The planning of Tokyo Area Council focused on the 18 months through July 1984. It marked a shift in our consciousness from two nations to one area. It also marked a shift in strategy from basically an extensive mode to an extensive/intensive mode. Finally, it was seen as a time of positioning ourselves during the next 18 months for a bold new 4-year plan in 1984.

I. POSITIONING FOR HDZ

It is the intent of Area Tokyo to position itself to launch 5 HDZ's (one per region) in August of 1984. Out of this intent arises a primary image of "6 in 56". While a symbolic image it also has content. The 56 refers to the 47 prefectures and 9 provinces of Japan and the Republic of Korea respectively. Our intent is to circuit/visit all 56 over the next 18 months. The 6 refers to the designated pilot HDZ in Cheong Won County, the HDP in Yubari and 4, as yet undesignated, HDZ's in Japan. Our intent is to strengthen our relationships and programs in all these locations in order to have 6 demonstration signs and a geographically inclusive movement network.

A. GEOGRAPHIC DEMONSTRATION

The major form of "6 in 56" will be given in this arena. It is our intent to do 56 geo-social systems research circuits by July of 1984. Twenty eight will be completed by September of 1983. Each region will design its own circuit schedule. In addition each region will hold one or more focused circuits per quarter. A focused circuit is to a specific place where more intensive program and/or follow-up is being conducted. In quarter III 5 regional strategy practicums will be held. Thinking on community systems will be included as a part of the practicum. On April 16-17 a Japan Task Force will convene with one representative from each of the Houses to pull together our thinking. Sapporo region will organize a symposium on "Coal Mining Communities" as an indirect tactic on Yubari.

B. MISSIONAL EXPANSION

The major emphasis of this arena is expanding our missional thrust and network of relations through social systems as opposed to geography. The two basic vehicles to do this are the IERD and Volunteer Programs. It is our intent to have a national gathering in Tokyo on Saturday, March 6 during the occasion of Sir James Lindsay's visit to Japan. It would be the time to plan for Japan's role in the IERD and to raise the question of a National Steering Committee. Each region would seek at least two representatives to attend this meeting. It is strongly recommended to Brussels and Hong Kong that Lindsay visit Japan Week 9 for funding calls and to help launch the national committee. The Tokyo region and advisors will provide overall coordination for the IERD. Between now and the meeting each region will be making calls and contacts to identify interested individuals and organizations with the objective of forming regional IERD sub-committees. During Lindsay's visit the GAB members will be contacted for development calls and strategies. In quarter IV each regional will hold a symposium or think tank on rural development. George Kawai will work on an insert for the current IERD brochure and Sapporo will create an "image piece" like the earthrise on the subject of global rural development.

With the volunteer program our intent is to expand the opportunities for service and to strengthen our network of social relations. While in Brussels Sandra will research the European volunteer model and our version will be refined, and offered in late February-March in anticipation of the Philippine work camp. The work camp, March 20-29, will be an Area program encouraging Koreans as well as Japanese to attend. The National Coordinator for Japan is Mary LeBlanc, and each region will provide one or two people as local coordinators. Recruitment will be done

locally through articles, talks, and advertisement. During quarter IV Tokyo House will produce a volunteers brochure. In quarter III each region will hold a volunteer service think tank to identify the organizations and opportunities for volunteers. Information to be gathered and listed (bilingually) include: Group or organization name, # of members, age range of members, nature of services, national headquarters, countries related to, our contact, and any other relevant information. (NB: the development card file system could be used here). During quarter IV each region will conduct a symposium on volunteer programs.

C. COLLEAGUE ENGAGEMENT.

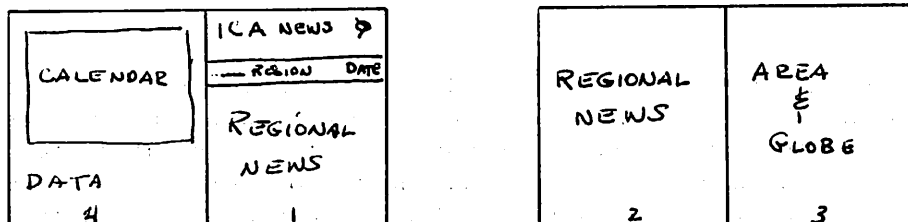
Specific recommendations were made in this arena as helpful images and actions for each region to consider and utilize. They included: initiating regional councils, building regional calendars with volunteer slots, identifying volunteer pools, establishing ICA International Circles in each region, recruiting people to Academy, holding regular advisors meetings, holding an annual membership celebration, and regional decor of members participation record such as a map and names. Sapporo region will translate the charts from the Area Council into Japanese.

II. SHAPING COMMUNICATION RESOURCES

It is the intent of Area Tokyo to demonstrate new means of information interchange and economic support. The former strategy is to provide both access to and communication of bilingual information. The latter arena is to reimage and undergird our current self-support modes.

A. INFORMATION INTERCHANGE.

The information interchange will be implemented by two strategies, promoting public image and providing information access. In order to promote our public image each region will publish a regional newsletter monthly, bi-monthly, or quarterly with the following common format.



The language published in will be determined by each region. Sapporo will create and publish a poster with the theme: Global Rural Development-Hope for a New World. The prose will be in English/Japanese and English/Korean. It is recommended that each region in Japan revise and publish the Sapporo membership brochure for their own region. The personal nature of the brochure seems to be its strong point and it is not recommended for central publication. A semi-annual area publication will be created and edited in Tokyo. Seoul region would get proofs to facilitate local translation and publication. It would include news from the area, globe, articles that ground the ICA work and philosophy and serve as a forum for original articles. Consideration should be given to advertisements in this piece as a way of funding it.

In regard to providing information access it is our intent to expand and share the information available to us. All regions will encourage regional colleagues to provide pertinent articles, books, and periodicals to the houses-particularly those that are bilingual. Each House will distribute relevant material to all the regions. Reference libraries and bibliographies are encouraged in each House.

B. ECONOMIC VENTURES.

It is the intent of Area Tokyo to launch our first steps in new economic ventures.

Sapporo House will research and purchase a new computer, with consideration given to compatability and English/Japanese software. During quarter III Sapporo will have a "hands on" learning will initiate word processing and ICA in-house applications. In quarter IV economic ventures will be launched in word processing and children's computer classes. Tokyo House will follow-up on the in-kind offer of computer time on the Bunka L.I. machine.

It is the intent of Area Tokyo to broaden our language teaching opportunities and to build on our vast storehouse of experience. First, we intend to perceive language teaching not only as a skill, but also an opportunity for education in Human Development. Secondly, we will follow-up on our initial efforts at curriculum building. Fukuoka will publish the results of the English Language Lab held in quarter II and each House in Japan will be assigned another portion of curriculum to build. Tokyo House will complete the 12-week curriculum for development education during quarter III. S. Rafos will experiment with it at the YWCA classes beginning in April.

III. SUSTAINING DEPTH CARE

It is the intent of Area Tokyo to continue to manifest the spirit depths of our work and programs. As an organization we intend to communicate and serve the needs of human development to undergird that we are NOT just a social agency or development group.

A. STAFF DEVELOPMENT.

The staff development will be implemented by two strategies, strengthening our sojourn models and journeying global staff. In regard to sojourn models each House will review its sojourn program and consider implementing the following actions; Guide-books given to sojourners, sojourners pay a yearly program fee, trips outside the country be considered and encouraged for every sojourner. This might mean some practical enablement for the sojourners like helping them to build a savings plan or searching for cheap travel, etc.

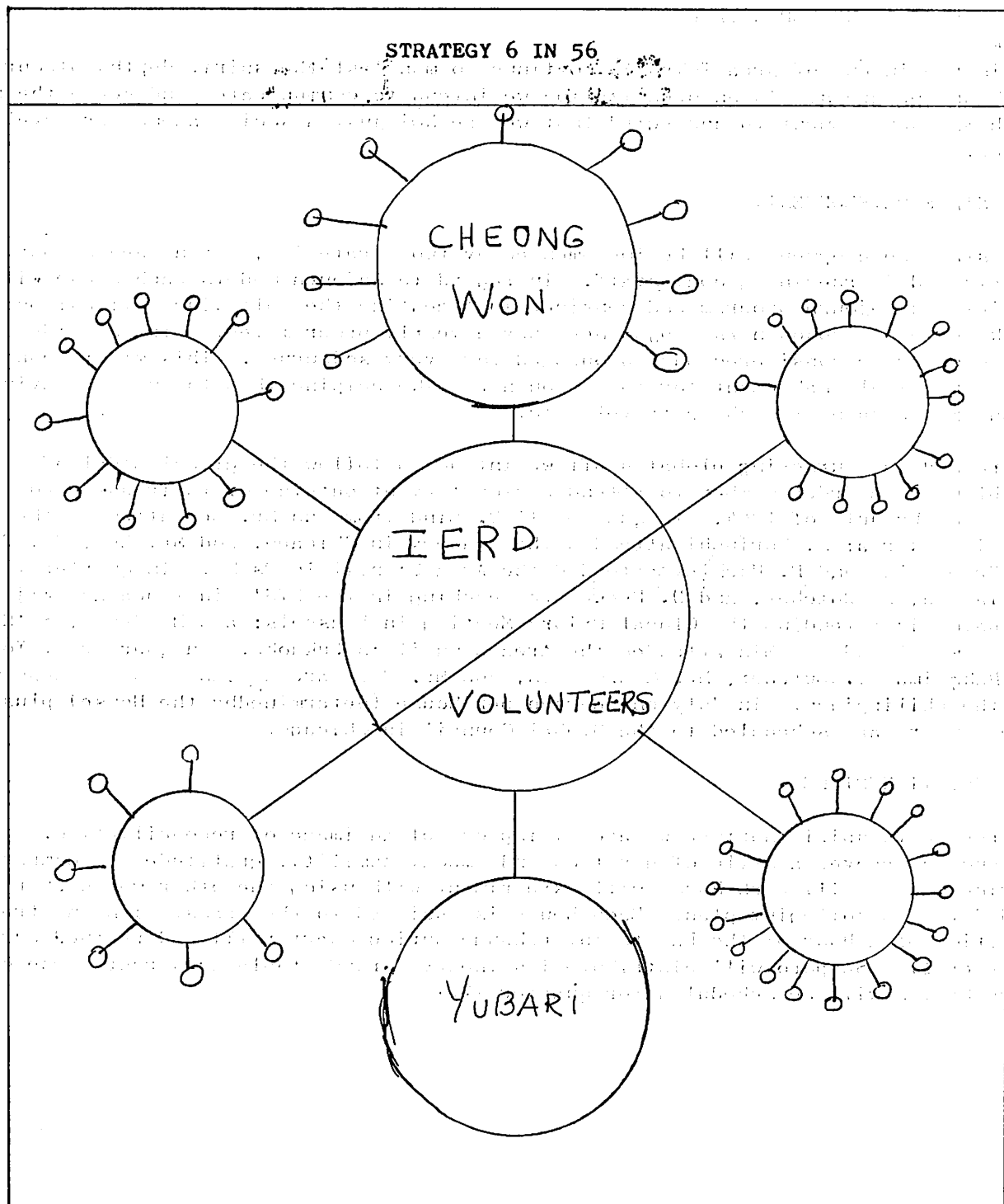
In regard to journeying global staff we intend to follow the global model of enabling each Order member to attend a global event outside of their assigned location by July of 1984. In quarter II D. Lindstrom and Mr. Lee attended the GRA in Jakarta; M. Horiuchi attended the Academy in Chicago; and Mr. Lee, Mr. Park, L. Greenwald and P. Hockley attended the Area Council in Osaka. In quarter III S. Tanaka, R. Butcher, and D. Reese are teaching in the PTS's in Tonga and Fiji; S. Rafos is attending the Global Priors Meeting in Brussels; and M. Jenks, S. Hamje, P. Schwobel and Mr. Min attended the Area Council in Fukuoka. In quarter K. Yoneda, Y. Nakajima, C. Butcher, Mr. & Mrs. Min, and Mr. Park are assigned to the Academy in the Philippines. In July one person per House (determined by the House) plus the Area priors are scheduled to the Global Council in Chicago.

B. SPIRIT NURTURE

In regard to spirit nurture we are living out of an image of reconciliation. We intend to recover a style of devotion and embody humility, gratitude and compassion. During quarter III each House will experiment with using the other world charts and devise a collegium plan. Each House is assigned to the translation and transposition of a Hour of the Day to interchange during quarter III and refined during quarter IV. Sapporo will distribute its Theory Z round table construct. One or more RS-1 s will be scheduled for quarter IV.

DEVELOPMENT

It is the intent of Area Tokyo to continue to move to realize its global obligations and bottom line. The Area development team has been designated as L. Hockley, Seoul; D. Hinkelman, Sapporo; J. Patterson, Tokyo; J. Lindstrom, Osaka; R. Hansen, Fukuoka. Each House will exchange GD-100 reports monthly and quarter III will be emphasized as a maneuver on Religious Orders. Sapporo in particular will explore funding for our research efforts and to seek funding for HD education as an ICA program. Major funding efforts will be tied to Sir James Lindsay's visit in March.
