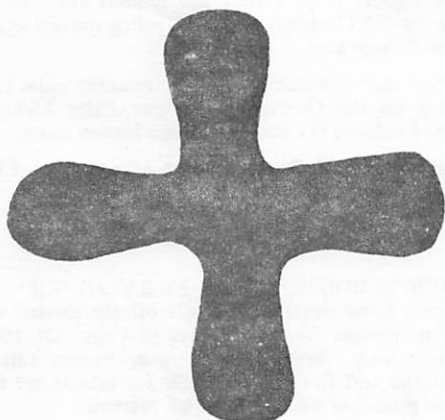


GLOBAL ORDER REPORT

LONDON

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: LONDON—ISLE OF DOGS HDP

External: Marque on top of abandoned air raid shelter in the center of housing estate signals Cahir Street Consult. Remaneuvering continues at general's meeting in Bristol. Consult document is ready for distribution and regional mailing provides opportunity to sign up to help card. Nine by two foot mural is completed, and pugs go back into emergency production. A meeting is held with Councillor Brannigan following Consult. News of Isle of Dogs inclusion in Texaco budget and commitment of consultant to work in Project during Week II signal futuristic direction.

Internal: News of JWM's death and study of "The Time My Father Died" mark the week.

Contradiction: Determining the symbolic action that will release the unifying vision that allows engagement of all who care for their community. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: GLASGOW

External: Rank Xerox once again gives free printing of newsletter and considers installation of copier on premises. GWF mailing goes out for Manchester GWF in November. Two staff members are assigned to London for a week of Development and Cahir Street maneuvering.

Internal: Australian colleagues, Denham family and others spend night and participate in Daily Office and breakfast on U.K. and Europe Research Odyssey on Community Care.

Contradiction: Shifting image from problem solvers to community catalyzers. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRISTOL

External: Area meeting with 32 present looks at Year of U.K. and rewrites maneuvers. Town Meeting Wales moves into most critical week as 28 communities decide on whether to have a TM or not. Emerging Generation has first area Town Meeting - song and all!

Internal: House celebrates birthdays of six House and metro colleagues with German chocolate birthday cakes!

Contradiction: Enabling community councils to make yes decisions. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MANCHESTER

External: British version of "Adopt a Village" proposal is printed and ready for clergy visits that begin next week. Twenty women plan to attend GWF pedagogy set for October 29.

Internal: The entire House travels to Bristol for area re-manuever planning session and Emerging Generation Town Meeting and return with new solid base of corporate power.

Contradiction: Making immediate consistent use of available collegial resources throughout the three campaigns. (Wk. 5)

PARIS

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PARIS

External: Operations Centrum (Randy Williams) joins House for meeting at Council of European Municipalities. GWF invitations printed, envelopes addressed, letters sent and news organizations contacted for the November GWF.

Internal: House rejoices to receive Ursula Parry, who speaks French fluently, for a year!

Contradiction: Unblocking the squeeze which grounds all in Paris and letting the provinces go on the back burner. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ROME—TERMINE HDP

External: One Terminese goes on Development work in Rome; two others search for women's industry. Two new Italian colleagues agree to serve on the Economic Advisory Board.

Internal: Auxiliary goes to opera in L'Aquila.

Contradiction: Broadening motivation beyond individual and family interests. (Wk. 5)

LAGOS

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: LAGOS—IJEDE HDP

External: Thirty 24-foot teak wood street light poles (worth

(RELIGIOUS HOUSE: LAGOS-IJEDE HDP) \$2640) are delivered and installed. Mailing goes to every donor as a gift to Ijede. Development yields \$1745.

Internal: One day blitzbreaks the back of Development contradictions.

Contradiction: Enabling current tension between traditional and emerging leadership to deepen the consensus making process. (Wk. 5)

BRUSSELS

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRUSSELS NEXUS

External: Two Development circuits in the U.K. and Berlin and Management trek to Amsterdam get all on the road.

Internal: Visit of global priors en route to India brings global news and new sense of the global band becoming an active reality.

Contradiction: Formulating a band interface which unblocks regional operations amidst ambiguities. (Wk. 3)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRUSSELS

External: Framing of Flemish provinces continues in preparation for intensive village maneuver. A Social Demonstration talk at Rotary Club in Gent nets \$400 and a request for bank account number.

Internal: House hears report on the events surrounding the death and funeral of JWM.

Contradiction: Laying the groundwork for the first Belgian TM while telling the TM story out of the continental history in Wales TM explosion. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: AMSTERDAM

External: Following Week II of discerning new directions, House is out on the road for TM, GWF and Development contacting 125 guilders in one call and finding good network leads.

Internal: House receives Gerry's report of JWM's funeral celebration.

Contradiction: Maintaining local momentum while honoring continental demands. (Wk. 5)

FRANKFURT

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: FRANKFURT

External: Things fall into place with breakthrough in communities of the industrial city of Duisburg, successful core meeting at the Rhein Main Air Force Base and key contacts made into volunteer organizations for HDP work-camps and long-term volunteers. GWF calls open up TM possibilities.

Internal: Week II on GWF (materials, story, timelines, ordering lists of names) reveals a plethora of leverage to utilize.

Contradiction: Organizing the authorization and assembly dynamic for catalyzing the many communities considering doing a Forum in February in the Ruhr Valley. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BERLIN-KREUZBERG OST HDP

External: First draft of legal form for project (constitution) is given to Guardian for inspection. Three city permissions are obtained for street beautification. Task Force does first exciting workshop on Christmas market. Park is cleaned. Inkind dry cleaning is obtained for all cafe laundry; 20 join in monthly cafe cleaning on Saturday night.

Internal: Australian Guardians research team visits Kreuzberg Ost. Elders group from another Berlin district visits Cafe zur Laterns land tours project. The Elliotts go to Chicago to represent House and area at Joseph Mathew's funeral.

Contradiction: Developing schemes of comprehensive engagement for those presently active in one program. (Wk. 5)

KINSHASA

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: LUSAKA-SHANTUMBU HDP

External: Wesley Lachman is sent on three-week Area Johannesburg Circuit to Malawi, Botswana, South Africa, Lesotho and Swaziland to explore programming beyond Zambia. ITI '77 report layout and printing is inkinded. Grads request to join staff and request visits are made to House by '77 ITI grads. Village Meeting request comes from grad in Serenje area.

Internal: Rev. Simfukwe trustee treasurer visits House for briefing on the Quarter. Newspaper "The African" from Malawi headlines ITI with front page feature story.

Contradiction: Confirming global schedule for LENS and GWF. (Wk. 4)

CAIRO

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CAIRO-EL BAYAD HDP

External: Local development gets off the ground with five yeses to pledges from businesses in Cairo. Of 104 babies weighed, only three did not gain weight this month. Antibiotics and five cases of milk for infants are inkinded. Sample galabeyas are sent to Dutch market.

Internal: After eight months of work, Nagi Wahib wins year off from government service to intern with the project.

Contradiction: Securing adequate financial support for completion of project. (Wk. 3)

NAIROBI

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: NAIROBI-KAWANGWARE HDP

External: A Guardian who provides the House construction team with continuing advice requested a large fat white female rabbit from the farm's demonstration hutch. He intends to give it to the owner of his large construction firm as a gift and as a tactic for securing a sizeable contribution for the Project. The newly appointed E.A. marketing manager of Veho (Geri Tolman's boss) makes a preparatory visit to Nairobi which includes a KHDP Site visit. As a result he returns to Sweden anxious to commence his Nairobi assignment and to get involved with the project's Guardians.

Contradiction: Remembering that a leader is the crucified one - even when semi-skilled. (Wk. 5)

BOMBAY

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BOMBAY NEXUS-MALIWADA HDP

External: High tea for 100 people is inkinded at the Taj Mahal Hotel with the replication school and Mrs. Vasantrao Patil as chief guest. Proposal documents for the 24 projects are completed. Free spectacles for 250 villages are secured.

Internal: The birth to David Alexander (8lb 3oz) to John and Thea Patterson and the 30th birthday of Mario Yufomeo are celebrated with singing and a feast.

Contradiction: Gearing total mobility into village replication back-up support system. (Wk. 10)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BOMBAY

External: The Inkind Team receives 2500 rupeesworth of cooking oil for the fifth HDT school. A truckload of inkind goods goes to Maliwada.

Internal: Humphrey Ndungu, Joe and Lucy Thariki from Kawangware are hosted on their way to Maliwada HDT School.

Contradiction: Structuring selves to meet the demands of hosting hosts of people and blitz recruiting. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KENDUR-KENDUR HDP

External: Auxiliary initiates possibility of school uniform contract to increase village industry. Survey is done for 50 latrines. Preschool uniform material arrives. Two village youth read story conversation at stake meeting.

Internal: Larry Philbrook arrives with news from Project Directors Meeting and word of Mathew's death. Whole House struggles with issue of appropriate response.

Contradiction: Enabling village decision to be continually visible. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: VAVIHARSH-VAVIHARSH HDP

External: Bombay Division sends eight to HDTs from Khamblae Village. Two inkind engines come into the village for irrigation. Ten villagers are sent out for four days of dairy training. Six hundred twenty-eight people attend scabies Health Camp.

Internal: Dharmalingam and David Scott go to Chicago for JWM funeral.

Contradiction: Getting villagers to participate more fully in the Project during a heavy harvest session. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KOLAMBI-KOLAMBI HDP

External: Inkind volleyball and net lead to organizing teams by stakes with inter-stake tournament and championship trip to neighboring project is in view. Four auxiliary lead Temburwahi. Consult.

Internal: Quarter's auxiliary arrives on the scene. Consult team returns and visit of Global Team, Fifth City and Vaviharsh project directors. Businessman and professor of engineering from Nagpur and doctor from Akola Lion's Club visit.

Contradiction: Spreading the three Marathi speakers (language of the village) between five stakes. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TASGAON-TASGAON HDP

External: Tasgaon HDP moves ahead securing loans for 32 farmers, for the Demonstration Farm, Sanction of Parent Seed. Health Fair in village is great; Rotary Club doctors from Satara, nearby capital city, attend. Clinic moves to new premises, larger with more maternity care rooms with two beds. Kitchen gardens are prepared in each of the six stakes. Villagers take up responsibility and leadership for NGP by applying to the Zilla Parishad for 50,000 grant phased over two years for village reconstruction. One acre of land is donated for high school. Presents proposal for piped water scheme to government authorities. Inaugurates village square. Mahila Mandal has successful GWF in Satara and village; sends two women to Malle Consult.

Internal: Sends Rose to Uti for set-up, Jasper to Chandigarh. Welcomes Ragnath Yadav, M. Gaikwad and S. Gaikwad, new auxiliary.

Contradiction: Maintaining the same speed with new auxiliary. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: UTI-UTI HDP

External: State Bank of India adopts village, insuring loans for all villagers and key woman leader brings other woman to guild meeting for first time.

Internal: New auxiliary arrives in time for early morning and sunset bird watch over prize hybrid sorghum plots.

Contradiction: Moving rapidly on all fronts with massive possibilities staring all in the face. (Wk. 4)

DELHI**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DELHI**

External: Embassy Aid and GWF contacts are expanded.

Internal: Marie Paul is sent out to JWM funeral as Ramesh

Agarwal returns from his father's funeral.

Contradiction: Firming up the date, place and price of GWF. (Wk. 5)

MADRAS**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HYDERABAD-NADLAPUR HDP**

External: Team of villagers and auxiliary contact key government and business figures in Hyderabad authorization blitz while things light up in the village. Post holes for lights in the Harijan quarter appear every night.

Internal: Three recruits for HDPs warm up in Nadlapur before going to Maliwada. George Balm cycles through mud to report on globe.

Contradiction: Maximizing the effective use of time and troops. (Wk. 4)

CALCUTTA**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CALCUTTA**

External: New staff in Calcutta House make important contacts at local cathedral service, signaling the re-affirmation of the historical church in India; also break-in loose fresh possibilities for potential colleagues.

Internal: Calcutta erupts into wild celebration of the annual Puja holiday - the great event of the Hindu calendar in West Bengal and sweeps the House along bursts of joy, noise, drums, lights, music (of a sort), decoration, new clothes and sweetmeats.

Contradiction: Publishing story as a prelude to further concrete action. (Wk. 5)

SINGAPORE**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SINGAPORE NEXUS**

External: Re-initiation of Registration procedures begins with visit to lawyer and chartered accountant.

Internal: Four-day Nexus meeting with Garnet Banks and Anna Stanley up from Canberra create one battleplan and common operating procedures for a bilocated Nexus.

Contradiction: Getting the key to the door of registration that has enough clout to seing it wide open. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SINGAPORE-SUNGGAI AUP HDP

External: Colleagues from East Malaysia visit about authorization maneuvers in Sarawak. September launch of Development maneuvers secures \$6,700.

Internal: Intensive battleplan for year tackled as Wiltse family shows up.

Contradiction: Forging clarity on the future of S.E. Asia and how the Centrum dynamic will be supportive to it in the future. (Wk. 1)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KUALA LUMPUR-SUNGGAI LUI HDP

External: Confidence of villagers becomes stronger by Dr. Ghames visit. Evidence of renewed vigor is shown by increased participation at stake meetings.

Internal: Development brings in \$2500 (Malaysian) from Texas Instruments.

Contradiction: Focusing on training in the midst of renewed activity of village. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE JAKARTA-KELAPA DUA HDP

External: First Women's Luncheon after Fasting month is attended by 60 women and 62 children in child care structures. After 56 visits in development in previous week, many people are visited in follow-up. Poultry farm offers to train two people for chicken farm management. Guild meeting with more than 50 people includes all village leadership. Local authorization is increased as staff takes

local government official and his staff to Bandung for a trip.

Internal: Brash inkind effort produces a real discontinuity for whole staff at Hotel Barobudur, the most expensive international hotel in Indonesia.

Contradiction: Engaging whole community in depth decision making. (Wk. 4)

HONG KONG

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HONG KONG NEXUS

External: House development treks to Tokyo and Cebu and gratefully receive certificate showing that ICA: Hong Kong is now incorporated.

Internal: House send: Ellery Elizondo and Bruce Donnelly, along with twelve from Zone House, to JWM Funeral in Chicago.

Contradiction: Grasping the urgent missional thrust that can release the common passionate expenditure. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HONG KONG-NAM WAI HDP

External: Village responds to health program of worm eradication by turning out in all stakes to receive doses contributed by Prizer Company. Village youth take up new roles teaching primary school children in tutorials. Others repair broken washing slab. Celebrations are highlight as Saturday evening demonstration celebrations are well-attended (Termine and Kawangware are first two) and a bus load departs for a family Sunday outing.

Internal: Bill Bonnell is sent out to participate in the celebration of the completed life of Joseph Mathews as the Hong Kong House and the region participates symbolically as high altar candle burns for two days.

Contradiction: Structuring time in the village to fit the pace. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KAOHSIUNG-HAI OU HDP

External: Welcome sign is replaced in TaChuan and area is beautified. Rotary Club in Taipei plans loan at no interest to Hai Ou for fish ponds. Phone location is agreed on by community and phone company. Retail store opens Saturday noon and grosses \$1500 NT in first day. House and community haul fish nets all Friday afternoon - catch is small, but excitement is high. Saturday afternoon workday cleans the beach. Hsiang (district) Government recommends four villages for GCF.

Internal: Pat DeSpain begins teaching third grade at Taipei American School- as self-support for House secured.

Contradiction: Catalyzing active village involvement as understanding of project aims begins to broaden and deepen. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MANILA

External: Women of House launch quarter II GWF countdown for urban and rural GWFs.

Internal: House celebrates the completed life of Dean Joseph Wesley Mathews.

Contradiction: Still laying economic foundation while the building is going up. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TAIPEI

External: Initial visits of villages near Hai Ou and creation of authorization brochure puts wheels beneath thrust of GCF for the year in Taiwan. Week four corporation appointments are set for Area Hong Kong Development trip. Taipei Guardians work with House on funding and continuing care for authorization strategy.

Internal: Three media people attend Ecclesiola and stay after to plan reports on Hai Ou HDP.

Contradiction: Establishing momentum and story for the whole year with GCF in the 16 counties of Taiwan. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CEBU- SUDTONGGAN HDP

External: This is the week of the Skin Disease Campaign, which includes skin treatment of all preschool children and radical house washing of those with serious skin disease. ELC field trip takes 35 mothers and 70 children to the big market in Cebu. Development makes 24 calls and finds out that five of the ten largest corporations in the Philippines are previous contributors to the Project.

Internal: Henry Chiang, a Cebu Chinese businessman who owns Guest House property in Sudtonggan, comes to ecclesiola after a day of hosting Development team all over Cebu and introducing them to the Chinese community.

Contradiction: Finding indirect methods to deal with community mindset relative to health, management training, sanitation etc. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DAVAO

External: Preparation for Mt. Apo Eruption Maneuver accelerates as workbooks are taken to printers; another 3000 pesos is picked up and "Bulldozer" team is sent out to set up the province for the 20 GCFs in Week Six.

Internal: News of Mathews' completed life sets underlying reflective mood as Roy Philbrook is sent out to funeral in Chicago.

Contradiction: Remembering that the major objective is to capture the farthest bridge, not to be pharisaical about the plan. (Wk. 5)

TOKYO

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TOKYO

External: Two GWFs are finalized, including one which is completely set up by local housewives. GCF trek to Kasuyama nets visit with mayor.

Internal: Carol Pierce arrives from Chicago to kickoff Quarter II GWF campaign in Japan. Laurie Hickey assists teaching English to community children.

Contradiction: Thinking through strategies and tactics for using colleagues. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: JEJU-KWANGYUNG IL HDP

External: Training dynamic is implemented for stake leaders and Town Meeting circuiters. Island government promises a letter advocating Town Meeting in every village on the island. Chicken house cages are built to hold "sex pals" - pairs of chickens - to begin egg production.

Internal: Village leaders attend memorial ecclesiola to honor JWM.

Contradiction: Using the mindset of "a lusty time of year" to unblock making projects visible. (Wk. 4 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: FUKUOKA

External: The guild meeting burgeons to 12 as students' contacts multiply. Rev. Tanimoto puts House in contact with Hiroshima Jaycees. Site selection and GWF progress as we make it to 14 villages by car and by bus.

Internal: The Mystery of all "halloween Eve" (Halloween) is celebrated by Emerging Generation who impact city witches, cowboys etc. on the way to three separate celebrations, including "Firestorm" at Yoshizuka church.

Contradiction: Scheduling time so we're in control. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OSAKA

External: The readings of Musashi prompt three guild members to stage a Japanese/English conversation all the way home on the train. House gets \$15,000 in Development funds: at the door and dispatches one member to Nagasaki to make

church contacts.

Internal: House sends out prior to Chicago for JWM funeral.

Contradiction: Freeing materials, volunteers and outside timelines in order to do things in spite of blocks. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SENDAI-OYUBARI HDP

External: Mr. Heiskanen of the Finnish Embassy is hosted at a city-wide dinner and sparks interest in cross-country skiing and wood industries. High School students build new entrance way to movie house as program is expanded to include adult movies. English curriculum and movie conversation is added to children's movie. Staff is invited to cho stake meeting in neighboring town with sights on doing first Town Meeting in Hokkaido.

Internal: Image for Week II is win-o-vation as facility is renovated and prepared for six months of winter.

Contradiction: Providing self-support while releasing Oyubari. (Wk. 5)

SYDNEY

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SYDNEY

External: The University of Sydney provides room for follow-up Guardians Meeting as they decide to do the internal structures for Oombulgurri HDP's community dining room and kitchen.

Internal: House becomes the Wayside Inn for 17 people as they return from JWM's funeral en route to maneuvers.

Contradiction: Focusing missional arenas so that there is clarity in the initiating steps while meshing those arenas into one thrust. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PERTH

External: A great GCF is held when Belmont U.C. Melville High School decides to begin the year with two GCFs-one for teachers, then one for everyone.

Internal: JWM Memorial Service becomes event to celebrate and share the victory of local people.

Contradiction: Breaking out from doing a few little things to doing the grand maneuver. (WK. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DARWIN

External: Walkabout team hits town as money is released from Potter Foundation and walkabout workbooks are completed.

Internal: House celebration kicks off Walkabout as all troops assemble in Darwin after JWM funeral.

Contradiction: Tapping the various levels of authorization in the bureaucracies and Aboriginal communities that see Walkabout on the road. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OOMBULGURRI-OOMBULGURRI HDP

External: Carol Borovich aids completion transition to Kalamazoo accounting system. First home movie taken by school project is many times. Mick Cotter, liberal representative in Parliament, visits Oombulgurri.

Internal: House welcomes Lee Collens and Sue White for overnight stay as they arrive with ice cream for all.

Contradiction: Arranging time and troops in order to win. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ADELAIDE

External: A pilot CMA is held with matriculation (12th grade) students of Nuriootpa High School in the Barossa Valley. Principal indicates interest in another CMA of broader scope at the beginning of the new school year in February. Local coordinator takes charge of mobilizing the elements of the seven-week timeline for a day-long community meeting slated for at least 100 Athelstone

citizens on 26th November.

Internal: Tim Wegner is sent out to represent the Adelaide House and region at the memorial service for Joseph Mathews. Joseph's death awesomely impacts House members and regional colleagues with the personal responsibility of deciding to be creative and global presence in every situation.

Contradiction: Keeping all systems forging ahead to capitalize on growing regional passion to be practically engaged in doing aspects of the three campaigns in the midst of sending two thirds of the in-House strike force on extra-regional maneuvers and symbolic assignments. (Wk. 5')

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MELBOURNE

External: Potter Foundation board members visit ICA office in response to request that the foundation support: HDP expansion, while Geelong trek sets up Week Five Guardians meeting. Battleplanning focuses awakenment strategies on state campaigns and GWF.

Internal: Postcard arrives from our "Operation Aurora" trekker, Roger Ross, who is now involved in Brisbane maneuver.

Contradiction: Maximizing effectiveness of permeation forces while "work-in" troops are out of town. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CANBERRA-SINGAPORE NEXUS

External: Ainsie Roberts, renowned Australian artist of Aboriginal lore, grants permission for use of selected prints for Oombulgurri and Walkabout brochure after seeing blue brochure. Minister of Health who visited Nam Wai sends clipping from South China News of ICA work there.

Internal: Colleagues return from Chicago and share the victory of Joe's life and death.

Contradiction: Effectively harvesting myriad possibilities relative to key contacts. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRISBANE

External: Southside follow up meeting with 40 attending decide to hold a community fete and continue to meet weekly to work on proposals. Regional Guardians dinner is held with 15 new people participating as Aurora maneuver starts with wins and losses.

Internal: House sends off to Darwin to begin Walkabout with new Aboriginal Workbooks in hand.

Contradiction: Establishing the corporate timeline that will hold together mission with iron colleagues. (Wk. 5)

SUVA

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MAJURO-MARSHALLS HDP

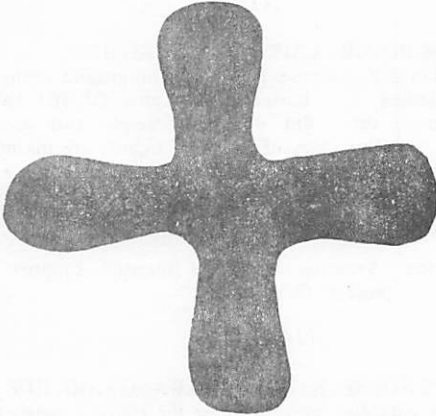

Internal: House forces attend celebration of the completion of the life of JWM.

Contradiction: Breaking down comprehensive demands to

the simple set of tasks that need to be done today. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SAN ANTONIO

External: Two Town Meeting circuiters result in Uvalde setting date for November 27 and Duval sometime this month. Schlesinger family leaves for a one week Town Meeting trek.

Internal: House hosts Tom and Trish Broersma. House inkinds six dozen eggs from Porter Poultry and Egg Company through Mr. Romo, the manager.

Contradiction: Acquiring a new House as the end of November approaches. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OKLAHOMA CITY

External: Two Town Meetings in Elmore City and Marland are held with cross-town representation. All 20 promised Town Meetings are set-up with dates before Thanksgiving.

Internal: First meeting of youth cluster with neighborhood high schoolers plan Community Youth Forum for this quarter.

Contradiction: Focusing the quantum leap that the Assembly will be in the next phase of awakenment and engagement. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DALLAS

External: Beacon Gap moves from initial contact to posters in the windows in two and a half hours. New Boston prints flyers while core is still trying to decide and they decide to go with it. House sets date for another November TM.

Internal: House hosts development team, Clesson McDonald, guardian from D.C. and Troy Jarvis, Wayside Inn is bulging.

Contradiction: Building the transnational scheme which will raise money in the counties from sources independent of the local town's set up work. (Wk. 6)

Employees of Xerox in Jackson, decide to give Community Association \$1000 earned in filming for commercial.

External: Day I and Day II experience wins all week with eight sprouts, five blooms and three harvests.

Internal: Mark Harvey and son from Pace stop in for dinner and move on after spending the day in Baton Rouge visiting architectural department at LSU.

Contradiction: Allowing communities who think Town Meeting is good idea to experience the hope that they can do it. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MEMPHIS

External: The counties are softening with nine new counties meeting and two new dates. Mayor of McLemoresville tells Mayor of Friendship, Tennessee, his Town Meeting was

greatest event town ever had. Friendship sets date! Factory co-worker goes on call to help set Cockrum, Mississippi date.

Internal: House welcomes Sue Tankersly from Houston en route to Pace Health Trek. Youth collegium on Pace Community Youth Forum gives first hand stories to use the local CYF contacts. Bowling with local man strikes strong cord of humor with diverse exhibits of style.

Contradiction: Tripling rate of victories without frantic moving. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ATLANTA

External: Tennessee Valley Authority supplies two field representatives and two TVA cars for initial Town Meeting set-up in 16 counties, through TVA contacts, in Southeast Tennessee and North Georgia.

Internal: Development and Research Centrum visit and give collegiums. JWM Memorial Service with 26 in attendance highlights the week.

Contradiction: Bridging the gaps in present Town Meeting set-up model. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CHARLOTTE

External: Six communities are visited in tour of four counties in four days; four TMs in three counties are set up. Unsolicited donation from Old Fort comes in the year after their TM.

Internal: Inkind dinner at Hardees then roller skating provides active celebration.

Contradiction: Pushing to the edge but not jumping off. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MIAMI

External: House schedules first TM and completes blitz library research. A visit from church callers turns into a possible neighborhood TM sponsorship.

Contradiction: Doing all-out assembly recruitment. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PITTSBURGH

External: Memorial service brings contact with old colleagues and Guardians. Dinner with Fooks, Mohn and Busa families renews contacts with possibility for TM/Quarter II engagement and new thrusts in Development enablement.

First TM (Foro Comunitario) given by Cano Negro leaders, in conjunction with members of Caracas cadre, calls forth visible signs of resurgent hope in nearby village of Tapipa Grande.

Internal: House celebrates completed life of Joseph W. Mathews with prayer and memorial service, and sends out priorship to funeral service in Chicago.

Contradiction: Formalizing practical training programs to enable efficient project management. (Wk. 6)

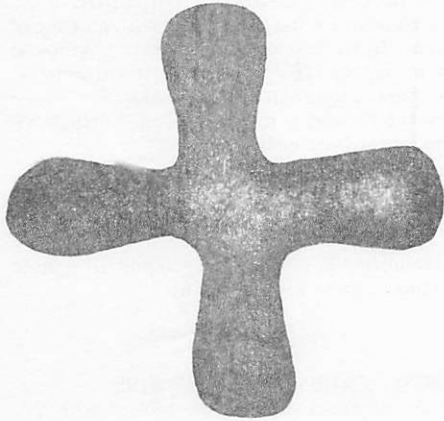

Grads begin to translate Bembe booklet for Village Meeting. Enablement booklet is ready for press. LENS, GWF and VM dates are set for Quarter II.

Internal: The House is transformed by painting outside. House celebrates the completed life of Joseph Wesley Mathews with Ted going to Chicago and Canonical Hours.

Contradiction: Mobilizing Zambian Forces to pull off remote rural Village Meeting in three weeks. (Wk. 6)

CAIRO

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CAIRO-EL BAYAD HDP

External: Local development gets off the ground with five yeses to pledges from businesses in Cairo. Of 104 babies weighed, only three did not gain weight this month. Antibiotics and five cases of milk for infants are inkinded. Sample galabeyas are sent to Dutch market.

Internal: After eight months of work, Nagi Wahib wins year off from government service to intern with the project.

Contradiction: Securing adequate financial support for completion of project. (Wk. 3)

NAIROBI

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: NAIROBI-KAWANGWARE HDP

External: Community shows itself eager to think through new weekly time design for engagement. This intensification of is a result of push to plan and implement a week-long second anniversary celebration of KHDP in December.

Internal: Collegium starts analytical comparison of Project's industries and captures all to point that it is continued in the evening for data.

Contradiction: Having the courage to witness the trauma of the community upon hearing the articulation of the good news that the end of the Project is at hand. (Wk. 7)

BOMBAY

Contradiction: Staging more great celebrations during harvest season. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KOLAMBI-KOLAMBI HDP

External: Village-wide Tuberculosis survey is climaxed by visit of Rotary doctor who vaccinates 400 primary and preschool children. Seeds inkinded for community garden come in.

Internal: Auxiliary compound is white-washed in four colors and preschool begins preparations for Diwahli (harvest, wealth, New Year) celebration.

Contradiction: Moving ahead when whole society is focused on Diwahli. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TASGAON-TASGAON HDP

External: Tasgaon HDP moves ahead securing loans for 32 farmers, for the Demonstration Farm, Sanction of Parent Seed. Health Fair is village is great; Rotary Club doctors from Satara, nearby capital city, attend. Clinic moves to new premises, larger with more maternity care rooms with two beds. Kitchen gardens are prepared in each of the six stakes. Villagers take up responsibility and leadership for NGP by applying to the Zilla Parishad for 50,000 grant phased over two years for village reconstruction. External: State Bank of India adopts village, insuring loans for all villagers and key woman leader brings other woman to

guild meeting for first time.

Internal: New auxiliary arrives in time for early morning and sunset bird watch over prize hybrid surgum plots.

Contradiction: Moving rapidly on all fronts with massive possibilities staring all in the face. (Wk. 4)

DELHI**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DELHI**

External: GWF recruitment uncovers elite and international network in Delhi. GSF nurture with Pushpa Jacob Kumar in Maliwada is great event for a week.

Contradiction: Maximizing the effective use of time and troops. (Wk. 4)

CALCUTTA**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CALCUTTA**

External: Search intensifies for key GWF group as Centrum sends concrete dates for GWF trek to Calcutta.

Internal: Profound Humanness spins sustain troops in midst of cheap lodgings and swarch for facility.

Contradiction: Overcoming paralysis in doing external mission in midst of preoccupation with securing facility and self-support. (Wk. 6)

SINGAPORE**RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SINGAPORE NEXUS**

External: Newcastle Metro opens up with Development maneuver and raises \$2,500 in four days, with Guardians springing up in all directions. Contradiction: Forging clarity on the future of S.E. Asia and how the Centrum dynamic will be supportive to it in the future. (Wk. 1)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KUALA LUMPUR-SUNGGAI LUI HDP
External: Headman, Dato Usuf, of the village of Sungai Lui, has publically articulated the importance of the cultivation and planting of the 300 acres of padi and has taken a large leadership role in getting it underway.

Internal: Two men have decided to sojourn in the Kuala Lumpur House, Aminudin Bin Mohd Taib, the first Malaysian to take this step, and Ananda Eranjan Senanayake from Sri Lanka.

Contradiction: Knowing when to drag feet or when to plow ahead and when the leadership role is being called for. (Wk. 7)

Internal: Trekkers return from Japan and Taiwan. Mid-quarter celebration is held at Aberdeen (Hong Kong) Floating Palace restaurant.

Contradiction: Capitalizing on the opportunities that are present in order to accelerate thrust so that victory is assured. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HONG KONG-NAM WAI HDP

External: Village responds to health program of worm eradication by turning out in all stakes to receive doses contributed by Prizer Company. Village youth take up new roles teaching primary school children in tutorials. Others repair broken washing slab. Celebrations are highlighted as Saturday evening demonstration celebrations are well-attended (Termine and Kwayngyungare first two) and a bus load departs for a family Sunday outing.

Contradiction: Catalyzing active village involvement as

understanding of project aims begins to broaden and deepen. (Wk.4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE : MANILA

External: House in kind five-star hotel for Manila GWF, November 22.

Internal: Sr. Gwen Hoeffel, Order of the Sacred Heart of Mary, Tokyo, is House Church guest with her Korean colleague. Baticas are sent out to Chicago assignment and Joey Armas is sent to Davao for three week GCF campaign.

Contradiction: Creating sense of urgency to release immediate funding. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TAIPEI

External: Development Maneuver nets \$54,000,000 in addition to \$100,000,000 for interest-free loan (equivalent to \$1,400,000 and \$2,600,000 US respectively). Hai-Ou report is printed in English and Chinese, while Community Forum brochure is sent to the printers.

Contradiction: Moving step by step event by event, while needing to be dancing miles ahead in three Global Campaigns. (Wk. 6)

Contradiction: Using the mindset of "a lusty time of year" to unblock making projects visible. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SEOUL

External: Colleagues cover the office while staff is at Area Council and make calls for Regional Council. House finalizes set-up for Price Waterhouse LENS for November 18-20, 1977, in Seoul.

Internal: House is deeply addressed by collegium study of Joseph Mathew's paper, "What Hath Been Wrought."

Contradiction: Coordinating global scheduling of local events. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: FUKUOKA

External: Development is intensified with visits to Texaco, Pfizer, Caltex. Evening is spent at US Ambassador's residence. Preaching at Mrs. Lee Chul Kyung's high school and local church happens. Lecture on "Practical Theology" at Yonsei University graduate school of theology is great event. Park goes to Jeju to meet with government officials.

Hong Kong government donates \$2,000 for Nam Wai. Chicago working requests and proposals increased by half million dollars, with proposals to L.E.A.A., Inter American Development Bank, Massey Ferguson, DeRance Foundation, Upjohn, Goodyear and Walgreen. The contradiction is in moving proposals to money in hand.

Global Research Centrum reports its sighting of a groundswell of futuric thrusts as Community Youth Forum expands its continental network of contacts with a 4-H presentation in Washington, D.C., and a cross-Centrum PSU on Historical Church strategy stirs new interest and insights on the events, issues and trends that make up the global state of the church today. In the meantime, Saturday night found the Academy riding high on its Grand Ball and Phase I fascinated by "Requiem" as RS-I grounds them in the foundations of Order life. The challenge comes in a demand to mount a surfing maneuver that focuses and balances priorities on the rising wave of history gathering force in our midst.

The contradiction lies in the arena of telling the story that elicits an immediate yes.

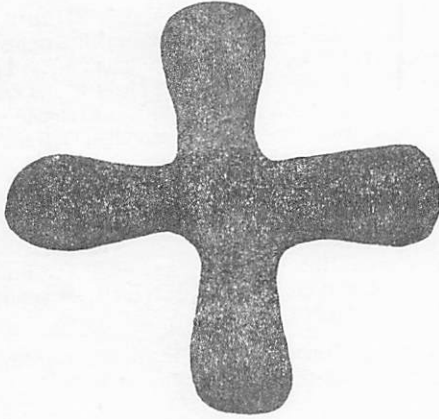

Painting of HDP office and completion of 3x10 oil painting by Danny O'Neill illustrates the three European and one NAME HDP. Power House path is completed with 100 in-kind paving stones.

Internal: Guy Fawkes Day is celebrated on mud chute with bonfire and fireworks in spite of drenching rains and gale force winds. House celebrates completed life of Joseph Wesley Mathews at House Church with regional colleagues and guild members.

Contradiction: Releasing guild meeting to be an event that makes a difference to the community each week. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: GLASGOW

External: Development trek visits securing economic, political and cultural authorization and potential funding for TM. GWF recruits up to four women to Manchester. Charitable Trust check arrives unexpectedly.

Internal: Ecclesiola is highlighted by study of polity document.

Contradiction: With new advantages, creating new maneuvers swiftly in order to position to strike the new fronts ahead. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRISTOL

External: One hundred fifty people attend Bhayader Town Meeting. Forty-eight participate in steering committee meetings; twenty-five prospective authorization figures listed; nineteen development calls are made; one third of the Welsh MP's are seen and give favorable responses. President of Wales Confederation of British Industry endorses TM and chairman of National Association of Community Councils gives nod.

External: Circuit to Evrewey discovers possibility of GCF in Calvados. ICA uncovers new network among the agricultural workers of France.

Internal: Dick Stanley brings news from the globe as he travels from Chicago to Singapore.

Contradiction: Rolling the development wagon. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ROME-TERMINE HDP

External: GWF is in Rome and Termine. Seventeen significant framing and support visits are made in two weeks. Project women decide to move into knitting production. Three religious order contributions come in (one designated for Hai Ou.)

Internal: House and Management Trek grapple with issues of self-support, development, and fiscal responsibility. Operations Trek workshops build clarity on completion.

External: Operations work with Wales TM Maneuver indicates mammoth victory in UK. GWF pedagogy in Manchester for all Area London houses and guardians has seventeen present. News of money in hand and coming in releases funds to continent and gives operating room.

Internal: Ecclesiola is experienced as the celebration of humor in life.

Contradiction: Structuring death ground campaign mentality within Nexus dynamic, to cover all fronts. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRUSSELS

External: Framing of Flemish provinces continues in preparation for intensive village maneuver. A Social Demonstration talk at Rotary Club in Gent nets \$400 and a request for bank account number.

Internal: House hears report on the events surrounding the death and funeral of JWM.

Contradiction: Developing schemes of comprehensive engagement for those presently active in one program. (Wk. 5)

KINSHASA

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: LUSAKA-SHANTUMBU HDP

External: Village Mecting training prepares all Zambian staff of ITI grads. GWF and LENS recruitment nets big fish. Community Development Officers and Shell/BP and Zambian State Insurance LENS on for Week 9. Wes Lachman returns from a 4-week Area Johannesburg circuit. ITI Report and grad newsletter completed.

Internal: Old cracked windows replaced and bars over all windows express care for a newly registered organization in Zambia. New life is added to House with Peter Malaba interning. Wayside Inn dynamic takes place for Botswana Bible Training Institute staff. Fiat car purchased and storage for ITI decor is inkinded.

Contradiction: Shifting from old one-to-one maneuvers to marketing maneuvers that assure victory. (Wk. 8)

CAIRO

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CAIRO-EL BAYAD HDP

External: First harvest of community garden feeds preschool and infants suffering from malnutrition. Additional produce sold at big savings to Bayad women. First woman's meeting brings together ten women who want to meet every week. Second order for galabeyas received from European market. Bayad builders make two requests for bricks for building in Bayad.

Internal: Week I feast with fantastic singing, more food than we could eat, and lively conversation marks a new era in the corporate life.

Contradiction: Clarifying the role of the project and the auxiliary to the village leadership. (Wk. 8)

NAIROBI

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: NAIRBOI-KAWANGWARE HDP

External: Edith Gachukia, chairman, Kenya Federation of Women's Organizations and a key to GWF is impacted by site visit she requested, just as we were experiencing frustration in attempts to get appointments with others in her office. Tuesday evening community leadership dinners grow to twenty as task of preparing for second anniversary celebration increases their responsibility. Agricultural program begins expansion with lease signed on more land. Yet another KYC school opens as education flags fill in open spaces on Kawangware activities map.

Internal: Ecclesiola is stumped by charade of "Impact Tool Intensification..." back to step 1-memorization. Assignment commission recommendations ground the requirements for new images of the task. Joseph Minar, skilled carpenter and cousin of Joseph Kameme, begins sojourn.

Contradiction: Moving ahead when whole society is focussed on Divali. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TASGAON—TASGAON HDP

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: UTI—UTI HDP

External: State Bank of India adopts village, insuring loans for all villagers and key woman leader brings other women to guild meeting for first time.

Internal: New auxiliary arrives in time for early morning and sunset bird watch over prize hybrid sorghum plots.

Contradiction: Moving rapidly on all fronts with massive possibilities staring all in the face. (Wk. 4)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SHIVNI HDP

External: First edition of "Shivni Voice" is written by villagers and distributed in local city. Literacy classes begin with 20 people and village teacher. Lions Club conducts a health camp with seven doctors and free medicine. The first Guardians meeting successfully plans economic development. Village men and school children do a miracle workday on streets and drains.

Internal: Auxiliary house gets a new floor and whitewash. Larger programme chart, grids, in-kind travel posters and colorful curtains give House a dynamic face. Jack Gilles is welcomed to work with acceleration treks.

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CALCUTTA

External: Global network manifested as key GWF contact indicates personal acquaintance with writers of GWF authorization letters circulated from Chicago. YWCA Calcutta agrees to host first GWF in Eastern India.

Internal: The Order in Calcutta celebrates the life and death of Canon Subhir Biswas, Vicar of St. Paul's Cathedral, a leading and enlightened figure of the historical church in India. Accommodation continues to be partly in-kind, shifting every few days.

Contradiction: Presenting the GWF story effectively in midst of other seminars and meetings at peak of conference season in Calcutta. (Wk. 8)

SINGAPORE

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SINGAPORE NEXUS

External: Newcastle Metro opens with development maneuver and raises \$2,500 in four days, with guardians

(RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SINGAPORE NEXUS)

springing up in all directions. Authorization goes full steam ahead in medical profession across whole Area Sydney. Singapore Nexus signs lease for larger facility allowing for budget cut. Management systems prepare for audit.

Internal: Sends out troops for CMA in Brisbane, attended by 175.

Contradiction: Organizing the move in midst of external mission demands. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SINGAPORE-SUNGAI AUP HDP

External: Colleagues from East Malaysia visit about authorization maneuvers in Sarawak. September launch of development secures \$6,700.

Internal: Intensive battle plan for year tackled as Wiltse family arrives.

Contradiction: Forging clarity on the future of SE Asia and how the Centrum dynamic will be supportive. (Wk. 1)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KUALA LUMPUR-SUNGAI LUI HDP

External: Dato Usof, Headman of the village, has publicly articulated the importance of cultivation and planting of 300 acres of padi and has taken a large leadership role in getting it underway.

Internal: Two men decide to sojourn in Kuala Lumpur House, Aminudin Bin Mohd Talb, the first Malaysian to take this step, and Ananda Eranjan Senanayake from Sri Lanka.

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MANILA

External: GWF visits to Philippine Women's Univ. president and Philippine Christian Univ. vice-president open interest in university assistance in HDP's. ICA board chairman initiates donor giver list with P2,000.

Internal: Global nexus colleague exemplifies servant force in great style.

Contradiction: Developing management systems to enable intensified task and dispersed troops to do effective job. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TAIPEI

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OSAKA

External: Three GWF's held in one week with over 100 participants. Nine trained interpreters work as a great team with staff—some appear in blue.

Internal: Carol Pierce challenges House and regional staff in GWF reflections to plan for geographical coverage by GWF's as entrance to Japanese engagement.

Contradiction: Hitting the elephant in so many places we only prick him instead of killing him. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SENDAI-OYUBARI HDP

External: Twenty-five representing five nations attend first Guardians' Meeting in Oyubari. Three task forces build practical plan to initiate winter tourist area in Oyubari. Monthly PSU created to work out other details of economic development. First youth movie is shown at newly renovated theatre and one room of activity center is made ready for infant school.

Internal: Community women secure winter futon (bedding) for all members of house at estimated cost of \$700.00. First snow of winter leaves 18 inches on ground and challenges our resources.

Contradiction: Pushing breakloose to action. (Wk. 8)

SYDNEY

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SYDNEY

External: Combined region maneuver OHDP completion, mass CMA set-up, development and troop enlistment gets into high gear with visits to Catholic Orders, State Service Club directors, State 150th anniversary celebration officials, a member of State Parliament and colleagues as well as a

Guardians dinner and follow-up meeting. Results include three paid registrations for CFC, materials, troops and air fares secured of OHDP night.

Internal: Spirit life receives new zest with intensified mission. House welcomes John Cock and Kim Thornton as zone maneuver team.

Contradiction: Firming the maneuver planning in midst of unformulated operation symbols and daily time rhythm. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PERTH

External: Maneuver GOWA (Wise owl-GSD, Wildflower-GCF, Two-UP-Development and Challenge-TWC Enlistment-) radicalizes region and metro through major breakthroughs with zone/national/state service organizations such as Lions, Apex, Rotary and Jaycees. Initiate West Australia State Committee at State Parliament House laying groundwork for 100 CMA's in 1978. Hold Order meeting with leadership from five orders. Orchestrated a full GMA that evokes awe. Development raises \$600 in-hand with \$600 more promised. Three summer program registrations are received and 11 yeses.

Internal: Inkind victories for maneuver include two cars, one office, two part-time secretaries, one copier and promise of the gift of a selectric typewriter. We finish maneuver week with wild celebration at Mexican restaurant and find waitress wants to come to House to discuss HDP. Cock, Thornton and Bob White are in for maneuver.

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DARWIN

External: First phase of preparation and training is completed as Walkabout Team reaches full strength and prepares for first Community Meeting at Oombulgurri on Week 2.

Internal: Collegiums keep the context broad to focus in on the particular of Community Meeting training for Operation Walkabout.

Contradiction: Securing the point of advantage in making contact with key people. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OOMBULGURRI-OOMBULGURRI HDP

External: First Aboriginal CMA demonstrates competence in use of methods and deep excitement over new song.

Internal: Visit from Operation Walkabout Team with fresh image of community meetings for aboriginals. Two luxuries in the form of motorcycles spark new life.

Contradiction: Creating effective forms that allow community participation in Operation Completion. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ADELAIDE

External: Five tons materials in-kind for Oombulgurri Piggery, Saddle Shed and Airport Shed. Ken Maher's church agrees to sponsor GWF and five rural community meetings. First Area Sydney guardian to join the Global Committee of 1,000 by pledging \$1,000 each year for five years is 22-year-old woman teacher.

Internal: House bulges as Operation Bushfire maneuver team arrives. Anthony Betonte falls out of tree, St. John's ambulance corps picks him up and rest of house casts lots for his sausages.

Contradiction: Objective necessity for laying groundwork for 1978 while battleplans for next year are still unclear. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MELBOURNE

External: Highton Rotary invites us to bring slides as they and Glenys Martin tell Oombulgurri story to another Rotary Club. Ad in university and church newsheets nets nine young people who come to dinner and context for Oombulgurri task force team. Phil Adkins recruits himself and one strong young man. GWF miracle as Executive Director of YWCA decides to carry whole show for February GWF—money, venue, recruitment.

Internal: In midst of last minute task team send-out, colleagues pause long enough to have fun doing charades of our 16 global priorities during ecclesiola.

Contradiction: Making new tracks for new people while keeping old tracks moving. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CANBERRA—SINGAPORE NEXUS

External: Speaking engagement opens door for new office staff assistant. Development trek open new sources for major funding. Funds for Walkabout come through—\$14,000. CMA in Perth is broken open by up-coming sesqui-centennial.

Internal: Week of overtime work opens new timelines. Emerging generation in new roles of responsibility and pedagogy. House sees double feature: "Clowns" and "Home Sweet Home" and laughs at absurdity.

Contradiction: Keeping eye on comprehensive when very particular nitty-gritty is all-consuming. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BRISBANE

External: Mt. Tambourine community workshop is held with 30 key Jaycees from South Moreton region. Week of donor circuit produces \$1200 developed and working. Community Training Consult recruitment letters are sent out to colleagues in the "bush."

Internal: Anthony Betonte is sent to Adelaide CMA maneuver as Robert Yallop arrives for a week of development in donor circuit.

Contradiction: Using the situation of the pre-Christmas lull and extended holiday image to advantage. (Wk. 8)

SUVA

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MAJURO—MARSHALL IS. HDP

External: Kwelok an Bukon Assembly, outdoors in the Courthouse Plaza, pulls together the community to do practical planning of the next steps to care for DUD and initiates "Operation Showplace."

Internal: House honors local regulations relative to entry and work permits as Joseph Sebastian goes to Nauru (at the expense of his employer, the Roman Catholic Church) to await his papers and six renewal applications are submitted a week early.

Contradiction: Trying to retool Marshallese local people to do effective planning (a skill they have lost) when everything falls into paralyzing routine and patterns. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: APIA

External: Rural Development Officer visits metro cadre meeting and answers questions on government programs. The government at present time is interested in big villages. Site selection criteria sparks interest in HDP.

Internal: The back wheels of the car come off while driving it in to the garage for check-up before going on site selection visit.

Contradiction: Having supports but not having finished the selection of the village. (Wk. 8)

SAN FRANCISCO

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SAN FRANCISCO

External: Five colleagues are recruited to orchestrate and set

up Town Meetings next week. Over 1000 flyers and 200 posters are delivered, and 25 churches are contacted for Community Youth Forum next week. PEP (Primal Ecumenical Parish) takes responsibility for the RS-I course for December, unsystematically reviewing constructs and determining current edges.

Internal: Los Angeles and San Francisco Houses meet mid-state for a California Planning Day to vision the immediate and longer-range future of the two regions, hosted by the Sanger United Methodist Church and metro colleagues.

Contradiction: Maintaining the momentum and setting enough Development appointments to reach the bastion's goal. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SAN JOSE

External: California Planning Meeting in Fresno metro is a time with old colleagues to vision the future on forthcoming California Project. Full participation in Adopt a Village Development Blitz with altered house timeline engages all and builds new development contacts with old and new colleagues.

Internal: Seeing the "Circus of Dr. Lao" during Planning Meeting recalls our task to do the impossible in local communities and the Thursday evening dinner with San Francisco is a celebration of the glory of intense missional engagement of the battle worn warriors.

Contradiction: Creating the needed task forces to begin Town Meeting saturation in the Valley, secure orchestrators and begin Project staging. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SACRAMENTO

External: Participation in S.F. Region Adopt a Village Development Blitz secures funding from one half of Sacramento Town Meeting Steering Committee, opens up coprorations and initiates church participation. Two more Town Meetings are held in Northern Counties and three more in the City of Sacramento. Senior Citizen meeting is televised and shown on 6:00 and 11:00 news.

Internal: Regional colleagues become expert at leading Town Meeting workshops with new Evening Town Meeting format.

Contradiction: Developing a continuing structure to intensify GSD preparation, GWF initiation, and Metro Cadre engagement. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SEATTLE

External: First GWF with 36 participants creates groundwork for future forums across state. Four Town Meetings held with regional colleagues participating in staffing each one.

Internal: Fireplace was initiated (thanks to newly cut firewood) during reflection session for GWF participants.

Contradiction: Effective deployment of limited troops to stand chaste in the task. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: LOS ANGELES

External: Orchestrators declare that three TMs held were best spirit happenings of any TMs they had attended. Article of HDPs written corporately for Intermediate Technology: Los Angeles and the Los Angeles Energy Fair includes appeal for volunteers.

Internal: Terrific House Halloween party calls forth spirits to release spirit tales from past as Incognito Cadillac disappears, hopefully to return, for its role of dynamic delivery (transportation).

Contradiction: Bracketing good ideas and issues not yet ready to be tackled so that corporate energy and time focus on ripe tasks. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PHOENIX

External: In Eagar, a town of 2,000, 300 people turn out for TM. State brochure is printed for the second time.

(RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PHOENIX)

Internal: Kate secures House ditto machine at half price by tough bargaining. Development and CYF are in Region.

Contradiction: Finding simple imaginal framework to hold our new multiple thrust now that map is colored yellow. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SALT LAKE CITY

External: A fine RS-1 course is held. Two co-sponsors are secured for December GWF, the YWCA and the University of Utah, Women's Resource Center, as well as \$100 from major bank. Four great TMs are held in Colorado.

Internal: Fine weekly celebration is held over venison roast and apple pie, followed by drinks before the fireplace.

Contradiction: Maintaining the most comprehensive story that reveals the unity of diverse endeavors. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BILLINGS

External: Four Town Meetings (two on one night) in western Montana brings total to 16 this quarter. Development begins Eastern Montana Campaign (Operation Bushwack) with great reception from banks.

Internal: Whole House (minus circuiters) assist Inyan Wakagapi HDP in planting 80 trees and celebrate with steak breakfast at House Church.

Contradiction: Eliciting leadership style of affirmation. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DENVER

External: Held 5 TMs in six mountain counties on the western slope. Invitations mailed for \$25/plate Cannonball dinner.

Internal: Study of the rural paper held inclusive insights on the squeeze on and the possibilities for rural areas.

Contradiction: Operating with primary strategy of evening format and no back-up strategy leaves some counties undone. (Wk. 8)

Contradiction: Having all three campaigns in the winner's circle in the midst of winning. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: VANCOUVER

External: Regional maneuver plans shift to coordinate with areal maneuvers sweeping prairies. Visit with UBC Women's Center leads to new strategies for GWF. Strong collegial base is established as Armstrong Forum wins the day.

Internal: Colleague invites House for evening of Nigerian slides and sharing stories of Movement in Lagos and Africa. with visiting Lagos museum curator.

Contradiction: Creating practical symbols of the areal victory in Vancouver Region. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ANCHORAGE

External: Tanana Town Meeting ends October TM month as preparations for the TM Assembly break loose eleven new inkind resource people providing all food and materials for the day. TM Assembly breaks loose new possibility for all present.

Internal: House is impacted by the mundane and profound dimension of engagement celebrating the acquisition of one

new job and the life and death of Joseph Wesley Mathews.

Contradiction: Constructing the next major maneuver that capitalizes on TM October momentum while holding focus momentarily on sustenance. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SASKATOON

External: Dispersed House engages in preparation for Forums and GWF recruitment. Local Women's group gets busy collecting materials for Vogar quilt industry.

Internal: New colleague, Norma Chapman, visits House after completing assignment in Africa. Old colleague of Nan Grow's, Rev. Ramona Underwood, visits House.

Contradiction: Coordinating direct action of mission with journeying of the constantly emerging, caring people. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: WINNIPEG-VOGAR HDP

External: Decision to rent facility for Community Store initiates major renovations. The arrival of 8530 lbs. of groceries and \$1000 of inkind materials catalyzes decision to renovate. Resource Center open house celebrates the arrival of 200 volumes for the library.

Internal: Auxiliary journies to Winnipeg for celebration with movie, "Star Wars" and dinner at colleagues.

Contradiction: Creating structures that will release community excitement to concrete engagement in the task. (Wk. 7)

HOUSTON

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HOUSTON

External: House fields four orchestrators to four TMs during Week II. Set-up for 4-week maneuver "March to the Sea" completed and House looks again at set-up strategy. Third Town Meeting held in Houston's 3rd Ward.

Internal: Workshop held on the holidays, their significance and focus, which has us looking forward to the Feast (Thanksgiving), The Gift (Christmas), and the Party (New Year's). Inkind 10 wild ducks for Thanksgiving feast.

Contradiction: Changing focus from one maneuver to another. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: AMARILLO

External: Panhandle Reconnaissance Maneuver reveals follow through victories and reservoirs of troops for future maneuvers. New possibility is uncovered in Hemphill county (we thought there was only one town in the entire county) in rural church serving as center to human settlement called Gem.

Internal: House forces attend celebration of the completion of the life of JWM'.

Contradiction: Breaking down comprehensive demands to the simple set of tasks that need to be done today. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: SAN ANTONIO

External: Second week of Texas Del Sur circuit visits 14 towns in 9 counties, holds 2 more TMs, to bring total to 5 held, 7 dates set and 3 core groups meeting out of original 14 county target. In Mirando City, meeting ended with all present choosing a proposal and signing up to work on it as town coordinator takes notes and promises to call meetings in next two weeks.

Internal: Whole House, including E.G., is on the road.

Contradiction: Capitalizing on momentum TMs are building with no self support system. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OKLAHOMA CITY

(RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OKLAHOMA CITY)

Internal: Celebrated the completed life and death of Elaine Hockley. Guardians luncheon takes a hard look at Assembly preparations.

Contradiction: Tying up loose TMs across the state. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DALLAS

External: Town Meetings in Cookville, Linden and Pecan Gap prove the four hour TM construct can happen anywhere, anytime, and be successful.

Internal: Don Clark visits and does collegium on Town Meeting acceleration; Clesson McDonald visits from Washington D.C. and House prepares for Bi-metro Thanksgiving Feast.

Contradiction: Keeping our eyes focused on the next four weeks while sliding into Quarter III (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TULSA-DELTA PACE HDP

External: Adult literacy class begins with 15 participants and three local teachers. Two state Jaycee vice-presidents from Mississippi and one from Illinois Join two Jaycee chapters in Pace to form a Pace Jaycee chapter; 20 Pacers meet with \$20 to form the chapter. The Delta Pace Community Association is legally incorporated. Global Women's Forum is held with 28, including four from Duncan, Mississippi. Economic Acceleration PSU is held with 15 participating. Health Acceleration report is written and Health Bulletin Board is put in Town Hall. Social work class from Delta State University visits to see the update.

Internal: Art Birkey visits for two days to prepare for moving in January.

Contradiction: Maintaining creative tension between leadership and emerging community leadership. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: NEW ORLEANS

External: Day I and Day II experience wins all week with eight sprouts, five blooms and three harvests.

Internal: Mark Harvey and son from Pace stop in for dinner and move on after spending the day in Baton Rouge visiting architectural department at LSU.

Contradiction: Allowing communities who think Town Meeting is good idea to experience the hope that they can do it. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MEMPHIS

External: Benson and Gibson counties join the ranks of the awakened as they hold TMs 6 and 7 for Between the Rivers. An NAACP leader in Tunica, Miss. surprises us at a Sunday evening meeting as he announces to his church, before our presentation, "There will be a Town Meeting in this church for four hours before Christmas--now, you pick the date!" A December 17th TM date is the result. Clark visits and Malone & Hyde is impressed with Tennessee TM story.

Internal: Yorkville Town Meeting barbeque provides Saturday night celebration as entire House joins the feast. Youth Open House at school gets reports of excellence from teachers.

Contradiction: Marching boldly ahead without giving in to a mood of 'taking it easy.' (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ATLANTA

External: Color Gwinette County yellow, as posters in both stores draw 30 participants in a very conservative Georgia County.

Internal: V.W. drops motor, Granada drops its clutch, Fury loses transmission as automobile situation creates a momentary glitch in circuit rhythm.

Contradiction: Finding the means, methods and meetings to break loose TM before Christmas. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CHARLOTTE

External: Three TM's held in far western part of the state with ten more in the chute.

Internal: Youth cluster receives school report cards, then plan to intentionalize study time.

Contradiction: Development of field contacts that can allow TM set-up over the phone. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MIAMI

External: The yellow is spreading in Florida with 3 TMs held this week. In joint TM for Inglis and Yankeetown, Chamber of Commerce president comments that this was the first positive meeting they had experienced in years.

Internal: Our carefully yellowed map of U.S. does not survive a bath of coffee; Dana Dirickson recommends that yellow and brown not be mixed!

Contradiction: Finding the towns where the story that December is an impossible month for meetings can be overcome. (Wk. 8)

CHICAGO

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CHICAGO-FIFTH CITY HDP

External: Town Meeting is held with community in 1½ hours. Win-door industry collects over \$700 in orders for storm windows. Elders Action Guild takes off on preschool uniform sewing project. The industry initiation loan is expanded. Movement ecclesiola is held with Fifth City, House members and Guardians all in attendance. Four new Town Meetings set this week.

Internal: Sharp collegiums, beginning with a Monday collegium on "maneuver thinking" get mood of week focused.

Contradiction: Sustaining momentum with key program victories. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: WICHITA

External: Flint Hills campaign schedules Town Meetings; now there are twice as many scheduled for a nine-day period as there were for three quarters last year.

Internal: House is in attendance at NAACP Freedom Fund Dinner, further cementing authorization in Wichita's Black community.

Contradiction: Deciding to do the 13 counties rather than focusing on fewer "great" TMs. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OMAHA

External: Norfolk TM brings Nebraska TM total to 17, with 7 counties covered. Dates are set for December and early January in 6 new counties, and Nucor Steel becomes newest statewide sponsor with \$300 gift.

Internal: As 40,000 women gather in Houston, 2 women hold Ecclesiola Friday night--signal of the way things are likely to be.

Contradiction: Getting trained in the practices and grounded in the dynamics of 3½ hour TMs before the first one happens. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: KANSAS CITY

External: St. Louis House joins Kansas City House in one day consult in Springfield, Ill. which occasions metro gathering.

Internal: Mailing to nearly 1,500 TM contacts ready on time. Two cluster members join high school wrestling team. Metro colleagues join in TM data preparation.

Contradiction: Keeping in step with colleagues as we hurry toward 16 priorities. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MINNEAPOLIS

External: All but five counties in the state are set with a TM before the middle of December. A crew of 20 from the metro, House and past TMs orchestrate 5 TMs over the weekend. EG lead Children's TM by themselves. The Town Meetings happen in the midst of a statewide blizzard. Inkind victories include over \$1000 in office materials, food and lodging—and a car!

Internal: Sunday night House Church is a festive event after a week in which all youth, EG, Day I and Day II troops participated in 11 TMs across the state. House participates in celebrating the life and death of Elaine Hockley and Mark Hockley leaves for Chicago to attend funeral.

Contradiction: Catalyzing yeses to TMs when official and unofficial leadership see the creative cohesive power of the TM but are afraid to take initiative. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ST. LOUIS

External: Nine TMs completed in two-week maneuver in Southern Illinois with House, Nexus, area and regional colleagues cooperating.

Internal: Chris is asked to be in "Who's Who in American Women." Glenda begins teaching job at Soldan High School by taking class on journey through black history using screen of reflective levels of consciousness. We get kitchen sink for \$1.00.

Contradiction: Deciding the victory of the quarter and putting iron brackets around our many wish dreams. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PEORIA

External: In two-week set-up town of 300 turns out 100 (75 adults, 25 children) for evening Town Meeting.

Internal: Memorial service for Joseph Wesley Mathews draws together assortment of colleagues in a celebration of the victory in death.

Contradiction: Fighting the temptation to relax now that 12 of 13 TMs for this quarter have been held. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: GREEN BAY

External: Three more counties are done, four more are set up. Week 2 circuit claims a victory and first Appleton ecclesiola rewrites the workbook; during sodality.

Internal: Colleague at ecclesiola promises the turkey for Thanksgiving. Mexican family of five shows up for House Church.

Contradiction: Moving faster than ever before (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MILWAUKEE

External: So many more TMs set up that it is hard to keep track. Village Adoption presentation is made to the Seratoma Service Club.

Internal: Charades highlights this week's ecclesiola. Reflects on death of Elaine Hockley.

Contradiction: Creating victory story and model for TM funding blitz. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: INDIANAPOLIS

External: Three day-long TMs held in Kendallville, Huntington, and Ft. Wayne launch TM: Indiana with 170 in attendance. Louisville and Lafayette Cadres meet Monday night to strategize on TM and RS-I and have White and Vermillion counties moving nicely. Initial yeses in both Hancock and Hamilton counties look good too.

Internal: Twelve House and metro colleagues journey to Chicago to celebrate the completed life of Joseph Wesley Mathews.

Contradiction: Creating timelines that manipulate time so that 10 more TMs get done before the "Christmas mindset" takes over. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CINCINNATI

External: House team of two spends three days in far reaches of the territory to find local man looking for community responsibility and involvement. Planning for 1978 TM brochure is begun.

Internal: Job search continues and renters are anticipated by November.

Contradiction: Realizing that the task is never complete while sensing the earth moving underfoot. (Wk. 3)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: DETROIT

External: Held 13 TMs in a week's time to complete victorious Northern Michigan Campaign of 26 counties prior to hunting season.

Internal: 17 colleagues celebrate completion of Northern Michigan campaign and launching of southern Michigan campaign to complete state before Christmas. Circuit teams get gonged in gong show singing medley of Town Meeting songs before packed night club audience.

Contradiction: Uncovering gold mines in golden glove state to pay for great campaigns. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CLEVELAND

External: The first evening TM is scheduled for Thursday night with everything ready to go in one week. Incredible Saturday blitz includes 15 community citizens and resulted in posters on every corner, brochures in every home and speeches or phone calls to organizations and churches.

Internal: House initiates metro circuits by meeting with colleagues for dinner in each of three polis groups.

Contradiction: Finishing work left undone for the sake of the future victory. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ROCHESTER

External: Orchestrator training in Binghamton yields trained troops that plug in immediately to TM assignments.

Internal: House members' creativity is let loose on basement and the result is a guest room that is the envy of all.

Contradiction: Internalizing methods in order to deal with the flexibility of TM time design. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: RICHMOND

External: Mini-centrum dynamic continues through preparation for 43 TMs next week in Southern Division. C&P

(RELIGIOUS HOUSE: RICHMOND)

Telephone Company comes through with \$500. Mayors of Baltimore and Charlottesville, Virginia, proclaim November 17 TM Assembly Day for their respective cities.

Internal: Bingham act as callers for square dance at Saturday celebration. Joseph Wesley Mathew's Memorial Service is occasion for all to take responsibility for the Spirit Movement.

Contradiction: Completing geographic saturation this quarter, with the demands of the next quarter already upon us. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: WASHINGTON-IVY CITY HDP

External: Heat installation and preschool renovation consume week during which we host the Jeudo Vice Governor and Island Saemaul Chief from Korea and a representative from the United Methodist Church's Commission on Race and Religion here about the grant for the Infant School.

Internal: Refocusing occurs during collegiums shaping the necessary strategies and maneuvers to assure victory in June.

Contradiction: Doing mid-course corrections without losing altitude or speed.

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BALTIMORE

External: Extensive Development continues with Black and Decker, Sam Newspapers, Carling Breweries and 30 other major companies and promises from CIP Telephone. Holiday Inn is secured for one TM Mid-Atlantic Assembly site.

Internal: Collegium on symbolic images of Movement is imaginative occasion for all.

Contradiction: Embracing each assignment as crucial in the midst of repeated changes. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: PHILADELPHIA

External: Global Servant Force say yes to TM assignments. Harrisburg Orchestrator training occurs in midst of conversation with local women representatives to prepare for Global Women's Forum. Whole House participates in completion of Town Meeting Mid-Atlantic.

Internal: House begins practical preparation for Quarter III's campaigns. Mailing for Joseph Mathews Memorial Service calls forth the church and service, with 21 around the table brings together old colleagues.

Contradiction: Enabling the Global Servant Force to take the quantum leap of commitment demanded by Quarter III. (Wk. 8)

Internal: Three-night planning task force works through implementing details of Weeks 8-13 to get the 'Jump on January.'

Contradiction: Communicating and symbolizing destinal significance of this quarter in order to let go of current maneuvers and move into Quarter III. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HARTFORD

External: Four House people orchestrate TMs and two youth go as enablers. Eight TMs are held November 5. Completed mailing of 1650 invitations to TM grads go out to attend Assembly at Faneuil Hall on November 19.

Internal: Memorial Service for Joseph Mathews brings forth two Faith and Life Community friends of Joseph, Hollis Huston and David King.

Contradiction: Making assignments to enable the area maneuver and still carry on the usual local missional tasks. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: ALBANY/MANCHESTER

External: Seven more TMs are set up in Long Valley operation to bring total to 13 out of 13. Inkind produces 200 rolls of masking tape, printing of 3000 sheets, decor materials and New York State Senate artist for New York Assembly decor; 145 egg muffins, eight dozen peanuts. Development checks continue to be sent in.

Internal: Star Wars celebration on Week II launches week of travelling at faster than light speed.

Contradiction: Engaging of others in the task. (Wk. 6)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: BOSTON

External: Nine TMs were held Saturday; every New England state held at least one. Rhode Island is now completed to the county level. Over 20 metro colleagues participated in orchestration.

Internal: Local memorial service for Joseph Mathews was attended by 52 friends and colleagues.

Contradiction: Bridging the 18-month gap between past Town Meetings and present excitement over the New England Assembly. (Wk. 6)

MONTREAL

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: MONTREAL

External: Forums in the Seaway continue while we are regrouping for the next maneuver.

Internal: Watching documentary on life of Sir Wilfred Grenfell—spirit giant with audacious circuiting style while mocking-up new bilingual workbook and concluding with celebration for Elaine Dahlke.

Contradiction: Signaling the new maneuver to ourselves and maintaining corporateness with troops in five locations for the next six weeks. (Wk. 8)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: TORONTO

External: The whole House is sent to three area fronts: New Brunswick, St. Lawrence Seaway Forums and area inkind.

Internal: House moves out of present facility and sets up ICA office in a metro colleague's home until a rent-free facility can be found.

Contradiction: Keeping the identity of the Toronto House and holding the cruciality of its geographical care while absent from the turf. (Wk. 5)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: OTTAWA

External: Leeds-Grenville Development Day Assembly links regional institution to awakening and creates practical tactics for proposal actuation.

Internal: Area Council uses GCF method and discovers how well it works.

Contradiction: Defining new missional operation image that will carry all into end of quarter with momentum and internal structures. (Wk. 7)

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: HALIFAX-LORNE DE L'ACADIE HDP

External: Eleven Forums held and 11 new ones are set up. One dozen community youth work on "Lorne Voice" as a result of the Community Youth Forum. Trappists grant a \$5,000 loan, bringing to \$25,000 the long-term low-interest loan for the Lorne Economic Development Corporation.

Internal: Canadian Religious Orders pray for Joseph Mathews.

Contradiction: Establishing regular corporate reflection on comprehensive Project design. (Wk. 5)

CARACAS

RELIGIOUS HOUSE: CARACAS-CANO NEGRO HDP

External: Having proudly completed repainting and functionally renovating the Medical Dispensary, Health Caretakers are commissioned in a festive ceremony attended by community and health officials in representation of regional hospital and the state of Miranda Health Department. First TM (Foro Comunitario) given by Cano Negro leaders, in conjunction with members of Caracas cadre, calls forth visible signs of resurgent hope in nearby village of Tapipa Grande.

Internal: House celebrates completed life of Joseph Mathews with prayer and memorial service, and sends our priorship to funeral service in Chicago.

Contradiction: Formalizing practical training program to enable efficient project management. (Wk. 6)

Hong Kong submits sixty-five working proposals in Manila. Singapore makes ninety-five development calls in Jakarta. The Ian Potter Foundation grants \$15,400 in Melbourne. New support comes from a Dutch foundation in Jakarta. Chicago launches the "Great 343" with five week maneuvers to raise \$343,000 to meet principles and write full program checks by the end of the year. The contradiction is in the arena of turning the massive amount of working requests into usable cash.

Global Academy graduates 50 students, representing nine nations, with immediate engagement of half the entire group in health treks, in Town Meeting and Development circuiting and in other centrum functions. Meanwhile, stories about the red Journal reveal significant impact on Order and Movement as colleagues are spied reading it on San Francisco buses, during lunch breaks in Hong Kong and in local church parsonages in Wisconsin. Three-day intensification of symbolic life (Richmond - Dahlke wedding, Elaine Hockley funeral and Wiegel baptisms) places demand of serious reflection on the shape and function of transparent liturgy in the church. Under the rubric of "Everyone a researcher," Research Centrum's Advent expectations include anticipation of depth sharing of collegium insights on "What, God Hath Wrought" and "The Next 20 Years," and hope for breakloose in historical church strategy through corporate analysis of the "Global State of the Church." Handling these arenas calls for intentionalizing of the research band, which will deal with the contradiction stated by Brussels Nexus: "Seeing research as an active dynamic beyond what's 'in and thru' all that we do."

Global Operations Centrum reports Community Meeting Australia begins to break open with date and money pledge set up in less than half a day in a community near New Castle. Attendance of 175 at Brisbane CMA helps break open that area for future CMAs. Chicago Nexus sends Leah Early to Africa and India on GWF trek, Carol Pierce to Asia for GWF courses and Mary Ann Mann to Europe to set up and teach Forums. Two travel to Pace to introduce literacy course to Pacers and do economic acceleration. The Health Acceleration Team returns from Pace, giving exciting reports on Health Fair and Health Advocates. Economic acceleration work continues in Fifth City, focusing on the Shopping Center, Economic Acceleration presence is sent to Cano Negro, a team of two Guardians and two Centrum Chicago staff. Special GCF strike forces were sent to Southern Illinois to set up TMs in the counties. Other special forces were deployed to Florida, North Carolina and Michigan. The contradiction lies in the arena of telling the story that elicits an immediate yes.

Receipt of financial reports on the business enterprises in HDP projects indicates a new level of fiscal responsibility. The contradiction lies in the arena of the unrealized flow of weekly and monthly reports which blocks the global picture.
