

SOCIAL INVENTION AWARD WINNERS FOR 1988 TRAINING, INC.: Best Unemployment Social Invention (London)

Training, Inc. in the States runs 8 very successful training workshops, mainly for unemployed ethnic minorities. 95% of these trainees complete the course and 85% of these go on to find employment. Many innovative methods are used, such as getting the trainees to act as if they are running a firm during the training; treating the trainees as whole persons, so taking great trouble over childcare or other personal problems; field visits to firms employing course 'graduates'; intensive mock interviews on video; and the ringing of a bell whenever someone gets a job - so that everyone can hear and celebrate the new position.

DEVELOPMENT COMMUNITY

KENYA CONFERENCE ON PRIMARY HEALTH CARE AND FAMILY PLANNING

An advisory committee included a fine mix of government (national/local) donors, NGO's and village residents. Seeking advice and learning how to take it was an important point of growth throughout this experience. A major part of the effort was to turn the image of "conferencing" from academic exercises to the first hand experience of the participants. The conference included one day of field trips to the targeted urban slum areas of Nairobi. The benchmarks of success included: (1) having money and deciding to use it effectively; (2) demonstrating facilitation skills throughout the conference; (3) establishing a longrange collaboration team listen during the conference for feedback to their long-term planning; (4) having fun and (5) understanding that collaboration is a process of mixing intents and resources to bring about a result that will benefit all concerned.


SKUNK WORKS III


