

- In the arena of Community Participation, the fact that most people do not participate together and many have full schedules indicates that the underlying contradiction is that THE DOERS ARE OVERWORKED AND THE OTHERS ARE INDIFFERENT. This contradiction is illustrated by only a few go to meetings and they go to several a night sometimes.
- II. In the arena of the Future Wellbeing of the Youth of the Community, the fact that people do not display concerned interest indicates that the underlying contradiction is a SOCIAL CLIMATE IN WHICH PEOPLE WOULD RATHER CRITICIZE THAN BECOME INVOLVED. This is illustrated by conflict in the local school situation.
- III. In the arena of An Inflationary Period,
 the fact that a small population, lack of funds on state and
 local levels, apathy among the town people, and "small circle"
 pride indicate that the underlying contradiction is the
 INABILITY FOR THE GRASSROOTS TO COMMUNICATE LOCALLY AND WITH
 THE STATE AND FEDERAL LEVELS. This contradiction is illustrated
 by comparison of La Harpe and Stronghurst.
- IV. In the arena of Political Commonality, the fact that people lack cooperation with each other indicates that the underlying contradiction is that PEOPLE ARE UNWILLING TO BE INVOLVED FINANCIALLY OR PHYSICALLY. This contradiction is illustrated by poor attendance at this meeting.

PROPOSALS

- I. We the citizens of Stronghurst, in order to keep the community informed, propose a WEEKLY LISTING OF COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES IN THE NEWSPAPER through solicitation of various organizations to submit information of their activities to Quill.
- II. We the citizens of Stronghurst, in order to involve people, propose a CLEANUP DAY THROUGH INVOLVING YOUTH AND CITIZENS.
- III. We the citizens of Stronghurst, in order raise funds for improvements, propose to INVESTIGATE GOVERNMENT FUNDING, THROUGH INVITING PEOPLE to a discussion with a RC&D representative.
- IV. We the citizens of Stronghurst, in order to provide more youth and adult activity, propose REGULAR ADULT_YOUTH DANCES AND ENTERTAINMENT, THROUGH A COMMITTEE COMPOSED OF YOUTH, ADULTS AND SENIOR CITIZENS to investigate best times, funding, local talent, publicity, evaluation of each one held for betterment of next one.
- V. We the citizens of Stronghurst in order to provide constructuve use of human energy, propose campaign to acquire additional playground equipment for the park, through cooperation of all community clubs--Boosters, Lions, Jaycees, Senior Citizens churches, school, Legion.
