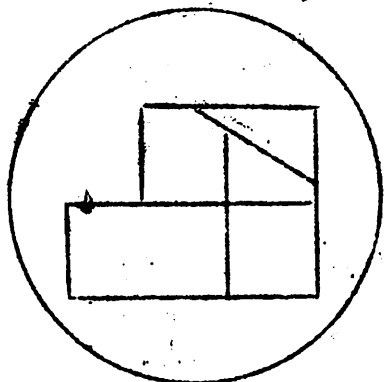

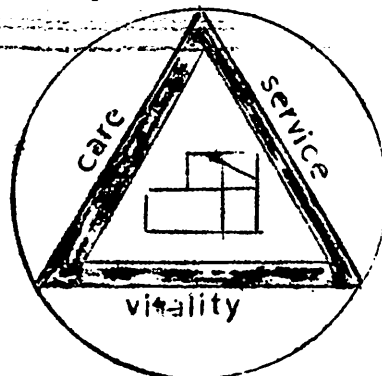

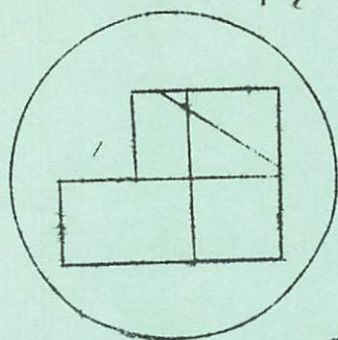

BLOCK GRANT MEETING

Following two public hearings, a pre-application is taking form for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The final work of the pre-application will be completed this Thursday, Feb. 8, 7:00 p.m. at the ICA Staff Center. The focus of the grant will be on water line renovation, street improvement, and housing rehabilitation. Paul Fisher of the Association of Southcentral Oklahoma Governments (ASCOG) has been assisting in the preparation of the pre-application and will be present at the Thursday evening meeting. The meeting will also include progress reports and planning for the continued expansion of services at the Indianoma Health Center and preparations for the series of Town Meetings to be held in Southwestern Oklahoma during the month of February.

prayer training

A prayer training session was held at the Post Oak Menonite Church Sunday, Jan. 28. The session was conducted by Dr. L. D. Barker of Snyder and was attended by over 30 persons representing almost every church in the Indianoma area. The training was held in anticipation of the Area - Wide Revival to be held Feb. 18-24 at the School auditorium.

HEALTH CARE WORKSHOP

A workshop for Health Caretakers and others interested in better health care for Indianahoma residents was held Saturday, Jan. 20 at the Indianahoma Health Center from 10:00 to 3:00.

Dr. Tom Whitsett from Oklahoma City was introduced by Joyce Jaye. He gave the welcome address and spoke on Preventative Health Care which means doing something to keep diseases from re-occurring.

Mrs. Charlotte Graham, Arlington, Texas, presented the morning workshop. After identifying our basic needs to get the center open and become self-supporting. Mrs. Graham spoke on the Town's Survey which is 85% complete. Those who haven't filled out a survey sheet please pick up one at the City Office, fill it out, and return it. Training on record keeping for each family was also discussed.

Dr. Whitsett said that First-Aid Training should be first on the agenda. The Comanche County Health Dept. and Fort Sill Hospital will be contacted to work with us.

During the afternoon workshop, the participants listed services that will be explored for Indianahoma. These include a well-baby clinic, blood pressure checks, immunizations, athletic physicals, pneum-a-vac for the senior citizens and chronically ill, annual cancer testing, and vision screening.

PLAZA WORKDAY

Saturday, March 10, marked the launching of the Showplace Plaza which will become the centerpiece of Indianoma's revitalized downtown. Seven Job Corpsmen, Lamar Hornsby, Terry Herman, David Nottingham, Jimmy Little, Danny Rubio, John Timmerman, and Gary Hamilton arrived early Saturday morning to add their skill and muscle to the efforts of Indianoma residents and ICA staff. The workers were divided into three teams: tree selection and planting, concrete block removal, and planter box construction. Jerry Paradise, our resident tree specialist, and his team went out to Holsey Acres to select trees donated by Elmer Holsey. Bill Slicker led the second team in its superhuman effort to crack and remove the concrete hunk from the middle of the plaza. This hunk was so large that everyone got a chance to help by taking turns using either Gene Hartman's 12 lb. sledgehammer or the city's 5 lb. sledge. After a full day of swinging and grunting the concrete was finally split and hauled off. The third team sawed railroad ties using Frank Poafpybitty's crosscut saw, dug the foundation for the planter and then arranged the ties in the planters outline.

The day was made possible by a week of preparation and volunteer help. Thanks go to Comanche County and Wendell Maddox for hauling in four loads of soil, Delbert Carter for his masterful job of leveling the plaza with the roadgrader (you had to see it to believe it), Gene Hartman for finishing touches on the surface preparation, R. K. Allen and Gary Kowena for assisting in removing the concrete runners, and Elmer Adler for helping in hauling off the broken concrete. And a special thanks to the Job Corpsmen for coming down on their own free time to help out on this project.

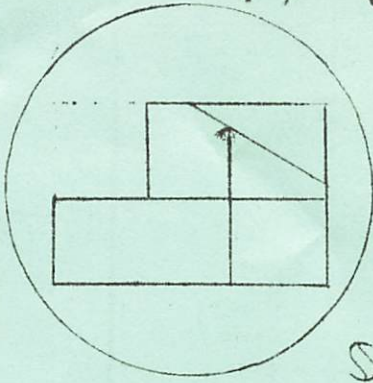

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION PLANS BEGIN

Efforts are proceeding on the formation of an Indianahoma Community Development Corporation. The intent of the corporation is to help establish needed businesses and services in the area while maintaining the style of a small town community.

A steering committee including Carlene Wisner, Betty Thrash, Clarence Halsey, and Barb Bailey along with other interested citizens has been reviewing this kind of organization.

A membership drive is scheduled for June 1-10. A formal Board of Directors will be elected at the first membership meeting on Thursday, June 21, at the Community Center. Membership is open to families across the Indianahoma School District with the payment of a \$5 annual membership fee.

city council notes

Highlights of recent City Council meetings include:

- Proposal submitted for funding city part development. Confirmation is expected in late July.
- Animal control complaints will be handled through written complaints turned in to City Hall.
- Application submitted to State Health Department for opening the demolition dump.
- Anyone using city dumpsters without paying garbage fee will be subject to fine.
- Vacant lots will be mowed by the city if the lots are free of debris and rocks at the rate of \$1.00 per lot. If anyone has any questions on this they can check with the City Clerk.
- Payment must be arranged for past due water bills before June 1st to prevent discontinuation of service. The council has determined with over \$2,000 in delinquent water, sewer, and garbage bills, the time has come for equality in the community. Those with past due bills should start paying their bills on time and make arrangements to begin paying monthly on their past due bills. If the city is to provide the services the citizens desire it is imperative everyone pay their fair share.

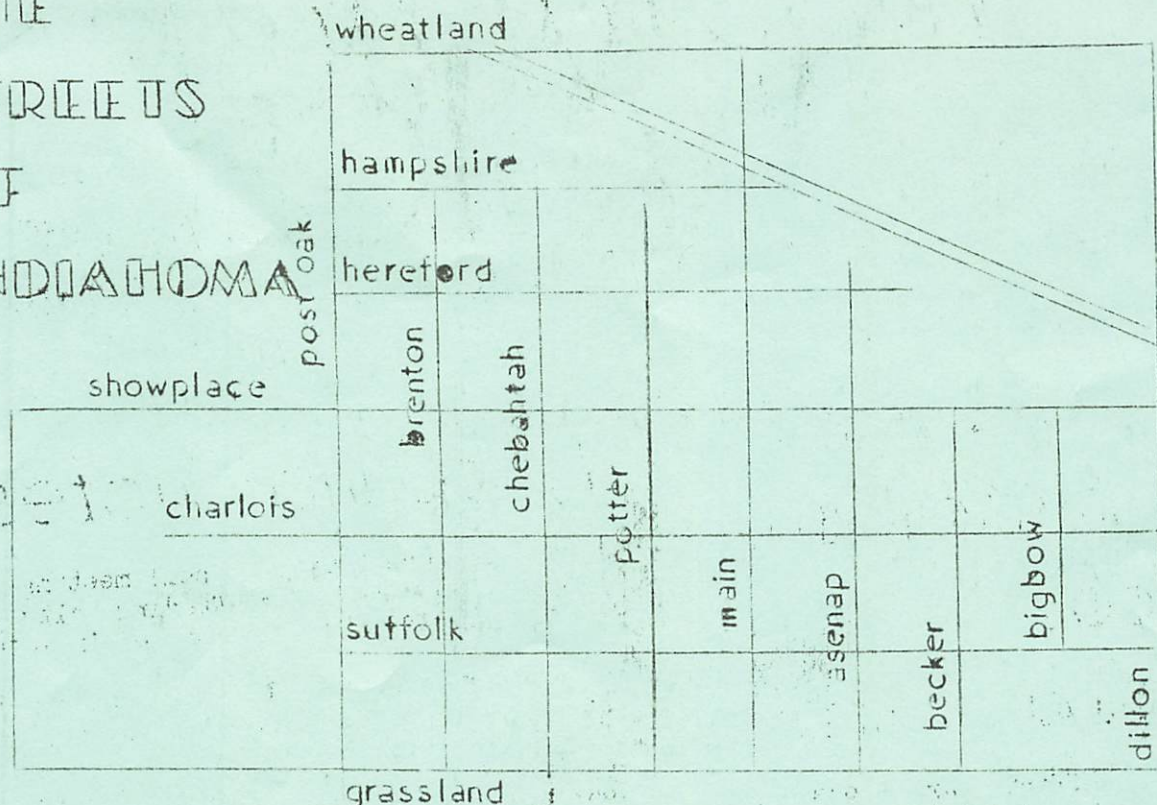

NEWS from TREASURE Lake

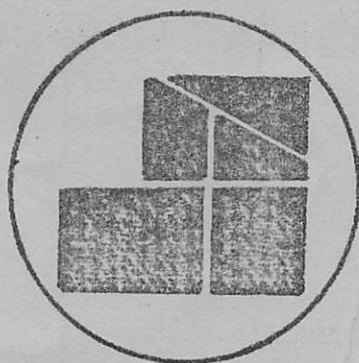

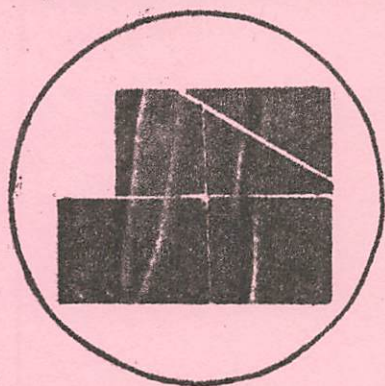

N. SCOTT MOMADAY

Pulitzer Prize-winning author, N. Scott Momaday, spoke to a group of students and faculty at Oklahoma University, Friday, Feb. 1. The discussion entitled "The Development of Ethical Attitudes Toward the Landscape", was carried on "talk-back" TV at Cameron and other area universities.

As Momaday explained, he retraced the journey his people, the Kiowas, had taken centuries earlier from Montana to the Southern Plains ending at Rainy Mountain. He told his audience that the Native American view of the land is important today; that reverence for the land living on harmonious terms with nature, involves more than "picking up litter from the highway". The Native American developed an "ethical attitude toward the landscape".

Western civilization, Momaday continued, views the landscape from an economic basis - that land must be used, exploited, (harvest trees, mine, oil and gas). We must change our attitude toward the environment or we will exploit it to extinction, he said.

During the question-answer period, a member of the student body suggested a parallel between the closeness

of the farmer to his land - a feeling of belonging to the land and Native American's reverence for the land.

The "rights of our children" to the wilderness is one important reason to preserve the wilderness, Comaday concluded.

SUMMER JOBS FOR YOUNG PEOPLE Apply by March 15, 1980

Refuge Manager Bob Kerges announced that the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge is accepting applications for lifeguards for the 1980 summer swimming season until March 15, 1980. One GS-4 Supervisory Lifeguard, salary \$4.83/hr. and four GS-3 Lifeguard/Fee Collectors \$4.30/hr. All lifeguards will work on the swimming beach at Lake Elmer Thomas, collecting recreation fees, providing lifeguard service, and performing minor clean-up duties in the beach area. Applicants must be at least eighteen years of age and possess certificates issued by the American Red Cross for First Aid and either Senior Lifesaving or Water Safety Instructor.

Applicants may obtain applications at the Oklahoma State Employment Office 811 D Avenue in Lawton or at refuge headquarters. For further information regarding these positions call refuge headquarters at 429-3222 Monday through Friday.

The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service will host a summer Youth Conservation Corps on the refuge.

The program is open to all young men and women interested in working outdoors regardless of race or family income. Applicants must be 15 years old, but must not have reached their 19th birthday. \$3.10 per hour for six hours of work per day. An additional two hours each day are devoted to environmental education.

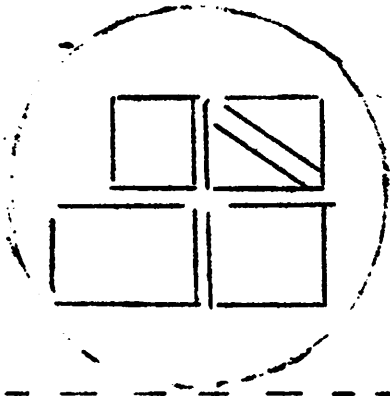

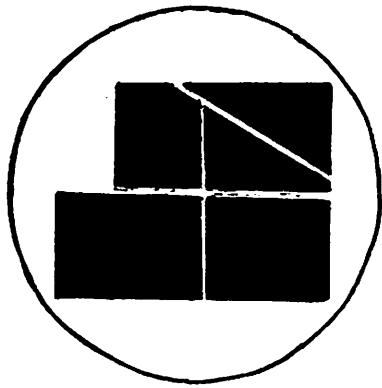
WILDLIFE NEWS

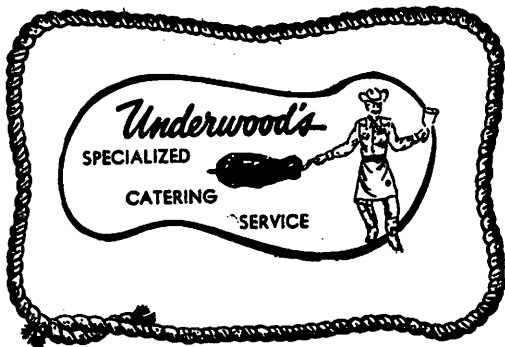
The TRS80 computer is housed in the math room at the school. Along with the permanent computer the school is fortunate enough to have seven computers which are on loan.

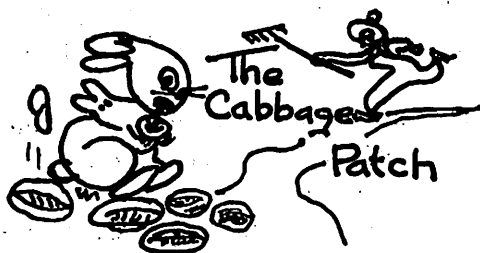
Grade school children are tested and placed in groups according to their level. This creates for a more homogeneous group of students and allows the teacher to focus on one aspect.

OLD TIMER'S TALE

An interview with Lottie Quetone,
now of Cache:

I was born 3 miles north of Indianahoma on my father's allotment. Each Indian was allotted 160 acres. Ours had a well and a muddy pond which we kids played in. I started school at Mountain View country school. I only spoke Comanche at that time.

When I got to about 4th grade, they consolidated the school and I and my sister had to ride a buggy to Indianahoma. The old gentle horse was harnessed every morning by my stepfather, Niyah, while we ate our breakfast. My older sister would make me drive because she wanted to sit and read on the way to school. She promised to pay me, but my hands got cold and mother put a stop to it since she knew my sister didn't have any money to pay me. I took the buggy to Maddeschi's house, tied it to a stake, and gave the horse hay. Then I walked to school.

We Indians were clannish then and kept pretty much to ourselves. We liked to play ball in an empty lot. On Fridays and Saturdays there would be movies in town. We also went to basketball games, but since there was no gym in town, the games were played outside. We loved to watch the older girls play. They wore knee-length bloomers with pleats in them which had to be pressed. Their long sleeve blouses had a black tie and a collar that was extra big in back. Very thin, high-top tennis shoes and hose completed the outfits. Maggie Heath (now Maggie Parker) was the star we all admired.

I came from a small family but I have 11 children who are all grown now. The oldest is 48, the youngest 30. All of our children have gotten atleast some higher education, and one grandson is now at Dartmouth College. He received an award for being the most outstanding freshman last year.

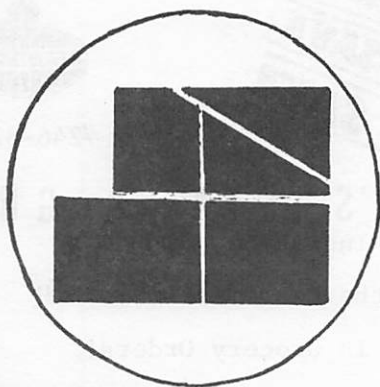

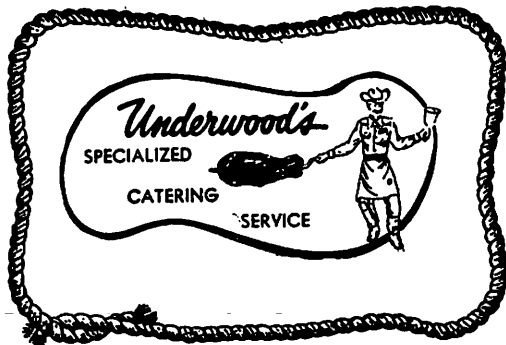
FHA

FHA Walk-a-thon

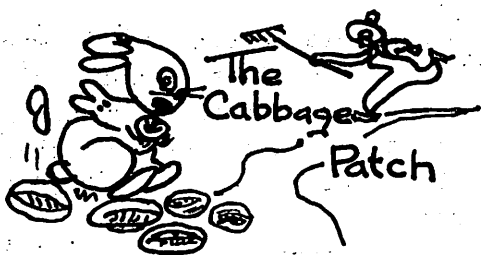

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OLD TIMERS TALE

Maddische Day, "Honoring an Indian Elder"

Sunday evening, Oct. 5th approximately one-hundred people met to honor Maddische, the oldest surviving Comanche in this area. The group met in the mountains at the Doris Recreation center. It was a time for younger generations to honor someone who has spent her life serving her family and people. The gathering was planned by the Christians of Post Oak Church who have benefitted from the steady Christian influence of Maddische. Words in praise of Maddische were spoken by many who remembered that she had always urged them to be Christians who go not two ways but one. Always walking God's Way. They also remembered that she was not one to tell how to be a Christian but rather demonstrated through her lifestyle. She was constantly doing things for others.

This week the Old Timers Tale will not be documented by Maddische since she does not speak English. Her stories are great to hear even through an interpreter. Anyone can catch her sense of humor and spirit without interpretation.

The crowd laughed often as she spoke about early memories near Indianhoma. When it was getting late and dark she told the mothers to count their children.

Maddische is the mother of nine children. She now lives with Lizzie Pacheka, her only living child. Since the Comanches believe in the extended family she also considers her brother's and sister's children as her own. Many people look up to her as Grandma.

As a child she lived out in the mountains north of Indianhoma. She made weekly trips to Fort Sill for supplies, like rice which the Indians called "worm food," and did not want to eat. They were given bacon which they did not know how to use, so they buried it.

She did not attend the White Man's school because her parents felt she was too frail. They hid her when the Indian agent came and told him her eyes were bad. Today she still sees well enough to quickly recognize her friends. She learned a lot when she hid under the tent and listened to her parents discuss history. She heard of the brave things her relatives had done. Her father was good looking and she will laughingly tell you that she did not take after him.

One brother was George Kowena, the first
Deacon of the Post Oak Mission.

Her stories of Jesse James would delight
the heart of any youngster. She loves to
tell of the time he came to the Indian camp
with his outlaws and threw up a piece of
fry bread, shot a hole in it and caught and
ate it. Apparently the Indians and outlaws
were able to share the mountain without any
difficulty.

As a young wife and mother Maddische lived
1½ miles north of town and could be seen walk-
ing into Indianoma for groceries which she
often carried home tied up in shawls on her
back. She raised her nephew from age nine
and Lizzie still thinks of Perry Heath as her
brother.

In 1917 when baby Lizzie was only 2 years
old Maddische was baptised by A.J. Becker.
~~Even before the baptism she had become an~~
active witness to her new faith and had en-
couraged a friend who was also baptised with
her. Today she sings Comanche hymns and
thinks of her past life and laughs.

Maybe she is laughing about that time when
as a young girl she was riding a horse and
saw a roadrunner which she decided to catch.
She jumped off the horse to catch it. Or
perhaps she is just laughing at us for
believing that story. Maybe she is laugh-
ing about the time she climbed a tree after
being told not to and got her foot caught.
For all she knows her shoe may still be in
that crook.

We do not know if the statue of Christ
will remain in the Wichitas, but noone can
remove evidence of God's creation, such as
the beautiful mountains or the Holy Spirit
as it lives in Maddische's heart.

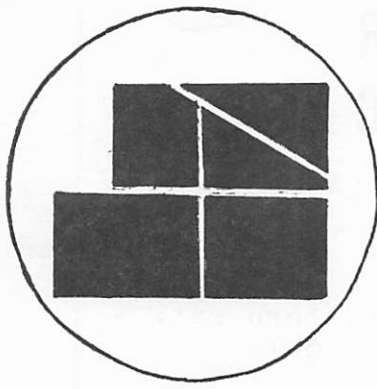

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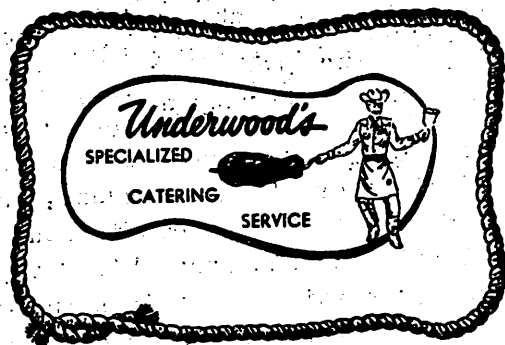
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Oldtimer Remembers

One crisp rainy day, Oct. 18, 1894, Mabel was deposited at our door. Then came Jewel, Oh what a shame! This one was supposed to get a boys name. (Feb. 1896). Genocide in Our Time

(Information from the Oct. issue of
Reader's Digest)

All of us know the horror we feel as we are told about the atrocities of Hitler in Europe. Inside we recoil at the very thought of what one human being was willing to inflict upon another. We shudder and hope that nothing so horrible will occur again. But it is occurring again, in our day and with the knowledge of our government. I am referring to the drive by the Communist Pathet Lao and the Viet Nameese government to systematically wipe out the H'mong tribes people of Laos, our allies during the Viet Nam war. Now they are being gassed, deadly chemicals are dropped by plane and helicopter onto their villages killing many immediatly and leaving others to die slowly from the effects of poisoned water and food supplies.

Our government has not made this a major issue, though the House Sub committee on Asian and Pacific affairs has taken testimony on the gassings. We can shrug it off as an internal affair in a nation far away, but so was the mass murder of Jews in Europe. If you want to stand against this sort of thing, write to your Congressmen and urge that a fully publicized Congressional hearing be called on the matter. Unfortunately, the Oklahoma State Constitution does not permit the state to accept and disburse this money. State question 545 will amend the constitution so as to permit the State Dept. of Transportation to accept and pay out this money to the counties and transportation groups. This is a form of service provided by the county wherein a minibus or van is scheduled to go to a particular area and take the residents to town for necessary business. It is a local service and its use is up to the local residents. This amendment will permit the State Dept. to provide federal money to help make up some of the operating expenses, so that much more service can be given to our small towns.

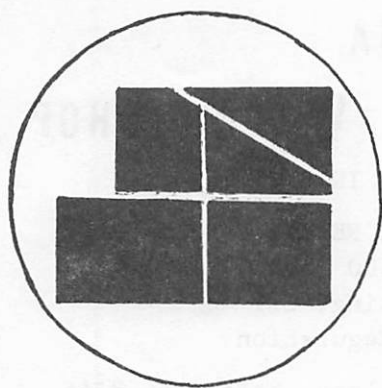

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Old Timers Remembers

The I.M. Prince Family.

Mr. Prince, Ike, was a native of Tennessee. He left there at an early age and settled in Texas; there he met and married a beautiful girl, (Susie Jane), they lived in and around Dallas County in a town called Lancaster.

In 1903, Ike and three of his older sons Bob, Charley and Granvel came to Oklahoma and homesteaded 160 acres just north of Indianahoma. Shortly after arriving they started building a house. They brought with them a man from Texas who built a unique cellar (which is still standing). I think the land belongs to the Doyle Thorn estate now.

When our mother and younger children came in the early part of January 1909 we had to stay with the Ed Young family, until our house was finished. They lived in Indianahoma and we all became good friends and met so many wonderful people. There were six girls, Lou, Norene, Bess, twins, Lealin and Dealin, and Virgie. There were also six boys, Bob, Granvel, Charley, Arthur, Hiram and Bentley. A younger sister was born on March 9, 1910 but after moving to Oklahoma she only lived about eighteen months as she had the measles and pneumonia. In those days there was'nt much even a doctor could do about pneumonia. Her name was Andria.

We made alot of friends at school and they loved to come visit in our home. It never mattered how many came, they were always welcomed. Our parents never complained even tho' they had twelve of their own to cook for. It was'nt like our generation; Lealin and Virgie had only one child each but had their sons brought home one or two friends without notice, they would have gone bananas!

Only three girls remain in the immediate family, Norene Kirkpatrick of Redding, Cal. Lealin Smith and Virgie Harris, both of Indianahoma. Three sister-inlaws also, Ollie Prince of St. Maries, Idaho, Maude Prince and Nita Prince of Indianahoma. When World War I was declared three brothers were called into service, Bob, Granvel and Arthur.

Continued-

Bob and Granvel went overseas. Granvel was killed in action in the "Battle of the Argon Forest"; only three days before the armistice was signed.

The boys had several saddle horses and saddles. We had cousins who would come from Texas almost every summer and spend a month or so with us. We would ride horses, go up into the Wichita Mountains, swim, take picnic lunches, climb mountains, take photographs. At home we would, play croquet and baseball, sing and play the play the organ. On wintery nights we would skate on our pond until we were exhausted and then make taffy candy and popcorn. Never a dull moment!

On Saturday nights our neighbors, the George Leitners, the Dave Bingham, and the Tom Knowles families would bring cakes and homemade ice cream. We had cattle, hogs, chickens, fruit trees and a good garden as most farmers did. All of us would can alot of fruit and vegetables. But the real treat was when we butchered. Each neighbor would help the others and by the time the lard was rendered, the soap made etc. everyone was pretty tired, but happy and thankful. We lost our Dad on November 3, 1920. Mother lived until April 4, 1941 long enough to see all of their children happily married. We had a very happy home life, our parents were superb and we have many precious and pleasant memories, those were the "good ole' days", believe it or not!

Mr. Perry can determine whether you qualify for these monies, but he can not apply for you! You must apply to accept this tax money returning to our community.
