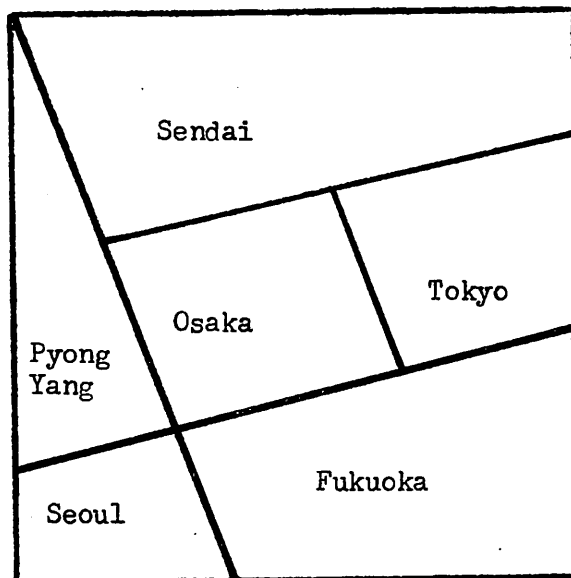
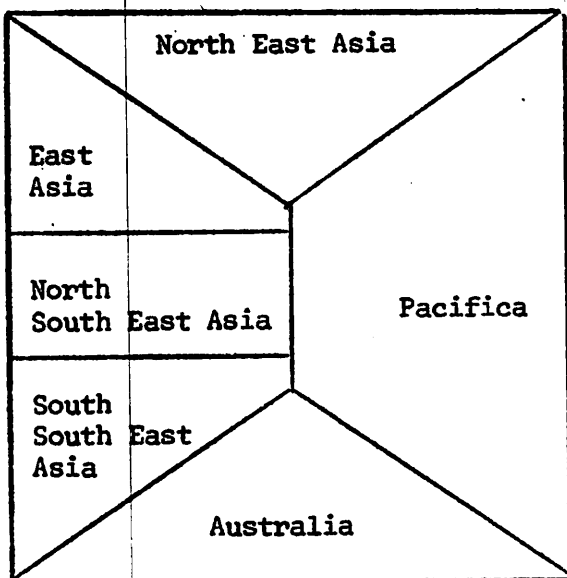

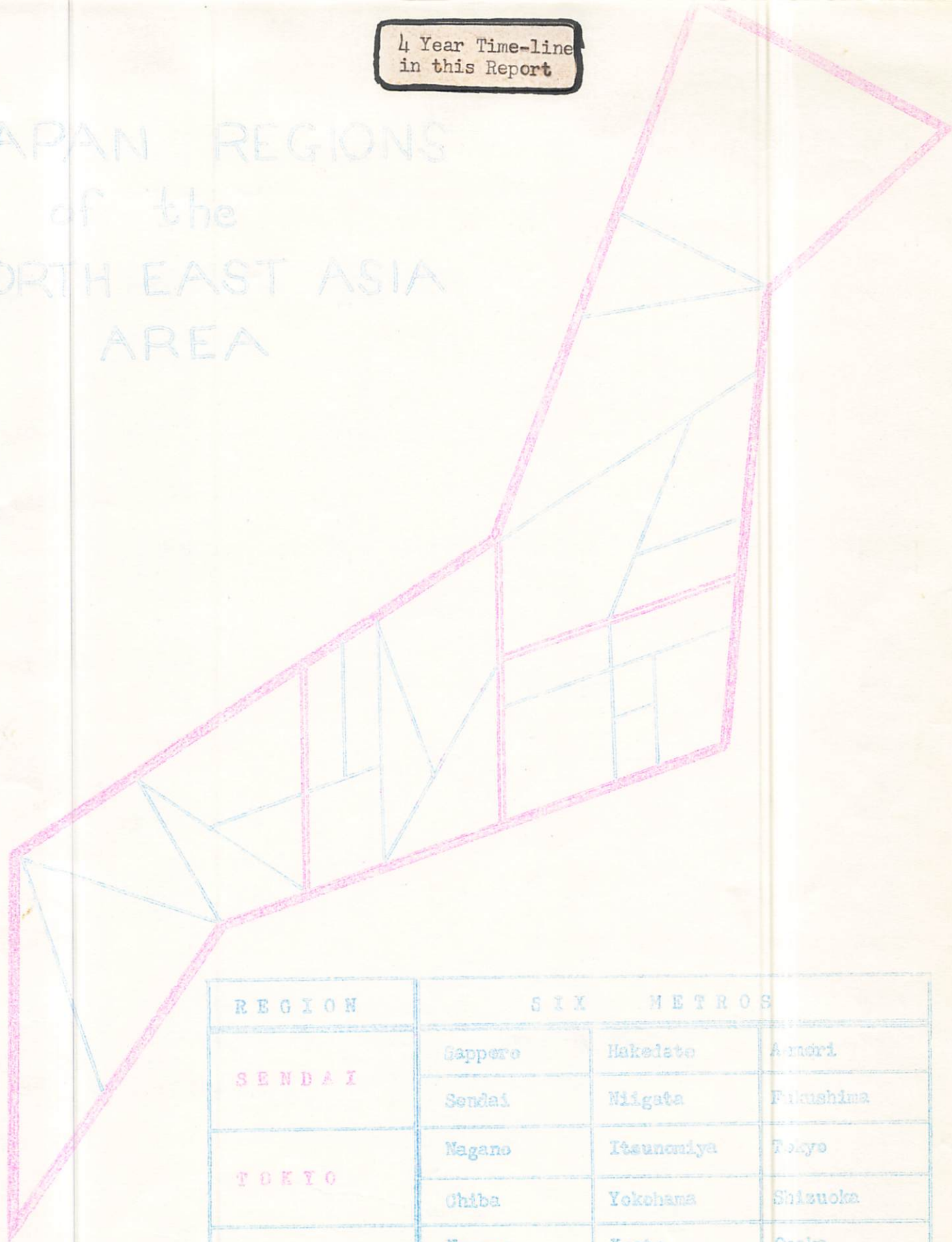

LEADERSHIP TRAINING

A key imperative for Northeast Asia and for all of SEAPAC is the raising up, training and nurture of 12 Iron-Men in each region who are

- Corporate and Disciplined Colleagues
- Master Pedagogues
- Spirit Giants
- Trans-cultural Human Beings

Without this happening, all else that is done will be for nought.

The following charts indicate

- The present situation and evaluation of the Iron men in each region (chart 1)
- The projected concrete program of training and nurture necessary for each person (chart 2)

Although many of the programs include similar dynamics and emphases each has a unique contribution in the journey of the Iron Man:

ATI	Area Training Institute: A two-week program within the Area to raise the possibilities for renewal, to excite, and to create a sense of responsibility in the Movement.
SOJOURN	For various lengths of time in the Religious House or Outpost to expose persons to new dimensions of corporateness, to provide cadre nurture and to share movement edge.
ITI	International Training Institute to sustain depth penetration and to expose persons to the cultural diversity, and to create a decision for the Movement.
IIP	International Intern Program particularly for those who have had the ITI to confront with the global aspects, and to create corporateness.
INTERN	For one year in a Religious House in order to deepen Spirit Style and Order decision.
ITI FAC.	In order to sustain or create Movement Decision, and to participate in disciplined colleagueship.
PED'gy	Theological clarity, and Methodological prowess is key to all movement leadership.

MONK'S SUNDAY: SENDAI OUTPOST

The Monk's Sunday program was an experiment in establishing the outpost as a nurture and training dynamic on behalf of the region. Guest night was an excellent tool for intensifying collegiality, but did not provide a way for colleagues to get much of a participatory feel after corporate living. The Monk's Sunday experiment was designed to intrigue people into constructively participating in outpost life, and to excite them through broadening their movement context and intensifying their spirit journey. A morning study on the Local Church Project provided futuric contexting, and an afternoon RSI pedagogy session provided a way to reground them in their spirit journey. Since we did not want this to be a program, but more a corporate living nurture dynamic, we did not require coming to all of the Sundays; but rather to definitely commit themselves on an application form for whatever sessions they chose to attend. This proved to be helpful in holding the tension of a serious decision to take part while all sessions were advisable but not required.

The sessions were offered every other Sunday for two months, strategically chosen not to interfere with weekend courses or other regional activities. Attendance per Monk's Sunday varied from two to five colleagues, representing two cities. The depth thrust of each Sunday set a valuable image of the outpost as an authentic nurture structure.
