THE CHALLENGES

In the arena of economics; these blocks exist: lack of concern, cooperation, knowledge, and follow-thru. This indicates that the underlying contradiction is not knowing where or to who we can sell what we can offer for an industry. This is illustrated by no new industry.

In the arena of civic pride, these blocks exist: lack of cooperation, and knowledge of tapping resources, people are reluctant to assume leadership, and the cost of new ventures. This indicates that the underlying contradiction is that we haven't found a way to get the whole town moving in one direction.

In the arena of political cooperation, these blocks exist; limited political voice in state and county matters, and an unresponsive bureaucracy. This indicates that the underlying contradiction is not knowing how to deal with state/county bureaucracy, and not barning together with other small towns with same problems. This is illustrated by not learning about plans until they're in action.
