It is the intent of this report to begin the pull together of activity and new directions catalyzed by the IERD and to elicite a much more broad and direct input from co-sponsors, national steering committees and delegates to the CIE.1

The New Realilty of Development

1.SHARING APPROACHES THAT WORK-Lateral Communication among Practitioners

The new reality is a 'sharing approaches' mode of cooperation in the urgent business of catalyzing sustainable self-help development...in contrast to the traditional 'go it alone' competative mode.

In most of the nations represented at the Central International Event (CIE) held in February, 1984, delegates have set up events to draw other practitioners together. They have studied the 'Voices of Rural Practitioners' series, heard reports from New Delhi, displayed their own projects and interchanged their approaches. These have included National Expositions of Rural Development in the Philippines, Spain and Egypt; Regional Development Symposiums in India, Taiwan, Peru, Guatamala, Honduras, Mexico and Canada; a State-wide Consultation in Karnataka, India; State-wide Expositions in Colorado, Montana, Wyoming, New Mexico in the USA; and urban Expositions of Local Development in Hong Kong, Los Angeles and Pittsburg, Kausa Cty.

Systematic documentation is continuing, as in Kenya where the Ford Foundation has underwritten a nation-wide campaign to locate and document signal projects for 'replication.' A team continues to refine the IERD Data Base begun in Phase I as a globally available electronic source of primary information. This data base now includes over 1000 carefully documented projects. The data base is assisting international agencies and local practitioners in finding practical insights and techniques from successful projects to assist them in determining development policies and solving local problems.

2. RURAL DEVELOPMENT PRACTITIONERS - A Profession Whose Time has Come

The new reality is a depth collegiality among professionals in rural development. The traditional distinction between government and private or non-government practitioner seems irrelevant in light of their foundational 'vocational commitment.' They share a deep passion to deal effectively with the massive yet unnecessary suffering in contrast to the limited yet often squandered resources available to address the need.

In New Delhi the 650 delegates discovered each other and are becoming a network of seasoned, committed professional rural development workers. Through this network new village to village partnerships are being established. For example one local project director in the Philippines who went to the CIE has set up a barter system of exchanging basic

commodities: rice, fish, spices, cooking oil and bananas among village projects from various corners of the nation. The idea was catalyzed in India and the network was established through the Philippine Exposition of Rural Development. A local solar-energy project in Colorado which was at the CIE has sent a team back to India to exchange expertise.

Since New Delhi, rural development practitioners are continuing to discover others and are expanding from the 'sharing approaches' technology into transfering skills, exploring new inter-project partnerships, doing professional collaborative strategic planning, and enjoying a collegiality. In India and the Philippines practitioners have formed Professional Associations. In each case they are clarifying their professional identity, establishing linkages with other professional groups, communicating their perspective to others in the development community, and improving their professional skills. They are also 'trade secrets' laterally as in the 7 day Human Development exchanging Training School in Guatamala. Similar exchanges are happening in Kenya, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Egypt, India, the Philippines, Korea, Peru, Mexico, Honduras, Jamaica, Portugal, Germany, Canada and the USA.

3. PRACTITIONERS SPEAK OUT - Messages from the Local Perspective

The new reality is a local approach to development rising out of years of living and working with local residents, struggling to find realistic ways to spark local initiative and sustain it. Village residents and local projects which have lived in isolation for years are now sharing their real-life wisdom and interjecting their perspective into the larger development process.

Immediately following the Delhi event a 28 page newspaper tabloid was produced and sent to delegates, co-sponsors, global advisory board members, and participating agencies. The projects that were represented at the CIE have been drawn together into a Directory of Rural Development Projects. The Directory is now available from the Publisher, K. G. Saur who distributes primarily to national and public libraries on a worldwide basis. It includes an overview of 300 projects, a list of their accomplishments, cross references and names and addresses of contact persons. Videos have been produced and distributed to delegations telling the story of the IERD. The Video 'Courage to Care,' featuring Sir Richard Attenborough has appeared on TV stations in many of the delegate nations. New documentary Videos of 'approaches that work' are appearing in Venezuela, Jamaica, the Philippines and the USA.

A series of eight "Voices of Rural Practitioners" booklets have been written from the documentation, interviews and workshops conducted in Phase I and Phase II. Since the original publication in booklet form they have been carefully edited in light of additional input from the project directors whose work provided the basis of the publication. These have now been drawn together into a single volume and will also be published by K. G. Saur by January 1, 1986. A third volume will include papers by key development figures and local practitioners from across the world, plus a detailed report on Phase III, to be released in 1986. Centres of Interchange and sharing approaches that work publications are emerging in India, Kenya, Egypt, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Belgium, the United Kingdom, Canada and the USA.

4. DEVELOPMENT EDUCATION - Mobilizing Practical Responsibility

The new reality is that citizens from technologically advanced nations are grasping the urgency to understand the real situation and invest their resources and expertise toward long term solutions. They are becoming more awakened to the enlightened self-interest of tackling the complex problems that inhibit the self-reliance and self-sufficiency of the poor...and that they are a part of the problem as well as have a key role in the solution.

An example of development education which uses the learnings of the IERD is called HEART OF THE MATTER in the State of Texas, USA. Partly funded by USAID it uses videos, slide shows, participatory games, and dialogue with third world citizens to awaken service clubs, schools, churches and voluntary organizations to the solutions now available for addressing absolute poverty. The process trains participants to 'think and act developmentally.' University and Secondary School courses with a similar perspective on development are being introduced in Belgium, Germany, Japan and the USA. A VILLAGE VOLUNTEERS project in the United Kingdom encourages funding the operating costs of indigenous village development practitioners.

Volunteers from the more technologically developed world are seeking ways to be directly involved in the development process. For example Rotary, International club members from the U.S., India, Spain and England are going into rural villages in Jamaica, Venezuela and India, bringing their expertise and their resources to work WITH the villagers. Japanese students are doing shoulder to shoulder workcamps in the Philippines. Training programmes have been established in London, Toronto, Chicago, Sydney, Seoul and Tokyo to prepare volunteers to be of significant service in rural areas of Zambia, Kenya, the Philippines, India, Peru, Venezuela, Jamaica, and the Pacific Islands. In each case the volunteers pay their own way and their own local expenses.

5. DEVELOPMENT POLICY CONSULTATIONS - A New Era of Micro-Macro Dialogue

The new reality is the willingness of global/national leaders and local citizens to take each other seriously as partners in a joint effort. There is a new level of hard-nosed strategizing toward designing effective programmes to deal with the fundamental contradictions maintaining the reality of hunger, disease, drought and illiteracy.

In the months following the CIE various teams of practitioners have conducted in-depth briefings on the learnings from the CIE with executives and staff of the World Bank, the Asian Development Bank, United Nations co-sponsoring agencies, multi-national corporation executives government officers. Such dialogues have occured in the USA, Canada, Belgium, France, Germany, United Kingdom, Netherlands, India, Nepal, Egypt, Kenya, Nigeria, Taiwan, Japan, Korea, Tonga, the Philippines and Jamaica. The ASIA-PACIFIC REGIONAL ASSEMBLY scheduled for November 18-23, 1985 in Taiwan (ROC) will engage local practitioners in a dialogue with government development agencies over futuric policies collaborative strategies for rural development across Asia and the Pacific.

The IERD accelerated the awakenment by both development agents and grassroots citizens alike that the initiative of local residents is required for there to be meaningful, self-sustaining development. Agents are seeing the necessity of working WITH local residents for their resources and technology to be utilized with any long lasting effect. Another example is the number of Women in Development forums, documents and delegate briefings conducted prior to the Nairobi DECADE FOR WOMEN conference held in July, 1985. Input from forums and interviews conducted in the nations of Kenya, Zimbabwe, Zambia, Egypt, Spain, Belgium, Austria, Japan, India, Guatemala, Canada and the USA were pulled together at Wingspread Center (USA) by an international team of women development practitioners. They published a document called "Local Women Participate" and hand delivered it to hundreds of the delegates in Nairobi.

6. EXPERIMENTAL PARTNERSHIPS - Finding New Modes of Collaboration

The new reality is that government agencies and corporation executives, development agencies and village leaders are venturing into new forms of collaboration. Their stance is "we are all substantial 'players in the game,' partners in this task and we need to make better use of our resources and creativity."

In Kenya the UNDP, the ILO, the Ford Foundation, the Kenya National Council of Social Services and the ICA are collaborating on a programme of systematic training and interchange of village leadership in order to spread the story and methods of successful projects across the nation. In Maharshtra State, India a coalition of private, public and volunteer groups have joined into Human Development Associations to lend their skills, resources and human energy to large clusters of villages. They meet regularly with village leaders, develop a joint strategy and then move into action in cross-sectoral task forces.

In the nation of Peru private companies, voluntary groups and development agencies are uniting in the PERU POTENTIAL. In 1985 there have been seven Regional Assemblies involving 75 regional organizations with over 3,000 participants. It is a process whereby 1000 village leaders, 600 communities and 700,000 rural Peruvians will have joined in a nation-wide attack on the roots of rural poverty. They have already experienced a year of dramatic acceleration and will culminate the process with a National Rural Development Exposition in January of 1987. In the Philippines and Venezuela private corporations have drawn government agencies, municipal leaders, voluntary groups, NGO development agents and village leaders together in a pioneering partnership toward comprehensive development of an entire area.
