When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. . .

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And, for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

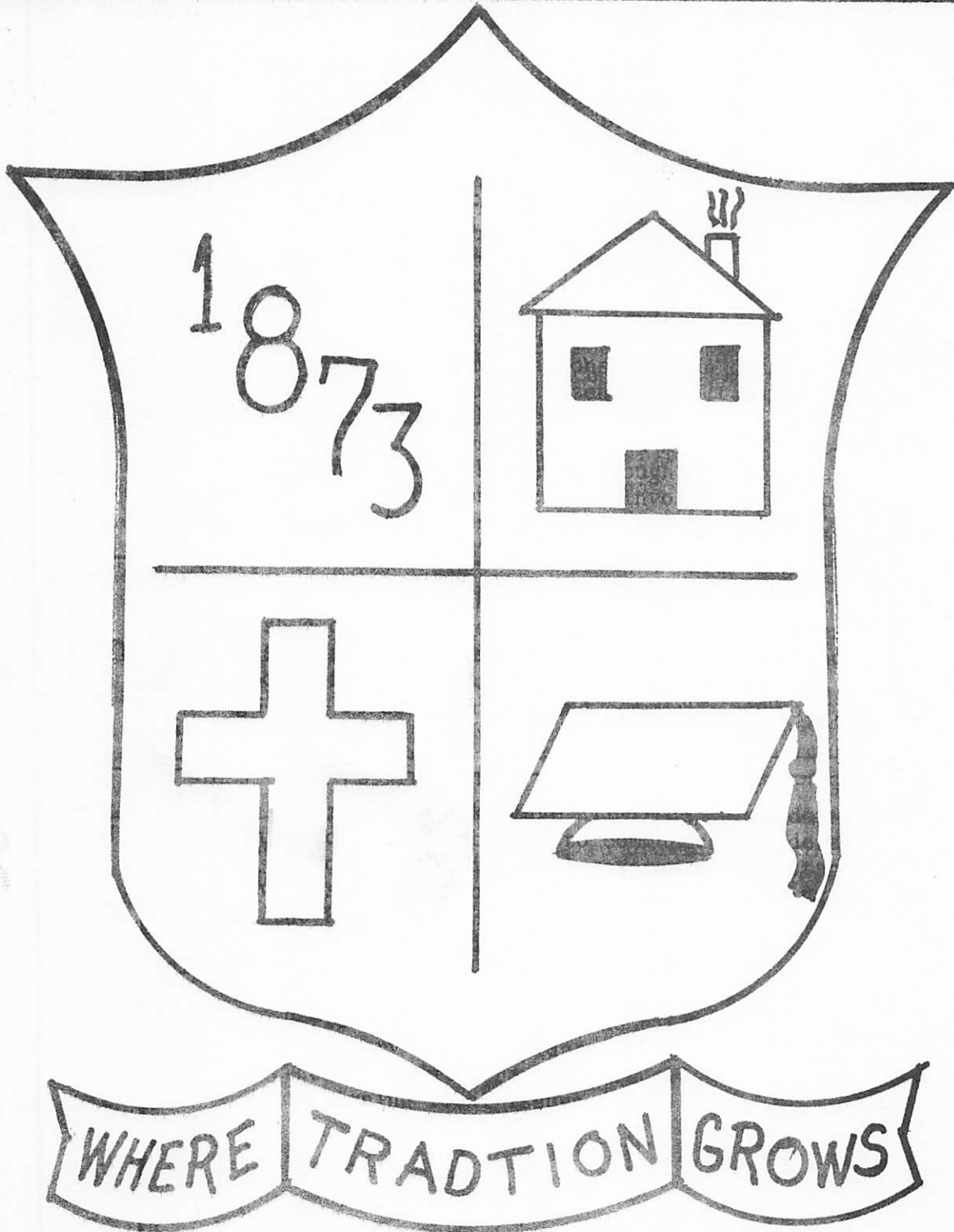

IMPROVED GOVERNMENT MANAGEMENT	<p>In the arena of taxing economic (improved government management the following blocks: beaureacy, no master plan for central city; indicate the underlying contradiction of apathetic citizenry involvement. This is illustrated by reduction of percentage of citizenry turnout and non-concern of issues at public meetings and polls.</p> <p>RED GUILD</p>
ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS	<p>In the arena of environmental concerns the following blocks, Federal and State impact on lifestyle patterns plus lack of physical and financial long range planning, indicate the underlying contradiction of promoting a stable and interested community with vital concerns regarding the city's development. This is illustrated by noise, air, water and visual pollution, flooding, heavy through traffic.</p> <p>RED GUILD</p>
ECONOMIC REALITIES	<p>In the arena of economic the following blocks, lack of diversification in bus (P.U.D.), lack of ingenuity in bus, higher prices/parking, previous financial committments in park facilities, input from public non existant, indicate the underlying contradiction of citizens must support life-sytle for residential community with viable business activities with quality education, recreationg and private property protection (physical and value). This is illustrated by no tax increase, seeking innovative businesses for tax considerations only, citizens don't put in enough of their time to understand problems - yet officials would welcome input.</p> <p>BLUE GUILD</p>
SELF INTEREST VERSUS COMMUNITY INTEREST	<p>In the arena of economics the following blocks,self interest, lack of money, over development of community preservation indicate the underlying contradiction of economics versus preservation. This is illustrated by apathy towards local government need to broaden tax base versus resistance to industry.</p> <p>BLUE GUILD</p>
OVEREXPANSION	<p>In the arena of economic commonality past failures to determine priorities of spending indicate the underlying contradiction of imbalance of service required with funds available. This is illustrated by necessity to lay off teachers and staff in school district.</p> <p>GREEN GUILD</p>

POLITICAL CHALLENGES

CITIZEN INVOLVEMENT	<p>In the arena of citizen involvement the following blocks: apathy, fear of personal conflict, state and federal dictation of local actions; indicate the underlying contradiction of people expecting good government without their personal involvement. This is illustrated by the difficulty in getting people to run for office, and/or get involved in local problems.</p> <p>RED GUILD</p>
DIMINISHED COMMUNITY INTER-RELATIONSHIPS	<p>In the arena of communication and participation the following blocks, satisfaction to let "other guy do it" unless personally affected, indicate the underlying contradiction of putting self before community, due to feeling of individual ineffectiveness and decrease of communicative skills. This is illustrated by low voter turnout at local elections and lack of attendance at community government and social functions.</p> <p>RED GUILD</p>
POLITICAL INVOLVEMENT	<p>In the arean of politics, the following blocks, people won't get involved, indicate the underlying contradiction of people want effective, responsible government, but are reluctant to contribute to it. This is illustrated by recent apathy in Park Ridge over 1) budget process, 2) utility tax proposal.</p> <p>BLUE GUILD</p>
APATHY & FEAR	<p>In the arena of political commonality, the following blocks, resistance to change, indicate the underlying contradiction of citizen suspicion and fear of change makes it difficult to convey full and complete impact of new ideas. This is illustrated by small citizen participation in deciding the library addition referendum, city budget review, etc.</p> <p>GREEN GUILD</p>
LIFE STYLE VS. COST	<p>In the arean of political, the following blocks, teen's role; public apathy; indicate the underlying contradiction of wanting to maintain the good life without paying the price. This is illustrated by not voting - refusing to pay taxes to maintain quality of life style - juvenile vandalism.</p> <p>GOLD GUILD</p>
NON-INVOLVEMENT	<p>In the arena of political issues the follwoing bolcks, adequate status quo-Home Rule-traffic-non local courts; indicate the underlying contratiction of non-involvement</p>

This is illustrated by community pride through home, family, neighborhood, church, organizations and politics.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">RED GUILD</p>
<p>PROGRESSIVE GROWTH VERSUS STATUS QUO</p>	<p>In the arena of culture the following blocks, 1. fear of new ideas limits creativity, 2. lack of sympathy for needs of others("not my problem" attitude), 3. in some cases, lack of family unity and responsibility, indicate the underlying contradiction of progressive growth versus status quo. This is illustrated by 1. real estate firms discourage blacks, 2. no low cost housing, 3. human relations committee never meets.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">BLUE GUILD</p>
<p>SELF DISCIPLINE</p>	<p>In the arena of cultural commonality factionalism by age and interest groups indicate the underlying contradiction of a lack of self discipline illustrated by an unwillingness to participate in; compromise with, or learn about community affairs and problems.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">GREEN GUILD</p>
<p>REFUSING CHANGE</p>	<p>In the arena of cultural commonality the following blocks, apathy, economic resources, looking beyond individual interest, basic satisfaction with quality of life indicate the underlying contradiction: apathy is not the result of lack of interest or involvement it is the refusal to accept fact that change is inevitable. This is illustrated by lack of voter turnout; lack of attendance at public meetings.</p> <p style="text-align: right;">GOLD GUILD</p>

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
UNITED STATES
1787

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

PLANNING	We the citizens of Park Ridge in order to have planned growth propose to provide citizen input to the planning commission through attending scheduled commission meetings, conducting a community survey and disseminating the plans of the commission thru leaflets distributed by the Boy Scouts and thru the school system.

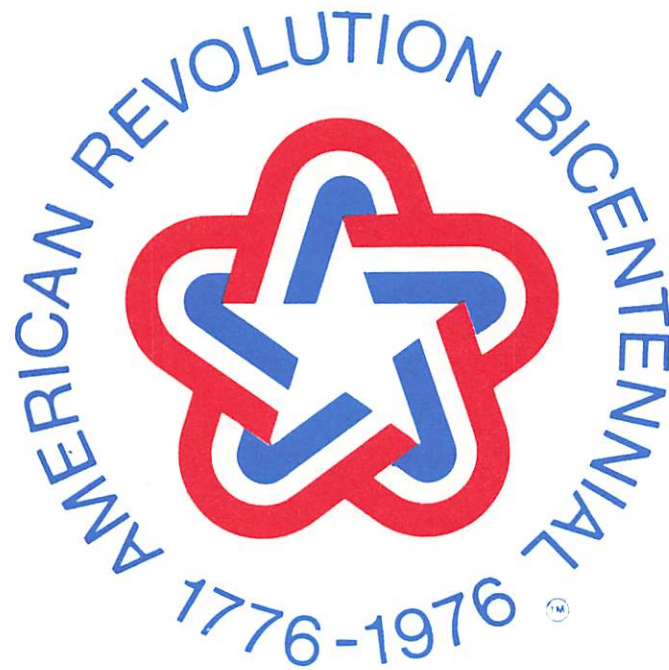
