THE TEMPTATION OF SUCCESS AND THE TEMPTATION OF FAILURE

Now the temptation of failure is to think you possess one ounce less of security before God than before you failed. God owns your failures now. Let them be. Let them be. God gives you your failures back to participate in responsibly—possibility, possibility, possibility to assume responsibility for the failure you now are. Watch out. Watch out. Temptation is crouching at the door. You must master it.

The temptation is to give in to despair—
to despair over having been so weak as to fail
to despair over the consequences of having now failed
to despair over being in despair.

In despair one wishes to have succeeded, and the hard cold fact of ...failure builds up new longing to succeed, that the pain of despair might pass.

But the moment I even wish to take joy in having succeeded I am in despair over having failed.

Let it be. Let it be. Take no joy in the fact that you have treaded on snaked and walked on scorpions and overcome all the enemy!s power and returned home unharmed.

But take joy only in the fact that <u>God</u> owns your dees and he gives them back to you to participate in creatively for the future.

And watch out: for temptation is crouching at your door.
