



When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. . .

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And, for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES 1787

We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Preamble

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise threreof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right to the people peaceably to the assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.



WHAT ABOUT US?

The International Society of Weekly Newspaper Editors was founded in 1954 by a group of editors and educators eager to improve the quality of editorial writing in grassroots journalism.

The principal founders were Dr. Howard R. Long of Southern Illinois University and Houstonn Waring of the Littleton (Colorado) Independent.

The organization first called the International "Conference" of Weekly Newspaper Editors, was headquartered for its first two decades at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale and usually met at Pere Marquette State Park, near Grafton, Illinois. Following the retirement of Dr. Long, the now "Society" became affiliated with Northern Illinois University at DeKalb in 1975. The university makes available its Lorado Taft Field Camous at Oregon for the Society's conference each June.

A distinguishing feature of ISWNE during its first 25 years has been the presentation of the Golden Quill Award for the best editorial of the year submitted at large and the listing of the "Golden Dozen" top entries.

Community conscience is epitomized in the Eugene Cervi Award, presented for moral courage in journalism, demonstrated over a period of years.

The Cervi Award commemorates one of ISWNE's earliest and most outspoken members who for many years operated Cervi's Rocky Mountain Journal in Denver. In 1979, the Cervi Award went to Houstoun Waring, one of the founders of ISWNE 25 years previously.

The Society hopes to renew its membership by attracting young editors from various countries and geographical areas in an effort to offer a balance of ideas and experience. ISWNE also seeks to encourage periodic regional meetings of members and contemplates additional overseas study trips similar to these it has conducted to the British Isles and Eastern Asia. Its 1980 conference has been proposed for Canada at Brock University, St. Catharines, Ontario.

GROWTH FOLICY

In the area of growth, the following blocks exist; qualified editors need to be identified, and editors need to be identified. The challange facing ISWNE is deciding ISWNE growth policies and devise a program. At the present time only informal conversations have been held and there is no policy statement.

ISWNE INVOLVEMENT

In the area of involvement the following blocks exist; money, time and distance. The challence facing ISWNE is making it possible for desirable members to overcome distance, time and money. Examples of this are the fact that most of the people attending the conference are from this area, there are only two new members this year and there are few small papers represented except those in the area.

FOCUSING SERVICE

In the area of service several blocks exist including unfocused objectives, service is never discussed and unconcern. The challange facing ISWNE is focusing the organization's objectives. Examples of this are the fact that there is no scholarship fund, and there is no established aid policy.

ISWNE MEMBERSHIP PROMOTION

In the area of promotion the following blocks exist: lethargy, preconception, no full-time director and vehicles are limited. The challange is motivating a few key members. An example of promotion is the fact that only two new members joined this year.

MEMBERSHIP ADVANTAGES

In the area of membership the fact that a lack of facilities and programs, short staff or other problems on our newspaper, and potential lack of communication between meetings indicates the underlying challange is improving communications to determine needs and wants of members and establish newspaper exchanges. This is illustrated by not knowing if children are interested in attending meetings and Ed DeCourcey's staff illness.

WHO WHERE HOW WHEN WHY

In the arena of better promotion of ISWNE the fact that regional sessions are a new idea and not fully organized and that uniqueness is hard to define indicates the underlying challange is priortizing the goals of ISWNE in terms of individual members time and resources. This is illustrated by present conference attendance is less than expected.

FIND AN ANGEL

In the arena of services that funding sources are not known, and those in need are often unknown. The underlying challeng is to investigate such sources and establish means to use this information. This is illustrated by the J.R. and Aspen caper, the Dubuque foundation fiasco, and the Hick's saga.

WHAT 9,000 WEEKLY EDITORS SHOULD KNOW

In the arena of Grassroots Editor, the fact that not enough professionels know about it indicates the underlying challange is promotion of awareness of the magazine in the profession. This is illustrated by not enough articles are being submitted.

A HAND UP

We, the members of ISWNE in order to enable young editors to attend the conference, propose creating afour (4) \$200 fellowships for the 1980 Conference by listing foundations that would be interested. Have beard appoint two solicitors and report back to January board meeting.

TALK TO EACH OTHER

We, the members of ISWNE in order to improve communication with members and board proposed to expand the general meeting.

TAKE A STACK HOME

We, the members of ISWNE in order to promote Grassroots Editors propose members take home stacks of journals and plan to share them with local editors with tear sheets when appropriate and send to journalism schools.

WAIT TILL NEXT YEAR!

We, the members of ISWNE in order to promote the 1980 Conference propose contacting qualified weekly editors in February by telephone, telegrams and mailgrams.

INCREASED PARTICIPATION

We, the members of ISWNE, in order to attract participants from a wider area, propose a mailing to those members unable to attend, followed by personal contact. To get this moving we would write a personal letter, designand mail a promotional brechure of this year's meeting, procure personal recruiters, and follow with a phone call from a participant

MEMBERSHIP POLICIES

We, the members of the International Society of Weekly Newspaper Editors in order to determine membership policies, propose board review of membership policies. To get this moving we would request a review of membership policy by the board and request a report of its results to the membership in the newsletter.

PROMOTION OF ISWNE

We, the members of ISWNE, in order to promote the society, propose board action. To get this moving we would establish a "Weekly Editor of the Month Award, I", urge each member to seek new qualified members in his IX state, issure promotional literature and explore other avenues.
