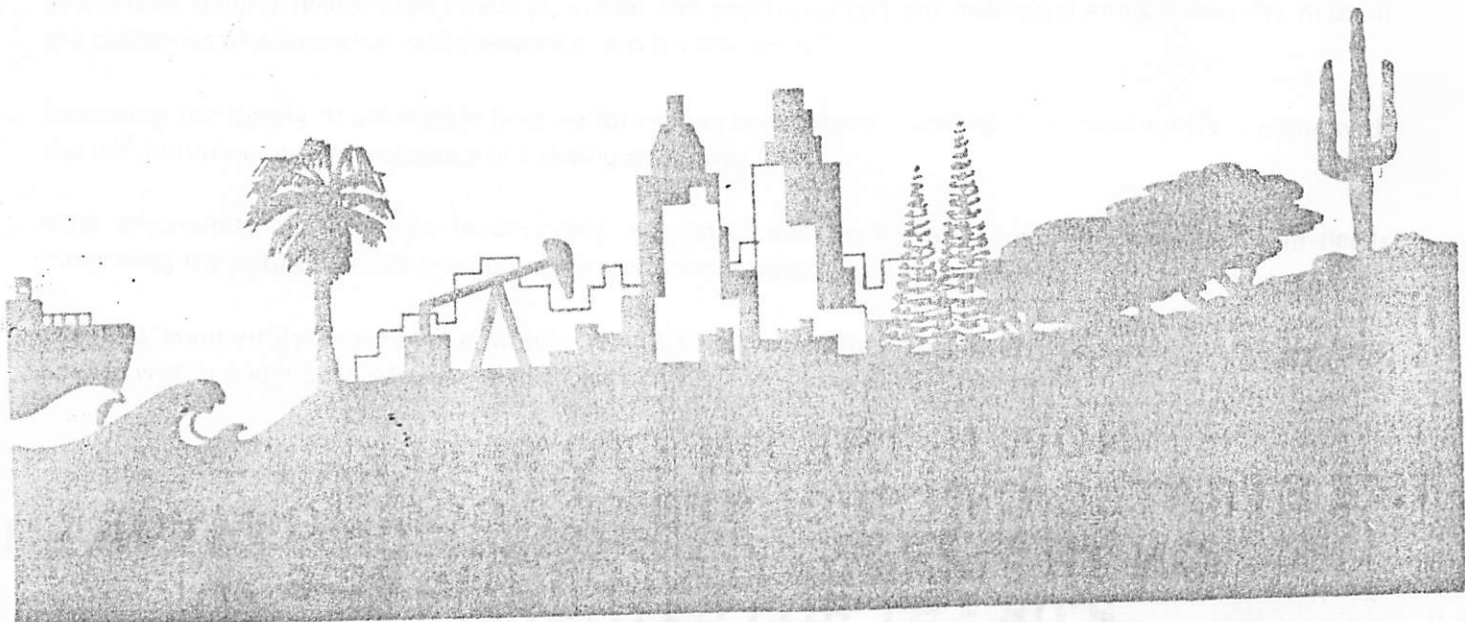

Since Symposium I in May 1981 an extensive network of people has been working to respond to the Mandates of the 80's. Now in SYMPOSIUM II a broader group of people will hear the results of these probes and engage in focused workshops to shape the next strategic steps. Each participant will interchange program insights. Panels will highlight the accomplishments in each Mandate arena. Small workgroups will develop and propose strategy components. Plenary sessions will articulate consensus for our future action. A mood of serious reflection and responsiveness will awaken new motivation.

The Institute of Cultural Affairs is organizing and facilitating SYMPOSIUM II as a service to institutions and communities which are concerned about human development in Southern California.

The ICA has had full-time staff in Los Angeles since 1968. This staff plus a network of dedicated part-time consultants have been providing leadership training and development seminars and programs to serve the needs of communities, churches, agencies and businesses across the region. Since 1975, Institute staff have facilitated community 'Town Meetings' in over 100 communities in the region. Especially since Symposium I in May 1981, ICA staff have focused on enabling agencies, businesses, churches and communities to create new strategies to implement the Regional Mandates in these times of great economic pressures.

Organizationally, the ICA is a not-for-profit private body funded through many contributions from individuals, corporations, foundations and religious bodies. The Institute now provides human development consultative services through offices in 24 regions in the U.S. and in 32 nations around the world.

For SYMPOSIUM II, an experienced team of eight ICA staff will orchestrate the program including full facilitation of small-group workshops. The team will have backgrounds in public administration, business management, agency administration, organizing of volunteers, community development and program management. This team will be the nucleus of the follow-up efforts to implement the results of SYMPOSIUM II.
