## OF THE UNITED STATES 1787

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Preamble

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise threreof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right to the people peaceably to the assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. . .

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And, for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

#### "WHERE TO SPEND THE BUCKS"

#### Guild 3 & 4

In the arena of public institutions the following blocks, rampant inflation historical stinginess of South Hollanders, and the lack of information indicate the underlying contradiction of a lack of consensus on priorities. This is illustrated by the defeat of the Thornwood expansion referendum, denial of the use of the park for festival, and unlandscaped parks.

#### "ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER THAN WORDS"

#### Guild 1 & 2

In the arena of economic commonality the following blocks, apathy, lack of money and communications indicate the underlying contradiction of "If we cared a nd communicated more, more interest, action and money would result in such positive results.

This is illustrated by forty years of train noise. The people banded together and then forced a hearing on the subject. Needless to say the people finally won.

#### "INVOLVEMENT IN ISSUES"

Guild 3 & L

In the arena of final meanings of personal life, the following blocks, lack of knowledge about issues and candidates, not knowing how to get involved, and lack of student representation and rights, indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of sutdent representation and rights. This is illustrated by the failure to establish a student bill of rights, and lack of interest by students in recreational facilities.

#### "PUBLIC INVCLVEMENT"

Guild 1 & 2

In the arena of community affiars, the following blocks, facility availability, communication and apathy, indicate the underlying contradiction of social individuality. This is illustrated by lack of pledged attendance of this meeting.

"BLUE LAWS, PFUGS, SAFETY - COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT"
Goild 1 \* 2

In the arena of communal wisdom, the following blocks, concern of businesses, loss of taxes, lack of community agreement, self-centered interests on issues, lack of family involvement and communication, lack of law enforcement, indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of law enforcement, family involvement, and community agreement and cooperation. This is illustrated by some businesses open and some closed on Sundays, vandalism, and lack of cooperation by civic organizations.

#### "COMMUNITY ITEALS CHANGING"

Guild 3&4

In the arena of social structures, the following block, one ethnicreligious philosophy indicates the underlying contradiction of divided
community and overlapping legal jurisdictions. This is illustrated by
stores closed on Sunday, no liquor licenses issued and organizations
leaving the village to hold fund raising events.

#### "PUBLIC APATHY"

#### Guild 1 & 2

In the arena of domestic tranquility the following blocks, legal base and legislative onsensus indicate the underlying contradiction of apathy of the community. This is illustrarated by the poor attendance at Village Board Meetings. The lack of communication between groups and organizations and poor voter turnout at elections.

#### " SOUTH HOLLAND NEEDS CHANGE "

#### Guild 3

POLITICAL CHALLENGES

In the arena of Political issues the following blocks, oligarchy in South Holland, Calvinistic church authority and racial prejudice for economic reasons. This is illustrated by the blue laws, re: Sunday closings, sesegregation of schools and housing discrimination by realtors.

#### " INADEQUATE POLITICAL PROCESS "

#### Guild 4

POLITICAL CHALLENGES

In the arena of political commonality the following blocks, lack of judicial support, poor foreign affairs, apathy indicate the underlying contradiction of inddequate political process, undeclard wars, small percentages of voter turnout in elections. This is illustrated by delays in criminal courts, criminals being set free, the S.S.T. situation, Angola, and less than 50 % turnout in the recent primary.

#### " DISCUSS THE ISSUES "

#### Guild 1 and 2

In the arena of community welfare the following blocks, lack of discussion, action and apathy of the community, indicate the underlying contradiction of lack of communication and stagnating the issues. This is illustrated by train crossings and truck traffic violations.

#### "CREATION OF COMMUNITY COMMUNICATION CENTER"


We the citizens of South Holland in order to improve communication and dissemination of information promoting understanding of the community needs, problems and possible alternatives for actions propose a community information exchange through a creation of a creation of a community committee organization board, development of a research committee and informational outlets,

#### "COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT"

We the citizens of South Holland in order to establish two-way communitions between Village gov ernment and the citizens. We propose to get the people informed and involved through establishing a Community Organizations Commission, publicizing agenda and actions of all Village commissions and boards, establishing a Village Public Relations Department, and have the Village Board survey the community for needs, proposals, and possible solutions.

#### "OUR FUTURE - PLAN OR ACCIDENT ?"

We the citizens of South Holland in order to plan for the future of our community propose to encourage people to run for office; formulate a long-range city plan; build a consensus and if desirable, propose a referendum for the Park District and Board through: 1. Asking leaders of service groups and church organization to run for office; 2. Running an urban planning contest to get prize money from banks; secure approval of village board; take referendum; give winner's rendition to village; implement most aspects; perhaps be run by Bicentennial Commission; 3. Utilizing service clubs for door to door effort on creation duties; needs and financing for Park District and Board; 4. Establish referendum for Park District and Board if consensus shos this is wanted in the community.



#### Community Unity

We the citizens of South Holland, in order to create a more interesting and inviting community to live in and be proud of propose:

- 1. A youth organization focused on skills and talents for community projects and beautification of the community for all to enjoy,
- 2. Block Parties,
- 3. Organization meeting for Block Clubs.
  - A. Ask city and private industry and people for materials and money
  - B. Ask for someone to do skills training for youth in landscaping, gardening and other areas
  - C. Break voter precincts down to smaller block areas to get lists for Block Clubs

The community of South Holland came to be in the mid-1800's. It was established by conservative, religious, energetic Dutch people seeking self-support and religious freedom. There was a turning point in 1947 when the Veteran's Park was established and the farmers started selling their land.

South Holland now is seen as a melting pot of upper-middle class residents striving to maintain their past heritage and independence from Chicago.

The future of South Holland holds a community that is safe and secure. Newcomers will expect to find a continuation of the ideals held by the original Dutch settlers and a maintenance of social, economic and political standards set in the past.
