When, in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. That, to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; that, whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new government, laying its foundation on such principles, and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their safety and happiness. . .

We, therefore, the representatives of the United States of America, in general Congress assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the name, and by the authority of the good people of these colonies, solemnly publish and declare, that these united colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states; that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the state of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved; and that, as free and independent states, they have full power to levy war, conclude peace, contract alliances, establish commerce, and to do all other acts and things which independent states may of right do. And, for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honour.

ECONOMIC MANAGEMENT	In the arena of economic and social priorities the underlying challenge is re-alignment of economic and social priorities, which has to do with innefectient use of tax dollars, separate polling places, separate voting dates, duplication of school staffs, duplication of taxing bodies, personnel and equipment, multibody purchasing, and difficulty of determining social need.
EFFICIENT USE OF RESOURCES	In the arena of distribution of common resources the underlying challenge is using resources efficiently with a minimum of waste and respect to overall needs, which has to do with energy conservation measures: 1. turn down thermostat, 2., turn off lights, 3 car pooling, and 4. observe speed limits
ECONOMIC WASTE	In the arena of economic waste the underlying challenge is overconsumption of natural resources and improper use of economic and human resources, which has to do with economic, political, and cultural priorities.
AND RESOURCES	In the arena of benefits and resources, the underlying challenge is to efficiently meet each individual's basic need, which has to do with maintaining an adequate lifestyle in healthcare, employment, housing, and transportation.
THICS IN GOVERNMENT AND BUSINESS	In the arena of business and governmental ethics, the underlying challenge is for the leaders of business and government to re-evaluate the ethical scope of their responsibilities and thereby establish less selfish priorities, which has to do with the presently excessive profits, patronage systems, and lack of community concern.
RESOURCES AND DISTRIBUTION	In the arena of economic resources and distribution, the underlying challenge is to realize the far reaching effects of decisions, which has to do with youth employment, conservation of energy; possibility of lower population in regard to use of natural resources and talent toward development of pride.

POLITICAL CHALLENGES

JUSTICE IN LAW	In the arena of justice in law the underlying challenge is law enforcement reforms which has to do with equal justice and law enforcement for all.
PROTECTION OF HUMAN DIGNITY AND RIGHTS	In the arena of equality of justice for all the underlying is to reestablish a firm foundation which has to do with equal justice for all economic levels through broader, committed citizen involvement.
SIMPLIFICA FICATION OF METHODS	reactively freely and practically
POLITICAL LIBERTIES	In the arena of participation in govenment the underlying challenge is making the little guy heard in areas beside voting which has to do with eliminating the clout of the big lobbiests in terms of house bills brought to vote and motivating the individual.
GUARDING CITIZEN'S RIGHTS	In the arena of interaction between govenment and individuals the underlying challenge is guarding citizens rights which has to do with too much collection of information, abuse of welfare, inadequate women's rights.
CITIZEN FRUSTRA- TION	In the arena of government and citizen responsibility the underlying challenge is government accountability and citizen education and action which has to do with prosecution of lawless politicians and voter registration and participation.
CITIZEN	In the arena of government-citizen interaction the underlying challenge is involving people more actively in directing government in the solution of their problems at job market diverse community apathy at the pools, preservation of open space and involvement of youth.
LAW ENFORCE- MENT AND SECURITY	In the arena of law enforcement and security the underlying challenge is to teach respect for individual rights and property to provide a safe existence for all people.

COMMUNITY FRAGMENTA- TION	In the arena of social consciousness the underlying challenge is to create a community awareness which has to do with apathy - lack of participation in local events, community growth, multifamily dwelings and industrial growth, latino discrimination, and family fragmentation, drugs and morals.	
ETHICAL "CRISIS	In the arean of self interest and apathy the underlying challenge is recreating pride in self and community which has to do with school and park vandalism and lack of interest in local government bodies.	
LANGUAGE LIMITATION	In the arean of corporate language the underlying challenge is to create group mindedness and empathy between diverse parts of cultures. which has to do with how they will personally begefit through their individual efforts toward the community.	
HUMAN RIGHT AND CIVIL (LIBERTIES	In the arean of human rights and civila liberties the underlying challenge is to create respect for the individual; a sense of the value of each person which has to do with equality for women; violence as a solution; inadequate environmental control; and abortion and euthanasia	
INADEQUATE PLANS	In the arean of planning for the future the underlying challenge is overcoming apathy about letting someone else do the planning which has to do with inadequate controls and limited planning.	
COMMUNITY CONCERN	In the arena of community concern the underlying challenge is personal involvement in social and political affairs in the community which has to do with the individuals responsibility to the community.	
COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT	In the arean of community involvement the underlying challenge is to get everybody to participate which has to do with getting people interested in their homes, schools, on the whole their communities, and themselves and to get people to have respect for their fellow man.	
STRENGTHEN— THE FAMILY	In the arena of strengthening the family, the underlying challenge is to reestablish the purpose of the family by creating goods, bettering communication, setting better moral standards and understanding interchanging of roles.	
COMIUNAL WISDOM	In the arena of communal wisdom the underlying challenge is to evolve a viable system dealing with current problems relating to inadequate education, lack of security, and apathetic responses.


