

THE NEW STORY FROM PRAIRIE TO SUBURB

Hardy early English pioneers, viewing the beautiful floweringopen prairie of Morton from its eastern bluffs recognized its potential as some of the richest farmland in the world and impulsively sank their plows into the soil, beginning a community of people destined to eventually work out the problems not only of developing this soil to feed a nation but farm machinery to feed a humgry world. Peoples' concern and need for religious freedom brought the Methodist circuit rider, the Monnonite and Apostolics, Crandall's Station, near Morton was a stop on the Lincoln circuit riding trail. Early industries were the tile works and potteries, fence and grain elevator factories and a cannery for the bright orange pumpkins. Productive farms, hardworking and industrious people satisfied and enjoying the way of life they had established and resistant to changing it.

Morton has grown into a village noted for its community pride. Young in time *\frac{1}{2} and in spirit, we mix the traditions of the green and the gold rows of productive *\frac{1}{2} farmland and the yellow "beasts" carving progress for the world. People going to *\frac{1}{2} church on Sunday morning are Morton's version of a traffic jam. Then there is *\frac{1}{2} Peter Peter Punpkin Eater who could build his "Beautiful Home" on the corner of *\frac{1}{2} Jackson and Morton, and feel right at home.

We have no more the narrow straight rows of corn for neighbors. The streets, the homes, the shrubs, the trees reach further toward the horizon. The annual mound of pumpkins has shrunken like the grape to the raison. Morton as a village has faded in memory. The industrial park is no nore plowed land, rather it is busy with the activity of light industry. Caterpillar remains a strong influence. We find ourselves as a suburb, as one community meeting others. A park, a playground is but a short walk. Driving is not hectic, rather a quick journey. The arts and crafts flourish with interest and activity. Education is a family commitment for yet the future. Though the farm is no longer dominent, the rural heritage remains. 

A BRIEF HISTORICAL ACCOUNT OF THE VILLAGE OF MORTON By Robert C. Conibear

Prepared especially for Morton Town Meeting '76, May 1, 1976



In 1831 the J. Evans family built a large log cabin about one mile north of Morton at the present intersection of North Main Street and Route 74 overpass. Evan's established a trading post and eventually this location came to be known as Evan's Corner. In 1853 J. Evans was appointed postmaster. In 1839 the first Community Center was constructed across from the Evan's trading post. It also doubled as a school house during the week and a church on Sunday with the Congregationalists and the Methodists using it alternate Sundays.

Early in the 1840's the community leaders formed a Library Association. The Community Center Building was known as "Liberty Hall". Abraham Lincoln made several speeches here. In 1868 the library burned to the ground.

James Campbell made the first survey of Morton around 1850. The town then was bounded by a triangle formed by North Main, West Jefferson and Garfield Streets. Between 1854 and 1858 the post office at Evan's Corner was moved to Morton and the use of the Community Center at Evan's Corner stopped.

Morton Township was formed in 1851, with Horace H. Clark, Jr., serving as the first township supervisor. From 1860 to 1875 Morton received Swiss and Southern German immigrants.

In 1871 Morton had outgrown the old one room school house on Main Street. A board of directors composed of Dr. Conibear, Thomas Scott, and Frank Griesser decided to endure the complaints of irate citizens which opposed needless expenditures and had a school erected on the present site of the Jefferson Grade School.



This structure lasted from 1871 to 1928 when it was replaced with Jefferson Grade School. The Morton Township High School was built in 1903 on the present site of the Morton Junior High School.

Morton received the village charter from Springfield November 15, 1877. Clarence Campbell was listed on the charter as Mayor and Lorenzo Durham was listed as Village Clerk. Because of personal differences between Campbell and Durham, Dr. William Conibear was made acting Mayor about September 15, 1877. Morton began using the Village Seal on January 4, 1878 on the first ordinance book. The population of Morton then was 400 people.

THE PRESENT CHALLENGES

Imbalanced City Leadership

In the arena of Economic Commonality the fact that control of finances and city leadership by established groups indicates that the underlying contradiction is a lack of balance between the established people and emerging concerned people of Morton. This contradiction is illustrated by voter apathy, fear of tax increases, ratio of age groups and control of elected and appointed city leaders.

GUILD: A-D

Economic Growth vs. Bedroom Town Syndrome

In the arena of Economic Commonality the fact that resistance to change indicates that the underlying contradiction is conflict of economic growth vs. bedroom town syndrome. This contradiction is illustrated by high cost of living, lack of diversified industry and low cost housing.

Dependence on Short-Range Goals

In the arena of Political Commonality the fact that government regulation, resistance to change, failure to relate to natural evolvements, lack of clear cut role of local government bodies, and financial limitations versus opinions of priorities indicates that the underlying contradiction is dependence on short-range goals rather than long and short-range goals. This contradiction is illustrated by efforts for a golf course, swimming pool, auditorium, YMCA and traffic control solution still not finalized.

GUILD: A-D

Broad Based Planning

In the arena of Political Commonality the fact that independent private and governing groups indicates that the underlying contradiction is inadequate broad based planning. This contradiction is illustrated by lack of consensus between private and governing groups.

GUILD: B-C

Lack of Individual Responsibility

In the arena of Political Commonality the fact that the public remains uninformed indicates that the underlying contradiction is lack of individual responsibility. This contradiction is illustrated by the people's lack of communication because they do not read the newspaper, lack interest and enthusiasm.

No Relevant Role in Decision-Making

In the arena of Cultural Commonality the fact that people don't feel they have any power to change things indicates that the underlying contradiction is that people don't feel motivated to change things. This contradiction is illustrated by poor attendance at village board meetings, small turn-out at elections and leaving decisions to a committee.

GUILD: A-D

Lack of Communication in Community

In the arena of Cultural Commonality the fact that social organizations are not fulfilling their functions due to a lack of individual involvement indicates that the underlying contradiction is a lack of communications of community needs. This contradiction is illustrated by lack of specific activities for youth to do, drugs and alcohol problems, vandalism, transient aspects of the community.

GUILD: A-D

Lack of Participation

In the arena of Cultural Commonality the fact that lack of participation indicates that the underlying contradiction is apathy. This contradiction is illustrated by the lack of attendance at community meetings.





A board of directors composed of Dr. Conibear, Thomas Scott, and Frank Griesser decided to endure the complaints of irate citizens which opposed needless expenditures and had a school erected on the present site of the Jefferson Grade School.



This structure lasted from 1871 to 1928 when it was replaced with Jefferson Grade School. The Morton Township High School was built in 1903 on the present site of the Morton Junior High School.

Morton received the village charter from Springfield November 15, 1877. Clarence Campbell was listed on the charter as Mayor and Lorenzo Durham was listed as Village Clerk. Because of personal differences between Campbell and Durham, Dr. William Conibear was made acting Mayor about September 15, 1877. Morton began using the Village Seal on January 4, 1878 on the first ordinance book. The population of Morton then was 400 people.
