

The Social Process

I. DEVELOPMENT, ADVANCEMENT, AND MOTIVATION AROUND THE COMMUNITY

In the arena of community care, these blocks exist, Inadequate facilities, lack of publicity for a congressman's visit, lack of facilities for young people, and inadequate educational facilities and plant. This indicates that the underlying contradiction is lack of unity and motivation, and the people being focused on family andd work to the exclusion of community concerns. This is illustrated by Civil Defense problems and the local High School.

II. COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENTS

In the arena of community depreciation these blocks exist: lack of money, disinterest, location and lack of concern, state legislation, and small population. This indicates that the underlying contradiction is too many people on fixed income, a second group on welfare, and a third group that is disinterested. The first group won't vote on bond issues, the second just don't care, and the third are getting tired of putting up with and paying for the other two. This is illustrated by the present conditions of people loafing, not working, a lack of pride and the run-down condition of property.

III. COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT AND CONCERN

In the arena of economic inadequacies, these blocks exist: there is no participation in community efforts by the people. This indicates that the underlying contradiction is lack of community concern and know-how. This is illustrated by numerous surveys taken with minimal response.

Getting the People Working Together

Start talking to people, ask for suggestions Invite people to work on committees Visit your neighbor Elders work on community project Communicate the value of a small town to the people Involve the parents through involvement of the children

Communicate Invormation about the Community

Start a community debating committee Hold public meetings Organize a community-oriented club or organization Form a PTA

Stimulate Community Interest

Men play the women in baseball A small group get excited about community activity so others will see it and get interested Have a square dance Build a park as a community activity

UNITY THROUGH UNITED EFFORT PROPOSAL
