1937-38 Oil Boom

Town Board has seen that Patoka has all necessary public utilities

PRESENT ISSUES AND CONCERNS

WHE CHALLENGES

"LET JOHN DO 1T"

The ALENA OF Social Systems BREAKDOWE, these blocks exist: lac of ambition, parental delinquency, infiled tration of bad habits from foreign lands, definite lack of authority at nome, school, or in government, non-certification of teachers, preachers, and public officials this indicates that the underlying contradiction is The OUR AFFIGERY SOCIETY, BOTTAL THIS TO BE TRUEPENDENT AND CLAUSE TO CALL THEIR METHORS this is illustrated by more crime, disinterested and participating politicians, lack of citizemery in public affairs because they ask, "What good does it do?"

WEAK ECONCHIC BASE

IN HE ALENA OF LONLY MALMUTRICTION, these blocks exist don't know how to go about it having time to investigate and it's hard to get peop ir working This indicates that the underlying contradiction is WE DON'T KNOW HOW TO APPROACH GROWTH FROM LOCAL STANDPOINT thi is illustrated by not knowing how to get to the right person, priorities on other uses of time prevent time spent of investigating local growth possibilities.

WILL PARTICIPATION HELP?

IN THE ARENA OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT LEPRESENTATION, these blocks exist: we don't vote, we don't grab opportunities, there is a lach of young leadership, people don't speak out for what they think is right, This indicates that the underlying contradiction is that citizens don't want to get involved This is illustrated by school election - many of us didn't go, there is an attitude of "If I don't have kids, I don't need to vote"

COMMUNITY FESTIVALS

WE THE CITIZENS OF PATOKA in order to raise money to support existing projects and afford the opportunity for people to get together PROPOSE holding Community Festivals through several organizations in town forming committees: Lions, Legion, and Legion Auxilery.
